

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



EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Simple Rules For Stickers

Primary Day across the state may be chaotic for election officials, but it need not be so.

For there are very simple, easy to follow steps in using a sticker, that would avoid much of the confusion.

It's obvious that the Republican party will have a candidate for governor - and there may be others who will gamble on getting more sticker and write-in votes than the official candidate. All this could create one of the worst foul-ups in modern election history.

And it probably won't be any better here, than elsewhere in the commonwealth.

Town Clerk George Winslow thinks "It'll be a mess".

Actually, it's easy to use a sticker. It should be pasted on the ballot under the section titled "Governor" and a cross placed opposite the name, just as in normal voting procedure. That's all there is to it.

Write-in votes are easy too - write or print, legibly, the name and address of the person and place the cross opposite the name.

The simplicity of this operation should be obvious but it never is. In any town or city election in which a sticker campaign is run, there's trouble. The stickers are pasted on anywhere, voters forget the cross or they vote for the name printed on the ballot and also paste the sticker on.

For those in Andover who wish to vote by sticker or write-in, this word of advice:

Don't be in a hurry - look at the ballot and be certain you place the sticker under the section devoted to the governor's contest. Put a cross opposite the name on the sticker. Or write in the full name and address and put your cross opposite that name.

If you do this, it will simplify the task of the election officers and your vote wil' be truly effective. If these directions are not followed, your ballot probably will not be counted in that contest.

Must Take Action

Off-street parking - a necessity in any progressive community - almost became a reality last week, as town counsel ruled that some of the \$25,000 off-street parking fund could be used to straighten and cover Rogers Brook on the West side of Main st. to allow use of the area. Merchants had asked the town to do this much, clearing the way for a leveling and hot topping operation they planned to support privately.

But almost as soon as the good word was received, bad news followed. Seems the town can't spend the money for this purpose after all, nor can the town lease the finished

lots, under the wording of the particular article appropriating the funds. Thus the town - all its residents, its officials and its merchants - are right back where they started.

There has been a suggestion that the wording of the article in question be changed, by proper steps at the special town meeting.

Any constructive action that can be taken - which would give the private citizens an opportunity to create some off-street parking - should be accomplished swiftly and without objection. If it works out that the town can, by changing a few words in an article, clear the way for a project of such importance, then this should be done. If, in so doing, a small section of Rogers Brook can be repaired, to allow better functioning, then this is of real benefit to the entire community.

It is essential that some steps be taken to provide adequate off-street parking. The merchants and interested private citizens have expressed their willingness to construct the lot, if the brook problem can be solved. This seems a logical step for the town to take.

Keep An Open Mind

A small flurry of excitement was created some days ago when Selectman Sidney P. White suggested hiring women as poll workers. For, unlike many communities, Andover just doesn't - as a matter of fact, never has - hired a woman for this task.

We don't want to create an issue, where none exists. But it is only fair to reiterate what many communities have already discovered - women do as good a job at the polls as do the men.

The advantage to having an open mind on this subject is the probability that there some day will be a shortage of male help on election day. For not every qualified man is able to leave his work when needed.

It might be wise to leave the door open to hiring women as poll workers - we're sure they can do as good a job and sometimes they are available at hours when men are

During World War II Dr. Phillips was in charge of Y.M.C.A. work among non-Europeans in 50 military camps. A member of the Y.M.C.A. national council for many years, he was recently presented a gold medal for his work with the association by its honorary president, Dr. F.G. Jansen, the Governor General of the Union of South Africa.

As chairman of the town council of the Moroka Emergency Camp just outside Johannesburg, Dr. Phillips has been in effect the mayor counsellor and advocate of a shanty community of 75,000 non-whites.

Having the respect and confidence of both whites and non-whites since his earliest days in the country, he has served on countless commissions and committees concerned with problems ranging from housing, wages and juvenile delinquency to education, local government and sports.

Born in Hawthorne, Wisconsin, Dr. Phillips was educated at Carleton College and Yale University Divinity School.

Dr. Phillips has recently been honored by election as moderator of the General Council of Congregational Christian churches. Use General Council of Congregational Christian churches. Use election took place at the national meeting of the denomination held in Boston last June. The position of moderator is the highest elective position in the denomination and Dr. Phillips' election marks the first time a missionary has ever held the important office.

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

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
