May Resolve Job Debate

A final decision on the addition of a person to the administrative or supervisory staff may be made at a meeting of the School Committee in October.

The position actually is the one made vacant by the resignation of Dr. John P. Gainey, who was assistant to the superintendent.

However, Supt. Edward L. Erickson has told the Committee he does not feel that an administrative job is called for.

Rather, he suggests a supervisory position, calling for intense concentration in the instructional field.

He told the Committee that such a person, although inevitably concerned with program development, should work closely with teachers, in an effort to help them improve their instruction.

These "thoughts" on the position, as Mr. Erickson termed them, were discussed at length Tuesday

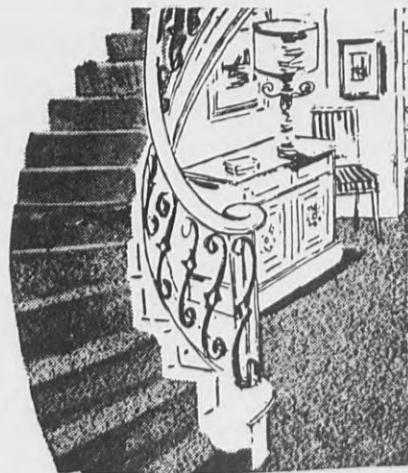

Theatre Proposal Under Study

The Planning Board is considering a proposed open air theatre at Lowell st. and Route 93, which proponent James J. Devine believes will bring substantial tax revenue to the town.

Devine made the proposal to the Planning Board last week, so that it could be studied along with other zoning proposals that will be acted upon next March.

He told the Board that the area is an abandoned gravel pit, and can not be used economically for residential purposes, even though it is zoned for residential use.

Devine said the area now brings in \$53 in tax revenue, and suggested that considerably more than that could be obtained by the town through construction of a theatre.

The land is situated generally behind the motel district off Lowell st., north of Lowell st. and east of Route 93.

An existing driveway into the property from Lowell st. could be widened to provide access, the Board was told. However, the proponent suggested that the traffic would mostly be on Route 93 and Route 495 which will intersect Route 93 about a mile away.

Devine said he believes traffic on local streets would be increased only by those local residents who visit the theatre - while much of the patronage might come from a wide area served by the two highways.

The Planning Board agreed to study the idea, as it works on rezoning land along the new highway.

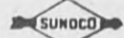

Light Vote

In all, Andover's vote can be considered light - about 30 percent of the 9,194 registered voters cast ballots.

Of these, 1,727 were Republican, 980 Democratic.

By precincts, the total vote cast was: precinct one, 583; precinct two, 383; precinct three, 691; precinct four, 411; precinct five, 162; precinct six, 477.

Warnings that the precincts might not report to the town hall until after midnight were a bit pessimistic. The first precinct to report was five, at 9 p.m. The others continued to report until the final precinct, three, came in at 10:55.

When James D. Doherty stated that the Acquisition Committee had never approved the site.

Mr. Rafton pointed out that the town meeting article appropriating funds for the acquisition of land directed his Committee to follow the orders of the School Committee, in the case of land for new schools.

It was reported in the Townsman several weeks ago, after a joint meeting of the Planning Board, Finance Committee and Selectmen, that seizure of the land had been approved.

At that time, the Finance Committee based its decision on the prior approval of the Land Acquisition Committee and the Planning Board.

Members of the Board of Selectmen also commented that they would vote for seizure, based on the earlier approval of the Land Acquisition Committee and the other boards.

However, Mr. Rafton asserted this week "We are merely an agent of the other committees".

He said the Committee was directed to attempt to purchase the John L. Noyes property on Lovejoy rd., and failed to do so.

This was reported to the School Committee, which decided to ask that eminent domain proceedings be started.

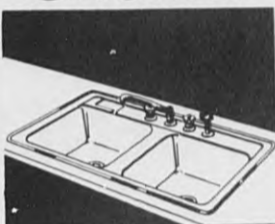
Mr. Rafton said the vote of the School Committee stated that "the town" would be asked to start the legal proceedings, and therefore his Committee did not become involved in this portion of the decision at all.

He said that, if the School Committee had asked his town board to do this, the matter would have been turned over to Town Manager Thomas E. Duff and Atty. Fredric S. O'Brien anyway.

Mr. Rafton said "Our Committee has no discretionary authority" in regard to land for schools, under the town meeting decision.

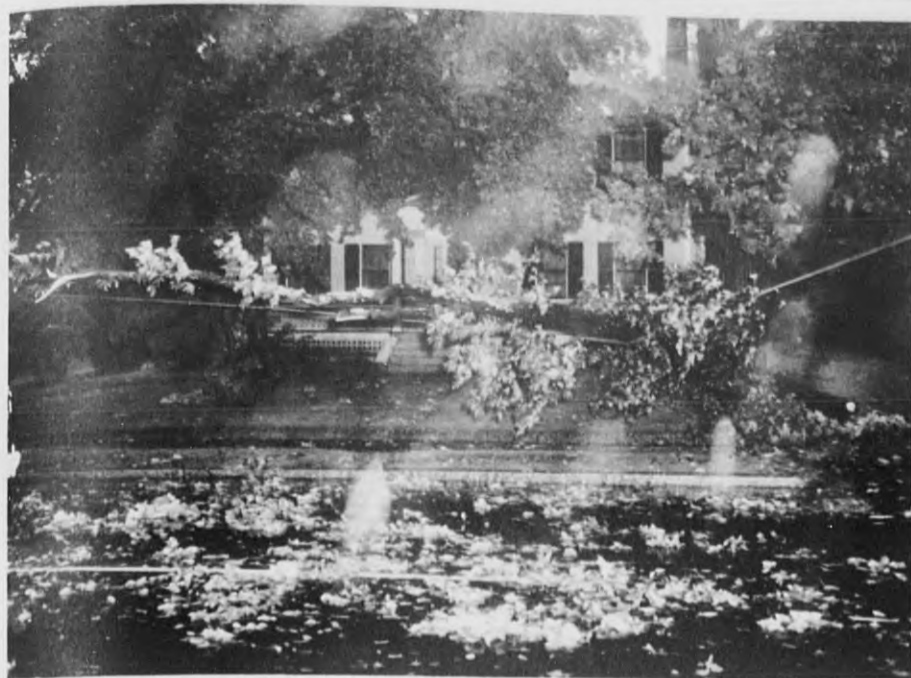

With local and the rest of America's interest centered on the ebb and flow of USA fortune tides on the Olympic fields of Roma, a local resident this week recalled her experiences in international competition. She is Mrs. Theodore P. Coates, wife of a retired Army colonel, who resides on Woburn st., and whose son, Philippe, is a sophomore at Andover High.

Mrs. Coates was Mademoiselle Suzanne Petit of Belgium at the time and attending the University of Brussels. Her physical prowess earned her the honor of representing her school at the Jeux Olympiques Universitaires in Budapest. That was in 1937 and only three women's teams participated in the bi-annual games that year.

The then Mademoiselle Petit excelled in gymnastics in addition to running the 800 meters, stroking an oar on the school's four-oared shell and being captain and center of the university's championship basketball team. In the latter endeavor, Mrs. Coates recalls that the girls "did not play according to women's rules, we'd never heard of them". The foray into the gymnastic jousts of University Olympic competition unfortunately did not end in victory; The Brussels entry finishing a close third behind the Latvian team. But the events provide a never to be forgotten experience for the local woman, rekindled by the current Olympic games.

Mrs. Coates, who married Colonel Coates, in 1947 and who has resided in this country since, then went on with the study of law at the University, earning her doctorate. She practiced law in Brussels for four years prior to

her marriage. Mrs. Coates was recently appointed director of the Bonnie Prudden physical fitness school which will open here this fall.

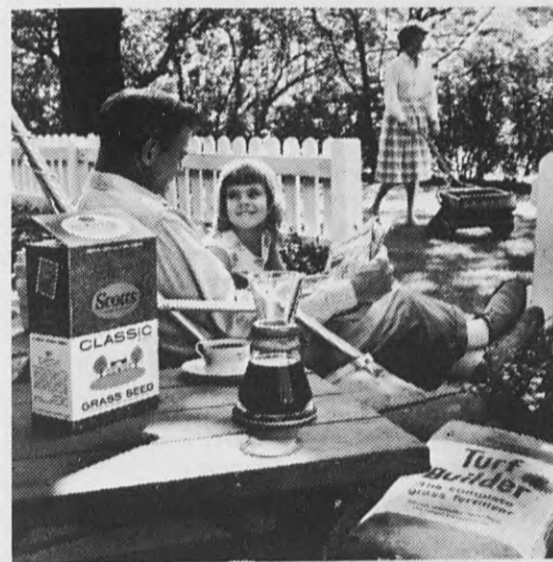

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

A Credit To Andover

The work of the Auxiliary Police, the men of the C.D. communications network, and the rescue squad was invaluable during Monday's Hurricane Donna.

The town should be high in its praise of these men, who turned out to help the municipal forces combat the effects of the storm.

The Auxiliary Police doubled up with the town's officers; stood watch at spots where trees or wires had come down; and generally made themselves useful throughout the hours when the community wondered just how much of the hurricane would strike here.

During this period, the communications people had set up a control center in the town hall, and had sent mobile units throughout the town to report damage. Other units were attached to the highway and tree department crews, so that messages could be relayed speedily, and crews could move to new areas without delay.

This was one of the most effective demonstrations of cooperation that has been seen for a long time, and the townspeople should be proud to know that many of their neighbors responded to the emergency so willingly and ably.

Strange Coincidence

Once again, at election time, there appears to be some interest in Rogers Brook reconstruction.

We wonder whether it is completely coincidental that the state becomes active in this matter just at election time, or whether there can be enough pressure placed on the state to continue its interest after the election.

Two years ago there were firm promises of action — and the town followed these by making the necessary arrangements at town meeting. Then nothing happened, until recently, when another meeting was held in Boston. Final plans for the project were presented then, but the town now must arrange for all the easements.

There have been promises that the work would be done, as soon as the town gets this part of the job done.

Do these promises mean anything — or is it necessary to wait for another election before the next step can be taken.

The strangely-coincidental timing makes us wonder whether the state officials have any real interest in reconstructing the course of the brook, or whether this is only an attempt to placate voters.

How About Some Answers?

The hearing on seizure of the Noyes property for school purposes takes place next Monday night at the town hall.

It would be in the public interest for questions to be answered, at that time, concerning the cost of providing adequate water for the proposed school, the installation of proper leaching fields, and drainage facilities.

These items are all part of the over-all question of whether this lot of land should be taken for the school — and properly they should be considered by the Selectmen prior to taking any action on seizure.

We hope that there will be sufficient interest shown in these questions, so that answers may be provided to the satisfaction of interested townspeople. Donna Failed Advance Billing

Hurricane Donna, whose top billing drove the political news into semi-obscurity Monday, swished through town Monday afternoon without living up to her press notices.

No one was disappointed, however, because advance notices of the storm - if translated to reality - would have left the town a wreck. In fact, there was little damage here.

Some trees and many small limbs were blown down. And about three-quarters of the town was without electric power at one time or another. Some areas continued to be without power Tuesday, as Electric Co. crews worked round-the-clock to find hidden trouble in some lines.

Even the heavy rain didn't have the adverse affect that some storms have had. Rogers Brook, although over its banks in the park, didn't cause many problems for residents along its banks.

Perhaps the highlight of the storm, apart from the wind and rain, was the state of preparedness that existed here.

In addition to the mobilization of all town crews, Civil Defense personnel were on hand by mid-afternoon and remained on the job until mid-evening.

They were credited by Town Manager Thomas E. Duff with playing a vital role during the storm. C. D. Director Lee E. Noyes, Duff, Highway Supt. Stanley Chlebowski and Water Department Supt. Donald Bassett toured the town during the few hours that Donna was here.

Under the direction of Alex Ritchie Jr., the communications network functioned capably, as did the Auxiliary Police unit.

Mobile radio units were assigned to town crews, and a control center was set up in the town hall. Thus, reports of fallen trees and wires were sent immediately to the crews, who moved swiftly to clear streets.

Auxiliary police and communications men also toured assigned areas of the town, reporting any problems.

Others stood guard over fallen wires when they threatened the safety of passing automobiles.

The C. D. emergency truck, under the direction of Charles Howe, stood by, as did Gordon Cannon, who heads the warden service.

Volunteers in the communications network were praised by their director, Alex Ritchie, for their work during the storm. He also complimented the men's wives, who stayed home alone while their husbands worked.
