New Parking Lot May Be Filled

The possibility that the newest 514-car Raytheon parking lot may be full the moment it is opened arose this week.

A traffic count taken by Officer Roy A. Russell in Shawsheen indicated that a possible 394 cars, now parked outside the lots, should be using the lot when opened. And Officer Russell estimated that 175-200 cars now using the largest of the Raytheon lots might move into the new one, because they are parked in aisles, traffic lanes and other areas not specified for parking.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported the results of the traffic count to the Selectmen Monday night.

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

What's Reasonable?

The word "reasonable" is about as debatable a word as there is in the English language - subject to various interpretations according to the beliefs of the individuals who must establish what "reasonable" is.

Thus we find it difficult to foresee anything but stormy weather ahead for those in the municipal government who must decide whether it is "reasonable" for a developer to install off-site drainage. The Planning Board has stated that it will require this work to be done whenever it appears "reasonable", and when the distance from the site is not "too great". There's another word that can be interpreted to mean many things.

It's going to be difficult to agree on what these words actually mean whenever a development comes before the Board. And it is certainly going to be hard to convince the developer that the Planning Board's decision on the meaning of the words should also be his decision. For it's going to cost the developer money, however the words are finally interpreted.

This will be one of the toughest decisions the Planning Board is likely to face - and the worst part of it is that the decision must be made for each sub-division as it comes along.

The sooner we have a drainage survey, to establish some proper ground rules to go by, the better off we will all be. And the Planning Board especially will benefit from the contemplated study, because it should help to define the "reasonable" and the "too great".

Why Not Get Estimates

Who is going to conduct Andover's drainage survey, if one is approved at town meeting?

This may seem a simple question, but actually there is considerable discussion going on about the willingness of engineering firms to, in a sense, compete for the work.

One point of view seems to be that engineering firms will not knowingly come into a community that already has one estimate on such a job and offer estimates of their own. This, we judge, stems from a sort of "to each his own" agreement among the many firms.

On the other hand, municipal officials believe that several excellent firms should be given the opportunity to discuss the survey and offer their estimates of cost. This, if it accomplishes nothing else, prevents one firm from quoting maximum prices on every job because it feels secure in the community.

There's nothing wrong with getting several estimates, then choosing the firm that will do the work for the least money - providing the choice is among engineering firms of good reputation. It would be foolhardy to chose only on price, of course, because smaller, less experienced companies would quote low estimates just to get the work.

But among the best in the business, we can see no reason why the town must be prevented from obtaining the estimates and making an independent choice. To do otherwise would only encourage the practice of quoting maximum prices, to the advantage of the firm and the disadvantage of the town.

Plan Will Help

The proposed plan of procedures, which would enable a businessman to determine promptly whether Andover is receptive to a new business, either industrial or commer-

As written by the Industrial and Development Commission, it provides the means for more rapid consideration of problems that might be inherent in any development proposal.

This plan, by itself, won't bring in new industry. But it certainly is helpful after a businessman comes here to seriously discuss Andover as a location for his enterprise. Perhaps most important of all, it helps establish a friendly atmosphere, which will encourage a businessman to believe that Andover welcomes new business.

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





Will Discuss Dog

Dog Officer Raymond Hoyer will be asked to appear before the Board of Selectmen, to explain the exact nature of his duties.

The subject came up when Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported that he has bills totalling \$236 from Mr. Hoyer for specific duties, for which fees may be collected under the state law.

Duff said the Finance Committee would have to allow a transfer to pay the amount, if that was to be approved by the Selectmen.

A set figure of \$325 is established in the budget for the dog officer's salary. But the statutes allow payment of \$2 for each dog killed, if the dog officer is not getting "regular pay".

The statute also allows the dog officer to collect \$1 daily, for a maximum of 10 days, for each dog kept by him.

The bills presented by Mr. Hoyer included \$30 for destroying dogs, \$190 for care and custody of the dogs and \$15 for killing other animals.

The Selectmen told Mr. Duff to see if the FinCom will allow payment of the amount for caring for the dogs, because this can be reimbursed by the county and would have no influence on the tax rate. They agreed, though, that the bill for killing dogs could not be allowed as there is a set fee established by the town for the job.

Members expressed some surprise that the dog officer, the animals were kept in a pen at the police station for a brief period and then, it was stated, were sent to the MSPCA in Methuen. The Selectmen wondered whether it is required to keep the animals 10 days, or whether they can be disposed of some way before the expiration of that time.



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

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

lopers to install off-site drainage where this is "reasonable" and when the distance from the site is not "too great".

In cases where two developments benefit from drainage, or where many single homes benefit, the Board feels it may be necessary to have some betterment system so that each can be charged a portion of the cost of the project. And it is suggested that this be made part of any survey of drainage in the community, so that a formula can be developed.

The letter also mentioned the possibility that much drainage construction might better be done by the town, as it can apply for one-half of the cost of some types of work from the state and is the only agency that can take land by eminent domain.

In discussing the letter, the Selectmen agreed to go over it in detail when Town Manager Thomas E. Duff brings in a specific cost item for the annual warrant. It is planned to have the article appear for the voters to vote on, with the price to be fixed after consultation with several engineering firms.

There also was considerable discussion of the original letter received from Camp, Oresser and McVee, which outlined what that firm would do in the way of a survey. The letter also mentioned the cost factors, and stated that a maximum cost of \$25,000 would be set although it is possible the work and subsequent bill might be for less than that amount. The Selectmen did not arrive at any conclusion as to the specific points to be covered in the survey, leaving this until the special article comes up for debate at a later meeting.
