The legal action was initiated by Frederick Fisher of the Boston law firm of Hale and Dorr.

The petition for a declaratory judgment asks the Court to find that the petitioner, Mr. Dimlich, has performed the duties of principal of the Junior High for over

Which Streets Will Be Laid Out?

Which of the 25 unaccepted streets will be laid out for acceptance this year?

The Selectmen and Town Manager Thomas E. Duff will continue discussing this issue June 27, at the next regular Board meeting.

The problem involves selecting about five of the streets for work this year, under a continuing program that eventually will find all of the controversial streets being laid out and presented to town meeting for acceptance.

Most of the ways are old town streets that most people have thought were accepted years ago. Mr. Duff recommended to the

Drastic and continuing enforcement of speed laws will be carried to every corner of the town by teams of Registry inspectors.

That was the promise yesterday of Hearings Officer James Perry, as he listened to a request for assistance from local municipal officials.

Eugene A. Bernardin Jr., chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Police Chief David L. Nicoll and Town Manager Thomas E. Duff sought the cooperation of the Registry of Motor Vehicles in suppressing the excessive speeds that have been the subject of widespread discussion.

The precise date of the Registry's get-tough drive here has not been revealed. But Mr. Bernardin indicated that it will be soon, and will continue.

He said the inspectors are empowered to stop any vehicle they believe is being improperly operated. The registrations are forwarded to the Boston office, and the licenses are "yanked" without further fuss.

Bernardin said it is his understanding that processing of the inspectors' report is handled in such a way that it is highly unlikely that anyone would have the opportunity to attempt to "fix" the reports.

The promised Registry assistance, with the continuing patrol of Andover police, is the municipality's response to growing complaints of speeding on most major streets. Various officials have had letters and calls from most sections, wherever a street is fairly straight and is a connecting way with another main road.

Latest among the complaints is that from Central and School sts., which became the subject of a

WHICH STREETS WILL BE SELECTED?

Board that five streets, with sewer and water available, and little maintenance needed, be laid out first. He included Pearson st. and Cutler rd. on this list.

However, members of the Board expressed the feeling that a legal roadblock against building houses on unaccepted streets might make it necessary to take up some of the more rural ways first.

It was explained by Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien that there is a serious legal problem, under the sub-division control laws, which might be resolved in such a way that land-owners could not build along

frontages on unaccepted streets. It was pointed out that some of the property owners may have paid taxes for years on the land, with every expectation that they could build along the present streets. Selectman William Stewart also wanted to know why some of the unaccepted streets are still in that condition when others apparently were accepted under a blanket provision, via a special legislative act. Atty. O'Brien explained that the statute made it possible for the town to accept, in a group, streets that were accepted over the years by town meeting in an illegal fashion.

It did not, he reported, apply to streets that had not been accepted at all - even though the streets may have been assumed to be accepted by usage over the years.

Mr. O'Brien promised to have further details on this part of the problem for the next meeting, as did Mr. Duff.

He told the Selectmen that the Ralph B. Brasseur engineering firm of Haverhill has been engaged to conduct the surveys and draw the necessary blue prints. The firm charges \$12 hourly for a three-man crew, and \$8 hourly for a two-man crew.

The amount of \$2,500 was appropriated at town meeting for the purpose, under the general plan of doing several of the streets each year until all are completed.

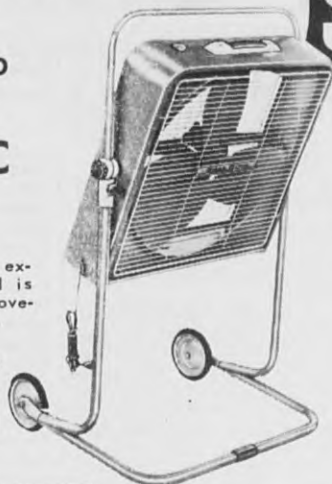

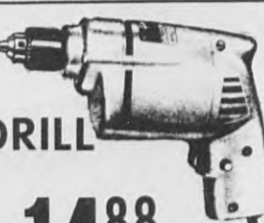

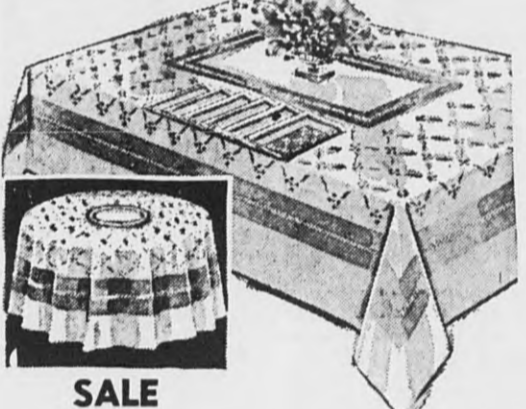

lengthy discussion Monday night at the Selectmen's meeting.

Residents of those streets bitterly complained that enforcement of speed laws on their streets is not slowing down the fast drivers.

They asked, and some demanded, that tough policies be followed. Seemingly the most favored approach was the old-fashioned speed trap, in which an officer remains behind some obstruction until he sees an offending vehicle.

Various residents spoke sharply to the point when someone suggested additional signs - claiming that people pay little attention to them.

Although several residents were caustic in their remarks about the police department, others lauded the men for doing as much as possible under existing circumstances.

The Rev. J. Edison Pike, rector of Christ Church, specially commended Policewoman Dorothy Volker for her work in front of St. Augustine's School.

But he recalled that, in addition to the children living on Central and School sts., there are several hundred who come to the churches and school on Central st. at varying hours of the day and night.

On several occasions during the session, the reputation of the community in relation to traffic control by the police was mentioned. Those speaking in this vein referred often to Stoneham, which they said has a reputation for being very tough on anyone breaking the traffic laws.

This, they felt, is a real deterrent because most people now automatically slow down when entering that community.

This is the sort of reputation they seek for Andover.

Although the residents lived on Central and School sts., they agreed with the comments from the Selectmen that equally serious conditions exist in other sections of the town.

It was noted that, for example, one man is in a cruiser at peak Raytheon traffic times, while the rest of the force handles that problem, along with six or seven Raytheon guards.

Town Manager Duff told the gathering that it has become obvious that the police force must be expanded another year, and that another cruiser must be added.

One resident suggested that the people right there in the hearing room would be glad to raise the money among them to pay for another man.

Some of the problems of enforcing the speed laws were suggested by Sgt. Raymond Collins. He told the residents that most people start flashing their lights as soon as a policeman is spotted, destroying his effectiveness except for the specific time he remains at the location.

He also pointed out that the department can not keep a man on Central st. for many hours a day. Also discussed were the merits of a timing device that will specify the speed of a vehicle, as opposed to depending on an estimate by the officer.

Collins noted that the speed limit in that area of Central st. is 20 mph, as specified by law for areas of the type. Many of the residents wanted immediate enforcement of that speed limit, without exception.

It was also suggested that police cars themselves, unless responding to an actual emergency, be driven at no more than the speed law allows. This would serve to slow down those behind the cruiser, it was felt, and would also be an example for others.

Atty. Vincent Stulgis, who represented the residents, suggested that the town might want to appoint a traffic commission similar to the one in Lawrence. He felt that this could be a working group, which could make recommendations to the Selectmen for action by the police department.

Meeting June 27 On School Site

A decision on initiating eminent domain proceedings, to obtain Lovejoy rd. for a new school, may be made at a Selectmen's meeting June 27.

A rather lengthy discussion of the problem took place Monday night, but the Selectmen decided to put off a decision until they can talk with Chairman Harold Rafton of the Land Acquisition Committee and members of the Planning Board.

The land is owned by John Noyes and lies on the west side of Lovejoy, across the street from the Noyes home.

The Land Acquisition Committee has been told by Mr. Noyes that he just doesn't want to sell the land - some 34 acres - but the School Committee has voted to ask that the land be seized.

The background of the negotiations were related to Monday night's meeting by James Doherty, a Committee member. Dr. Milton Meyers, chairman of the School Committee, also described the school department's interest in the site, and told how it had been selected at a joint meeting of the Planning Board and School Committee.

Several persons wanted to know whether other, equally-desirable sites might be found in the immediate area, and whether these could be purchased or not.

School Committee member William A. Doherty again protested the use of eminent domain proceedings. He voted against this at the meeting when, by a 2-1 vote, the School Board formally asked the town to take the land.

Doherty told the assembled members of the Finance Committee and the Selectmen that he doesn't believe it makes much difference whether the new West Andover school is built on Lovejoy rd., or in the Bailey District. He said the proposed new church on Haggert's Pond rd. will open up that area, and indicated that either school would, in his opinion, be satisfactory. Thus, he reasoned, the Lovejoy rd. section could be let alone with the hope that it will be for sale at a later date.

The basic question to be asked of Mr. Rafton in two weeks is whether he or his committee ever sought other sites in the West Andover area near Lovejoy rd. - or just negotiated for the specific sites given them by the School Committee.

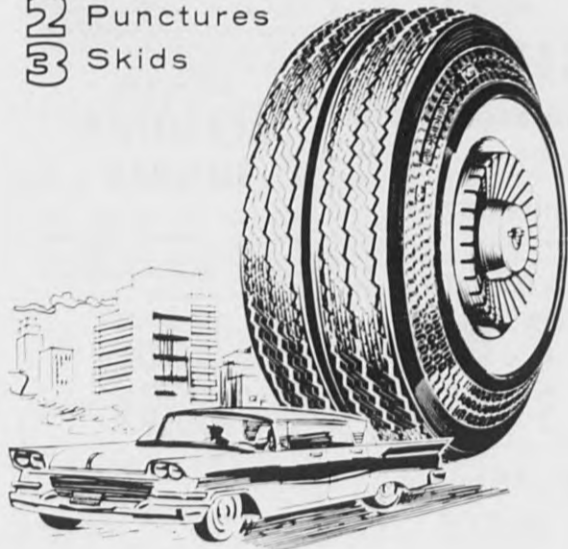

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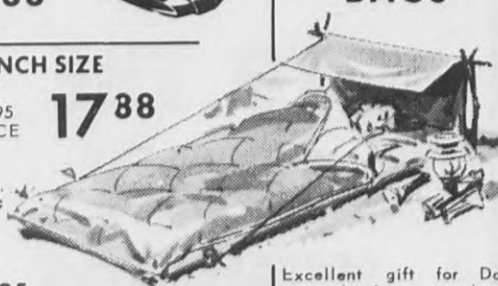

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Creating A Muddle

Taking land by eminent domain is a distasteful task; one that should not be undertaken lightly.

Sometimes, however, the step is necessary because a specific piece of property is the only one that will serve the particular purpose.

This may well be the case with the land on Lovejoy rd. that the School Committee has voted to designate for a new West Andover School.

Town meeting specified that the School Committee should pick out the sites for new schools, while empowering the Land Acquisition Committee to negotiate for them and, if necessary, to take them by right of eminent domain. But it is also required that the Selectmen, Finance Committee and Planning Board approve.

And all of this has placed the land acquisition work in a bit of a muddle.

The School Committee has voted for a specific site, and asked that seizure take place because negotiations appeared fruitless. This is exactly what the town meeting specified as a procedure.

The problem comes, however, in being required to consult with so many boards. Each of them as an entity, and each of the members, has to be filled in completely on the background, thus back-tracking over work already done. Then the members no doubt will come up with divergent opinions - for it is almost a foregone conclusion that no group of board members can be in complete accord.

Thus it appears that although the School Committee has the right to choose a site, all the other boards also have a right to choose the site, at least by the power of veto.

This could go on indefinitely.

It appears that too many cooks can, indeed, spoil the broth.

We would prefer to have the responsibility rest with the School Committee for selection, and the Finance Committee for approval of financial aspects.

This would appear to be far more workable an arrangement, one where action could be taken without the delay entailed in having multiple board action.

Plan To Be There

Attendance at town meetings is always a civic responsibility, which should be taken seriously by all registered voters in the community.

But seldom has it been more urgent for all voters to recognize their duty to the town than is the case now.

Town meeting will be called to order at 7:30 June 29th - and municipal officials are frankly concerned that there will be too few voters on hand. The magic number is 350 - a quorum established by town by-law.

The meeting is considered to be of special importance because the country club proposal must be acted upon at this session. This plan for use of over 200 West Andover acres has met with unanimous approval from town officials and members of the various boards and committees. And apparently it has gained general acceptance throughout the town.

Adoption of the special wording, which will allow the country club to be built in a residential area, can mean a substantial increase in tax income to the town from the developed golf courses, the other recreational areas and the country club building itself.

Other zoning articles to be considered at the session are garden apartments off Morton st., with an estimated tax income of \$21,000, conversion of an industrial-residential area at Stevens and Main sts. to business, and a shopping center district near Dascomb rd. interchange with Route 93. Some articles met with objections, but have many favorable aspects as well.

It can readily be seen that this special town meeting is important enough to command the presence of every voter. Plan to attend.

Vacation Fun

Many of the places which vacationists will visit this summer have names that are worth a moment of study and research. Accounts of how these names originated can be found in books and magazines at the Memorial Hall Library. George R. Stewart, the leading authority on U. S. place names has a book "Names On The Land" which has become a classic of Americana. The book narrates the countless explorations of the Spanish, Dutch, French and English settlers and tells of the names they left in their wake. For instance, "Florida" was named by Ponce de Leon in 1512 from the fact that the whole area which he saw was covered with flowers, and "Florida" is a Spanish adjective meaning flowery or abounding in flowers.

The state name of Illinois comes from a combination of Indian and French, according to another book "State Names, Flags, Songs, Birds, etc." by George Shankle. The name is derived from the Algonquin word "Inini", which the French pronounced "Illini" and which signifies "the men, perfect and accomplished". The letters "ois" denote tribe, in French. Thus, Illinois means "a tribe of superior men".

Other books are "Story Key To Geographic Names" by Engeling; "American Nicknames, their origin and significance", by Shankle; "Viking And The Red Man (Old Norse origins of the Algonquin Language), Sherwin; "London Street Names", Habben; good magazine articles on this fascinating study are "Names We Go By", Saturday Evening Post for Dec. 26, 1957, "Can You Place It?" in Holiday Magazine, April 1958 and "Place Names" in Hobbies Magazine for January, 1951.

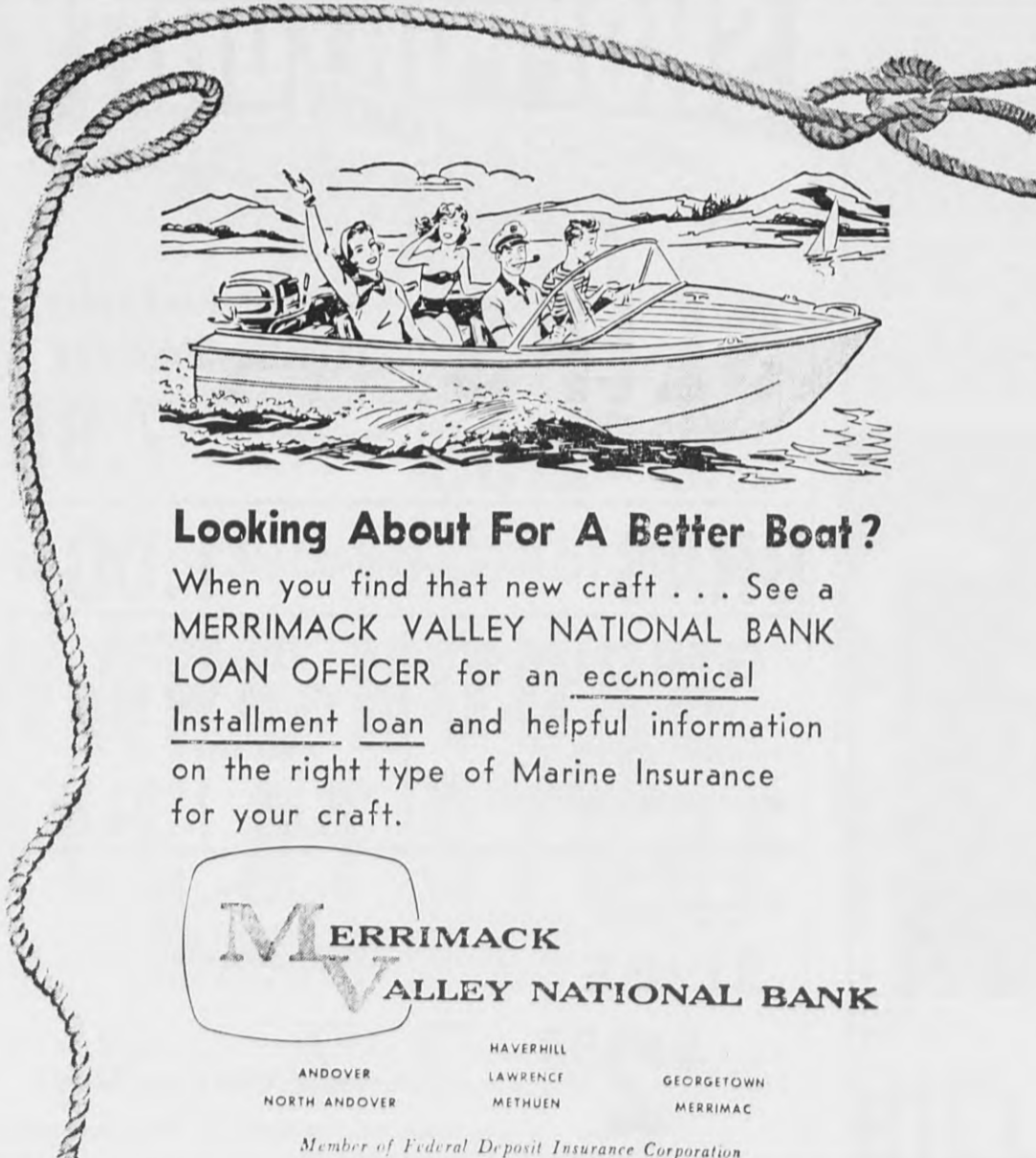
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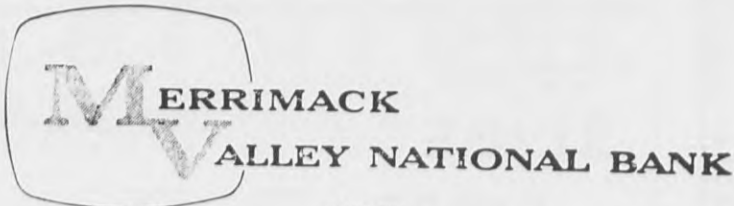

three years, performed the duties of supervisor of the Junior High for over three years, and that he can not lawfully be demoted from that position except for good cause, and with compliance with the statutes as to procedure.

Mr. Dimlich was not re-elected by the School Committee this spring.

He contends that there was no good cause for dismissal or demotion, nor has he consented to it. He further claims that he is entitled to the benefits of the tenure provisions in the law, and to re-election or re-appointment as principal or supervisor of the Junior High.

The declaration includes statements concerning Mr. Dimlich's employment here: that he served as teacher in the Junior High from September of 1936 to June of 1949; acting principal from September, 1949 to June, 1950, during which period he performed the duties of principal or supervisor.

The declaration contends that Mr. Dimlich served as sub-master of the Junior High from September, 1950 through June, 1957, "performing, in fact, the duties of principal or supervisor of the school".

From June, 1957 to date, the petitioner performed the duties of principal or supervisor, the suit states.

The document states that the petitioner, Mr. Dimlich, from September of 1949 to date has performed at all times the duties of a principal or supervisor of the school, although his position has

changed from time to time and has been variously designated. The duties included general supervision of the school under, and subject to, the School Committee, the suit states.

The petition declares that the duties performed by the petitioner as principal or supervisor of the school from the period, September 1949 to June 1957 were substantially identical to the duties performed and service rendered by

the petitioner during the period from July 1957 to date.

The petition notes that Mr. Dimlich has served in the position of principal or supervisor for greater than a three year period, by whatever title the position may have been known from time to time.
