## Slow-Down In Growth Predicted For Schools

### Played Worst Game Of Season

"You can say this much - we're making this week a little more strenuous than usual".

That's head football coach Dick Collins talking, in the aftermath of Saturday's 14-0 loss to Marblehead . . . and in the face of a tough Woburn opponent this Saturday.

"We played the worst game of the season", Collins flatly stated, "specially in the first half. The breaks just didn't go with us in the second half. We could have won it with the breaks, after all, we had four touchdown drives started and three were stopped by fumbles."

What about those costly fumbles that stopped the team cold?

"They were our responsibility. The movies show that Marblehead didn't have anything to do with them, like tackling extra hard."

In part, this week's tougher practice schedule is to tighten

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Andover's school population will not increase as rapidly in the next 10 years as it has in the past, according to a statistical analysis prepared for the School Committee by a special committee of townspeople.

The group, headed by Louis M. Warlick, included Charles Langdell, C. Lincoln Giles, Prof. Charles H. Dufton and Lewis C. Trumbore.

The statistical study resulted from the School Committee's desire to have some definite estimates on which to base decisions as to school needs during the next decade.

The study, carried out by men trained in the field of statistical research and projections, indicates that the total public school growth in five years will be between 348 and 527 - with the strong recommendation that the School Board use a figure closer to the minimum estimate than to the maximum.

The Committee Chairman, Mr. Warlick, explained the plus and minus factors considered by the

## Bushy-Tailed Kitty, In Pa., Belongs To Someone Here

A Pennsylvania woman is looking for the owners of a 4-5 month old kitten, lost in Andover Sept. 25.

The long-distance lost-and-found effort results from a strange set of circumstances, with the Townsman and the Board of Trade asked to serve as intermediaries.

In a letter addressed to "The Chamber of Commerce, or any such organization" in Andover, a woman in Sellersville, Pa. asks to be put in touch with owners of the kitten.

Apparently pedigreed, the female cat is orange-tan, speckled with black and has a "very bushy tail".

"She's lovely, and fascinating to watch", our correspondent writes, "and I would like to keep her. But having two dogs and a cat of my own, I know how this

family is feeling about their lost pet."

Seems the Pennsylvania woman has a friend who was working here in Andover during September - but she doesn't know where the friend's residence was. The kitten followed him home one night as he returned from work and he took it in rather than see it stay on the sidewalk all night.

Having to leave Andover permanently the next day, he took the kitten to Pennsylvania.

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## Delays Naming Ass't. Principal

The School Committee has tabled, for one week, a recommendation that Mrs. Dorothy Partridge be named assistant principal at the Junior High School.

Mrs. Partridge was first recommended for the job some weeks ago in a letter from Benjamin Dimlich, principal. At that time, Supt. of Schools Edward I. Erickson said he had no prior knowledge of the letter, before it was handed to him the night of the meeting. The Committee declined to act then, stating its belief that any such appointment should come through the superintendent.

## Will Discuss Assessing Methods

Town assessing procedures will be explained to the Board of Selectmen next Monday night, at the suggestion of the five elected officials.

Selectman Edward P. Hall suggested calling in the assessors, commenting that the Board should know how assessments are determined. Other members agreed that they should be well-informed on the practices.

Mr. Hall also suggested that it may be necessary for the Selectmen to establish some policy for the assessing department in relation to increased assessments for home maintenance.

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## Drainage Dispute In West Andover

The Selectmen expressed deep concern with drainage plans for the sub-division on the Wild Rose Farm, during the regular Monday night session.

Secretary William Stewart focused the Board's attention on the plan, which was approved early in June by the Planning Board, following extensive hearings and many discussion sessions.

Stewart said he doesn't see how a 50-inch drain now installed in the development can be tied in to the existing drains in Lowell St., or Argilla rd. These are two-foot drains, he stated.

Stewart commented that he

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### Selectmen Issue U.N. Proclamation

In recognition of United Nations Week, beginning Oct. 13, the

Selectmen have issued a proclamation urging the citizens of the town to demonstrate their faith and belief in the aims of the UN, by observing United Nations Day Oct. 24.

Miss Miriam Putnam, librarian at the Memorial Hall Library, is town chairman.

She has made available materials about the United Nations for any individual or group. Special films have also been booked for the week and are now available for any community group.

The proclamation by the Selectmen reads:

"On June 25, 1945 in San Francisco, the United Nations came into being to help the peoples of the world to live at peace with one another.

"In its comparatively short life it has had achievements as well as failures. It is understandable that its failures sometimes loom larger than its successes. Yet we know how difficult it is to get things done on local, state and national levels, even when people speak the same language.

"Often, too, the violent disagreements in the Security Council and the General Assembly make the headlines, while little is made in the public press about the important work that gets done quietly and without fanfare through the United Nation's specialized agencies. Work which contributes so much to the easing of world tensions through the eradication of disease, through the sharing of technical progress, through the spread of education, through the pooling of essential knowledge.

"As members of the Andover Board of Selectmen, we urge the citizens of Andover to demonstrate their faith and belief in the aims of the United Nations by making appropriate observance of United Nations Day, Oct. 24, 1959."

At the request of Mr. Erickson, the Junior High principal then sent a notice out to the teachers asking if there were any applicants for the position, and none were received except from Mrs. Partridge.

A lengthy discussion of the appointment took place at the last School Committee meeting, but this was an executive session and the details were not made available. However, Mr. Erickson then circulated a notice to all teachers asking for applicants, and suggesting that interested teachers could discuss the subject with him without applying first, if they wished. Only one application was received, other than Mrs. Partridge's letter.

Tuesday night, Committee members discussed the subject openly, referring several times to the procedures used by the principal in making his suggestion to the Committee as being poor.

It was also disclosed that Mr. Dimlich had made up his year's schedule on the basis of Mrs. Partridge being appointed, and this action must have taken place prior to the opening of school in September.

Members John Sullivan and Milton Meyers expressed concern over the feeling among teachers that there would be no use to apply, after the original recommendation from the principal. Supt. Erickson agreed that this feeling might very well be a factor in the lack of applications.

But he said he would not recommend anyone unless they applied, even if he knew that someone else in the Junior High might be a stronger possibility.

Dr. Meyers suggested that the best possible person be recommended by the superintendent,

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who had also agreed that if things were equal, he would prefer a man in the job. But said Mrs. Partridge had many qualities recommending her for the position.  
Mrs. Reta Buchan spoke of embarrassment that would result now, whatever the Committee recommendations.

Secretary William A. Doherty presiding in the absence of Chairman Roy Russell, urged the Committee to take some action, said, in agreement with Mr. Erickson, that the school need the services of an assistant. He suggested that if the Committee didn't want to appoint Mrs. Partridge, they find someone else and draft them for the job.

Both Dr. Meyers and Mr. Sullivan felt that the appointment should be put over for a week and Mrs. Buchan agreed when the matter was put to a vote. Supt. Erickson urged action at the Tuesday meeting, asking the Committee what would be gained a week's delay.

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## Sean Rhu Won 2 Blue Ribbons

One of the largest - perhaps even the largest Irish setter ever to appear in dog shows in this area, and possibly in the country,

is Sean Rhu, the friend and constant companion of Major William F.M. Longwell of Henderson ave. Sean, at what Maj. Longwell calls "the height of his obesity", weighed 105 pounds. A strict diet brought that down to a heavy 92 for the dog shows this summer, in which Sean took two firsts in

American Bred Dog classes. Others in the class weigh in the mid-70's. The fact that Sean is so big sometimes is no asset when it comes to entering a show, however. Maj. Longwell explained that some judges just don't like big dogs, and hardly look at the handsome setter. Others have a fondness for the larger dogs, he continued, and to them, Sean stands out.

Major and Mrs. Longwell had three Irish setters previously, but Sean is the first registered dog they have owned.

But even though he has all the qualities to make an excellent show dog - as proven by his triumphs this year at the North and South Shore Kennel Club shows - they prefer to have him as a friendly pet.

Sean roams the Henderson ave. neighborhood - where, best of all, he likes the youngsters.

This is a routine that hardly meets the requirements for a "professional" show dog, according to Maj. Longwell. The "pros" are kept carefully groomed, and put in hours of practice in the proper stances. "We just didn't want to get into that sort of thing", the major commented, although he has received offers to show the dog from professionals, who would keep the animal during the show season.

Sean - whose full name is Laurel Ridge Casey O'Shea -

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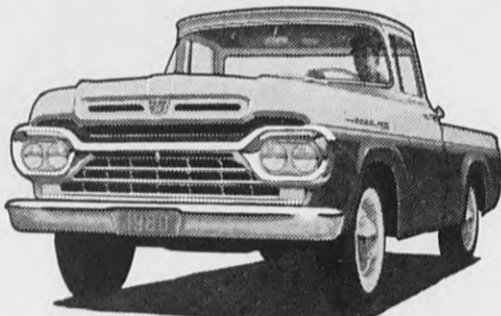
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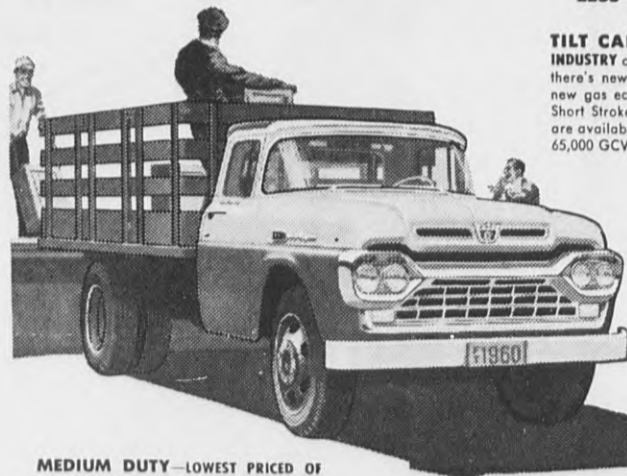

actually begins to get the treatment about two months before a show.

Major Longwell explained that the hair is trimmed about the length of time before a show so that it will grow out to just the proper length.

Flees, not permitted on dogs at the show, are another problem. Major Longwell says he now castrates the dog at just the right time, so that he is free of them at the show. Lots of special combing and brushing go into getting the dog ready and, strangely, the toenails on the rear feet must be cut to a certain length.

As Major Longwell explained, the nails must be short enough so that the animal is comfortable with his rear feet stretched back. If he is not, he'll keep shifting the feet forward to get away from the pressure of the long nails - and this is something that counts against the dog while he is being shown. Actually, the animal should be able to keep his show pose for quite a span of time, the nails are just right and the training has been constant.

Sean, although he knows the tricks of his trade pretty well under the friendly urging of his master, is no "professional". Instead, he's a big, sociable fellow who's just as likely to come home covered with burrs after a run in the woods as a mongrel.

And if anyone in the Henderson ave. section happens to hear clatter somewhere near the garbage pail, it's likely to be Sean.

"He knew when he was on a diet", explained Major Longwell, "and didn't try to raid the garbage pails. But after those shows he really began making the rounds".

"One day", he continued, "I put him on the leash and let him lead me around the neighborhood. He started at the Abbot Academy garbage disposal site and we visited three other garbage cans before the trip ended."

Whatever his tendencies towards finding additional food supplies, Sean isn't in the same category as one of the setters the Longwells owned.

That eccentric animal, while waiting for Major and Mrs. Longwell to come out of church on Sunday, carefully picked up wrapped garbage somewhere in the neighborhood and spread it out on the church lawn for all to see.

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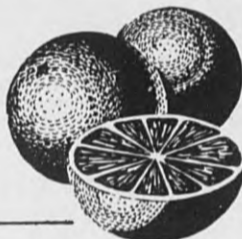

"Machine-made bread" was advertised boldly in 1858, evidence of a change in thinking from the 19th century to this modern age when "home-made bread" is now worthy of notice. This difference in social attitudes and customs is the core of an exhibition

current at the Addison Gallery of American Art, Phillips Academy, until Nov. 30.

"From The Rooftops - 19th and 20th Century Advertising Art" consists of a group of 69 quaint 19th century advertisements running from the 1830's to the 1880's, lent by the Library of Congress and circulated by the Smithsonian Institution, Washington. In sharp contrast is the 20th

century counterpart, assembled by the staff of the Addison Gallery, featuring the work of Boston artist, Carl F. Zahn. Zahn's principal occupation with the Museum of Fine Arts, his problems and challenges wider and consequently design which he has made for clients are also displayed.

A series of panels demonstrate the modern designer's role in advertising thinking is also included as part of the exhibit and small display of 20th century roadside folk art, as seen through the observing photographer's eye. Nina Howell Starr, adds to the over all interest and amusement for the exhibit as a whole possesses entertainment, as well as a nostalgic glimpse of American past. 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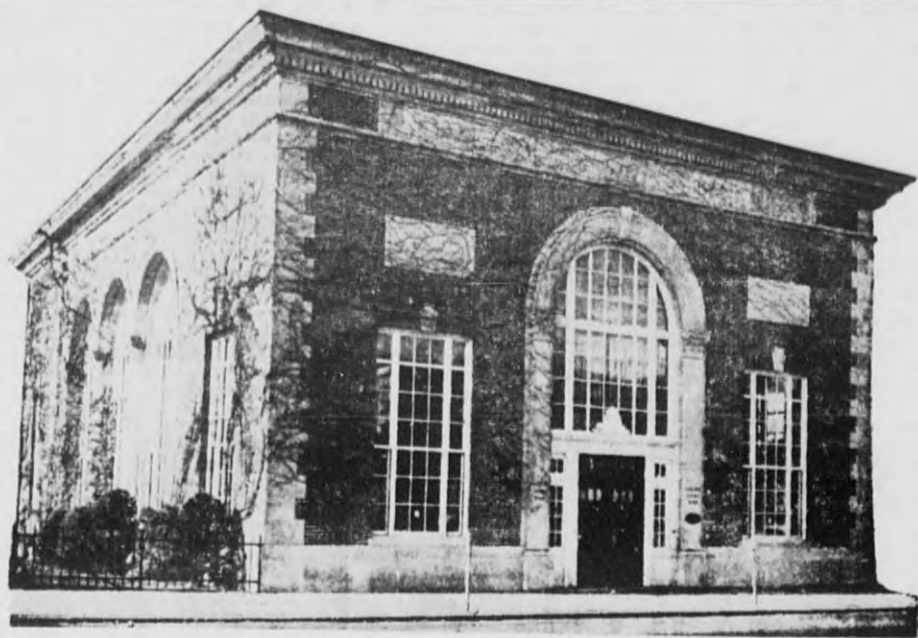

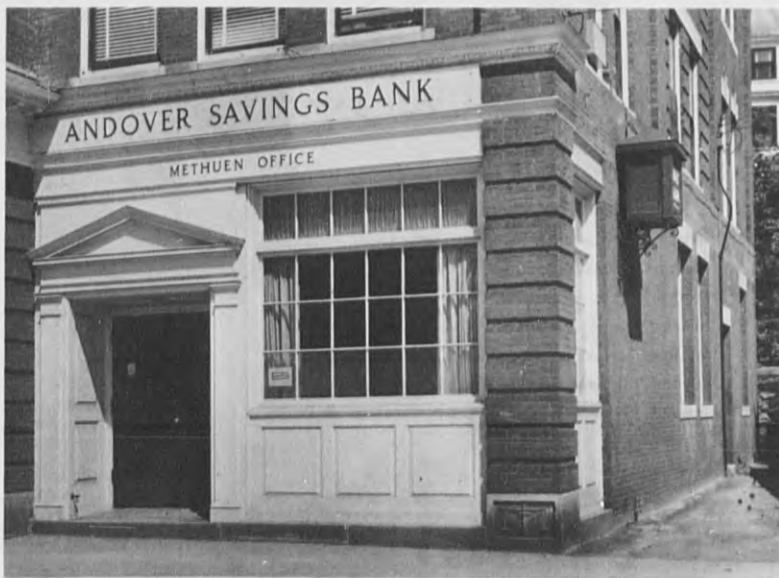

watched water flowing from the drains last weekend, in consider-

able quantity. And he pointed out that the town should, in no way, be put in the position of being responsible for any private development's drainage.

"Let them stop building if they can't solve their own drainage problems", he told his colleagues.

The Board agreed to seek town counsel Fredric S. O'Brien's ruling on any legal entanglements involving water flowing on private land after being conducted to that land through a drain in the street. Town Manager Thomas E. Duff said the developers wanted the town to dig up Lowell st., so that they could furnish a culvert for installation. Duff said he had told them to do the job themselves, and that they probably would be responsible for any extra water damage done to land across the street. There was considerable discussion about how much a present waterway could be increased, and who would be liable for damages.

The plan was approved in June, showing over 40 houses and drainage for that area. Also shown on the plan was the 90-inch drain, that eventually will handle water from the remainder of the 150-home sub-division.

But it has been explained that the Planning Board agreed that the amount of water being carried in the pipe from the 40-house area will not be more than existing town pipes can handle. The problems created when the entire area is to be drained will have to be solved then, it was stated.

The Planning Board, along with the Board of Health, is charged with the responsibility for approving or turning down plans for sub-divisions. But it has been explained that the Boards can only consider the plans before them, not potential plans that might never become definitive.

Plans, as a matter of courtesy, are also channeled through the town manager's office, although his signature is not required on them when approval is given.

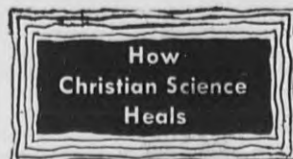

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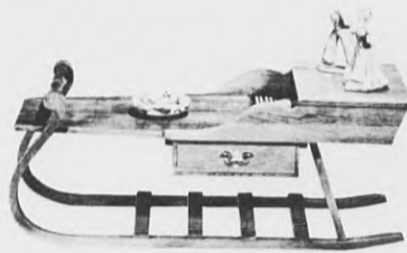

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## Dr. Frishman Led Committee In Preparing Winning Paper

A paper prepared by a committee of top research men, headed by Dr. Daniel Frishman, 14 Castle Heights rd., has won the inter-sectional competition of the American Association of Textile Chemists and Colorists.

The paper, "Pile Fabrics", was a cooperative effort of several men, some from competing firms. It was rated the best paper presented in the competition, with seven of the 12 sections of the nation presented. The Northern New England section last won this competition in 1947.

Serving with Dr. Frishman on the committee were Fritz Kobayas-

ki, Lowell Technological School; Harry Freedman, Malden Mills in Lawrence; Daniel P. Collins, Derby Co.; Henry L. Pero, Carbide Chemical Corp., Needham; Sam Golub, Fiber Service Co., Boston. Dr. Frishman is head of research and development for the Malden Mills.

Coincidentally, back in 1953-'54 he formed and chaired a committee in Washington, D.C., which prepared the winning paper in the 1954 competition.

Dr. Frishman, who was brought up in Brooklyn, N.Y., received his A.B. Degree from Brooklyn College, his master's degree from Catholic University and received his Ph.D. Degree at Georgetown University. He formerly worked at the Harris Research Laboratories in Washington, D.C. and at A. Hollander and Son, a fur processing firm. He was one of the key scientists concerned with developing the first atomic bomb at Oak Ridge, serving with the Manhattan project for over a year.

The paper prepared by the local group was judged by men representative of the 12 sections of the country. A maximum of thirty points could be given a paper for each of these categories: originality, scientific value and practical value. Another 10 points maximum is assigned to the presentation of the paper at the Association's meeting, held this year in Washington.

## Want Contractor To Fix Roads

Expressing displeasure with the conditions of Dascomb rd. and Lovejoy rd., the Selectmen have instructed Town Manager Thomas E. Duff to confer with the Realty Construction Co. over immediate repairs.

The firm has had the streets torn up while installing sewage, water and drainage.
