

What is a Planning Board for, if not to anticipate the future needs of the town in terms of its expected growth? At the same time, it should seek to preserve those assets which are preservable and which the town can afford to pre-serve. 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"The majority of the expected influx of newcomers can easily be accommodated in those areas closer to the center of town where problems of development are now problems of development are now in the process of solution on a large scale. Under present zoning standards, if Residence A were to be fully developed and the B and C zones only one-half filled up, a total population of 34,500 would result. A scarcity of re-sidential land is not one of our problems

sidential failed is hot one of our problems. "The Planning Board expects that the influx of new residents will cause a moderate increase in taxes, unless residential development is balanced by an increase in toxyble industrial and increase in taxable industrial and commercial property. New resi-dents and old residents alike will share the burden of this increase. In the absence of a thorough study of assessments, it is difficult to generalize about the relative a-mounts of tax revenue provided by old and new houses. Since the recent revaluation, new houses have been assessed at higher rates

"The Planning Board does not believe that large lot zoning is the perfect answer to our growth the perfect answer to our growth problems; far from it. Large lot zoning of itself does not inhibit overall growth in a community. The very desirability of the community as a place for subur-ban living is thereby enhanced. There are other methods of pre-serving open lands or rural finge which are preferable, but pro-hibitively expensive. Mr. Haartz put forth such an idea for Andover in the December 31st Townsman. put forth such an idea for Andover in the December 31st Townsman, advocating purchase of a 650-acre "green belt" beyond Route 93. This proposal actually is a very sensible one. The Master Plan recommended that this area be acquired by the Town and pre-served as open land. All that is required to carry out the proposal is plenty of money; is plenty of money;

is plenty of money: "The efforts of the Andover Village Improvement Society to obtain such lands for preserva-tion by purchase and gift are greatly to be commended. Unfor-tunately it too is hampered by the amount of funds available. "Developers will argue that large lots are much more ex-pensive to develop. A comprehen-sive study of large lot zoning in

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

"Let George Do It?"

Slightly more than 55 percent of the 8,695 registered voters cast their ballots Monday - a somewhat better turnout than had been foreseen.

Now what about town meeting?

How many of the 8,695 voters are content to let someone else decide the fiscal policies of the town? How many of you are willing to sit at home and allow others to determine the course the town will follow in zoning?

If this year follows the pattern of others, a thousand or so voters will turn out Saturday for the annual meeting. This is a small minority of the total eligible to attend yet year after year, the majority seems content to allow a minority to transact public business.

Just as it is essential to have a high percentage of the votes cast at the election, so is it vital to feel that the community's expenditures for the year, and its policies towards growth and development, are decided by more than a relative handful of those eligible to make the decisions.

Don't let someone else decide for you. Attend the town meeting Saturday and make your own decisions, using your own good judgment. Only in that way can we actually be certain that the town is moving in the direction desired by its residents.

When you "let George do it", you are sacrificing your rights, and you are doing a disservice to the town in which you have chosen to live.

Final Decision Needed

Printed in this week's issue of the Townsman is a map of the town which shows the two areas proposed for twoacre house lots.

According to estimates at the public hearing, about one-third of the town's 32 square miles would fall within this proposed zone, if two-thirds of the voters at town meeting approve the change.

We have reitterated our belief that two-acre zoning is not desirable - and we maintain that conviction as town meeting draws close.

Others, however, feel that benefits will accrue to the town from this zoning. And we have printed, this week, the reasons stated by the Planning Board for proposing it.

This is a vital issue - one that must be decided with some finality at this town meeting. The presence at town meeting of a majority of the voters

would be desirable - and certainly there should be in attendance far more than the usual number of voters, so that this question can be decided by more than a few hundred voters.

Shenandoah" by Stanley Horn, a story also told by Murray Morgan in his "Dixie Raider"; Fletcher Pratt's "Civil War on Western Waters" and Rich-ard West's "Mr. Lincoln's Navy" are both well read. In addition the biographies of the men who fought the battles there are two pictorial studies of interest: "Divided We Fought", by Mil-hollen and Kaplan, and "Mr. Lin-coln's Camera Man" by Roy Mere-dith.
