Will Enforce **Dumping Laws**

Rigid enforcement of laws prohibiting dumping on public ways has been promised by Town Manager Thomas E. Duff.

He warned all residents that police inspection in the town, specifically around the general area of the dump on Chandler rd., will be continuous. Violators of the statutes will be taken into court, he stated, as permitted in the law. The maximum fine is \$50, the statute states, and it also indicates that, after conviction, the registrar of motor vehicles may suspend the license for 30 days and the registration for a like period, if the violator is the owner of the car. The law states that dumping will not be allowed on, or within 20 (Continued on Page Three)

Is Bannister Rd. Accepted Or Not?

Accepted Or Not?

James A. MacMillan of Bannister rd. and town officials just can't agree on one point - whether the road is an accepted street.

Town Counsel Fredric's O'Brien told the Selectmen Monday that the street is not accepted, as it can not be found in the town clerk's records.

Mr. MacMillan, who wants the town to fix up the street, produced exerpts from old town reports to indicate that the street is accepted, He stated that back in 1904, the town voted to have a list prepared of all accepted streets, specifically town voted to have a list prepared of all accepted streets, specifically eliminating those that were not then accepted. He claimed Bannister rd, remained on the list-indicating its acceptance prior to that year. However, the municipal officials have agreed that, without confirmation from town records, the street can not be considered as accepted.

Duff said full cooperation will be given the drive by the police department, who will keep a careful watch over areas where dumping has been observed in recent weeks.

The subject came up at the Selectmen's meeting Monday, when Selectman Russell G. Doyle told his colleagues of a case of illegal dumping that happened on the past weekend. It was also reported that several piles of refuse - all in the general neighborhood of the town dump - have been identified as to ownership, and residents notified not to leave trash outside the official dumping area.

The Selectmen were quick to agree that violators should be taken to court, in an effort to eliminate the piles of refuse from public ways.

Selectman James D. Wilson suggested that the dump be opened Sundays, when many of the violations seem to occur. And Selectman William Stewart agreed, providing the dump is moved somewhere else, It has been a long-standing contention of neighbors that the dump should be closed on Sunday because at least one day should be free from the trash that accumulates on lawns and the side of the streets in the area.

The Board also considered the possibility of fencing in an open side of the dump off Ledge rd., because some persons walk in and leave the trash - but not in the proper section of the dump.

During normal opening hours, the dump is supervised and residents are directed to put refuse in specific places, where it can be burned or covered, Refuse left in various spots makes it difficult for others, with cars, to get to the proper sections of the dump, it has been explained.

mented that he objected to the new job when it was first suggested two weeks ago, and is still opposed to it. Member John Sullivan suggested that the new position would be valuable, and cited other systems where this sort of administrative iob exists.

Harold Wennik rushed up to the stage and loudly insisted to Dr. Meyers that "You promised to tell them". After insisting that the crowd be "told", Wennik accused Dr. Meyers: "You're double crossing me". After prolonged

discussion in the hallway, Dr. Meyers returned to the stage and made the announcement, waiting for Mr. Wennik to round up all those spectators who remained in the corridors.

Mr. Wennik's role in the proceedings were not clarified, except that Mr. Erickson revealed that he and Mr. Wennik had a meeting Tuesday morning to discuss the new job and Mr. Dimlich.

Later in the evening, Dr. Meyers said he had a call late Monday night from "a representative" of Mr. Dimlich, who inquired about how arrangements could be made for Mr. Dimlich to enter into discussions about the new job.



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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Rubbish Is A Problem

Municipal collection of rubbish may not be far away, if we read the cards correctly.

There has been increased emphasis on this municipal service in recent years — with town meeting denial coming by a smaller majority each time it is presented.

And the problems being faced by many homeowners in using the dump would appear to give an added push in the direction of town collections.

The Selectmen are continually faced with the various factors involved in controlling the dump - hours, unsightly conditions, improper dumping, use of surrounding areas for after-hours dumping; and must also provide for proper and continuous supervision and maintenance inside the

The inability of some residents to get to the dump on weekdays, a perfectly logical occurrence for those whose work week extends into six days, further complicates matters. They either dump in the surrounding area, or are forced to pay for collection at their homes.

We completely sympathize with residents in the surrounding neighborhood who are opposed to the dump being open Sundays - the litter dropped on the streets and on their lawns is bad enough on week days. But certainly closing on the Sabbath is an added reason why residents will certainly move in the direction of municipal collections.

It's probable that the next article to authorize the town to provide rubbish collection will be approved at town

Common Sense

The Selectmen used a lot of common sense in deciding to promptly change the town's parking meters to penny-

There has been a constant demand for this action, both by merchants who feel the five-cent meter discourages business and from individuals who do not wish to spend the nickel for an abbreviated period of time.

This change will not be reflected in greater income, and may actually represent a cost in terms of extra counting time. But this will be offset by the added service to townspeople who wish to shop.



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

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

Issued Statement For Majority

A special statement was read to the School Committee, and some 84 spectators. Tuesday night, in which Dr. Milton J. Meyers said he expressed the feelings of a majority of the Board.

He told Supt. Edward I. Erickson later that the statement was prepared Tuesday afternoon.

He also asked that it be reitterated that the Committee majority did not at any time question Mr. Dimlich's integrity in the case.

The statement reads:

"The School Committee is charged by state law with the responsibility for public education in Andover. In this connection its most important obligation is to make available to the thousands of young people in this community the best possible education.

"Appointment of principals to assist in meeting this objective is a very serious responsibility of this committee, especially in light of the state tenure law. The majority of your committee believes that tenure appointments

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to such key positions in Andover should be made only to those individuals who have demonstrated beyond any reasonable doubt their capacity for excellence.


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
