In the case of the Suburban Household Enterprises, the board found that there was sufficient area but lacked the necessary 180 foot frontage as prescribed by the by-law. The lot frontage on River rd. is only 83.43 feet.

Further the board found that the lot is so irregular that the house would not conform to the size, shape and set-back of other houses on the thoroughfare. In the decision, the board reports it, "does not believe that the variance could be granted without substantial detriment to the public good and without substantially derogating from the intent or purpose of the Andover Zoning by-law".

In the petition for a subdivision of present property by Rose and Sarkis Colombosian, the board was requested to approve the division of land separating a house and garage on one parcel and a creamery and shed on another.

The petition was denied after the board found that the proposed dividing line would run between the garage and creamery in such a manner as to leave no space between the rear of the garage and face of the creamery and less than three feet between the sides of the buildings. This would be a violation of the zoning by-law, according to the decision. The board reported it was unable to grant the requested relief since it would be of substantial detriment to the public good and a substantial deviation from the zoning by-law.

The petition of Chester D. Abbott was granted, allowing him

Abbott was granted, allowing him to convert his present dwelling into three apartments, utilizing portions of the first and second floors of the building as the third section.

floors of the hist and second floors of the building as the third section.

Restrictions, however, were placed on the granting of the variance, which will govern the conversion of the home. These restrictions stipulate that no structural changes shall be made on the outside of the building, only the first and second floors of the dwelling shall be utilized and that the dwelling shall contain only three apartments.

In granting the request, the board found that the house was large, close to the street and that another multi-dwelling unit was in the immediate neighborhood.

# Voters Should Attend Session

This, very frankly, is a plea to all registered voters in the town to attend the special town meeting Oct. 6, at 7:30 p.m. in Memorial Auditorium.

The community has had several disappointing experiences with special meetings, particularly when they do not excite debate over large appropriations or emotional

And at this session, there is little to offer in the way of excitement.

But there are vital proposals, all the same.

The zoning articles - referring particularly to the garden apartments, shopping centers and business zone are of special importance to us all.

So, too, are the articles requesting appropriation transfers to accomplish the annual program of the Board of

In short, although this meeting promises no sensationalism, this town's registered voters have a civic duty to perform by attending the session and staying until the end. A quorum of 350 is sometimes difficult to exceed, so let's not forget that date - Oct. 6 at 7:30 at Memorial

# Have Courage, Not Fear

After listening to the abundant reasons for and against zoning to create a multi-housing district for a garden apartment project, we have come to the conclusion that a community must take a calculated risk when dealing with problems of this type, whether they be concerned with housing, business or industry.

The negative viewpoint, in large part, was based on the town's lack of control if garden apartment zoning is approved. In essence, this argument said the town should not allow the zoning unless it has air-tight control over the construction of the future. And it was pointed out with vigor that the town could run the risk of seeing some types of construction in the special district that would not be pleasing - this, based on the contention that the developer might change his plans later or might sell the property to another developer, who would build sub-standard housing units.

On the positive side, proponents of the special zone argue that the town should protect itself as much as possible, with rules, regulations and restrictions, but should not insist on perfection. This reasoning claims that the town must put some faith in the plans of the developer, particularly when the individual or firm happens to have excellent financial standing and to be of fine reputation.

It seems quite obvious that perfection can not be reached. But it also appears sensible to assume that we must not insist on it, for fear we will never be able to take a progressive step in our blind insistence on this tight control.

As it happens, the developer of the garden apartment project has himself agreed to any reasonable restrictions. the town wishes to write into the zoning law. He realizes that the law probably could be circumvented somehow, during the coming years - but he also has pledged himself to abide by the law.

And in this case, what more can the town do? It seems to be a case of standing still, in fear of the future, or moving forward courageously, in the belief that community benefits from the project will exceed its detrimental features.

And this criteria, we suggest, should be used whenever a new project is suggested.

Will the project, of whatever description, help our town to such an extent that its bad features are outweighed? If the answer is yes, then we should always take the progressive step forward. We should never look so fearfully at the negative side that we see, but do not comprehend,



For the past four years, he also has been secretary of the Overseers committee headed by David Rockefeller, which studied the needs of the college.

"In recent years one out of four undergraduates has sought his counsel through the Financial Aid Office. Invariably, they have found him a wise, practical and friendly source of help. # Problems, Politics Involved In Conversion To Manager Plan

THURSDAY

On the other end of a flitting five-month span, Andover will make a fresh municipal start under its town manager charter.
This much is fact.
But how it will be done, what happens in that transitory period between election and appointment of a manager, is a subject of considerable quiet debate among town officials.

considerable quiet debate among town officials.

Mainly, the discussion center around interpretations of the charter. But weven throughout the private talks is a strong political thread — who will the five selectmen be?

men be? Practical Politics

As the manager charter reads, each candidate for Selectman must choose a term and stay with it. Two will be elected for three years, two for two years and one

years, two for two years and one for the one-year term.

It's expected that there will be considerable jockeying for position, with candidates hoping to pick a soft spot. And of course there will be the inevitable attempt by some to so crowd the ballot with candidates that a minority set will mean electric.

vote will mean election.

Although there has been no announcement from any source, it is well understood in most political circles that the present Selectmen will seek election to that office under the new charter. But office under the new charter. But for which terms they will run is anyone's guess.

And there have been strong

rumors, amounting to certainty in some observors' minds, that two or three members of the Board of Public Works will seek a Select-

Names of other candidates, although the election is many months away, have been bouncing from mouth to mouth. But there have been no announcements and it appears that many names under it appears that many names under discussion are just that — names, without much foundation in fact.

It has been anticipated, from public statements by members of the pro-manager group, that an attempt will be made to elect at least a majority of the Board. Whether this will be in the form of a slate of five candidates or whether the committee will choose whether the committee will choose individuals, but not a full slate, is not yet known.

is not yet known.

Also under consideration, it is understood, is the question:
"Can an opponent of the manager plan last year help administer it fairly or will he approach the new system with a negative attitude?"
Some present officials and private citizens, themselves opposed to the plan, have said they believe most men could impartially support the manager plan, even though they were vigorous and articulate in their opposition last March. Others believe this isn't possible and they predict there may be a two-fold effort by proponents of the plan — to elect pro-manager candidates and also to at least prevent the election of the most definite opponents.

Another interesting sidelight on the campaign is the possibility that a woman might, for the first time in the town, have a good chance for election. One observor of the local picture thinks this may be a real possibility, in a crowded field.

In the field of legal interpretations, it is understood that several problems are presenting them-selves for solution. Who will serve as assessors,

These, then, are some of the subjects under consideration, as the town faces this major change-over; and these are some of the political ideas and opinions of individuals in, or close to, elected offices.

offices.

On one item there was unanimity of opinion — that the next five months, until election; and the following months until a manager is appointed, will be some of the most fascinating and certainly in that capacity, but certainly the town will need assessors during the town meeting period and afterwards. One answer, given considerable weight, is that present assessors will continue in the office until their successors are appointed and sworn in.

Other town officials, who will be appointed under the manager plan, presumably will continue to serve until they are re-appointed or another appointment is made.

The Board of Public Works, on the other hand, will be abolished as of election time.

But that Board must submit its annual budget for 1959 and someone certainly will have to explain it at town meeting. To whom this responsibility will fall is not clear. But some interested parties believe the Selectmen will fall heir to this job.

What happens, then, if the incumbent Selectmen are defeated or do not choose to run?

That possibility, while perhaps remote, must be considered.
