Memorial Day Tribute Planned

A four-division parade will highlight Andover's Memorial Day celebration next Monday.

Led by an escort of marching police officers, the parade will halt three times for memorial services.

First comes the Memorial Hall Library, where Post 8, American Legion, will hold a short service. The parade will then wind its way to the Memorial Auditorium, where major commemorative services will be held, in charge of the Disabled American Veterans. The third and final stop on the parade route is at the Memorial Tower, where Post 2128, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will hold brief services.

Following the disbanding of the parade, services will be held in the town's cemeteries.

The Legion will hold services in West Parish Cemetery, about 11:15 a.m. At approximately 11 a.m., the VFW will hold services at Old South Cemetery, then go to St. Augustine's Cemetery at 11:30.

Many Plan On College

One hundred and two members of the graduating class at Andover High will continue their education, according to information released this week.

Headmaster Lindsay J. March indicated that 66 of the 165 graduates will attend 58 degree-granting colleges located in 20 states. Others will continue their education at junior colleges and various schools offering specialized work. Seven members of the senior class will enter the Armed Forces, and another seven are still considering some school.

The Guidance Department, under William Igoe, has worked with the seniors in helping them select the colleges and schools to which they applied.

School Board Plans To Appoint Acting Principal For Jr. High

An acting principal for the Junior High School may be appointed by the School Committee when it meets June 3.

Acting Tuesday night, the Committee directed its administrators to work out a method of making the appointment, and asked that recommendations be made at the meeting a week from Friday.

Dr. Milton J. Meyers, chairman of the Committee, emphasized that he doesn't want to discuss the sub-

ject - but does want the recommendations made June 3. He felt that the selection of a method of appointing an acting principal, and the recommendation of a person, are strictly administrative matters and should be left to Supt. Edward I. Erickson and Dr. John P. Gainey, assistant to the superintendent.

Member John S. Sullivan agreed that he would be guided in large part by the recommendations of the superintendent.

There was general agreement that something must be done in June, so that an appointee can assume the position after June 30.

Member Robert McIntyre commented that he believes it would "be grossly unfair" to put any

Police Investigate Robbery At Grants

Police are still investigating the bold nighttime robbery Monday at the W. T. Grant Co. store in the Shawsheen Plaza.

Nearly \$4,000 worth of merchandise was taken sometime Monday night or very early Tuesday morning, and police theorize that a key may have been used. There were no indications of forcible entry or exit from the building, according to investigators.

Sgt. Robert Deyermund reported that the robbers either hid in the building before closing time Monday, or a key was used to permit easy access.

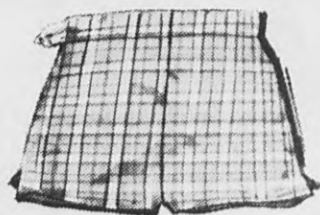

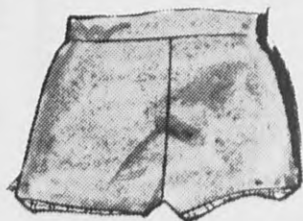

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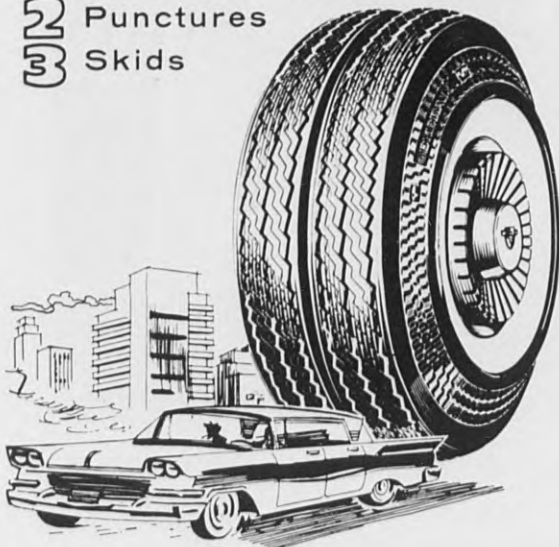

Exams Coming For Military Academies

Young men interested in military careers will have an opportunity to seek appointment to the Naval Academy at Annapolis and the U.S. Military Academy at West Point early this summer.

Congressman Edith Nourse Rogers has indicated that she has the right to designate four appointees to the Naval Academy and one to the Military Academy, all from the Fifth Congressional District. In addition, 20 alternates will be chosen for the Naval Academy and three for the Military.

Mrs. Rogers explains that any young man, a resident of the District for 10 years, between the ages of 17 and 22, may take the written examination in Lowell July 11.

Mrs. Rogers must be notified of the individual's interest by June 10, so that authorization cards may be mailed. Mail may be addressed to congressman Rogers at 15 Kearney Square, Lowell.

The exam, including two aptitude and one subject matter test, will determine the order in which the principals and alternates are selected. Physical examinations will also be given, once the federal civil service department has graded the examinations and cer-

tified the status of the individuals. Later, after official designation, appointees will in most cases take qualifying mental and physical examinations conducted by the Navy or Army Departments.

ROUTE 93 TO OPEN FRIDAY

(Continued from Page One)

The opening also will include the important two-mile, \$840,000 Route 125 Connector in Wilmington. This connector will provide cross-country access between I-93 and Route 28 where a new interchange will be placed in traffic use.

Commissioner DiNatale said the new Expressway will provide valuable time-savings for motorists and commercial vehicles between Boston and points north. He also pointed out that Route 28 will be relieved of heavy through traffic.

The section of Rt. 93 to be placed in traffic use Friday traverses the municipalities of Reading, Woburn, Wilmington, Tewksbury, Andover and Methuen. Approximately nine additional miles of the route is under construction at both ends of the section to be opened.

Ultimately, Rt. 93 will terminate at an interchange with the proposed Boston Inner Belt Highway on which public hearings on location studies were held earlier this month in Cambridge and Boston.

The following interchanges will

be available at the time of the opening: Route 128 - serving Metropolitan Boston; Route 129 - Lowell st., Wilmington and, at Concord st., Wilmington; Route 62 - in Wilmington; Route 125 - in Wilmington, serving as a connector to the Andover cut-off and to Route 28; Dascomb rd.; Route 133 - Lowell st.; River rd.; Route Junction 110-113 - Lowell st., Methuen, present northerly terminus of Rt. 93.

The temporary Lowell st., Methuen, terminus will route traffic a two-mile distance between Route 28 and Rt. 93.

Commissioner DiNatale predicted that the removal of through traffic from parallel Route 28 will make the older highway safer and, at the same time, would induce a better business potential for commercial establishments located along the route.

"It is encouraging to note," DiNatale said, "that a large number of communities anticipate being influenced by the new highway's potential social and economic impact, and already have plans to meet their expectations of commercial and residential developments."

"Such intelligent planning," he continued, "reflects and spurs faith and confidence in the future economic growth of Massachusetts."

The Commissioner said that motorists and truck operators alike will benefit in great savings in time offered by the new highway segment.

Ceremonies will be held at 11:30 a.m. on the highway's Merrimack River Bridge between Andover and Methuen. Federal, State and local officials will participate.

Massachusetts motorists, for the first time, will drive on a seven-mile stretch of eight-lane, divided expressway. Rt. 93's eight lanes begin at the Route 128 interchange and extend northerly to the Tewksbury line. Each roadway in this area is 60 feet wide.

From the Tewksbury line, the new highway gently reduces to six driving lanes, three in each direction, northerly to River rd. At River rd., Rt. 93 continues to its terminus as a four-lane, divided expressway.

A huge directional interchange and traffic rotary will be in use at the junction of Routes 110 and 113 in Methuen.

The cost of Interstate Route 93 is being financed 90 percent by the federal government and 10 percent by the state.

More than 70 miles of white line painting on the new section of highway is now under way.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Let's Pause To Think

Next Monday - amid the holiday atmosphere and general feeling of gaiety that a day out of work brings - we wonder how many men and women will pause, at least briefly, to observe the true meaning of the day.

As the name implies "Memorial Day" is meant to be celebrated in memory of those men who have taken part in this nation's wars, many of whom were casualties of battle, and many of whom have since died.

Officially we will mark the occasion with the usual parade, and the fitting ceremonies at memorials along the parade route. And services will be held in the cemeteries, where many of the community's veterans are buried.

But more than that is needed - something extra should be added, by each individual regardless of the official ceremonies.

Each of us should spend at least part of the day contemplating the sacrifice that our veterans made. We should take a penetrating look at our world today, and see in our own minds whether the sacrifices have been in vain.

And having done this, we, as individuals, should dedicate ourselves to doing whatever we can, whenever we can, to make our own community, the state and the nation a better place in which to live. By so doing, we can truly say that the purposes for which our veterans fought and died have not been forgotten.

How Many Principals?

The town can very conceivably find itself in an embarrassing situation next September, with the possibility that the Junior High School may have none, one or two principals.

It's distinctly possible that the Dimlich court case will not reach the courts in time to be settled prior to the opening of school - and with that comes the question: "Who will function as principal until it is settled?"

Certainly no one from out of town is going to seriously consider accepting the position as long as it is in legal contention.

Mr. Dimlich has not been retained by the School Committee for the next school year.

This would ordinarily leave a vacancy that can not be filled on a permanent basis until such time as the Superior Court renders a decision.

It is possible, however, that someone will be appointed in an acting capacity, to fill the void.

Then we may see two principals on the job - for it is entirely possible that Mr. Dimlich will report for duty each working day, supporting his contention that he is under tenure in the position.

This won't be a very happy picture to present to the world, but it never-the-less is a probability.

Engineer Would Be Busy

The concept of an engineering department for the town, as mentioned briefly this week by the town manager, seems entirely sensible.

In fact, similar suggestions over the past few years have also appeared to be a common-sense approach to one of the town's most critical problems.

For it is established beyond doubt that the community faces many questions each year that require engineering recommendations.

From the smallest installation of a water pipe to the problems of sub-division design, there is a constant need for some engineering advice. To date this has been provided by employees who do not function primarily as engineers, by individual consultants or by firms of engineers.

The time has long since come and gone when there can be any question about the need for a full-time engineer. Now it appears to be only a matter of waiting until next March for money to pay one.

Whatever appropriation is required to hire and retain a competent man, we feel that it will be money well spent.

Resume Of League History Was Given

A resume of the founding of the League of Women Voters of Andover was given at the League's annual meeting by Mrs. John Barss, a former president.

Mrs. Barss read from a letter from Mrs. Horace Poynter, president of the League in 1926. Mrs. Poynter helped form the Andover Women's Suffrage Association in 1912. This organization was the forerunner of the League of Women Voters, founded both nationally and locally in 1920. She led the group:

"After the 19th amendment was ratified, the suffragists turned soberly at once to the problem of helping instruct the woman voter in some of her duties and privileges. First, simple lessons in government, then more intensive material collected and simplified by specialists in their fields, has been provided by the National League for these 40 years. The Andover League had superior study groups on Foreign Affairs and Child Welfare in the early days which were eye-openers to many."

"Mrs. Frank Brigham was the first president of the Andover League. She admirably carried over the bridge from the Suffrage Association to the new organization. The second president was Mrs. Mabel Fraser and she really put the Andover League on the map; the paid membership was 300 women. Miss Helen Chickering did wonderful work as Membership chairman in 1928 and then, over a considerable period, as treasurer of the League."

"The early League was very much in favor of the League of Nations. One of the finest things done in those early years was the model League of Nations, put on in a packed George Washington Hall, with groups representing the different nations, and eminent speakers, mostly from Harvard, recruited largely by Mrs. Gilbert Franke."

"There was the work in conjunction with the Lawrence YWCA for women in industry. For several years the League sent a girl from one of the Lawrence mills to the Summer School for Women in Industry at Bryn Mawr College. The child welfare group worked hard for the Shepart Towner Bill, whose passage is considered the first major accomplishment of the National League. Town affairs were also of great concern. The League began with the usual postcards for registration and voting dates. It studied taxation and ardently supported the Selectmen in their efforts for a re-appraisal of real estate (and got its first strong masculine support in that way). It studied the over-lapping and duplication of welfare organizations in the Town, with the result that Town Meeting voted to install a town welfare worker. Money raising activities were ambitious. The hobby show held in the town hall will never be forgotten by anyone who took part, nor probably by Mrs. Tyler, who ran it. There were concerts and barn dances."

Mrs. Dudley Fitts spoke to the members about the League in Andover, from 1940 to the present. She gave three examples of how it has grown in prestige and usefulness to the town. The work right after the war in support of the school committee to construct two new elementary schools, now known as Central and West, was soon followed by a study on zoning which resulted in new zoning by-laws for the town and a strengthened Planning Board. Her third example was the study and work for the selectman-town manager form of government.

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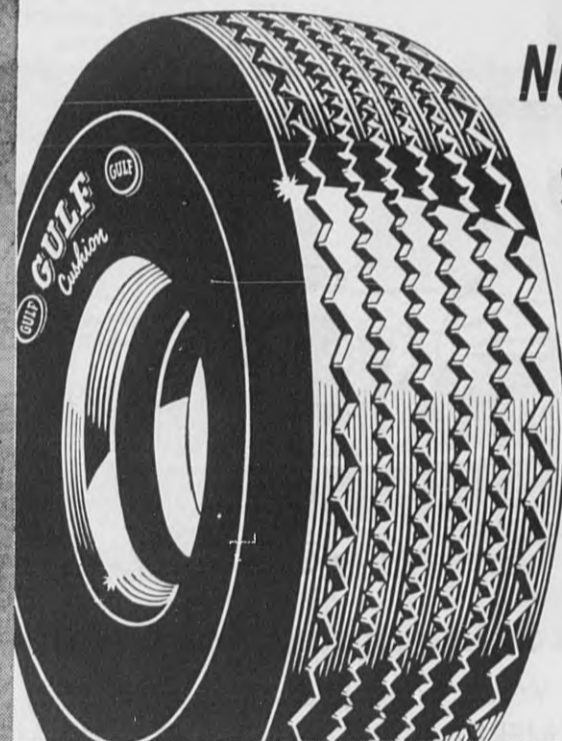

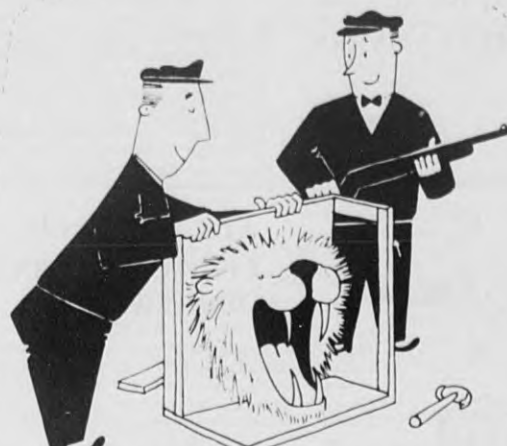

League Approved Survey Proposal

The League of Women Voters has overwhelmingly voted to adopt, as part of its 1960-'61 local agenda, a town survey to be conducted with the cooperation of town boards and officials. A similar survey was

completed recently in Wayland by the Wayland League, in conjunction with the Wayland Planning Board. The Andover League has consulted with the Board of Selectmen and the town manager, the School Committee, Edward I. Erickson and Dr. John P. Gainey, the Industrial and Development Committee, the Andover Housing Authority, the Board of Health, the Library Board and the Recreation Committee, as well as the Planning Board. Most of these boards expressed interest in a house-to-house survey and wished to pose questions to the townspeople. The results of this opinion and factual poll would be compiled by the League and turned over to town officials for their use.

The League hopes to interest other civic minded organizations and citizens in helping them with this major undertaking. The League of Women Voter's local agenda for 1960-'61 reads as follows: 1. Continued study of recreation, with emphasis on cooperation with, and support of, the Community Recreation Council; 2. Study of town planning, including Urban Renewal, with a view towards action and including a Town Survey.

Continuing Responsibilities include: 1. Support of the Selectman-Town Manager form of government; 2. Support of the Conservation Commission. A budget of \$1985 was also voted for the next season, during the annual meeting May 19 at the Log Cabin. Mrs. Jerome Andrews Jr. and Mrs. Edward Flint, president and treasurer respectively, continue their terms of office for the next season. Two-year directors, Mrs. G. H. Sherrard and Mrs. Harold Shay also continue. New directors are, for 2 years, Mrs. Paul Crane and Mrs. Edward N. Sabbagh and, for one year, Mrs. Raymond Durham, Mrs. Jack Kyger, Mrs. Allan May and Mrs. William G. McKeown. Mrs. Charles St. Clair was elected vice president for a two-year term and Mrs. Alfred Fuller will serve as secretary for a similar period.
