Council Seeks Data On Recreation Needs

Again Request Parking Ban

Shawsheen residents have again appealed to the Selectmen for better traffic and speed control in the Village.

And they have, through the Village Improvement Association, renewed their request for no parking on many streets all day.

Included in the suggested 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. parking ban are Enmore, Balmoral, Argyle, Arundel, Carisbrooke and York sts.

However, the Selectmen promptly frowned on this request - pointing out that some residents certainly would be inconvenienced. Various Board members recalled that this idea, when originally presented, brought protests from some Village folk, some of whom have no driveways in which to put their cars.

Suggestions that no parking rules be adopted for at least one side of these streets brought the same comment - that this would result in

Questionnaires will be sent home with all school children this week, seeking data on recreation.

Sponsored by the Community Council, the questionnaire will attempt to discover what the adults of the community want in the way of recreational facilities.

The documents will also be available at the Library and at the town hall.

Listed on the questionnaire are various activities, with columns to check indicating the extent to which the family would participate in them.

Listed are sports, music, drama, arts and crafts, hobbies, dancing, social and playground. Those filling out the questionnaire are invited to add any other activity which they think should be sponsored by the community in its recreation program.

The document also asks whether the individuals can help organize an activity, and supervise it after it has been started.

The questionnaire is designed to get a widespread response, indicating the level of family and individual participation in the various activities.

Noto of Lawrence, the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church. Noto, with two companions, was fishing in the lake when their boat tipped over. The other two men reached shore safely and summoned aid. The Andover emergency boat, manned by Deyermund and Willard H. Money Approved For Renewal Plans

Urban Renewal planning received a big boost late last week, when the Urban Renewal Administration announced a grant of \$62,025 for detailed planning of the local project.
Housing Authority Chairman Thomas P. Eldred was notified of the grant, which involved determining the practicality of the original survey and detailed plans for the area.
No town money is involved in this stage.
If the plans are acceptable to the government, a town meeting would be expected to determine whether the town would put up its share of the eventual cost. At that time, the money allocated for planning would be added to the total cost of the project. However, if

the town meeting did not approve the plans, the entire \$62,025 cost would be borne by the government.

The government has also set aside \$514,700 for the eventual project, if it is undertaken.

The area involved is essentially that in the center of town, including the municipal buildings.

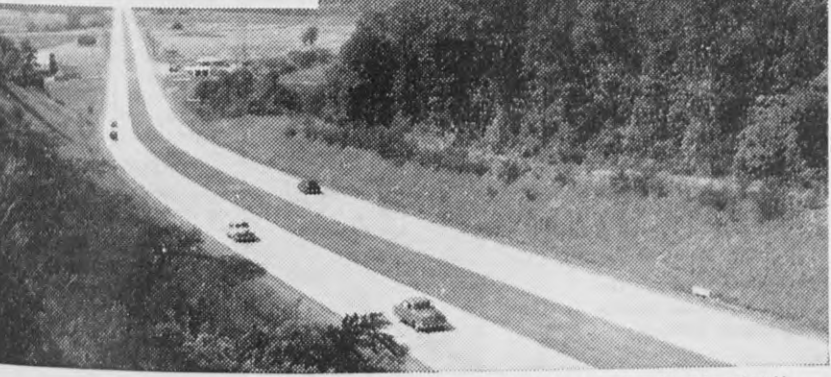

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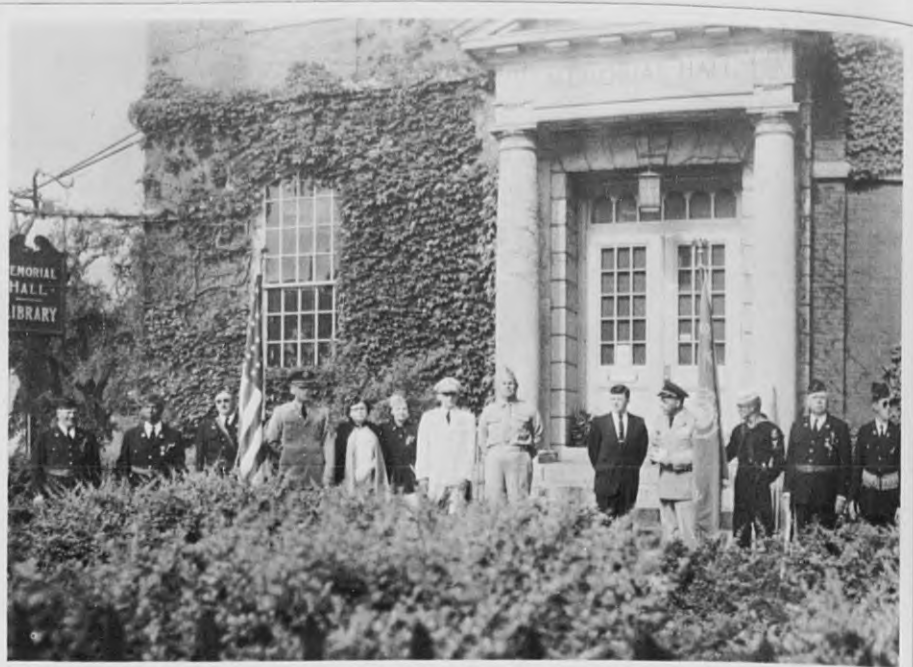

Grade Four Pupils Learn About Town

The fourth graders of the Shawshen School put into action the words of the popular tune "Getting to Know You", when they set out in a bus last Thursday morning to become better acquainted with their town.

Under the guidance of their teachers, Mrs. Virginia Garland and Miss Florence McCarthy, the pupils of grade four have been studying about Andover and have become aware of the rich heritage Andover possesses.

The story of the former slave, Pompey Lovejoy, and how Pompey's Pond acquired its name, held special fascination for the children. When the bus stopped in front of the house where "America" was written, the children felt a particular thrill to think that in this house were written the words of the famous song sung by people all over

America.

The children visited the Addison Art Gallery and for many of the group it was their introduction to the work of great masters. As the pupils walked across the campus of Phillips Academy, they had an opportunity to view many of the buildings of an institution that has been designated by nationally known critics as the most beautiful school campus in the country. A tour of the Peabody Museum, more familiarly known as the Archaeology Building, gave the children an opportunity to see how Andover looked 300 years ago when our forefathers first came here. On the return trip, as the children traveled down Main st., they contemplated the progress and changes effected through the years because of the establishment of Andover industries and business houses. It was pointed out that the entire morning could be spent investigating and learning about the offices in the town house.

One of the objectives of the social studies curriculum for grade four is to establish the fact that certain, broad environmental factors influence life in a given region. The aim of this particular field trip was to show the pupils how the people of Andover endeavor to profit by the environmental factors dominant in this region. When they returned to their classrooms the pupils organized group discussions to evaluate their trip. While their teachers explain that it is impossible to tabulate the intangible effects, they feel assured that, for many pupils, the trip awakened a desire to know more about their town; it stimulated a respect for the past as it influences the future; and it created an awareness that in a few years these children will be called upon to assume the responsibility of guiding and shaping the policies of their town.

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Reserved For Professionals

Should professional educators, or well-intentioned laymen, establish school curriculum and policy?

The answer to that question seems quite obvious — the professionals are, of course, better equipped to do this job.

Yet it's interesting to note that well-meaning laymen here and in most other communities have been delving deeper into this area.

So much of a problem has this become, in fact, that one noted educator has called for a halt to the practice of allowing citizens to establish educational policy and curriculum. A brief report on this opinion was given to the School Committee last week by Headmaster Lindsay J. March.

He explained that the speech, given at an educational conference, stressed the retention of policy making by the professionals, in the face of greater interest and increased pressure by laymen.

We have noted here in Andover that education has become a prime topic of conversation — some residents glibly toss the professional-sounding phrases around, but have little understanding of their meaning. Others, with some background in education, know a bit about the subject. But we are compelled to wonder whether the whole responsibility for education in the community, and curriculum development, should not rest squarely with the professional men in the school department.

This is not to say, of course, that interested citizens should not freely ask questions and expect reasonably answers. It is of doubtful value, however, to have the residents replace the thoughtful responsibility of the professionals with their own brand of education, which may be the result of a smattering of knowledge, their own prejudices and an instinctive response to world conditions.

Even the School Committee, which has an over-all responsibility for our schools, should not be embroiled too deeply in solving these problems. While the members must give their approval to all matters concerning the schools, it is too much to expect that they are all experts in the educational field. They should not take the responsibility for establishing both the broad policy and the mechanics putting it into effect when competent men are paid good salaries for this purpose.

Nor should we, as citizens, expect them to do so.

We should, on the other hand, expect the professional educators to keep alert to modern methods and developments; make worthwhile suggestions for changes and alterations in policy as needed; and be capable of implementing these policies.

Emergency Phones Needed

Picture yourself driving along a thru-way in some distant place, late at night, when you have the least idea of your precise geographical location. All you know is that staying on the highway is all you have to do, to get where you're going.

Then picture what might happen if suddenly there was a bad accident — and you had to hurriedly call an ambulance and the police.

Would you know where the nearest phone is located, or, for that matter, how to get to it quickly?

Probably the answer is no. You wouldn't have the slightest idea — except possibly to drive until you found a restaurant or gasoline station.

This, then, is the same situation that faces anyone driving along Route 93.

Late at night there is only a slim chance that a stranger — or even some folks who live nearby — would know where to find the nearest phone. They might not even know what town they were in.

Thus it appears that some form of citizen alarm — those telephones hooked up directly with police headquarters — might profitably be installed at two or three prime locations along the highway. Occasional signs could tell the location, so motorists would be aware of the alarms' existence and location. This seems to be the only sensible solution to the problem — for the installation of public phones in booths along the highway is, we understand, impractical.

Perhaps the state would be interested in pursuing this line of thought, for such a system might save lives in an emergency.

The public seldom views with alarm the opinions of those who expect to alarm others with their views.

hardships for some residents, on whose side of the street the ban took place.

However, the Selectmen agreed that the major complaints - speed and traffic - will be considered carefully.

Chief David L. Nicoll explained that town meeting voted the money for a device that will determine the speed of cars, and this item is being purchased. He agreed that the officers assigned to the Village at peak traffic hours can be moved around some, to check on the speed of cars after they leave the Raytheon plant.

It was brought out that two vital bills are in the Legislature somewhere - one would levy a high fine on persons who get too many tickets, the other would allow towing from specific areas.

Both the residents and the Selectmen agreed that the local representatives should be contacted to find out how this legislation can be pushed forward.

The towing law would give the police department power that it does not now have to tow cars in certain posted areas. This would result in better control of the parking situation, it was explained.

The boosted traffic ticket fine would, it was felt, discourage those who now shrug off their \$1 or \$2 fine for repeated offenses as being an inexpensive price to pay for all-day parking privileges.
