Ritchie Says CD Radios Are Missing From Sector HQ

Alex Ritchie, Andover's Civil Defense communications director, said late yesterday that he doubts whether the CD sector headquarters in Tewksbury can be opened for the planned test early next week.

Ritchie and his volunteer communications personnel had planned to activate the sector control station May 3, as part of the nation-

wide CD tests.

However, he said that so much radio equipment has been taken from the Tewksbury location that it would now be necessary to move Andover's radio equipment up there.

This is in direct contradiction to a directive he received in July of 1959, in which the state CD office stated that the sector quarters "would remain intact and can be placed in operation with a minimum loss of time".

Ritchie said the only working piece of radio equipment at the sector quarters, located at the state hospital in Tewksbury, is a transmitter that can be used only between the sector and area control stations - but it can't be used for amateur purposes. Thus, he continued, there is no way for sector headquarters to communicate with any of the cities and towns only with headquarters. Two

817 Voted In Tuesday's Primary

Some 817 voters did about what was expected of them Tuesday - supporting Vice President Richard Nixon and Senator John F. Kennedy in the preferential preference portion of the balloting.

Republican votes numbered 625, while 192 Democrats voted.

On the GOP ballot, 415 indicated a preference for Nixon, New York Governor Nelson Rockefeller received 37, Senator Kennedy appealed to 17, Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge received two, Secretary of State Christian Herter, two; and receiving one vote apiece were

SUMMER SCHOOL QUESTIONNAIRE OUT

A questionnaire to assist in the organization of the Andover Summer School has been given to each pupil in the high school and junior high school.

These forms are to help determine the possible enrollment in the various course offerings. Advance registration for Andover pupils will be at the high school between the hours of 1 to 3 p.m. from May 16 to May 26.

The summer school will open July 6 for a six-week term.

A public hearing will be held next Thursday night at 8 o'clock, when officials of the Country Club Development Corp. will explain details of the proposed 225-acre country club in West Andover.

A decision to hold the hearing came Wednesday morning at a meeting of top town officials with representatives of the developers.

The country club, including a 27-hole golf course, would be located in the heart of undeveloped residential land bounded generally by Argilla rd., Blood rd., the high power lines and Lovejoy rd. Access to the grounds and the \$775,000 clubhouse would be from Lovejoy rd.

First announcement of the proposed came in the Townsman of March 31, when it was revealed that options were being sought on land in the area.

Real Estate man Ralph Kimball indicated this week that five parcels have been taken under option,

Ballot-Counting Law Held Up

A proposed state law that would prohibit towns from counting ballots until after the polls close is still held up in committee, according to Rep. Arthur Williams of Andover.

Mr. Williams said the bill, already approved by the House of Representatives and the Senate, must come up again in the final "enactment" stage. He said there is little doubt that the House will

again approve the measure, but explained that the Senate could possibly "kill" the measure by removing the "enactment" clause.

The bill would require that towns as well as cities, count ballots only after the polls are closed.

Town clerks, including Andover's George Winslow, point out in opposition that this would add to the cost of election processes. Additional personnel would be needed after the polls close, Winslow has indicated, but the same number of workers would be required during the voting hours.

Thus, the town would be forced to pay for the extra help in the evening, and to work much later in the night before completing the tabulation.

**European Students
Study At Raytheon**

Students from five NATO coun-
 tries, Belgium, France, West Ger-
 many, Italy, and the Netherlands,
 recently began the first phase of an
 indoctrination program that will
 transfer technical information on
 the HAWK System to NATO coun-
 tries which may be involved in
 the manufacture of the HAWK
 Guided Missile System in Europe.
 Students, most of whom are en-
 gineering graduates drawn from
 the ranks of industrial and staff
 personnel, are attending the course
 as representatives of their country.
 Their stay in this country varies
 from four to six weeks depending
 upon the length of the course they
 are taking. The majority of the
 group has been staying at the
 Shawsheen Manor during this
 period.

Operating within the framework
 of Andover's NATO Support De-
 partment, the course has been
 designed to familiarize these key
 personnel with the functional
 operation of all major items and
 integrated system operation. To
 aid them in their understanding,
 NATO personnel are given the
 opportunity to converse directly
 with Raytheon engineers.

Instruction has been facilitated
 by the fact that students possess
 considerable background in the
 manufacture of such electronic
 items as radar and fire control
 systems.

Included as an important feature
 of the course is a visit to the
 operational battery site in West
 Andover where students get a
 chance to see tactics preparatory
 to actual firing, as well as examine
 in detail the hardware comprising
 the HAWK battery. Additional tours
 covering the production of equip-
 ment here at Andover as well as
 at Waltham are also provided.
 Recently the NATO Support De-
 partment transferred from the An-
 dover Plant to the Wood Mill in
 Lawrence.

United Fund Adds Member

Following a favorable report from the Admission Committee, the Directors of the United Fund voted admittance as a member to the Medical Research Program of the National Foundation for Medical Education. In admitting this agency as a member, the directors feel that the United Fund now offers to the public a balanced health, welfare and character-building program.

The Admissions Committee in making its study found that approximately 29.7 percent of the funds raised by major national health agencies which conducted substantial research programs have gone to medical research as a whole. For these principal health agencies, this 29.7 percent would total about \$34,000,000 nationally. This is roughly the current scale of medical research spending which the givers in all American communities, including Greater Lawrence, indicated their willingness to support in 1958. It has not been ascertained exactly what part of the \$34,000,000 was devoted to basic research. The best available medical testimony is to the effect that about one-third of total research funds should go to basic medical research but there is little evidence to indicate that anywhere near this amount is being spent in this manner, the directors stated.

The Committee further reported that a quota for the Medical Research program would be based on 10 percent of the total raised by the principal national health agencies in this country. The meeting of this quota through United Funds would nationally produce a sum sufficient to conduct a sound basic research program in the nation's medical schools and research institutions. It would also insure the United Fund givers that they are participating in a substantial and worth-while manner in the kind of basic research program that the country needs and everyone desires.

The Medical Research Program is a voluntary national program to provide funds for the major medical research facilities of this country solely for basic unrestricted research whose ultimate purpose is to find the cure for any and all diseases. This program has been approved by the Association of American Medical Colleges and the American Medical Association.

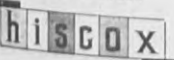

League Officers At National Meeting

Mrs. Jerome Andrews Jr., president, and Mrs. Edward Flint, treasurer, of the League of Women Voters of Andover, are attending the 24th national Convention of the League of Women Voters this week in St. Louis, Mo.

"40 years of a great idea" is the theme of this convention, as this is the 40th year since the founding of the League. Carrie Chapman Catt, leader of the woman suffrage or-

ganization, in an address in 1919, called for a "league of Women Voters to 'finish the fight' and aid in reconstruction of the nation."

The "fight" was for enactment of the 19th amendment to the federal Constitution to give full and equal suffrage to all women in the United States. "Reconstruction of the nation" referred, of course, to the post World War I period.

U. S. Foreign economic policies will be the subject of major discussion at this 24th national Convention. Local and state Leagues throughout the country expressed foremost interest in this topic for study and action over the 1960-'62 period.

Mrs. Andrews and Mrs. Flint go as uninstructed delegates from Andover; but they go with the knowledge that the Andover League overwhelmingly endorsed the proposed agenda subject on relationships of United States and foreign economic policies.

The national budget of the League is met largely by pledges from local Leagues, which raise their money through dues and contributions. The latter come from in-

dividuals who value the public service the League renders their communities in working for a better informed electorate and more active participation by all citizens in government at all levels.

There are over 1,000 local Leagues, in all 50 states, and the District of Columbia. There are about 127,000 members of the League of Women Voters of the United States.

The League of Women Voters stresses its non-partisanship, it does not support or oppose political parties or candidates. After intensive study it may take a position on an issue provided there is a consensus among the membership. Then it supports or opposes specific legislation in accordance with that position. League members are encouraged to work in the party of their choice but leaders closely identified in the public mind with the work of the League may not be active workers in their parties while holding League office.
