



Support Your Team

Is The Primary A Farce?

The state primary next Tuesday seems fated to be a minority affair again this year, with little or no interest being shown in the primary.

With attention focused on the November election, it appears that most residents of Andover and of the state will let the selection of candidates for state offices go

by default. As usual, a minority will vote in the primary and select the candidates - then many men and women will complain that the candidates do not offer the qualifications they, the absent voters, would like to see.

If nothing else, the primary will offer one test that normally does not come to light - the ability of teams of counters to get the ballots counted and properly tallied after the polls close. There is considerable speculation about the process, because no one really knows how long it will take the teams to finish their jobs - thus this is a good test, a warm-up of sorts, for the November election.

It's a sorry commentary that this is the only item of much interest in the primary. For in many ways this selection of candidates is the more important of the elections. If good candidates are selected, we can be fairly certain that the eventual office holders will be qualified, regardless of their party affiliation. If the candidates are not wisely chosen, by many voters, there certainly will be room for complaint when the election comes along in a few weeks.






