Memorial Day Program Set

The annual Memorial Sunday Service, to which veterans of all wars are invited, will be held in the United Church in Ballardvale Sunday, May 29.

The annual services will begin at 11 a.m., and all members of the veterans organizations are requested to meet at their headquarters no later than 10:15.

That same weekend, May 28-29, graves of all veterans will be decorated with a flag.

Post 2128, VFW, will decorate the graves in the Old South, Christ Church and Spring Grove Cemeteries. Chapter 18, DAV, will care for the graves of veterans in the West Parish Cemetery. And Post 8, American Legion, will place flags on veterans graves in the Spring Grove Cemetery.

The next of kin of veterans of any war, who are buried in the town are asked to notify the Veterans Service Office of any oversight in the placing of the flags.

Plans for the Memorial Day parade and the services en route have also been completed.

Mrs. McCabe Leads Workshop

At the annual meeting in the Shaw Barn last week, both new and old board members of the Children's Theater Workshop gave a standing round of applause as Mrs. Samuel S. Rogers, founder of the Workshop, retired from the position of chairman, which she has held for the past five years.

The idea of bringing live theater to the young people in the community originated with Mrs. Rogers when she was chairman in 1955 of the fourth grade division of the Andover-North Andover Parents League. At that time outside Children's Theater groups, such as the Portland Players, were brought in to give performances, and a year later, under the tutelage of the Parents League, a few original plays and an adaptation of "Winnie the Po" were given. The last Parents League production was "Tang" in the Spring of 1957, and

5 Articles In Meeting Warrant

Trombly Given Bus Franchise

The Selectmen have given the Trombly Motor Coach Co. its franchise to operate over local streets, while providing express bus service to Boston.

Acting Monday night, the Board made it plain that buses must not operate on Central st., nor via Essex st. and Lupine rd., heading towards Dascomb rd.

An alternate route was stressed, that would have the buses proceed along present Route 28 as far as Route 125, there transferring to Route 93.

A special town meeting with five articles - four of them zoning - will convene at 7:30 the night of June 6 in Memorial Auditorium.

Planning Board hearings on the four zoning articles will be held Saturday, June 4, under statute requirements that the articles be heard and that the Board must report to the town meeting on them.

The first article will involve the proposed country club in West Andover - a plan that has obtained the unanimous approval of town boards and officials. Although a special zone will not be created, the voters will be asked to amend the residential zone by-law allowing a country club land use, providing construction starts within a specified time.

The Selectmen designated the only non-zoning article as number two in the warrant. It requests adoption of a statute that allows the town to pay vacation wages in advance - a custom here for many years.

Many Object To Pit Continuance

Renewal of an expired gravel pit permit for the Essex Sand and Gravel Co. drew heavy objections at a hearing Monday night - with residents of Ballardvale rd. and Sunset Rock rd. complaining strongly about noise, wind-blown sand and traffic hazards.

Dr. Harry C. East led the opposition, explaining that the heavy trucks grind slowly up the hill from 7 a.m. until late afternoon, for nine months or more of the year.

And he offered to pay the expenses of the pit owners if they will spend a day sitting in the East home, listening to the racket, to see whether it actually is objectionable or not.

Other residents protested the noise, and commented sharply about sand sifting off the trucks, which primarily haul to the company's hot top plant in Peabody. And on windy days, the neighbors claimed, much more sand finds its way to the roadside and onto the lawns and porches along the way.

Traffic was also pointed out as a problem, with some residents objecting to the trucks wheeling out of gear on the return trip, picking up what they believe to be an unreasonable speed down Ballardvale rd.

Speaking for the pit was Mr. Drislane, one of the principals in the company. He said truck operators have been instructed to cover all loads and promised this would be enforced. He told the Selectmen that the pit has about five years left to run, but agreed that some portions have already been worked out. Selectman William Stewart pressed to have these sections restored properly.

During the discussion the Selectmen clamped down on the operation, pending renewal of the pit permit or legal advice that would allow a continuation of the operation.

On the grounds that the permit expired, with hauling continuing without the permit, the Selectmen told Mr. Drislane to halt all operations.

He suggested that an area of some 10 acres - taken and paid for by the town as a site for one of the new wells - could be worked in the meantime, because an agreement with the town gave the company the right to remove the sand.

Legal advice was to be sought on this point, with hauling at a halt until it was obtained.

Whether the pit gets its renewal license or not depends in large part on the sub-committee in charge of gravel pits. This three-member group will investigate conditions at the pit and the complaints of residents before making recommendations to the entire Board.

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Needed: Decisive Action

If ever there was a need for decisive action, now is the time.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff should, by virtue of his ultimate authority, direct the Planning Board and Industrial Commission to reach a decision on the type and extent of zoning along Route 93 and its interchanges. And possibly a time limit should be placed on the deliberations of those two official groups, so that a workable plan will be presented by Fall.

Then perhaps it would be reasonable to have one special town meeting, at which all the zoning articles can be considered apart from all other subjects.

We've noted in the past that zoning articles at the annual town meeting fall well back in the warrant — so that essentially only those with special interest in zoning remain to vote on the issues. In many cases the zoning articles have been taken up at the adjourned sessions, when fewer voters attend.

Thus it seems reasonable to assume that a special meeting for all zoning changes would attract as many voters as are interested.

Confusion over present proposed changes certainly could be eliminated, if all of the proposals except the country club are held up until a Fall meeting. At that time, we would anticipate that a workable plan can be available, and that it will have the support of both the IDC and Planning Board.

Mr. Duff needs to assume some leadership here, and tell the two groups to get to work now on this problem, and continue with it until it is settled. Otherwise we'll be continually plagued by requests for changes, and a stream of special town meetings to consider them.

How many attractive businesses or industrial prospects will be knocking at our door in those intervening months? It's costly and unnecessary to hold the special meetings for them as they come up — and unfair to the town and the businessmen to put everything off for the next 10 months.

Let's Settle The Issue

A tongue-in-cheek motion to have a special town meeting decide on legal fees for Atty. Fredric S. O'Brien, who represents the School Committee in the Dimlich controversy, was defeated at a special Committee meeting last week.

Secretary William A. Doherty wanted the Board to insert an article in the warrant of the June 6 meeting for an appropriation of \$5,000 for fees — on the stated grounds that the money could not properly be provided by the Finance Committee under any emergency clause.

Chairman Milton J. Meyers and Member John Sullivan promptly objected — both on the grounds that the money could be obtained by transfer under emergency provisions and in the belief that the voters might cause a cessation in the legal maneuvering by failing to vote the money.

The latter reason, we assume, is at least based on fact. It's a pretty fair bet that this question, if included in the warrant, would attract hundreds of persons and, we'd guess, the appropriation would fail.

But this would be an unsatisfactory way for the question to be answered. In our opinion, only the legal decision promised by the principals can clear the air. For the voters to step in, in a partisan attitude, and stop the case now would leave Mr. Dimlich's status completely in the air, and the citizenry as much confused as ever.

Thus, while we can understand and appreciate Mr. Doherty's intentions, it appears that the decision was sound.

Strictest Control Needed

Gravel pit control still looms as a major responsibility of the Selectmen.

But, unfortunately, it is a task that, in its day-to-day activity, doesn't quite belong to that Board.

While present town by-laws call for the Selectmen to hold the hearings, and grant the permits, it appears that the required close supervision of the pits can best be done some other way.

Perhaps the building inspector should be given the authority by the Selectmen, and with the advice and guidance of the manager. For it seems that absolute supervision could eliminate many of the complaints that become, at hearing time, major reasons for refusing to renew the permits.

Residents who have legitimate objections to some phase of the operation would thus have one person to talk

to. And if this person had authority, he could probably straighten out many of the misunderstandings that develop.

However it's done, some sort of complete control is essential.

Witness the fact that the Essex Sand and Gravel Co. has been operating without a permit — and was informed Monday night that it must cease operations until the new permit is issued. The decision was announced Monday, yet the firm has not had its permit for some time. One person, responsible for day-to-day pit control, would have presumably called this to the attention of the Board the instant the old permit expired. And the operation could then be called to a halt until the mechanics of requesting a renewal had been followed, and a decision reached.

If the town intends to allow gravel pits at all, then the strictest control is necessary in the best interests of the town itself and all of its citizens.

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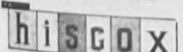

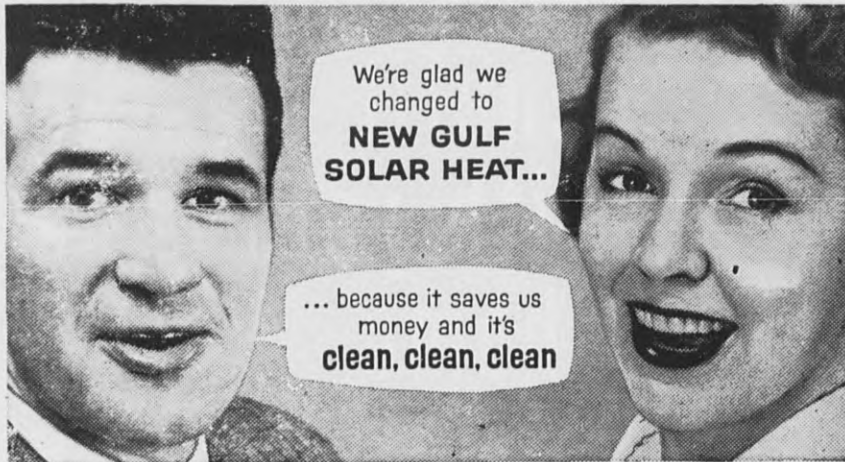

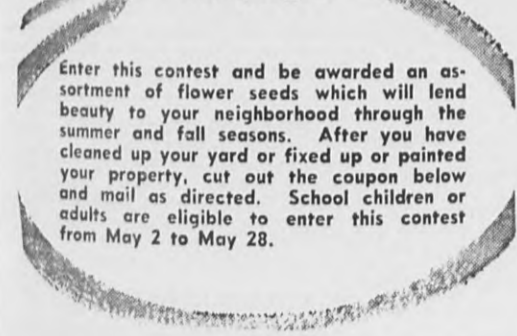
