The Post Office will be open until 5 o'clock Saturday, for both the sale of stamps and parcel post.

Postmaster Stephen A. Boland is again asking for the cooperation of Andover residents in mailing Christmas cards and packages early. And he points out that residents can be of invaluable assistance by tieing Andover, Ballardvale, and out-of-town cards, separately. Labels can be obtained from the Post Office or from letter carriers, he explained.

The Post Office is anticpating one of the largest volumes of mail in its history, thus emphasizing the value of patrons' cooperation.







Construction of Route 110 from Tewksbury to the Route 93 interchange in West Andover will start next spring, according to Palmer Day, project engineer from the State Department of Pulbic Works.

And he anticipates that the sections east of Rt. 93, through the North Main st. interchange, "won't be far behind".

Mr. Day appeared before the Selectmen and interested town officials Monday night to explain details of the plans for the inter-change at North Main st., special ly the dead-ending of Poor st. at North Main. This had not been discussed with the Selectmen

before. Mr. Day said this is planned because there would be a turn-around at that intersection, for cars to make a loop and head towards Lawrence along Union st. The planners feel, he said, that allowing Poor st. to remain open would be dangerous in the midst

of the turning traffic.

The turn-around is required because North Main st. will be one-way towards Andover and any turn to get onto a road heading to Lawrence must be made at that

point.
Raytheon Access Sought

Of particular interest to the Selectmen was the possibility of creating some way for Raytheon traffic to get onto the route, without having to use Haverhill st. almost exclusively.

It was suggested that Venilworth st. might be widened at its intersection with North Main, so that cars could use it without making the present sharp turn. If

making the present sharp turn. If this is done, it was felt that many cars might use this street instead of Haverhill st. in the

Square.

Mr. Day said there can be no access to a ramp going onto the route, but that traffic certainly will have more freedom to move when the one-way system is established. He thought that cars turning right from Haverhill st. onto North Main could mingle with, and exchange lanes with, cars heading straight along North Main st. prior to reaching the first ramp onto the route.

When the voters assemble for town meeting next March, they will be asked to approve salaries of \$400 for four members and \$500 for the chairman. The pays have been \$1,000 — the same as established for the former Board of three members.

Expressing the concern of his fellow Board members for economy in government, Chairman Eugene A. Bernardin Jr. announced the startling decision early this week. He said the members are called on to spend much less time than former Boards; because the town manager charter establishes a system in which the administrative work is done by the manager, not the Selectmen.





# Let's Stay On The Ball

There aren't many new items in the municipal grist mill - only variations on familiar themes.

Witness, for instance, the emergence of an old and familiar topic - unaccepted streets.

This was a subject of considerable discussion, and some controversy, a couple or three years ago.

Now, the Planning Board has decided that it can allow no building on any of the unaccepted streets until the Selectmen state that they will be accepted. There are at least 39 of these public ways - and some are old, wellused thoroughfares that most folks believed to be accepted streets until the disclosures many long months ago. A list of the streets, and details of the Planning Board's action, appear elsewhere in today's issue.

Perhaps the present Board of Selectmen, with the town manager, can move forward with some speed in this matter. Most of us believed, when the Legislature passed a special act allowing the town to accept many of the streets, that this would be done almost immediately. But it bogged down and there was no action.

Now we are faced with fresh problems, all hinging on the fact that these streets have not been accepted.

Let's clear up this matter without delay - even if it is necessary to spend some money for an engineer to lay out the present bounds of the roads so that plans will exist in the town files.

Delay has been costly enough to the town as it is. And if one figured out the cost of the man-hours spent discussing the subject, the expense would reach fabulous

## This Bill Deserves Support

The area's representatives should line up solidly behind Rep. William Casey's proposal to authorize the state to build a connecting road from near the Raytheon plant out to the Den Rock Park section of Lawrence, where it would meet Route 110.

This piece of road has been contemplated for a long time - and generally in a favorable light. But there always has been one major stumbling block - money. Who would pay for the construction?

If the road comes under Chapter 90, this leaves Andover and Lawrence in the position of committing their Chapter 90 appropriations to this work for several years an undesirable solution when one contemplates the number of roads atht need immediate attention from this annual appropriation. Then too, such a solution would imply that the communities could agree on an equitable distribution of the costs. . . . an assumption that we can not

The state can best design and construct this relatively short road, possibly thus using some of the money contributed to the state from the area via taxes of all sorts.

We can think of no better solution to the traffic problem.

Lighting sets and extension cords should be in good condition and carry the UL label, which means that Underwriters' Laboratories, Inc., have tested them for fire and shock hazards. Bulbs should hang free and not rest on needles. Do not leave tree lights burning when church is unattended. An inspection should be scheduled each day by someone of authority to determine whether the tree has dried and become brittle and should be left up for a longer time or be discarded. Never use candles on the tree.

All draperies and decorations used at any time in any part of the church should be properly flame-proofed. The local fire department can give advice concerning flame-proofing methods. A pamphlet entitled "Flameproofing of Textiles\*," published by the National Bureau of Standards, gives a number of formulas for flameproofing solutions. Flameproofing is also done commercially by many laundries and dry-cleaners, with fire department approval.

Although flameproofed fabrics have a certain degree of resistance when exposed to a source of ignition, safety measures should be followed, never-the-less. Candles should never be placed where draperies or decorations can blow over them. In addition, if candles are used, take further precautions by always setting them in sturdy candelabra which will not tip over and seeing that every candle is extin-

always setting them in sturdy candelabra which will not tip over and seeing that every candle is extinguished when the service is over.

Combustible decorations are on the list of special fire hazards of churches. Their use for flimsy costumes, Christmas creches, canopies and decorations for social functions is evidence that the fundamentals of fire prevention are not fully understood.

Church officials should scrutinize their present practices, first for the purpose of reducing the use of combustible material to a minimum, and second, to protect that which must be retained in the ritual so that it does not present a serious fire hazard, the National Board says.

Suggestions include the use of flameproofed cloth, clothing and decorations, treatment of both temporary and permanent interior woodwork with fire retardant paint, erection of Christmas trees and creches on church lawns, and where this is impracticable, keeping them small. Open flames and temporary wiring, obviously, should not be permitted near combustible material, and where special illumination is required spot lights should be connected to permanent fixtures at safe distances.

#### Ulcers Healed in 8 Out of 10 Cases by New Drug



Gastric and duodenal ulcers have been healed in eight out of ten cases, without the aid of a special diet, by a new drug that is based on a mucilage formed from vegetable material.

Ulcers, practically unknown a century ago, are now almost as common as measles. It is estimated that, in the United States alone, 18 to 20 million persons suffer from ulcers. This high frequency rate has spurred research work on new ulcer therapy techniques, and Vanul is the most recent and most effective product of this research effort. The drug, called Vanul, was clinically tested over a two-year period, on more than 400 patients whose ulcer diagnoses had been confirmed by X-ray. It healed ulcers in better than 80 per cent of the test cases. These results were also substantiated by X-ray examination.

The new compound, developed by the Vanguard Pharmaceutical Corp., of Cedar Grove, New Jersey, has been approved for sale by the Food and Drug Administration. A national distribution system has been instituted to provide immediate availability. The new drug is a greenish, slow-flowing liquid that has a licorice-mint taste. In extensive clinical tests, none of the patients regarded the taste of Vanul as objectionable.

In the tests, it was given to the patients at a dosage of one tablespoon before each meal, plus an additional tablespoon at bed-time. This schedule was continued for 20 days. For the next three months, the patients received one teaspoon of Vanul in the morning and in the evening. The only dietary restriction made during the tests was that patients were not to drink carbonated beverages.

#### **Building Stopped** On Some Streets

Thirty-nine unaccepted streets are temporarily "off limits" to builders, until the Selectmen indicate in writing which of the streets they plan to accept.

The Planning Board decision to allow no further construction on unaccepted streets came at a time when one application was presented for a home on Blood rd. But Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported that the action "had been building up" for a long time and just happened to coincide with the Blood rd. request.

He told the Selectmen that a policy statement from the Board is needed, so that the building

policy statement from the Board is needed, so that the building inspector and Planning Board can issue permits on unaccepted streets "where such building would not place an undue burden on the town".

on the town".

He suggested that this procedure could be followed, if the Selectmen agreed to the gradual acceptance of the streets as the engineering work is done on plans. It was explained that many of

the streets may not meet present-day requirements — but have been under town care for years. These, it was felt, should probably be accepted as they are, after proper

plans are drawn for the records.

This process may cost the town additional funds, it has previously been brought out, and possibly could be done over a two or three

year period. Eventual approval of the streets lies with town meeting, but it has been ruled by legal counsel in the past that the streets must be laid out by the Selectmen prior to acceptance by town meeting. There was some grumbling among Board members that the

streets were supposed to have been accepted many, many months ago following a special act of the Legislature that made it possible for the town to take such steps.

There were no reasons advanced as to why positive steps had not been taken at that time.

Mr. Duff pointed out to the Selectmen that the building inspector and Planning Board have been approving issuance of the permits, based in part on the former Board's statements that the streets would be accepted.


