High Plain Road Pit Requested

John M. McCoy of Sunset Rock rd. has applied for permission to level off his land on High Plain rd. and sell the soil.

A hearing on the request will be held Dec. 21, at 8:30 in the Selectmen's meeting room.

Mr. McCoy owns the old Babicki farm, which is bordered by High Plain rd., Wood Hill rd., Haggett's Pond and Haggett's Pond rd.

The path of construction of Route 110 will be through this general area.

According to normal procedure, only the actual abutters have been notified of the hearing. They are Vincent A. Rodden and Frederick K. Welch, Gleason st.; Curtis J. and Ethel J. Davideit, 219 High Plain rd. and John and Sophia Chmielecki, 251 High Plain rd.

Under the town by-law, the Selectmen must hold a public hearing on applications for gravel pits, or the sale of soil as requested by Mr. McCoy.

Testimonial Planned For Retiring School Custodian

New Parking Lot May Be Filled

The possibility that the newest 514-car Raytheon parking lot may be full the moment it is opened arose this week.

A traffic count taken by Officer Roy A. Russell in Shawsheen indicated that a possible 394 cars, now parked outside the lots, should be using the lot when opened. And Officer Russell estimated that 175-200 cars now using the largest of the Raytheon lots might move into the new one, because they are parked in aisles, traffic lanes and other areas not specified for parking.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported the results of the traffic count to the Selectmen Monday night.

He said the town will enforce existing parking regulations the minute the new parking area opens, in order to drive the cars into the parking lot. But any new regulations to further control parking should await the results of the rigid enforcement, he advised the Selectmen. If need be, he suggested shorter parking

Besides the house-to-house calls that the girls have always made, many of the local business firms and banks have signified their willingness to allow the girls to sell Camp Fire Girls assorted chocolates on their

premises. As Mrs. Frank B. Santuccio, chairman, recently stated, "This type of cooperation is particularly beneficial when the weather is so uncertain at this time of the year. The cooperation of all the townspeople is requested during this once-a-year drive so that the organization can continue to fulfill its purpose — increased service to girls of every race and religion."

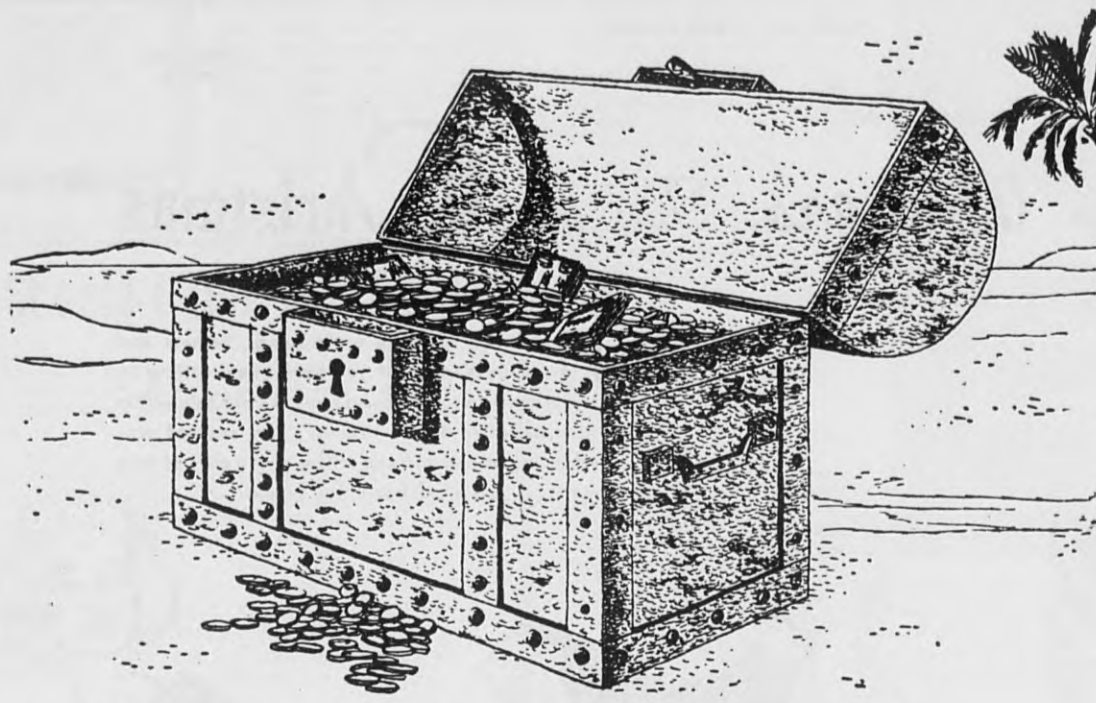

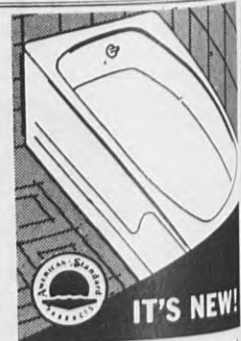

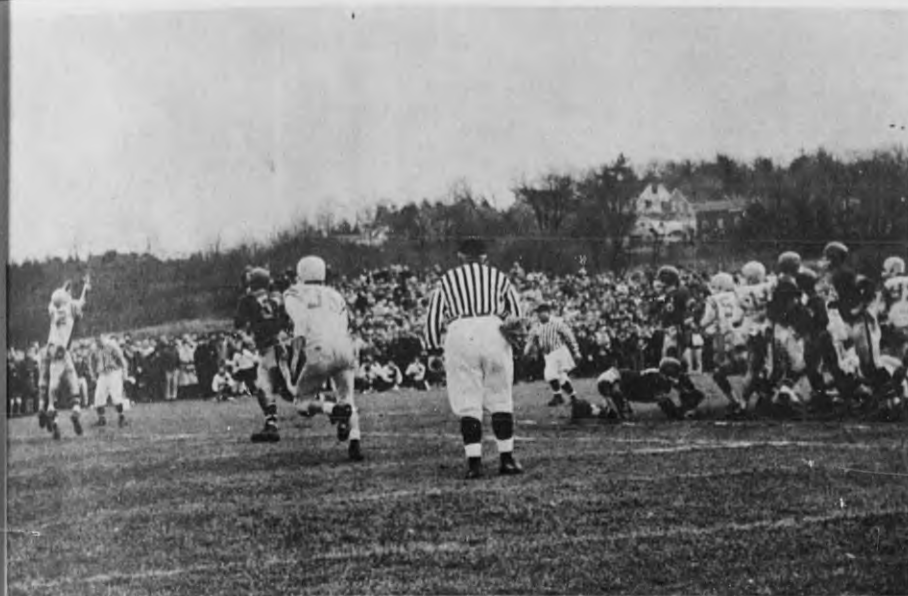

**Tax Rate May
Be Up \$3**

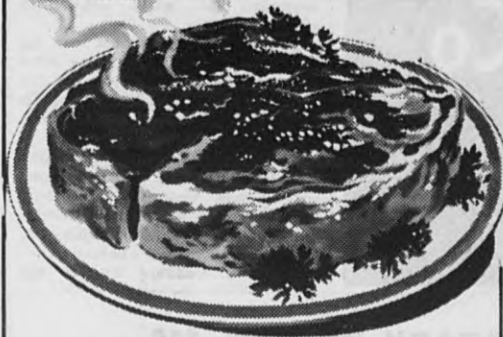

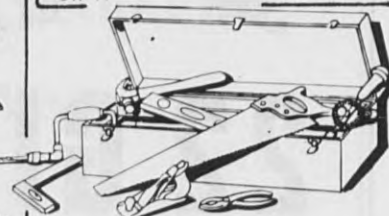

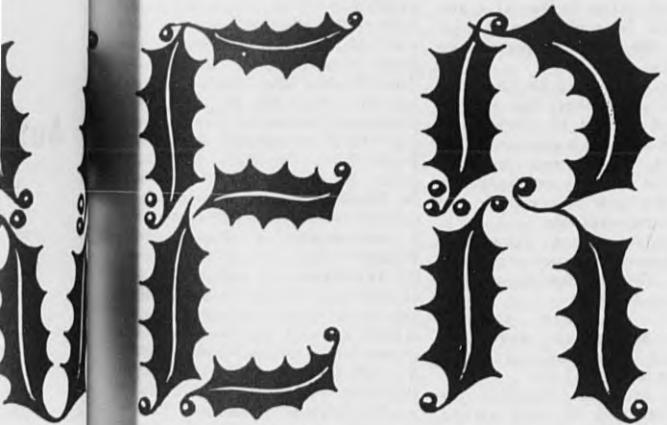

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

What's Reasonable?

The word "reasonable" is about as debatable a word as there is in the English language - subject to various interpretations according to the beliefs of the individuals who must establish what "reasonable" is.

Thus we find it difficult to foresee anything but stormy weather ahead for those in the municipal government who must decide whether it is "reasonable" for a developer to install off-site drainage. The Planning Board has stated that it will require this work to be done whenever it appears "reasonable", and when the distance from the site is not "too great". There's another word that can be interpreted to mean many things.

It's going to be difficult to agree on what these words actually mean whenever a development comes before the Board. And it is certainly going to be hard to convince the developer that the Planning Board's decision on the meaning of the words should also be his decision. For it's going to cost the developer money, however the words are finally interpreted.

This will be one of the toughest decisions the Planning Board is likely to face - and the worst part of it is that the decision must be made for each sub-division as it comes along.

The sooner we have a drainage survey, to establish some proper ground rules to go by, the better off we will all be. And the Planning Board especially will benefit from the contemplated study, because it should help to define the "reasonable" and the "too great".

Why Not Get Estimates

Who is going to conduct Andover's drainage survey, if one is approved at town meeting?

This may seem a simple question, but actually there is considerable discussion going on about the willingness of engineering firms to, in a sense, compete for the work.

One point of view seems to be that engineering firms will not knowingly come into a community that already has one estimate on such a job and offer estimates of their own. This, we judge, stems from a sort of "to each his own" agreement among the many firms.

On the other hand, municipal officials believe that several excellent firms should be given the opportunity to discuss the survey and offer their estimates of cost. This, if it accomplishes nothing else, prevents one firm from quoting maximum prices on every job because it feels secure in the community.

There's nothing wrong with getting several estimates, then choosing the firm that will do the work for the least money - providing the choice is among engineering firms of good reputation. It would be foolhardy to choose only on price, of course, because smaller, less experienced companies would quote low estimates just to get the work.

But among the best in the business, we can see no reason why the town must be prevented from obtaining the estimates and making an independent choice. To do otherwise would only encourage the practice of quoting maximum prices, to the advantage of the firm and the disadvantage of the town.

Plan Will Help

The proposed plan of procedures, which would enable a businessman to determine promptly whether Andover is receptive to a new business, either industrial or commercial, is a good one.

As written by the Industrial and Development Commission, it provides the means for more rapid consideration of problems that might be inherent in any development proposal.

This plan, by itself, won't bring in new industry. But it certainly is helpful after a businessman comes here to seriously discuss Andover as a location for his enterprise. Perhaps most important of all, it helps establish a friendly atmosphere, which will encourage a businessman to believe that Andover welcomes new business.

Selectmen OK'd Commission Plan

A plan of procedure for studying proposals by business wishing to locate here or by local firms wishing to expand has been approved by the Selectmen.

The Industrial and Development Commission proposed the plan, in the belief that it will encourage more taxpaying commercial ventures to locate here, and existing

business to expand.

That Board also believes the procedural outline will make it possible to avoid unnecessary appearances before three or four town boards by both proponents and opponents; and will make up-to-date information available for anyone in a central location.

The plan calls for the town manager to assemble all vital information as a sort of "clearing house". The manager would also carry through the details of the plan.

As adopted, the procedure to be followed by any proposed new business, or by a local firm desirous of expanding, will be: First, to outline the plan to the manager, who will provide the proponents with the policy statement of the IDC. The manager will then determine whether the problems outlined by the proponents require the consideration of an advisory policy committee.

This group would include representatives of the Selectmen, Planning Board, IDC, Board of Health, fire chief and police chief, or other department heads, if needed. The views of these people could be obtained via telephone, or at a meeting, whichever would best serve to expedite the matter.

If any of the interested boards has to meet formally with proponents of any venture, the manager will arrange this, and will give public notice to any interested civic organization which might be expected to have views on the subject - such as the Taxpayers' Association, League of Women Voters, AVIS, etc.

Proponents will be adequately briefed on the discussion, so that answers may be made available at such a meeting. And if further questions arise at the session, the manager will attempt to transmit the data, rather than call another meeting.

The plan of procedure also states that the formal meeting, after hearing both proponents and opponents of any venture, would attempt to arrive at a decision the same evening. If this can not be done, a specific date would be set for a decision.

The requirement that a special town meeting be called for some proposals has not been overlooked, with the plan reiterating the policy that the Selectmen must take this step if convinced that it is necessary at the time.

In stressing the objectives of the plan, the IDC commented that it has no desire to take any authority away from any existing board or official, nor to relieve the town meeting of its ultimate responsibility of determining the desirability of the specific venture.

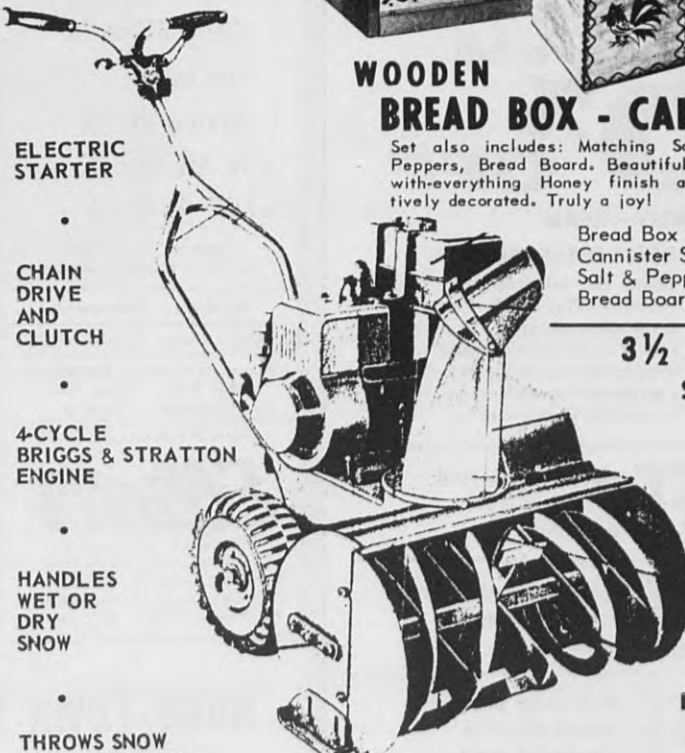

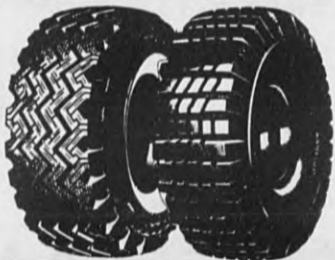

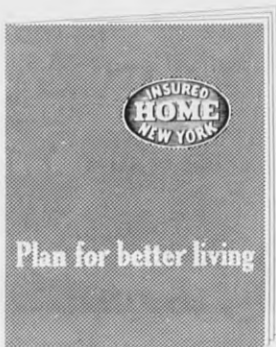

Piano Recital Delighted Audience

Music lovers were delighted last Saturday evening with Miss Yi-an Chang's piano recital, held in Davis Hall at Abbot Academy.

In 1956 Miss Chang won a John Hay Whitney Fellowship for study and performance in Europe. The year was spent touring France and Germany, playing many concerts there, including private engagements which took her as far as Bangkok and Hongkong.

Upon her return to the United States she was awarded a Martha Rockerfeller grant for 1958-59 for a follow-up of the European tour. This time she had engagements in France, and in Britain, including broadcasts for the B.B.C. radio and television. This spring Miss Chang will again go to Britain and Germany for several weeks of concert touring. She has done private teaching in Paris as well as in Great Neck and New York City.

Her program included "Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring", Bach; "Hess; "Sonata in E", D. Scarlatti; "Sonata op. 53", Beethoven; "Excursions op. 20", Samuel Barber; "Evocation" and "Saguidillas", Albeniz; and "Nocturne, op. 15 no. 1", "Etude op. 25, no. 1", and "Scherzo in minor" by Chopin.

More than one and one-half million students have been tested in the annual academic competitions. Currently 3,000 of the country's most able students hold Merit Scholarships at 400 colleges and universities. Fifteen million dollars have already been committed for these awards.

Semifinalists and Commended students receive many scholarships apart from the Merit Program. NMSC estimates that more than nine million dollars in scholarships for the freshman year alone will be awarded these students, in addition to the regular Merit awards.

**Will Discuss Dog
Officer's Duties**

Dog Officer Raymond Hoyer will be asked to appear before the Board of Selectmen, to explain the exact nature of his duties.

The subject came up when Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported that he has bills totalling \$295 from Mr. Hoyer for specific duties, for which fees may be collected under the state law.

Duff said the Finance Committee would have to allow a transfer to pay the amount, if that was to be approved by the Selectmen.

A set figure of \$325 is established in the budget for the dog officer's salary. But the statutes allow payment of \$2 for each dog killed, if the dog officer is not getting "regular pay".

The statute also allows the dog officer to collect \$1 daily, for a maximum of 10 days, for each dog kept by him.

The bills presented by Mr. Hoyer included \$80 for destroying dogs, \$190 for care and custody of the dogs and \$15 for killing other animals.

The Selectmen told Mr. Duff to see if the FinCom will allow payment of the amount for caring for the dogs, because this can be reimbursed by the county and would have no influence on the tax rate. They agreed, though, that the bill for killing dogs could not be allowed as there is a set fee established by the town for the job.

Members expressed some surprise that the dog officer keeps the animals, and it was recalled that when a member of the Police Force was dog officer, the animals were kept in a pen at the police station for a brief period and then, it was stated, were sent to the MSPCA in Methuen. 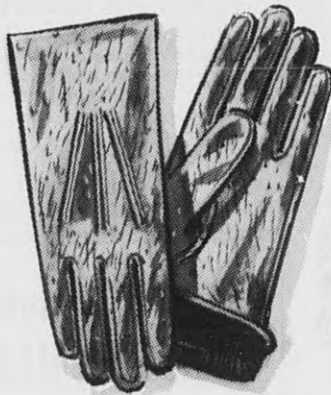

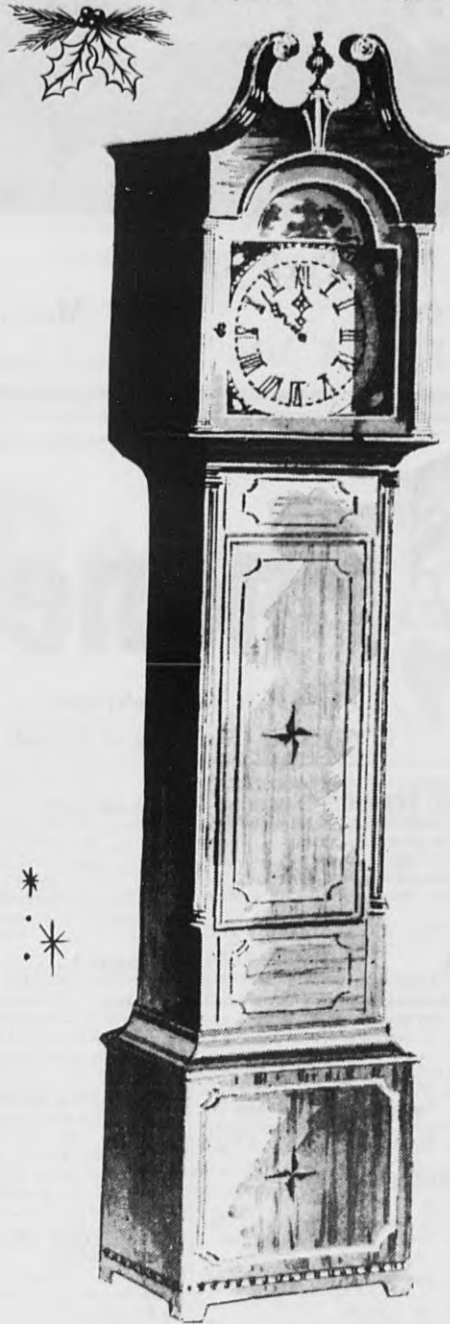

Explains Funds For Home Service

Since the publication of the annual report of the Andover Red Cross, copies of which are available at the Punchard ave. headquarters, many people have expressed surprise that so much of the budget goes to home service and other work for the armed forces.

Mrs. Oscar Witten, chairman with Mrs. Joseph J. Taverner of the Red Cross home service, says that the activities of the committee are largely confidential, but that home service provides

24-hour telephone coverage and handles two or three cases each week.

Whenever applications for emergency leave have to be made, the military authorities turn to the Red Cross home service for verification of the facts before they decide if the applications can be granted. The Red Cross facilitates communication between the servicemen and their families,

helps with counseling in family problems, and may give financial help in emergencies. It assists whenever affidavits have to be made for compassionate reassignment or hardship discharges.

The home service committee may also work with Frank Markey of the Veterans Services office in helping veterans and their families make claims for pensions and other government benefits.

Mrs. Witten would also like the public to know that, although the Red Cross home service has a Charter responsibility chiefly to the serviceman and his family, it gives help as well to all citizens of Andover within the scope of its possibilities.

The experienced case workers of the home service staff are Mrs. Ernest Krakauer, Mrs. Lindsay March, Mrs. Milton Meyers, Mrs. Joseph Taverner and Mrs. Witten.

lopers to install off-site drainage where this is "reasonable" and when the distance from the site is not "too great".

In cases where two developments benefit from drainage, or where many single homes benefit, the Board feels it may be necessary to have some betterment system so that each can be charged a portion of the cost of the project. And it is suggested that this be made part of any survey of drainage in the community, so that a formula can be developed.

The letter also mentioned the possibility that much drainage construction might better be done by the town, as it can apply for one-half of the cost of some types of work from the state and is the only agency that can take land by eminent domain.

In discussing the letter, the Selectmen agreed to go over it in detail when Town Manager Thomas E. Duff brings in a specific cost item for the annual warrant. It is planned to have the article appear for the voters to vote on, with the price to be fixed after consultation with several engineering firms.

There also was considerable discussion of the original letter received from Camp, Dresser and McFee, which outlined what that firm would do in the way of a survey. The letter also mentioned the cost factors, and stated that a maximum cost of \$25,000 would be set although it is possible the work and subsequent bill might be for less than that amount.

The Selectmen did not arrive at any conclusion as to the specific points to be covered in the survey, leaving this until the special article comes up for debate at a later meeting.
