Cancer Crusade Plans Progress

The house-to-house Cancer Crusade will be held here next Thursday, between 6 and 8 p.m. N. P. Hallowell Jr., area chairman, announced this week that the special gifts portion of the annual drive should be completed this week. Mrs. George Luedke of Porter rd. is chairman.

Mr. Hallowell also reminded women of the community, over 20 years of age, that the second special cancer film will be shown tonight at the Central School Auditorium at 8 o'clock. A physician will be present to answer questions. The films deal with the early detection of cancer of the breast by self-examination; and of cancer of the uterus by medical examination.

School Board, Counsel Confer

A second special meeting has been scheduled by the School Committee with legal counsel Frederic S. O'Brien for April 29.

The Committee and Mr. O'Brien conferred about the Junior High principalship Tuesday night in executive session.

Chairman Milton J. Meyers, following the meeting, said a vote was taken not to divulge any details of the conference.

It is known, however, that various legal steps, and counter-moves, were discussed.

Benjamin F. Dimlich, the principal, has indicated that he could take legal action at any time he desires, asking the courts to determine that he has tenure as principal. Mr. Dimlich said last week, however, that he would wait and see what happens before making up his mind when, or if, legal action will be

South Church Will Be Host To State-Wide Congregationalists

Clergy and lay leaders representing 584 Congregational churches in the state will gather here May 15-17 for the 161st annual meetings of the Massachusetts Congregational Christian Conference, oldest and largest Protestant denomination in the Commonwealth.

The opening service Sunday, May

15, at 4 p.m. will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the historic meeting of missionary-minded students in 1810 that led to the organization of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions. This opening service will be held across the river from Andover in the historic Bradford Congregational Church in Bradford.

At this opening service there will be a procession of retired missionaries representing at least 10 countries, and a commissioning service for a young missionary heading out to foreign fields.

The headquarters for the official 161st annual meeting of the Conference will be at the South Congregational Church.

Monday, May 16, there will be annual meetings of the Laymen's Council and the Fellowship of Congregational Christian Women.

Among the keynote speakers for the Monday and Tuesday, May

Rev. Rosenblad Going To Kansas

The Rev. Ralph A. Rosenblad, pastor of the United Church in Ballardvale, has announced his resignation. He will join the Central Kansas Methodist Conference

June 1, where he will be appointed pastor of a church by Bishop Dana Dawson.

Mr. Rosenblad said the illness of Mrs. Rosenblad's family in Hutchinson, Kansas, prompted the decision.

The Ballardvale pastor has been at the United Church for five years, assuming his pastorate just after the merger of the Methodist and Congregational Churches.

A native of North Quincy, he had been pastor of the Centralville Methodist Church, Lowell and the Bay Street Methodist Church, Springfield. He is a graduate of Boston University School of Theology and has continued his studies there. He holds a B.A. degree from Baker University in Kansas.

During his tenure here, Mr. Rosenblad has served in various civic activities, and has been president of the Andover Council of Churches.

Mr. and Mrs. Rosenblad have three children - Signe, Eric and Kirstin. The family will move to Kansas immediately after June 1.

New Hours Set At Town Dump

Changes in dumping hours have been established by the Selectmen, with approval of the Board of Health.

The dump will be open for the summer from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., except Wednesdays, from 9 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. It will be closed Sundays, but open all holidays.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff recommended the new hours, noting that the extra hour at the end of the day should make it possible for homeowners to make a trip to the dump after they get home from work.

One of the criticisms of the hours has been that there is insufficient time after normal working hours for residents to get home, load up, and get to the dump. Duff noted that daylight saving time will start April 24, making it increasingly possible for persons to work out doors later in the afternoon and evening.

Enforcement of the dumping hours will continue, with violators warned that they may be taken to court. Town officials have previously warned residents that dumping outside permitted areas, or alongside streets, is not allowed.

Policemen in plain clothes have been around the dump on recent weekends, and have given warnings to several residents who were about to dump refuse near the municipal area.

Duff has also pointed out that the sticker issued to residents must be displayed on the vent window on the driver's side, and should not be carried in the glove compartment or in other places in the vehicle. The sticker will also be good for use of the Pump's Pond facilities, he explained.

Elm st., formerly the Deacon Isaac Abbot Tavern, and the home at one time of Priscilla Abbot for whom the Chapter is named.

Members and invited guests assembled at the house at 1:30 o'clock and enjoyed the program. The invocation was given by the Rev. J. Allyn Bradford, pastor of the Free Christian Church, who is a descendant in the 11th generation from the Pilgrim Governor Bradford of Massachusetts. His prayer was as follows:

"We ask Thy Blessing, O God, on our proceedings here this afternoon. We are here to bring the tribute of our honor to this place. In the minds and hearts of those who are gathered here, the home of Priscilla Abbot has become hallowed with associations, associations which have stood the passage of time. Only by Thy saving grace, O God, can we see clearly

the inner meaning of what is being done here. Our heritage of democracy and tradition of liberty came in the beginning from Thy hand to those who came before us long ago. The gift of freedom was given to them from Thee. All that we cherish now, and are here to commemorate this afternoon has come from them to us. Grant us Thy grace, O God, that we may live in the truth which they have passed on to us. Then in our generation we shall be faithful to Thine eternal purpose, Amen."

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States was led by Howell Stillman, a member of the Sons of the American Revolution, with David Shuford, a fifth grade student at the Central School, holding the Flag.

The gathering joined in repeating the American's Creed, led by Mrs. Roland Weeks, ex-regent of the Chapter, in the place of Mrs. Herbert McQuesten, and one verse of the National Anthem was sung, with Frank Markey, veteran Legionnaire, and head of the Veterans' Bureau of the town, directing. The music was played on the trumpet by another of the school children, William Cole of the Junior High.

Mrs. Frank Hayes, regent of the Chapter gave the words of welcome, and Francis B. McCarthy of Phillips Academy told the story of the house, and several incidents connected with it. It was built about 1680, but was well known when Deacon Isaac Abbot petitioned the General Court for a tavern license, as many travelers stopped here on their way from up-state to Boston, and requested refreshment. Presi-

dent George Washington breakfasted here in 1789 on his way to Boston from Haverhill, where he had stayed overnight.

The plaque was unveiled by Mrs. Hayes. It is placed on the easterly corner of the house, and tells in brief the significance of this old Andover homestead. In a few well-chosen words Mrs. Hayes presented it to Mrs. Young, and she in turn graciously received it.

Those present were then invited to tour the house and were served refreshments by the hostesses, Mrs. Guy B. Howe, Mrs. Roland Weeks and Mrs. Leo V. O'Connor, former regents of the Chapter, and Mrs. Frank Hayes, the present regent.

The business meeting was held after the program with routine matters being transacted. Mrs. Hayes read excerpts from the National Defence article, also some of the resolutions made at the State conference in March. The secretary's report by Mrs. Edward Thompson and the treasurer's report by Mrs. Arthur Bonner were read and accepted. Mrs. Edwin Otto spoke about the historic tours to be given later in the month and in May for the fifth grade children of the public schools, and asked for volunteers to accompany the children. A slate of new officers for the coming three years was presented by Mrs. Roland Weeks, chairman of the nominating committee and will be voted on at the May meeting, which will be held at the home of Mrs. John Murray, 27 Summer st., May 10.

**Police Department
Gets Second Bike**

The Police Department will put another motorcycle on the road for meter and parking enforcement.

The Selectmen and Town Manager Thomas E. Duff have approved Police Chief David Nicoll's request for a second three-wheel motorcycle.

The bike will cost the town \$750 less trade-in value of at least \$100 on a 1940 two-wheeler that is not being used.

Chief Nicoll pointed out that a man on foot can not adequately cover the up-town shopping area and nearby intersections, where an officer is needed at various times of the day.

With the new motorcycle, however, the chief believes that efficient coverage can be given the area, while continuing the Shawsheen patrol on the other motorcycle.

Money for the new bike will be

taken from the meter fund, with the approval of the Finance Committee, Duff reported.

In agreeing to the purchase, the Selectmen insisted that the motorcycle be used only for parking and traffic control, but not in chasing speeders or other duty of that sort. And they also agreed that officers should operate the two vehicles by their own choice.

Selectman William Stewart expressed some concern over the safety of the motorcycles, if they were to be used in any way other than parking and traffic control. He recalled that some officers have been killed while using two-wheel bikes on patrol on the highways.

During the discussion, Chief Nicoll suggested to the Selectmen that the two vehicles can probably be operated part of the winter. Lowell and Lawrence both use the motorcycles throughout the winter, he stated, except when impeded by snow.

**Way Now Clear
For Bridge Erection**

Final easements have been signed by Raytheon Company and the Selectmen, giving the company the right to install a Bailey Bridge across the River at Kenilworth st.

Four major provisions in the easement are:

It is revokable by the Selectmen, without cause or reason, on 90-day notice.

The bridge is to be used only for the passage of automobiles.

A gate will be erected on the River rd, side of the bridge. Raytheon will landscape the area.

The easement was signed by the Selectmen, and by P. L. Spencer, senior vice president of Raytheon.

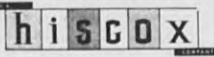

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Another State Control

Another little bit of political voodoo has been taking shape in the Legislature — and perhaps has already been decided.

This is the legislation to prevent towns from counting ballots while the polls are open.

The bill has passed both branches of the Legislature, and at this writing needs only to be passed to be enacted — the third step in the legislative process. The House and Senate were to consider the bill this week, and may have done so by the time this is read. It appeared likely that, after moving the bill so far towards enactment, there would be little chance of defeating it.

The result of its passage is increased cost to the town, and considerable inconvenience.

If all the votes must be counted after 7 p.m., it's logical to assume that the count can not be completed until late in the night. Extra help must be used at night, while it appears that about the same number of persons must be hired for the daytime activity. Thus there will be considerable extra pay for the additional men and women.

Proponents of the plan claim that towns should be treated equally with the cities, where the count can not be started until after the polls close. This would, they say, prevent any "leaks" of information.

But it seems to us that the Legislature, in its "wisdom", is merely creating a further hardship for the towns, without any real purpose.

Formal Patrol Needed

It's about time that some formal arrangement is made for the patrolling of Route 93 through Andover.

As matters stand now, the road is not officially open to the public, and police patrol is rather unofficial. Town cruisers do travel over it to be sure, but there seems to be some unavoidable confusion over responsibility.

Can local police tag speeders and make it stick in court? What happens if an accident occurs because a car is being driven the wrong way, as sometimes happens because the access roads are unmarked?

And perhaps most important, what happens if someone has a disabling accident on the highway late at night?

It seems to us that the state and the contractors could make some official arrangement with the local department so that proper enforcement can be legally undertaken.

The police department, as far as we can see, is sticking its neck out when it patrols the road. And of necessity, this patrol can not be as effective as it might be if legal and financial details could be worked out with the state and contractors.

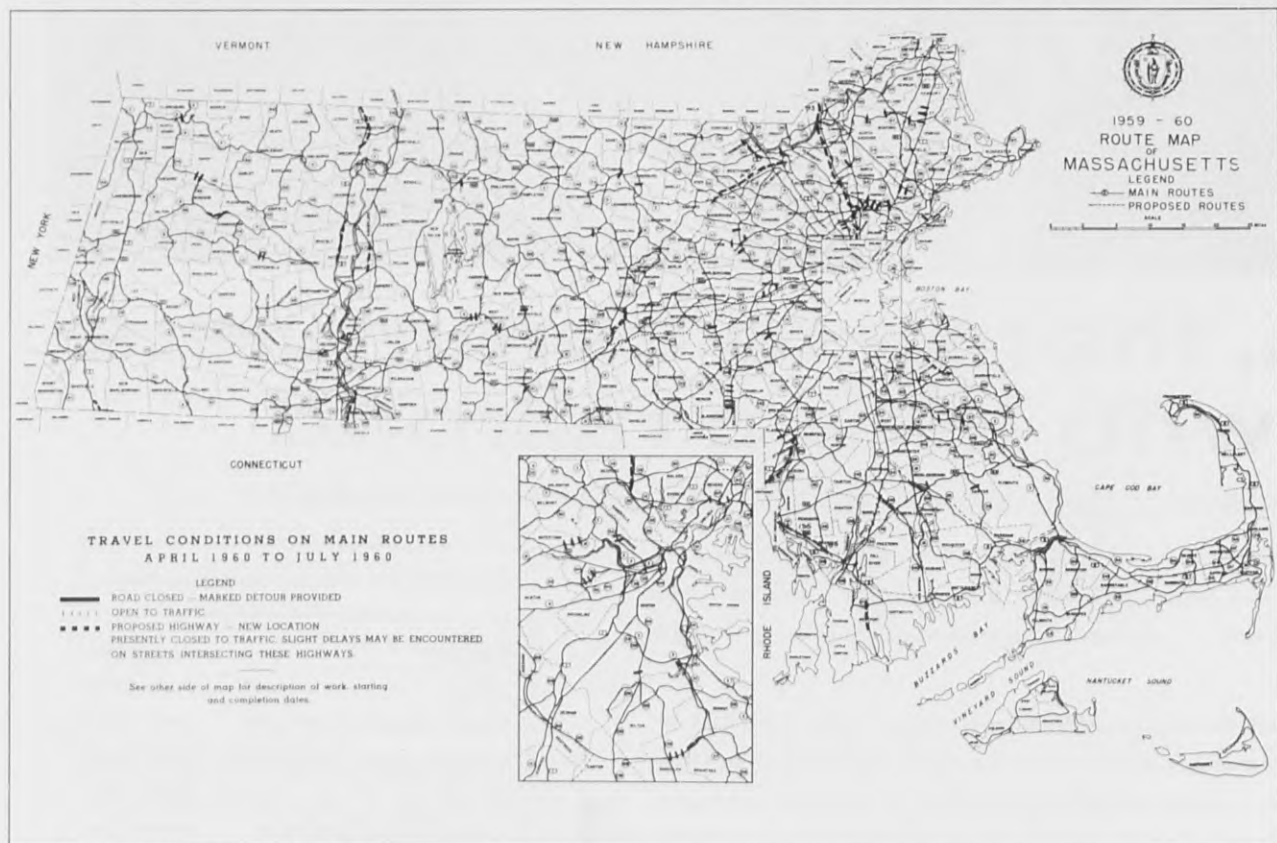
Maud Morgan Paintings Displayed

Town, State Plan For Rt. 110 Work

Significant steps are being taken, with increasing frequency, to insure that the municipal water supply and sewage system are protected and relocated in relation to Route 110 construction.

Water Department Supt. Donald Bassett, and consulting engineers Camp, Dresser and McKee, have been having more frequent contact with design engineers handling the highway, as construction time approaches. Major problems include installing water and sewer lines in conformity with the highway layouts; and increasing the size of water lines to meet future needs, so that expensive reconstruction can be forestalled. Money was appropriated at town meeting for the changes.

A third problem concerns Haggert's Pond, where it is now planned to construct a settling basin for water coming into the northwest end of the pond via two brooks.

These run through the area where construction will take place, and could carry silt into the Pond after severe showers and heavy rain storms. To avoid coloring the water with the silt, it is proposed to construct the settling basin - at a state cost of about

\$3,000 - where the water remains long enough to allow the silt to settle. Bassett said the state probably will bear the cost of the construction on town-owned land.

He indicated that the state is moving swiftly with final design of the highway, with the apparent expectation that sections will go out to bid shortly.

Crackdown On Drag Racing

Registrar Clement A. Riley has announced a drastic crackdown on so-called drag races on the public highways of the Commonwealth. As the result of a recent drag race in Revere, one boy was killed and 12 other young people were injured. Registrar Riley is determined that this highway slaughter must end. In the future, the drivers of the cars involved in racing on the highways will have their licenses suspended immediately and the occupants will be given a hearing to show cause why they should not lose their licenses or right to operate. The Registrar is asking the cooperation of educators, all churchmen of the Commonwealth and all enforcement agencies. Drag racing is a form of highway suicide. Registrar Riley, as Chairman of the Massachusetts Highway Safety Committee, has the complete cooperation of all enforcement agencies of the Commonwealth in making this drastic crackdown against irresponsible show-off drivers effective. The Registrar insists that the actions of a small group of teenagers will not be permitted to condemn the vast majority of young people now taking part in the Registrar's educational program and maintaining fine records as courteous, respectable young drivers.

Ink Paintings At Addison Gallery

Currently on display at the Addison Gallery of American Art, Phillips Academy, is an exhibit of 45 ink paintings by Lucy Fields. The exhibit will be on view through May 15. Lucy Fields was born in Hartford, Conn., but has lived in or around Boston for the last 30 years. She is the wife of Herbert Fields, an insurance broker of Boston. The 45 works are for sale and nearly all were done within the last two years. Mrs. Fields has studied watercolor painting at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, but has evolved her own technique and style in her works in ink, of which this exhibit is comprised. She uses non-absorbent paper which she wets thoroughly and on which she paints in ink in her various techniques as the paper dries. The timing of her use of ink is directly tied to the dampness of the paper, depending on the effect she wishes to obtain. Wet paper gives a fluid vaporous quality to the pigment; drier paper gives an increasingly solid texture to the ink. This enables her to create pictures that are both suggestive and pictorial in a medium that is usually associated with drawing only. She does not use a pen and only now and then does she use a brush. She manipulates the ink by control of

the water on the paper, adding either more water or more ink. She uses colored inks as well as black. This is her first large show. The paintings are of modest size, being generally about 6 x 8 inches in dimension. In style, they come closest to resembling Chinese landscapes, although the technique and approach is totally different. Both are concerned, however, with portraying the essentials of nature in a poetic imagery. The Addison Gallery is on the campus of Phillips Academy and is open to the public from 9 to 5 every day except Sunday, when it is open from 2:30 to 5 p.m. **ESTATE VALUED AT \$400,000**

Central st. residents have vigorously protested a plan advanced by Francis J. Trombly, which would result in buses using Central st. on their way towards Dascomb rd. and Route 93.

Trombly, at a public hearing Monday night, asked the Selectmen to approve suggested routes for his buses, which he says will provide express service to Park Square in Boston.

The only protest came from the Central st. residents, who stated that the quiet residential character of the street is being disturbed enough by gravel trucks and transient use, without adding buses.

Trombly told the gathering that he certainly would alter the route, using Lupine rd. and Essex st., if this is the wish of the Selectmen. He explained that there would be no stops on Central st. - and that it merely appeared to be the best way to get to Route 93 from the center of town.

Trombly will eventually seek permission from the Department of Public Utilities for the suggested service, providing he gets permission from the Greater Lawrence municipalities. 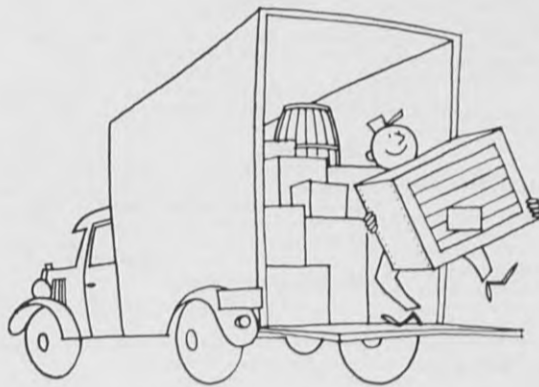

Appeals Board In 3 Decisions

Peter Loosigian has gained Appeals Board approval for alterations to his roadside stand at 254 Lowell st.

In a decision handed down this week, the Board unanimously approved the alterations. Permission was needed because the stand is a non-conforming use in a Zone B residential zone.

The Appeals Board found that a 6x12 building near the street will be torn down, an addition of about 6x20 will be erected, with the final building measuring 20x20. This will be located further from the street than the smaller structure now on the lot.

The Appeals Board decided the plan would improve the property; that it will not be an unlawful extension of a non-conforming use; that it is not detrimental to the neighborhood; and that a substantial hardship would be worked on the petitioner if it was denied.

A second decision signed this

week gives John Philip Enterprises permission to build on six lots on Lovejoy rd., all under present zoning requirements.

Briefly, the Board decided that the lot usage would not be objectionable, as the area was substantially developed under former zoning requirements. The lots in question conform to the prior zoning, and the Board stated that the developer began work in good faith, complying with the by-law as it was at the time.

The decision noted that objection

centered around drainage along Lovejoy rd.

A third decision this week refused permission to Charles D.

Roberts to build a house on a lot on Magnolia ave., with side and rear lot lines less than required.

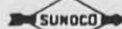
