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



Duff said the developers wanted the town to dig up Lowell st., so that they could furnish a culvert for installation. 

What Our Readers Say—

To the Editor of the Townsman: 'With progress on every side, sometimes overlook the need we sometimes overlook the need to make corrections in rules and regulations which have become unnecessary. Two instances need our attention: The compulsory school attendance laws and the age limit in the child labor laws.

"In a day gone by, when schools were ill-equipped and far away, when there was plenty of work to do on the farm and there was no law against child labor in the factories, the compulsory attend-

law against child labor in the factories, the compulsory attendance laws were essential, otherwise few would be in school. But that has changed.

"Alas, now there is little for the child to do at home; all our schools are within walking distance or bus ride; the value of knowledge is brought into every home by means of newspapers and magazines, and other means of universal communications. Parents fully comprehend the usefulness of fully comprehend the usefulness of education for their young and go out of their way to see that they are in school. It follows then, that compulsory attendance is no longer useful. Indeed, in some cases it's actually a hindrance in that it keeps in school some pupils that would be better out, thus making room for others.

"On child labor, those laws were established when working conditions in factories were a real test of physical prowess and the normal day was 12 hours. Now it's a rare factory in which the working conditions are not better than in the homes of 70 percent of the workers, the hours are eight of the workers, the hours are eight or less, with food and rest in abundance. In such a workaday world, a youngster of 14 can be of much use, as well as in part time work, in many spots about the community.

"Because of this progress, we handly consider renealing the

"Because of this progress, we should consider repealing the compulsory attendance school laws and reducing the child labor laws, to 14 from 16 years of age. Doing that, we would be proving our faith in democracy by improving its quality with infusions of still more democracy, a society without compulsion being our great secular aspiration.

Mr. Warlick said this percentage has fluctuated all the way to, and over, 70 percent during recent years, but the Committee believes that 30 percent is a fair estimate.

Thus, they use the number of births recorded in town six years ago (presumably the ones who enter grade one six years later)

After this is done, he indicated, the same grade has been projected all the way through grade 12, with the statistics indicating very little change in class numbers from grades three through eight.

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
