Meyers Cites Urgency Of Filling School Job

"It's exceedingly necessary that we fill the job".
That's Dr. Milton J. Meyers' assertion, relating to the vacant assistant superintendent's post.
Furthermore, Dr. Meyers believes that the School Committee and Supt. Edward I. Erickson agree with him.
However, the School Committee chairman feels that the Board should not be rushed into appointing someone - rather, sufficient time should be taken in interviews and discussion prior to that final action.
He suggested that Supt. Erickson may have some candidates to discuss with the full Committee when it next meets Sept. 6.
He could foresee no disagreement among Committee members over filling the post.
There have been undercurrents

in the community to the effect that the Committee might have a deep disagreement over the importance of having an assistant superintendent, at least within the framework of the job description voted by the Committee late in the spring.
The Committee, in that step, spelled out the duties of the assistant and defined his responsibility and authority. Dr. Meyers said he can see no reason why this should be changed now. "And I think Ed (Supt. Erickson) feels the same way about it", he stated.
Dr. Meyers said that there are two applications from persons referred by the Boston University School of Education, and three or four from persons referred by Harvard. At least two additional applications are on hand from other individuals, he said, who have

Army Takes Over Town Today

The Army will take over Andover today, in a simulated war situation.
One platoon will spend the day here, as part of a three-day exercise in civil affairs administration. Several other communities are involved in the undertaking by a Reserve Army company on training duty at Fort Devens.
The platoon will arrive here by 9:30, and the conference room in the town hall will be set up as headquarters.
Initial interviews with key personnel will start at 9:30, for a half hour period.
A formal ceremony will be held at 10 a.m., at which the Army commander will read a proclamation and the basic laws. There will be a public designation of appointed officials to serve under civil affairs supervision.

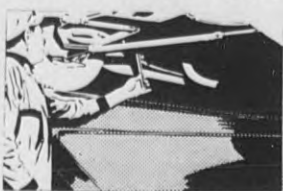

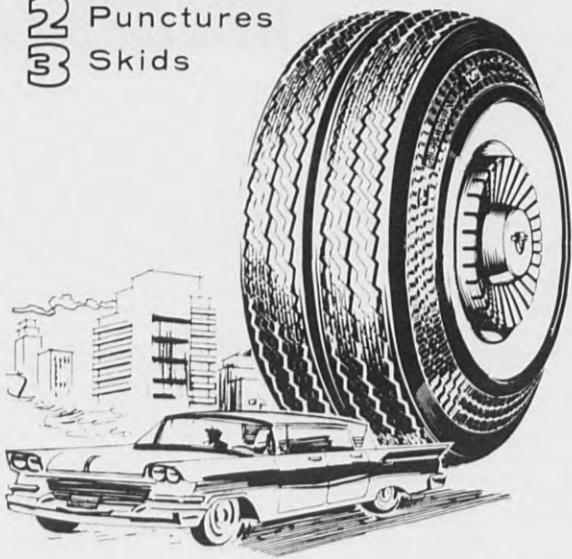

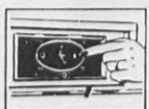

Added Service By Health Association

Frederick H. Tarr, president of the Essex County Health Association, announced today that the Association plans to offer a new service to its 30 communities. The Association will add a public health nurse to its staff as tuberculosis coordinator for the Association. She will work closely with the Essex County Sanatorium and the local health departments to insure adequate follow-up for the tuberculous.

Tarr, Rockport, established the new program activity as one step in the all-out attack against tuberculosis recommended by national leaders at the Arden House Conference.

In announcing the plans for improved service to the communities, Mr. Tarr stated that the Association, with Christmas Seal funds, will continue to provide chest X-rays and tuberculin testing programs, health education, and rehabilitation of former patients as it has been doing.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Has The Need Changed?

Another tempest appears to be brewing in the School Committee over the advisability of replacing the assistant superintendent.

Although there has been no outright statement, it appears that there may be some strong feeling, both within and outside the Committee, that an assistant is not necessary - or that one should not be hired to do the same job that Dr. John P. Gainey performed prior to his resignation.

It will be interesting to hear the discussions on this subject.

For our memory tells us that there was general agreement on this subject before Dr. Gainey was hired - the Committee then felt that the position should be created and that certain academic areas should be included within the assistant's responsibility.

Thus, on the face of it, we wonder why there should be any indecision about filling the job. Is it any less important now?

At this point, we are inclined to agree with some of the School Committee members who want it filled as soon as a fully qualified person can be found.

While there need not be too much haste in hiring a person, there should also be no feet-dragging attitudes to hamper the search.

Restrictions Too Severe

Regimentation may be necessary in certain fields; tight restrictions may be required in particular circumstances.

But we somehow can't quite swallow the latest disclosure about the hauling of gravel.

The Selectmen take the position that anyone moving sand, gravel or loam, for any reason, must first obtain permission from them.

The by-law specifies that the material must be for sale before a permit is required. But there has been some stretching of this flat statement, to the point that the material may be assumed to be for sale until the Selectmen are satisfied that it is not.

It has been maintained that the residents wanted the removal or transfer of materials controlled, regardless of its availability for sale.

Apparently the latest restriction means that the process of hauling the material may be stopped until permission is requested and given regardless of the wording of the by-law.

It seems almost too restrictive to prevent a man from moving materials from one piece of his own land to another for some private purpose. Instead of the burden being placed on the individual, the Selectmen or their agents should first determine whether the material is being sold, before stopping operations. This, it would seem, can easily be done.

If the townspeople wanted to control this type of operation, why would the provision be included in the by-law that the material must be for sale? Are we not stretching things too far when we imply added authority, additional restrictions, more control?

Kittens, Anyone?

Kitten, kitten, who wants a kitten?

That's a query that has been heard many a time in recent weeks - and the answer usually is "I've got five of them at home. Know anyone who wants one?"

Having asked the question himself, and having heard the answer on too numerous occasions, the editor is sadly wondering whether he'll be forced to move out to make way for the fast-growing young kittens he's still harboring.

And apparently this is not a problem unique to the editor.

One man matter-of-factly commented that he "just spread the word" and easily gave away five kittens. Most however, make the mistake of asking the adults first, instead of showing the cute little things to their friends' children first. Somehow, adults have a habit of saying "no" all too easily unless their own offspring have had a chance to set their minds on taking home a kitten.

If something isn't done - if there isn't some answer to the common problem - many a man is going to face the dreadful facts of feeding mama and her brood indefinitely. "Anyone want a kitten?"

Hagggett's Pond is down 54 1/2 inches below high water mark, but there is no thought being given to restrictions at this time. The average pumping is 2,600,000 gallons per day, just slightly more

than last year. The Pond is not yet as low as it was in 1949.

On Many Fronts - Africa

It may seem strange to single out for special mention a collection of short stories, but rarely have we found a book of any kind which so powerfully sets forth the subtle interplay in human relationships between white and black man as in this collection of fifteen stories, *The Zulu And The Zeide* by Dan Jacobson, beautifully written and masterpieces of construction.

Any list of books about Africa might well include some, if not all, of the following, each of which in one way or another, illuminates some aspect of this troubled continent; *Cry, the Beloved Country*, Paton - almost a classic in its sympathetic interpretation of South Africa's racial ferment; *The Lost Cities of Africa*, Davidson - a 1959 Ainsfield-Wolf award winner; *Blankey, Murray* - about a South African ritual murder, not only a gripping story, but part of our "tragic human experience"; *The Harmless People*, Thomas - a fascinating account of the Bushmen of the Kalahari desert; *Episode in the United States and Africa*, American Assembly - a series of papers on the African economy, society and political systems; *Venture to the Interior*, Van Der post - this African born author is sensitive to how much Africa can contribute, if only the white man will recognize the fact; *Hope For South Africa*, Paton - a good introduction to the present South African crisis; *The Afro-Asian States and Their Problems*, Panikkar; *The Dark Child*, Laye - a member of a Negro Moslem tribe tells about a childhood in French Guinea - and there are many other excellent books.

DR. SIDNEY L. SIMON

Appointment of Dr. Sidney L. Simon of Andover as chief engineer, Missile Electronics and Controls Division, RCA Defense Electronic Products, was announced by William B. Kirkpatrick, General Manager of the Missile Electronics and Control Division.

Dr. Simon succeeds Dr. Robert C. Seamans Jr., who has accepted a post with the National Aeronautics and Space Agency (NASA).

Dr. Simon came to RCA in December, 1958, with wide experience in the fields of combustion, high temperature materials, nuclear energy, and aircraft nuclear propulsion studies. He was associated with the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics from 1943 to 1955. As head of the Fundamental Combustion Section until 1946 and then as Chief of the Physics of Solids Branch from 1949 to 1955, he organized and directed research concerning the physics of solids, high temperature materials, corrosion and radiation damage.

Since joining RCA, Dr. Simon has held positions of increasing responsibility, the most recent being manager of Systems Engineering at the Burlington defense plant.

He is an associate fellow of the

Institute of the Aeronautical Sciences, and a member of the American Society for Metals, the American Physical Society, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and Sigma Xi. He holds several patents, and has written papers on various subjects which have been published in ANL reports, NACA reports, and scientific periodicals.

Dog-Day Locust A Fraud, Just A Courting Cicada

The so-called hot-day forecaster known as a dog-day locust is nothing short of a masquerading

fraud, says Boston's Museum of Science.

First of all, the persistent, high-pitched buzzing sound heard on summer days is actually the mating call of the cicada (sick-ay'-da), an insect not even remotely related to the locust.

Second, country tales to the contrary, the cicada does not foretell the day's weather. Since it usually sounds off on a day already grown hot and only serves to emphasize the fact, the insect is really more of a newscaster than a forecaster.

Even the celebrated "17-year locust" is misnamed, says the Museum's assistant director of education, Gilbert E. Merrill. This insect is also a cicada, but one with a much longer period of metamorphosis, or life cycle, than the common cicada.

Setting the matter straight, Merrill says that the destructive locusts of the Far East, descending in voraciously munching hordes upon the grain fields, are not to be feared in this country. Although we do have true locusts - our grasshoppers are an example - they do not occur here by the hundreds of millions at periodic intervals as they do in Asia. Even so, local grasshoppers cause farmers some concern, but American know-how in crop-dusting and pest control has kept the menace to a minimum.

On the other hand, cicadas should not be thought of as excessively or dangerously destructive. The adult insect does no damage to speak of, having eaten lavishly and done most of its lifetime feeding while still in its nymph stage.

To understand this, let's review the life cycle of the cicada. Mating takes place in mid-summer, and the female cicada then deposits her eggs - dozens and dozens of them - in green twigs or tree bark. Here the eggs remain until they hatch, the tiny emerging nymphs falling to the ground to borrow into

the soft earth. There they live on sap from the same tree on which they were hatched.

Underground, the nymph goes through a series of molts for about a year until, in its last nymph stage, it crawls to the surface in mid-July. Clinging to its mother-tree, it goes through its final stage of development when it sheds its outer skin and emerges as a winged adult. Now it begins the final short portion of its life, devoted mainly to finding a mate.

Called the Rip Van Winkle of the Underground, the 17-year locust has much the same life cycle, except that its metamorphosis takes 16 years longer to complete. Because it occurs in such vast numbers, it has been known to cause extensive damage to the roots of trees in some areas.

The last emergence of the 17-year cicada in the Cape Cod area took place a few years ago, but it can be found somewhere every year. (One state this year; a neighboring state, the next.) This fact alone should dispel the ancient myth that the insect's emergence foretells the coming of war.

Perhaps the cicada's prime claim to fame is its long and loud mating call. This distinctive sound is produced by the buckling of celluloid-like plates lining its abdomen wall.

To man, this "belly laugh," heard on a hot day, is the signal to get in out of the sun, leaving the cicadas alone to conduct the important business of courtship.

URBAN RENEWAL SURVEY TO START

The Housing Authority will appoint the appraisers, whose work will be done at a later date. The survey team that will begin work in September will not involve the appraisals. Members of the team will be suitably identified by a letter, so that property owners may be certain they are talking to members of the consulting firm.

As part of the survey, they will accumulate data designed to give the firm, and the Housing Authority, enough information to decide which buildings will be removed and which can be retained.

The housing requirements of all families in the area will be obtained, so that each family or person that has to relocate can be provided with a suitable house or apartment.

It has again been stressed that the current planning stage is paid for by a government allocation, and is not paid for by local funds. Only when a town meeting accepts the eventual plan will the town be involved in payment of money for urban renewal.

During the planning stage, the consultants have stressed that they will make every effort to keep abreast of the Town's attitudes, and will try to make the plan adaptable to them. This was brought out during a question period Tuesday night, when someone asked whether sentimental attachments to buildings will be considered when deciding the future of the properties.

When the planning stage is completed, and throughout the weeks when it is being constructed, the Housing Authority intends to have meetings with interested persons so that full information will be available.

URBAN RENEWAL SURVEY TO START

(Continued from Page One)

The Housing Authority will appoint the appraisers, whose work will be done at a later date. The survey team that will begin work in September will not involve the appraisals. Members of the team will be suitably identified by a letter, so that property owners may be certain they are talking to members of the consulting firm. As part of the survey, they will accumulate data designed to give the firm, and the Housing Authority, enough information to decide which buildings will be removed and which can be retained. The housing requirements of all families in the area will be obtained, so that each family or person that has to relocate can be provided with a suitable housing apartment.

It has again been stressed that the current planning stage is paid for by a government allocation, and not paid for by local funds. Only when a town meeting accepts the rental plan will the town be involved in payment of money for urban renewal.

During the planning stage, the consultants have stressed that they will make every effort to keep abreast of the Towns' attitudes, and will try to make the plan acceptable to them. This was brought out during a question period Tuesday night, when someone asked whether sentimental attachments to buildings will be considered when deciding the future of the properties. When the planning stage is completed, and throughout the weeks in it is being constructed, the Housing Authority intends to have meetings with interested persons that will provide them with information that will be available.

Women Given Vote In Time For Election Of 40 Years Ago

Forty years ago the U. S. was groaning under the same thundering oratory and rolling bandwagons that comprise a presidential election campaign, with one hair-raising difference - women were about to cast their vote for the first time on a nationwide scale.

Harassed men of politics had let down their guard and regardless of whether women might become desexed or turn politics into a morality play, as opponents of feminism charged, they were going to have their say.

It wasn't the first time women had voted, however, reports World Book Encyclopedia.

Congress had left the decision to the states and New Jersey at first permitted its women to vote. But the men had second thoughts and the state took back the privilege in 1807.

As women joined the labor force in the new factories, and began to help men fight for temperance and the abolition of slavery, they gained a forum to air their pet peeve.

A meeting at Seneca Falls, N. Y., which has been called the first woman suffrage convention in the U. S., stirred public discussion in 1848.

Two years later reformers,

male and female, from the entire country assembled at Worcester, as the Woman's Rights Convention.

The crusade was in full swing when the adoption of the Fifteenth Amendment divided the forces of reform.

The radicals, led by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, opposed the amendment because it gave the vote to Negro men but not to women. They organized the National Woman Suffrage Association.

A more moderate group founded the American Woman Suffrage Association and concentrated on persuading the states rather than the federal government to grant voting rights to women.

In 1872 the determined Miss Anthony was arrested for voting and her trial focused wide attention on the feminist fight.

Several states granted woman suffrage in the 1890's and others began to take the idea more seriously. At the same time, the suffragists re-united in the National American Woman Suffrage Association and prepared for the big push.

Their chance came with World War I and the expanding role of women.

Militant womanhood descended on Washington, D. C. They paraded through the capital, picketed the White House and carried on hunger strikes in jail.

In 1917 a woman suffrage amendment to the Constitution was submitted to the House of Representatives. The pressure was stepped up and in 1918 Woodrow Wilson personally went before a joint session of Congress to urge passage.

Congress took action and the last of the necessary three-fourths of the states approved the Nineteenth Amendment in August, 1920, just in time for the presidential election.

male and female, from the entire country assembled at Worcester, as the Woman's Rights Convention. The crusade was in full swing when the adoption of the Fifteenth Amendment divided the forces of reform.

The radicals, led by Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton, opposed the amendment because it gave the vote to Negro men but not to women. They organized the National Woman Suffrage Association.

A more moderate group founded the American Woman Suffrage Association and concentrated on persuading the states rather than the federal government to grant voting rights to women.

In 1872 the determined Miss Anthony was arrested for voting and her trial focused wide attention on the feminist fight.

Several states granted woman suffrage in the 1890's and others began to take the idea more seriously. At the same time, the suffragists re-united in the National American Woman Suffrage Association and prepared for the big push.

Their chance came with World War I and the expanding role of women.

Militant womanhood descended on Washington, D. C. They paraded through the capital, picketed the White House and carried on hunger strikes in jail.

In 1917 a woman suffrage amendment to the Constitution was submitted to the House of Representatives. The pressure was stepped up and in 1918 Woodrow Wilson personally went before a joint session of Congress to urge passage.

Congress took action and the last of the necessary three-fourths of the states approved the Nineteenth Amendment in August, 1920, just in time for the presidential election.

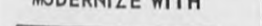

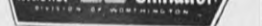
