population survey committee.

## **Denies Basic** Dimlich Charge

Town counsel Fredric S. O'Brien has filed an answer to charges brought in a suit against the School Committee by Benjamin F. Dimilioh

F. Dimlich.

In the answers to specific allegations, the Committee has in general denied the basic contention by Mr. Dimlich that he had been performing essentially the same duties as principal or supervisor for longer than the time required to gain tenure; and that the Committee did not follow procedures defined in the statutes for his removal or demotion from the principalship of the Junior High School.

## Land Seizure **Was Approved**

With only one abstention, three municipal boards have agreed to seize 32 acres of land on the west side of Lovejoy rd. for a new served. school.

The land, belonging to John Noyes, has been the subject of somewhat agitated discussion re-cently, following a School Committee decision to ask for eminent

domain proceedings.
Selectman Russell G. Doyle was the lone Board member to abstain - and he did so on the grounds that the cost of sewer disposal and drainage facilities had not ade-quately been spelled out.

He questioned the cost, and in-deed the practicality, of using sep-tic tanks and leeching beds in the area, which is known to have a high water table. He also queried other town officials about possible drain-age problems, and the cost of meetage problems, and the cost of meet-

ing them.
However, the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Committee and the Planning Board approved the seizure, after meeting Monday night to discuss the subject for the second time.

The Planning Board renewed its recommendation that a school site be found in this area, because it is the area that is growing the fastest, and where the demand is greatest at this time.

The Finance Committee decision came after a corridor-huddle, and Chairman Winthrop Newcomb re-ported that the FinCom decision is based on the approval of the School Committee, Planning Board and Land Acquisition Committee as to

Land Acquisition Committee as to the suitability of the site and the scarcity of alternate locations. Although several members of the Board of Selectmen expressed their disagreement with using eminent domain processes, they said that the urgency of the situation appeared to leave no choice.

The Land Acquisition Committee

reported two weeks ago that nego-tiations with Mr. Noyes could not proceed, because he does not wish to sell the land.

It was estimated Monday night that \$15,000 may be a reasonable "guesstimate" of the cost of the land. It was mentioned, however, that good residential property is selling, undeveloped, for about \$1,500 an acre - but those present felt this might not be the price for Mr. Noyes' property as it is farm land and is known to be wet in in-

terior portion.
Continued objection to taking the land was heard from School Com-mittee member, William A. Do-

herty, who was on the short end of a 4-1 vote of his Committee to recommend seizure. He believed the land might be purchased later, and that it would be just as reasonable for the town to get another site in the Bailey rd. area, and build there. He told the gathering, as he did two weeks ago, that transportation is always a problem, and that building away from Lovejoy rd. probably wouldn't create any greater difficulty than would building in some other location.

Planning Board spokesman Harold King commented on the idea that a majority of pupils in a Lovejoy rd. school would be "walkins", but agreed that eventually the town must talk about building three or four more schools in sections of west.

or four more schools in sections of West Andover. Under present zoning, he commented, which the townspeople appear to want, this will be a minimum number of schools.

During the session it was brought out that no other sites are avail-able in the Lovejoy rd. section, un-less several small parcels are put together. Many of these are already built on, and thus land-takings

would involve dwellings too.
Selectman William Stewart appeared to reluctantly support the procedure, as he commented that he did so only because the Finance Committee was willing to approve. He had commented on the size of the parcel, when some 14 acres are required for the actual school grounds, in terms of the cost to the taxeness.

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## **EDITORIAL THOUGHTS**

## **Teach The Bike Riders**

Tragedies involving bicycles have been reported in the news columns of the newspapers, here and in other places, far too often in recent weeks.

It's time that something was done to promote safe bike riding, just as we promote safe driving practices.

For in many cases we suspect that the young bike drivers may not carefully observe precautions that can keep them out of trouble, either with cars or in other types of accidents.

Certainly, above everything else, the youngsters must be taught to respect the rules of safe riding on the highways - and in many cases this training will provide a firm background for the boys and girls when they grow old enough to get driving licenses.

Small children who do not pay attention to blind corners, or older ones who carry passengers on their bikes while weaving along the streets, or those who dart in and out of traffic, are actually accidents looking for a place

We wish private and public agencies, plus adults who are directly responsible for the individual youngsters. would work together to a greater extent than they now do. Some additional programs certainly appear mandatory if many bike accidents are to be prevented.

## Above All, Be Candid

One important factor in the success of urban renewal possibly the single most important step that can be taken is absolute frankness.

Now that funds have been made available for planning, and the project authorized, every step of the urban renewal project should be spelled out for all townspeople to know and understand.

As the consultants begin their work, there should be constant discussion with those whose property is effected; and full explanations to those who must eventually vote on this proposal.

For as we have read and heard about this problem in other areas, misunderstandings have been the real stumbling blocks to a reasonably fast approval by the com-

It doesn't take long for rumors to take hold - but it does take much longer to chase down and dispel those stories which are based on conjecture.

In short, if urban renewal is to become a reality in Andover, those responsible for this planning stage should not only constantly provide information, but literally go to the people with the facts as they develop.

That's the only way that sensible decisions can be reached when the subject comes to a town meeting, instead of the noisy hassle that has developed in many other communities.

### Watch For The Deal

Political machinations can be expected for the rest of the year, as ambitious public figures view the possibility of a Senate vacancy.

It was rumored over the past weekend that the president of the State Senate had been promised an appointment to the U. S. Senate, if Sen. John F. Kennedy is successful in his bid for the Presidency. If elected, he would resign his seat, and according to law, the governor could appoint someone to fill this seat. Although there is some doubt that any "promise" has been made in this regard, you can bet your bottom dollar that politicians throughout the state will be maneuvering for advantage, even at this early date. If Sen. Kennedy is not the nominee for President, this activity will stop. But look for it to get hotter and more devious throughout the summer and fall, if he is his party's choice for the top elective post in the country.

It's even possible for the governor to resign, and then

be appointed to the vacancy by the lieutenant governor, under provisions of the law.

This special situation will keep the politicians on their toes in the Commonwealth, and promises to lend added interest to an election year that already looks like one of the governor of the law.

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

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DENIES CHARGE IN SUIT

(Continued from Page One) served as "acting principal" from September, 1949 through June of 1950, "performing, in fact," duties as principal or supervisor. The answer denies this, claiming the 'acting principalship' occurred from October, 1949 through June,

The suit alleges that Mr. Dim-lich served as "submaster" of the school from September, 1950 through June, 1957, and performed the duties of principal or super-visor during that time. The answer denies this, claiming that Mr. Dim-lich "served as a teaching submaster under a duly elected and

serving principal from September, 1950 through June, 1957." The an-swer specially denies that he acted

as principal during those year.
Also commented on is the allegation that Mr. Dimlich was legally and properly elected or appointed by the School Committee to all the positions starting with teacher and those of acting principal, sub-

master and principal.

The answer, in this case, fails to deny or confirm, but lists the various votes taken by School Committees concerning Mr. Dimlich, and notes the absence of votes in some years. Some of the motions quoted in the answer spell out salary items, with allowances for duties as submaster and coaching.

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Dimlich served as principal, although the title changed on occa-sion, the answer states that the teaching submaster's post was subordinate to the principal, and that he served under the direct

supervision of a principal.

And again in another answer, the Committee denies that the duties performed by Mr. Dimlich from September of 1949 through June of 1957 were actually those of a principal or supervisor, whatever title was used.

In response to the use of the word "supervisor" in some sections of the suit, the answer notes that, if the word is meant to describe the job of "teaching submaster", then the Committee does not contend they may dismiss Mr. Dimlich from that position without comply-ing with the statutes as to pro-

cedure.

In answer to the claim that the Committee had no good cause to dismiss or demote him, and that he had not consented to this, the answer asserts that this is "irrelavant" - "because the petitioner has not served as principal nor super-visor, nor has he performed the duties of principal or supervisor for over three years".


