School Board Sees Nearly Three Million Needed In Next Decade

A seven-part capital outlay program, costing some \$2,725,000, has been proposed by the School Committee as part of Town Manager Thomas E. Duff's overall town plan.

The seven steps would take place roughly in the next 10 years, according to the Committee.

First in the program is the new elementary school for which a site is being sought in West Andover. This step is estimated at \$900,000.

Second on the program is the expansion of recreation and play areas around the High School, with

a \$150,000 price tag. It was stressed that these facilities will be needed for school purposes, and that this step is not essentially a part of any town-wide recreation program.

Third on the list presented by the School Committee is the addition of eight rooms to the Junior

High School. Supt. Edward I. Erickson said "We are going to be hard pressed for room there" with an estimated 1,095 pupils scheduled to occupy the building in the next five to seven years. The Committee estimated that \$300,000 might be needed for this addition. It was ex-

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RR Wants Automatic Gates At Essex St.

3,550 Attend Public Schools

A record public school enrollment has been established, with 3,550 pupils in school as of Sept. 16.

Supt. Edward I. Erickson reviewed the new figures with the School Committee Tuesday night and noted that the enrollment has jumped 43 since the opening of school, when 3,507 students started their academic year.

The High School enrollment is 599, with the Junior High pegged at 827.

There are 556 pupils in the Central School, plus 138 at the Stowe School next door. The Jackson School houses 25 students.

Shawsheen's enrollment figure is 385; South School has 542; and the West School enrollment is 478.

The Boston and Maine Railroad has asked the town to approve installation of automatic gates at the Essex st. intersection with the tracks.

The railroad also has asked approval of a plan to simplify the layout of tracks in the area; to straighten a section of Railroad st. at the intersection and the driveway into the Stevens Co. land.

On a plan shown to the Selectmen Monday, the railroad also indicates that the parking surfaced area behind the depot platform is private property and can be fenced off by any new owner of the depot. This would compel vehicular traffic to use the narrower Essex st. towards the Square, at least past

Will Test Site On Lovejoy Rd.

Test borings will be taken on the John L. Noyes property on Lovejoy rd. before any decision is made to acquire the land for a new school.

Thus a hearing scheduled for Monday night on seizure of the 32 acres was postponed for four weeks, at the suggestion of Mr. Noyes' legal counsel, Halbert W. Dow.

The Selectmen's hearing room was crammed with members of town boards and citizens, assembled to hear the contemplated eminent domain proceedings discussed.

But Mr. Dow, opening the meeting, said he would suggest the delay until the tests have been completed. He did not specifically state that the land could be purchased by the town, but he asked that the newspapers make it clear that Mr. Noyes had never actually refused to sell the property.

Various board representatives commented on the wisdom of delaying the hearing long enough for the borings to be taken.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff said he would immediately determine which of the town boards will be responsible for this activity, and discuss the problem of finding

a reputable firm to do the job.

Selectman Philip K. Allen presided in the absence of Chairman Eugene A. Bernardin Jr., who was confined at his home by illness.

Members of the School Committee, Planning Board, Land Acquisition Committee, and town counsel Fredric S. O'Brien were present at the brief hearing.

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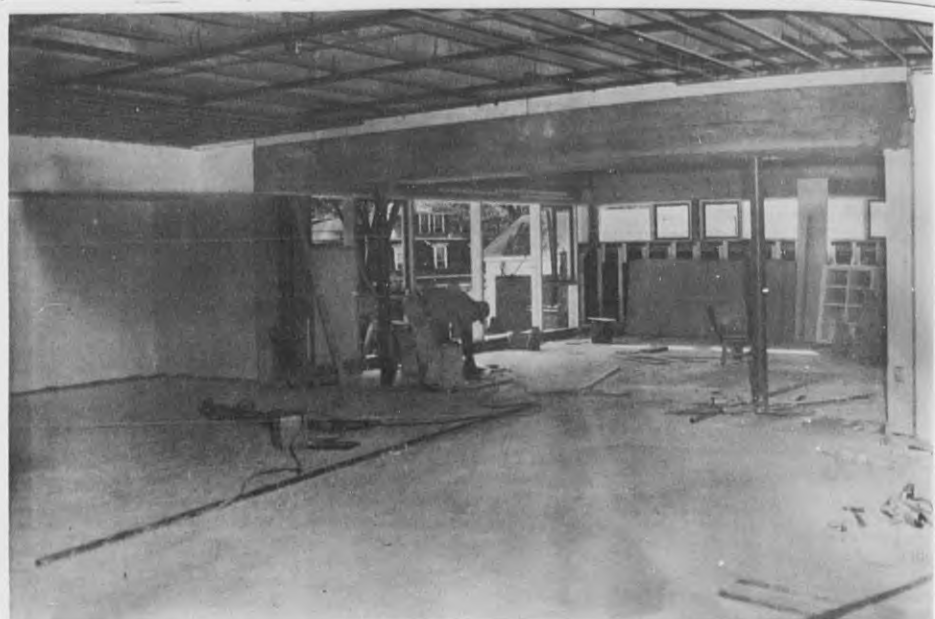

Opening day figures showed a net increase of 168 students over last year at the same time. One critical problem facing the School Committee is highlighted by enrollment figures - the Junior High capacity is only 900 pupils. Thus it appeared Tuesday night to members of the Committee that another year or two will see that institution at capacity, and then there will be the necessity of solving the subsequent problem of overloading. Acting Principal Peter Soderbergh has already appointed a faculty committee to study this problem and report, no later than Jan. 5, 1961.

An over-crowded kindergarten situation at the West School, where 92 are enrolled, was solved this week when the Committee engaged a second part-time teacher. In doing so, another afternoon session was added, thus reducing the number of pupils in each of the half-day sessions.

By grades, the enrollment breaks down this way: Kindergarten, 316; first, 330; second, 326; third, 313; fourth, 308; fifth, 267; sixth, 239; seventh, 280; eighth, 280; ninth, 252; 10th, 224; 11th, 185; 12th, 189; post graduate, one; special classes, 40.

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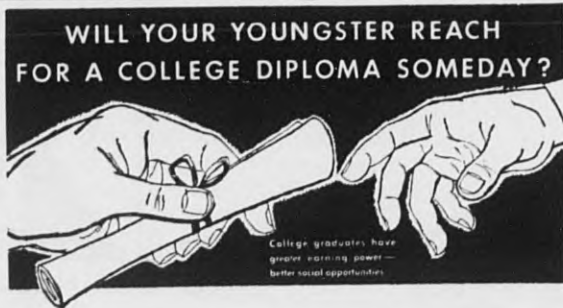

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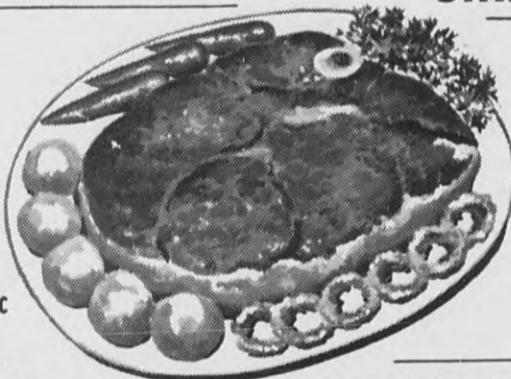

plained that the present building can comfortably hold 900 students.

Fourth on the list of projects is another \$300,000 addition - six to eight rooms will be needed. The School has a 750 capacity now, with core facilities for 1,000 students.

By the time these steps have been taken, the Committee feels that another elementary school will be needed, at a cost of one million dollars.

The sixth step, expansion of play and recreation areas around Central, Junior High and Shawsheen schools, has no cost estimate. And this part of the program could be worked in anywhere in the schedule, the Committee agreed.

Seventh on the list, with a \$75,000 cost, is the acquisition of three more school sites, after the current selection of a site is accomplished.

Although the Committee disagreed on the time factor, member William A. Doherty urged that the acquisition of sites be undertaken at once. He pointed out that land prices will keep going up, and that the needed land will probably be built upon if the Committee delays.

Other members asked whether the voters might not, seeing a large request for funds, vote nothing. They wondered if the Committee might not be better advised to ask for money for some of the needed sites, then ask for additional money in other years.

Mr. Doherty insisted that the request should be made at the first possible moment - the next annual meeting - and in the total amount that the Committee feels is necessary. Then, he explained, if the voters turn it down, they will have made the decision themselves.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Thinking Clearly

Town officials are demonstrating their ability to think clearly, once a subject comes forcefully to their attention.

By postponing a hearing on the seizure of the John L. Noyes property, while test borings are made, the town fathers have shown that they are willing to gather all the available facts prior to making a decision. This, of course, is a wise procedure and one that should always be followed.

It is now apparent that full data will be available for the officials to consider at a later date - drainage, sewage disposal and water installation estimates will be available, as will the results of the test borings.

It is our understanding that the borings, although taken in the dry period of the year, can show the water table and the height to which the water has come during other periods of the year.

It is always good business to have full facts in hand before making a lasting decision. This, apparently, is now being done, to the credit of the town officials involved in the problem.

Get This Job Done

Selectman William Stewart is pushing hard to get action on Rogers Brook - and it's good to see someone taking some aggressive steps towards completion of this project.

Through his urging, the Selectmen voted Monday to call an immediate meeting with the state - following review of the plans by the town's consulting engineers.

It is hoped that the state will then call for bids on this job and get the contract awarded.

Action on the Brook will only come if Andover's officials keep pressing for it. The state, based on recent indications, will drag its heels indefinitely if allowed to do so.

Thus we applaud Stewart's determination to get the project into the construction stages just as quickly as possible.

Let's not let the state off the hook, by resting when we should be moving full steam ahead.

Spend Now, Save Later

School Committee Secretary William A. Doherty, who doesn't hesitate to disagree with his colleagues, has made a strong case for the purchase of additional school sites.

Doherty believes that the School Committee should spell out its anticipated needs - and ask the town meeting to appropriate money for whatever sites are believed to be needed in the future, at today's prices.

Some members of the Board have felt that the voters should be asked only for moderate amounts, even if these do not meet the actual needs, on the grounds that the voters might appropriate nothing if they are asked to appropriate a large amount.

Doherty maintains that the School Committee has the responsibility to tell the voters what is needed, then let the voters make the decision on the amount of money.

This makes sense - the voters shouldn't be protected from the truth as the Committee sees it. They should be allowed to make up their own minds, on the basis of the facts the Committee presents at town meeting.

Many people believe that land prices are likely to go up in the next decade. Shouldn't the voters have the right to purchase land now in the expectation of saving money, at today's high prices, instead of later when prices may be higher?

Sometimes it makes sense to spend a considerable amount of money, in order to save dollars at a later date.

Air Force Finds Way To Stop Vapor Trails

Tell-tale vapor trails, bane of World War II bomber crews, will no longer indicate the presence of high flying US Air Force jets, according to a discovery by the USAF Geophysics Research Directorate at this installation.

Called "contrail suppression", the scientific breakthrough was reached after more than five years of painstaking laboratory and altitude chamber research by the Aerophysics Laboratory at Hanscom Field.

Elimination of the giveaway smoke, which is caused by the condensation of jet gases at high altitudes, was achieved by mixing tiny dust-like particles with the water vapor of the burning jet fuel. The process results in reduction of the droplets to an invisible size.

A six engine B-47 jet bomber was used in the final tests and during the experiments, which were directed from the ground, the

jet crew eliminated the contrail vapor trail from the right engines while the three left engines continued to produce the familiar white vapor streams. An adjustment of the equipment reversed the procedure and the system was deemed successful.

Another solution, though not completely attractive to the Air Force involved the use of a special mixture, which when burned produced less water vapor than the usual jet fuel. Drawbacks were the problem of supplying the special fuel to each base and the cost of modifying present aircraft to use it.

The Contrail Suppression Project is being directed from the Aerophysics Laboratory of the Geophysics Research Directorate. It is under the direction of Mr. Seymour J. Birstein, the project scientist, and Captain James F. Church.

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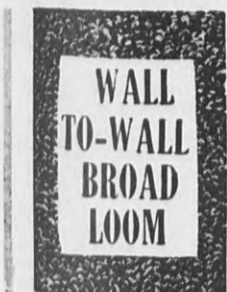

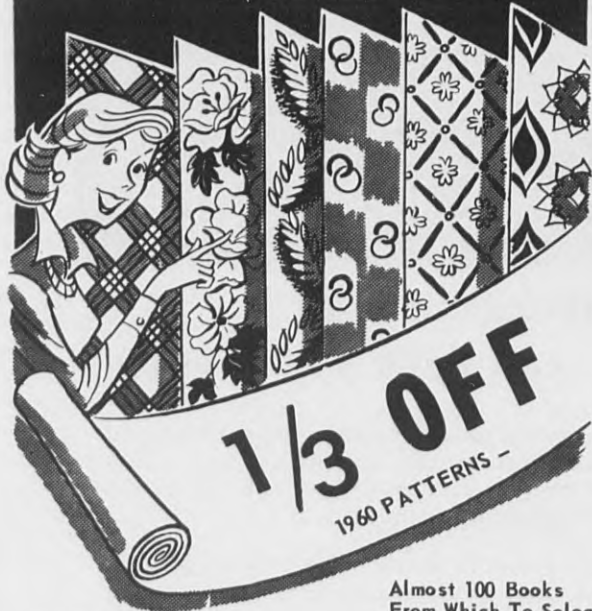
