Giles Seeking Governorship

"The next Governor of Massachusetts must call a sharp halt to the lavish spending habits that have prevailed throughout the present administration," Rep. Frank S. Giles of Methuen declared yesterday as he announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor.

Giles, Republican floor leader in the House of Representatives, asserted that "this unabated drift toward more spending, new spend-

Members of the November Club will hear Dr. Peter D. Comanduras speak on "Medicine - Weapon of Freedom", at the Locke st. Club-house, Feb. 1, at 3 p.m. Tea will be served at 2:30.

An unceasing war against disease around the world is being waged under the direction of MEDICO (Medical International Cooperation), a new division of the International Rescue Commission, which was formed early in 1958.

MEDICO's objective is to send teams of physicians and medically trained assistants into the underdeveloped areas of the world, where they build, equip, and staff medical clinics and small hospitals.

Shortly after he became secretary-general of MEDICO, Dr. Comanduras embarked on a four-month, 20-nation tour of developing African and Asian nations. If the (Continued on Page Two)

Hearing Planned On Bridge Site

A plan - that has informal approval from the Army already - has been advanced for the construction of a Bailey Bridge across the Shawshen River from the Raytheon parking lot to Kenilworth st.

This would allow much of the traffic that normally heads north when it gets into Shawshen Square to use the bridge, and cut down the tremendous tieup that occurs in the Haverhill st. area.

The company, through its spokesman Benjamin Chase, said this solution is only temporary, because the firm hopes that legislation will be enacted for the construction of an access road through the Den Rock area, out to Route 114 and eventually to Route 110.

In the interval, however, engineers at the local plant believe much of the congestion that develops daily in the Village can be averted if the bridge is placed at the rear of the parking area, so cars can leave directly to Kenilworth st. and onto Union st.

Mr. Chase suggested that the only municipal action required is to grant easements to the company for the town-owned land on (Continued on Page 12)

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Wide Area Covered In School Legislation

Considerable interest has been demonstrated in the latest attempt to legislate a decrease in the powers of school committees. The School Committee has voted

to register its opposition to the measure, feeling that it is an infringement on powers that have wisely been separated from "politics" that might be involved in the community.

At a recent Selectmen's meeting, members agreed that the Board should take no stand as a body, but that members are free to express their individual opinions. The legislation this year is sponsored by the Massachusetts Selectmen's Association.

In its basic form, the proposed legislation seeks to limit the powers of school committees by increasing the powers of city councils or town meetings over

appropriations, and by striking out the 25 percent penalty clause provided in existing statutes. This clause allows the courts to penalize the town 25 percent of the amount the town deducts from a school committee budget, if this deduction is in violation of the law relating to the powers of school committees to set budgets.

The proposed amendments to the existing law gives, in the case of towns, the town meeting power to establish by-laws setting school department employees into a wage and classification plan, except those directly related to teaching and educational administration.

Another amendment further defines the meaning of school department appropriations, extending these to cover interest and principal payments for any debt incurred for schools. The budget at this time does not include interest or retirement of the debt.

Still another amendment would generally separate curriculum from the category of subjects required by the state and those not required.

The town would have to pay the sum decided upon by the school committee as a reasonable cost of the service involved in teaching the required subjects. Others could be taught, within the framework of the appropriation granted at town meeting. Passage of this amendment would give the town meeting authority to decide what additional subjects may be taught, and at what cost.

The amendments include a provision for going to court if the town does not appropriate the money required to support the schools, in relation to the "required" instruction. And the 25 percent penalty, although still assessable, would be held over for use the following year for the general school appropriation.

Under the statute, items such as building maintenance, travel, clerical salaries and capital outlay would be subject to the discretion of voters at town meeting.

At this time, all these items are part of the school budget and fall within the framework of the section which stipulates that determining the amounts is strictly up to the School Committee. Under the proposed amendment, the budget probably would be split into sections, showing the cost of providing the "required" courses in one portion, and other proposed costs in a second part.

judgment on this situation, and other town manager charter restrictions contained in the document.

LaRosa expressed his opinion that if the manager has control of salaries, the Personnel Board—existing now in an advisory capacity—has no power in this field and should not be the guiding influence. He said no one from the Association had been asked to attend any meetings of the Personnel Board when it considered the salary question. It is known that a recommendation has been made by this Board to the manager for an amount considerably less than the six percent.

The legal ruling questioned by the Association came last week. Atty. Fredric S. O'Brien said the manager, not town meeting, has exclusive power to set salaries for all those whose jobs come under his appointive power. The manager would have to act within the framework of the total appropriation, he stated, but town meeting could not legally act on a six percent increase itself, as a special article.

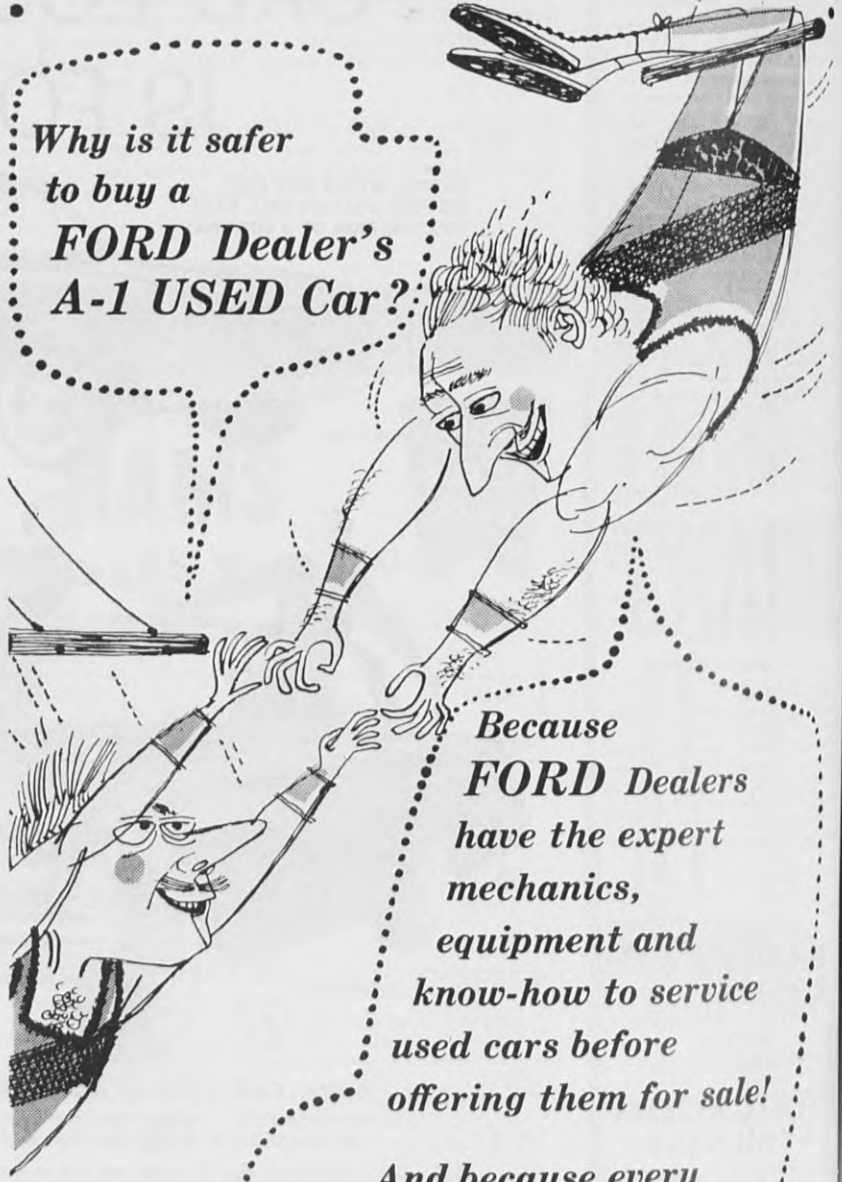

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Traffic Control Is Necessary

The serious proposal by the Raytheon Company that a Bailey Bridge be installed over the Shawsheen river, at Kenilworth st., warrants close study by town officials.

The Company has pointed out that installation of the bridge is actually suggested as a means of solving part of the town's traffic problem, and is not actually needed by Raytheon. However, the firm is willing to pay the bills — providing the town grants easements on town-owned land on the Kenilworth st. side of the stream.

Immediate objections to the idea have been heard from at least one resident of that street, who believes traffic will increase on it, that a bottleneck will develop, and that the character of the neighborhood will be changed by reason of the increased usage.

We appreciate the fact that objections to any proposal, which affects a specific area, will be heard. But if this bridge suggestion can actually make the vexing traffic condition better, then it may be necessary for the town to move in that direction.

We hope this gets plenty of thoughtful study by responsible officials, and that a decision can be forthcoming soon.

Only by prompt action can the proper articles be placed in a special warrant, for action during the regular town meeting March 12.

An 11-year-old boy was instantly killed in Shawsheen this week, when the sled he was steering crashed into a truck. His sister and a friend were also riding on the sled and were hospitalized.

Sub-zero weather has been the rule instead of the exception this week, with readings of 35-below recorded at Playdon's greenhouse on Lowell st. Monday was universally cold, with 20-below recorded in Ballardvale. Wednesday, the thermometer really tried to set a record, with below-zero readings all day and nighttime readings of 30-40 below zero in several sections of town.

A car and garage burned up on River st., Ballardvale, Tuesday night, but no one knew it until Wednesday morning.

An extra guard has been established at the schools, after two apparent attempts to cause damage to the buildings. An attempt to set fire to the John Dove School was found, when a custodian discovered burned papers and a charred shelf in a closet. The door had been locked by whomever set the fire, thus fortunately shutting off the supply of oxygen. Later, it was found that the water had been almost completely drained off from the three boilers in the main heating plant at the Jackson School.

ing, and higher spending creates an oppressive burden on all Massachusetts taxpayers and is the chief obstacle to industrial expansion in this State".

"Because we must encourage industry to expand here in order to provide jobs for all Massachusetts workers, it is imperative for us to embark upon a program of economy and a gigantic effort to attract industry", Giles pointed out. "The Republican members of the Legislature have been laying a firm groundwork for such a program. Our budget studies and our job opportunity surveys have pointed the way toward a positive plan of action for the next Governor to adopt."

Giles is now serving his fourth year as GOP leader in the House, where he has been a member for 14 years. Prior to his election to the leadership by his Republican

House colleagues, he held the position of Republican Whip for four years under the Herter Administration and was responsible for securing the votes for the Herter legislative program. He also served two years on the important committee on Ways and Means.

Giles is one of the three representatives from this district.

Giles maintains that his experience in the Legislature, working to develop "a positive and aggressive Republican program", places him in the logical position to take this program to the people as the Republican candidate for governor in the 1960 election.

"I am sure the taxpayers can no longer afford the luxury of a spending spree that jumps from 400 million dollars two years ago to 450 million last year, and then to 500 million this year," he charged. "The present administration measures progress in terms of dollars spent. As governor, I shall measure progress in terms of saving money for those who pay the taxes and in terms of the number of jobs that we can make available in industry for our working people."

He referred to his own background as a working man and business executive to emphasize his understanding of the problems facing people in business and industry today. For nine years, he was employed in the Arlington Mills, where he was an active member of the Textile Union's Local, and is now serving as Vice-President of Stuart Engineering Services, Inc. He has formerly been associated in business with Consolidated Management, Inc., Northeastern Theatre Corp., and the New England Concession Co.

Born in Methuen 44 years ago, Giles has been a lifelong resident of the town and a town meeting member since he was old enough to vote. A graduate of Methuen High School, where he was a track star, he continued his education at McIntosh Business College. He was also a member of the Methuen police force for several years.

Prominent in Republican circles, he is a member of the Methuen Republican Town Committee, Republican State Committee, and was district delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1952-56.

Long active in the affairs of the Greater Lawrence community, he has served as chairman of the Community Chest, Red Cross, and Infantile Paralysis drives, and has served 16 years as moderator of the Forest St. Union Church in Methuen.

He is affiliated with many civic and fraternal organizations, including the Masons, Lion's Club, Boston Club, and the Methuen Board of Trade. Prior to entering the Legislature, he served as chairman for five of the six years he was a member of the local school committee.

He is married, the father of three children, and resides at 827 Riverside dr. in Methuen.

Brook Bonding Up To Voters

The entire Rogers Brook appropriation — some \$195,000 — will be acted on again at the town meeting in March, even though the voters thought they disposed of the question over three years ago.

An error in the method of appropriating the funds, discovered by the bonding counsel in Boston, has resulted in placing an article in the warrant for the entire amount.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff explained that the funds were voted in 1956 at a special town meeting — but the appropriation was to take place in 1957 and be applied to that year's taxes.

This procedure has been frowned on by the legal people, he told the Board of Selectmen.

Thus the original \$175,000 will be placed before town meeting again, plus \$20,000 for easements and damages along the course of the reconstruction.

The state has formally, and in writing, agreed to spend a total of \$295,000 on this project, providing the town vote is affirmative in March. Originally, the town thought it was appropriating matching funds — but the plans drawn by the state have been estimated to call for a project costing the larger sum. The state will pay the difference, however, if the town agrees to the appropriation for easements and damages.

the Kenilworth st. side. He said the firm may not, by Army direction, become involved in using privately-owned land for the purpose.

And he also told the Selectmen that another, and better, location has been impossible to obtain because of plans for Route 114. This is the Fletcher st. coal yard area — but he said the state is planning to take the area for highway construction anyway.

Opposition to the plan came from Harold Haller, a resident of Kenilworth st.

He said he believes traffic conditions would worsen on the street if cars use it directly from the Raytheon parking area. He also believes that a serious traffic jam would result at Union st. if two-way flow of vehicles is maintained and if cars have the right to turn in either direction from that intersection.

Haller also said he believes the location of the bridge at the foot of that street would tend to lower values and to alter the character of the neighborhood as it now is.

Hearing Promised

The Selectmen promised to hold a hearing on the subject, so that other residents of the area can speak their minds.

It was pointed out by Town Manager Thomas E. Duff that a decision on putting an article in the warrant must be made soon.

A special warrant, set for action at a specific time within the regular meeting, could be set up. Duff said there is an early February deadline for this procedure, however.

Agrees To Wait

The town meeting article asking for a minimum-maximum wage for police officers can legally be acted upon at town meeting. Atty. Fredric S. O'Brien said the legislation setting up the wage law specifically states that it can be acted on regardless of any other law or local by-law. This puts it in a different category than the six percent wage boost article, which O'Brien says can not be legally acted upon at the session because this subject is among the town manager's responsibilities. The minimum-maximum wage, which can be adopted by accepting the state law, is \$4,880 in the first year, \$5,030 the second year and \$5,500 the third year and afterwards. It applies only to police officers.

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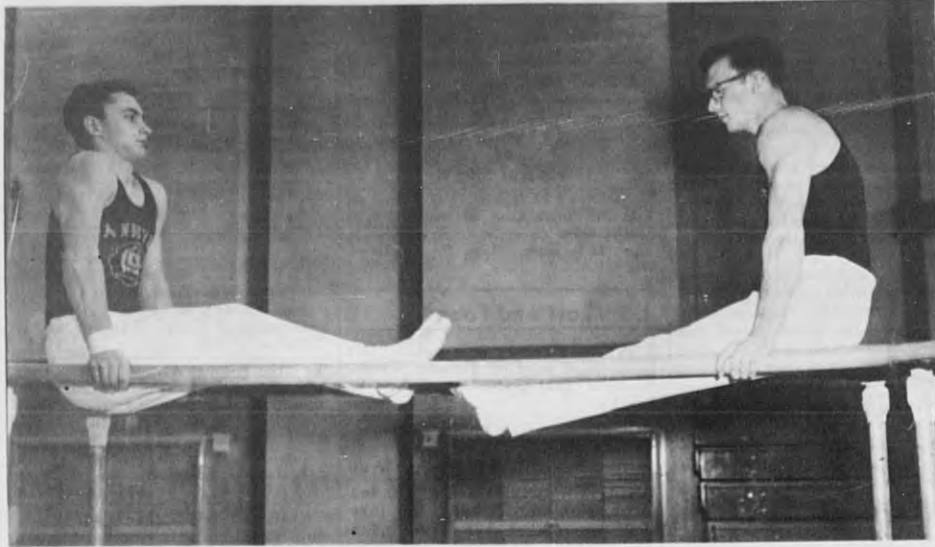

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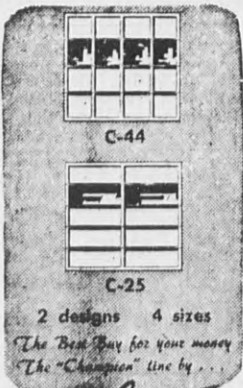
