Jaycee's Safety Crusade Given Official Support

Full municipal cooperation has been offered to the Greater Lawrence Chamber of Commerce, as it begins a year-long safety crusade.

Chairman Eugene A. Bernardin Jr. of the Board of Selectmen, and Police Chief David L. Nicoll have assured the Jaycee safety crusade committee that town officials and the police department will cooperate in the campaign.

The year-long event will be kicked-off May 9 at a dinner meeting at Central Catholic High School Auditorium.

Chairman Robert Hermann of North Andover has announced that Registrar of Motor Vehicles Clement Riley will be one of the principal speakers.

The Jaycees, in starting the

crusade, are responding to a growing concern within the Greater Lawrence communities at the increasing rate of automobile accidents. The crusade will be a continuing effort to make all citizens aware of the dangers facing them, the need to exercise caution and to obey traffic laws.

Based on results obtained in other communities, the Jaycees feel that the campaign can result in a saving in lives and in the reduction of high automobile insurance rates.

Chairman Hermann anticipates that an official of another Massachusetts city, where a similar campaign was conducted, will speak to the May 9 dinner meeting. Mr. Hermann also will describe the program as outlined by the Jaycee steering committee.

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"I'm going to stay in my job until they throw me out" ousted Junior High School Principal Benjamin F. Dimlich told the Townsman this week.

"I consider myself principal of the school and I wish to have them (the School Committee) recognize it, so that I can continue my program".

Dimlich said he has made up his mind not to accept a post as administrative assistant, which was created by the Committee and to which he was appointed at \$7,400 yearly.

His initial statement of refusal came last Saturday, after he received official notice of the job.

Mr. Dimlich reiterated this week that he had been promised an apology "by a member of the School Committee" and insisted that there had been an agreement on the longevity of the new position.

PRE-SCHOOL GROWTH OUTLINED

Pre-School opened with the fall term last year with 15 students. It now has a full complement of 20, a fully accredited teacher and two

mother assistants for each day of school.

But of greater importance than statistics is the fact that the experiment has been successful. The school is completely self-supporting. And for the second year it is truly non-denominational; there are boys and girls attending who represent each of the three major faiths. The school is giving the children a real growth experience and it is giving their parents an opportunity to share in and learn from their child's first break with education at the home level.

What makes a "cooperative" cooperative? The parents work. In this case each mother assists twice a month at the morning school session. School is held each weekday except Thursday from 9 a.m. until 11:30. In addition, both mothers and fathers attend work parties to build, repair and refurbish equipment. They take responsibility for the membership of classes for the next year; they earn money for additions to the school's permanent equipment. They also attend three or four parent education meetings a year to discuss such subjects as speech development, character development, physical and emotional growth.

This is a church related school without church domination. Free Church has no financial hand in the school other than the donation of its facilities. The education committee of the church has an interest in, but no direct control over the curriculum. The school's teacher is hired by the executive board elected from parents of children attending each year. An advisory board of past officers and interested educators provides continuing leadership.

Why does Free Church sponsor an activity which is of direct benefit to only a few of its members? (A minority of students each year have been from Free Church families.) The church considers that it is discharging part of its responsibility to the community by supporting a project for the general good.

Leaning post for all the parents involved is Mrs. Thayer Warshaw, teacher, who guides the mothers and fathers into really benefiting from their association with a cooperative. Mrs. Warshaw, a graduate of Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio, has taught in the public schools and just prior to this post was assistant teacher at the Jewish Community Center

nursery school in Lawrence.

Teaching four-year-olds who are not really ready to sit down school-desk fashion for more than short periods requires a knack for encouraging, guiding and restraining simultaneously.

An important part of the pre-school "curriculum" is free play. A third of each day is devoted to this time when the children may dress up for make-believe play, build with blocks, paint as the fancy strikes, climb, read a book, play records, etc. What to an outsider may seem a period of general disorder is actually one of perpetual growth. Early in the year most of the children play along side one another but maintain their independence. But with time they progress to group play, i.e. playing train for example when they are willing to delegate authority to one engineer or conductor and cooperate to make the train go. This free period also encourages those who have not developed beyond physical play to branch out into handwork or quiet periods of listening to music, for example.

Free play is followed by an informal group period when children are given an opportunity to stand up and talk about home and experiences to their schoolmates. Some are only ready to listen, but all develop vocabulary and poise from this experience, as well as respect for others and a healthy imagination.

A short period of refreshment is preceded by a simple non-demonstrational blessing. This break is "work" provides a chance for social experience. The children select the friends they wish to sit with and they help with serving, thereby beginning to acquire acceptable manners. Then there is a brief rest period during which the boys and girls listen to a story of music.

The last portion of each morning is spent outside in good weather, inside with a series of short activities in bad. When confined inside the children move through such directed activity as rhythm orchestra, action songs, and special creative work requiring attention and following of instruction about how to cut or paste or assemble paper objects and the like.

Periodically short trips are planned when the boys and girls share the excitement of learning first hand about the fire house, library, the zoo, trains, the airport, a farm and a dairy.

League Heard Talk On Cuban Situation

Robert Lyons, Executive Secretary of the New England Regional Office of the American Friends Service Committee, spoke to the League of Women Voters on Cuba at their spring luncheon last week at Fieldstones.

Mr. Lyons has visited Cuba twice in the last year and told the members present that he was generally favorably impressed with what is happening in Cuba. He said he is of course critical of some aspects of the situation but that the average Cuban is far better off under Castro than he was under Batista.

Mr. Lyons itemized the improvements that have occurred under the revolution; first explaining that to Cubans, the revolution is a positive thing. Revolution means to build, to them, he said. The construction of new schools has been fantastic. Many new schools were built and manned in areas Castro controlled long before he took over the whole country. This trend

has continued. Highway improvements are phenomenal too. This is a country where roads have always been impassable in the rainy season and where there has been much war devastation. An excellent social welfare ministry has been established. This is the first time the Cuban government has provided any aid to the aged, indigents and homeless children.

Questions followed the talk. Mr. Lyons explained the disturbing facts in the situation; anti-americanism and the absence of elections. He reminded League members that anti-americanism in Latin America is only the fruit of the seeds we have sown over many years.

Mrs. Jerome Andrews Jr., President, opened the meeting with several announcements, including the statement that the League of Women Voters had no position, nor had ever discussed, the current school problem. She said this was the usual problem of the organization being blamed or praised for actions of its individual members.

She asked those present to help remind the townspeople that League members are all free to act politically as they wish and that all their opinions are not those of the organization.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Consider Issues On Merits

Looks like Andover will be a mighty political place, as if it hasn't been in past years, now that the Town Employees' Association has announced its intention to take part in the general political area.

The feeling of the employees is perfectly natural — why shouldn't they take part in examination of budgets, and make themselves heard on other issues, when there are other organized groups doing the same thing?

While this is a quite natural reaction, we wonder if the town's best interests are served by having group more or less drawn up against group.

In cases such as this, many persons have a tendency to choose up sides — supporting everything proposed or supported by one group or the other. This sort of reaction, while natural, does not always serve the town best. For there often are both good and bad suggestions from the various groups which assume some responsibility for the management of the community.

For one, we'll still call the shots as we see them on the issues as they come up. And in doing so, it's a certainty that we'll be both agreeing and disagreeing with one group or the other at various times.

This is the way issues should be considered — each on its merits, without regard to the personalities of the individuals connected with the ideas.

Strictest Control Needed

One of the most vital jobs the Selectmen have is control over the town's gravel pits — important because pits can so easily become an eyesore and a danger to the community.

We were surprised to hear last week that some pit operators have been working without bothering to renew their permits — a responsibility that rests with the individual operator, who should keep track of his permit and seek a renewal in sufficient time.

This information was disclosed by the sub-committee of the Board of Selectmen, who periodically inspect the pits and recommend action to the full Board.

It seems to us that some one person — perhaps it should be the building inspector — should regularly and frequently inspect the pits. Any infraction of the permit should result in an immediate shut down, until the condition is corrected. Only one or two situations of that sort would occur before all the operators decided to comply fully with the town's requirements.

From time to time we've pointed out that the town can not justly ban all gravel pits — but we certainly believe in the strictest control. One has only to see the dangerous and unsightly conditions left for other towns to worry about to become insistent that Andover maintain a rigid, inflexible policy of requiring every single regulation to be met, without exception.

Well Done!

The initiative shown by students at the Junior High School, in pitching in to reconstruct a green area at the school, is highly commendable.

The young people turned out in droves last Saturday to dig up the hard-pan area near the parking lot, spread loam, and sow grass seed. Plants and trees will be planted in the area, which had become an unsightly spot over the past few years.

The Student Council, which arranged and financed the project, and all the class members who turned out with a will, deserve the praise of every resident.

In addition to synopses of the plots, the author gives statistical data with casts of first world performances.

Champy Will Start Project

Although nothing has been heard from the state about the new industrial site in Shawsheen Village, Town Manager Thomas E. Duff said this week that he expects developer Bernard Champy to go ahead with proposed streets and a railroad spur line.

Mr. Duff said he understands the developer will start construction of his interior roads, plus the rail line, as soon as the weather permits.

His biggest problem is as yet unsolved, according to the manager, because the state has not indicated whether it will plan to erect abutments on part of the area, instead of filling it for the passage of Route 110. If fill is used the Andover portion of the site would be cut off from much of the area, and the planned spur line could not be built.

The industrial location was zoned at the annual town meeting, and lies in the area generally known as the old filter beds.

Mr. Champy's plan shows access roads to South Union st. near the White Pups Bridge in Lawrence, and to Route 114 in Lawrence.
