Director To Be Named Monday

The Andover Housing Authority will appoint a director of urban renewal at a noon-time meeting next Monday.

Acting Director David MacDonald said the Authority has now narrowed down its search to three applicants, whose backgrounds are under thorough review this week.

They are Albert Cole Jr., deputy fire chief; James Franklin, urban renewal director in Wilmington; and James Mann of Haverhill, whose experience is with the real estate section of Sylvania Co.

MacDonald said John O'Malley, director of industrial development for Lawrence and Housing Authority Chairman Thomas Eldred have withdrawn from consideration.

Two other candidates, interviewed Monday night by Authority members, are not now being considered, he stated.

The position pays an annual salary of \$10,000.

This sum is included in the federal funds that have been made available for a study of the urban renewal area here, and the preparation of plans that can be submitted to the town for action by March of 1962.

AVIS Bought Large Land Area

The Andover Village Improvement Society has acquired a 50-acre tract of land along the Merrimack River, which will be made available for public use.

To be known as "Deer Jump Reservation", the site includes some two and one-third miles of frontage along the River, varying from 40 to 700 feet in depth.

A right of way to the reservation will be maintained off River rd., at Deer Jump Hill, next to the stone house. The AVIS plans to open the reservation this fall, and will attempt to have at least one path cleared the length of the strip.

President Albert Retelle commented this week that the reservation includes most of the native

Oct. 7 Is Last Registration Day

Unregistered adults in Andover will have opportunities to register to vote Nov. 8, during the coming week.

With the total registration now standing at 9,194, some officials see the possibility that Andover might have 9,500 voters eligible for the election.

The registration dates - where any unregistered person may register - are as follows:

Sept. 30, precinct five, Ballardvale fire station, 7-9 p.m.

Oct. 5, precinct six, Peabody House, Phillips st., 7-9 p.m.

Oct. 7, precincts one and two, town hall, noon to 10 p.m.

Although the registrations are held in the precincts, any resident, whether belonging in that precinct or not, may register in the stated times.

Both political town committees are expected to make every effort to see that unregistered persons get their names on the rolls in plenty of time for the November election.

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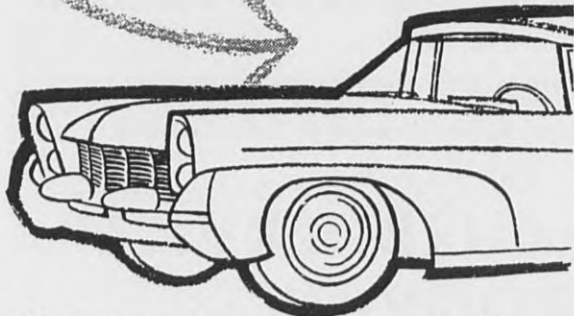
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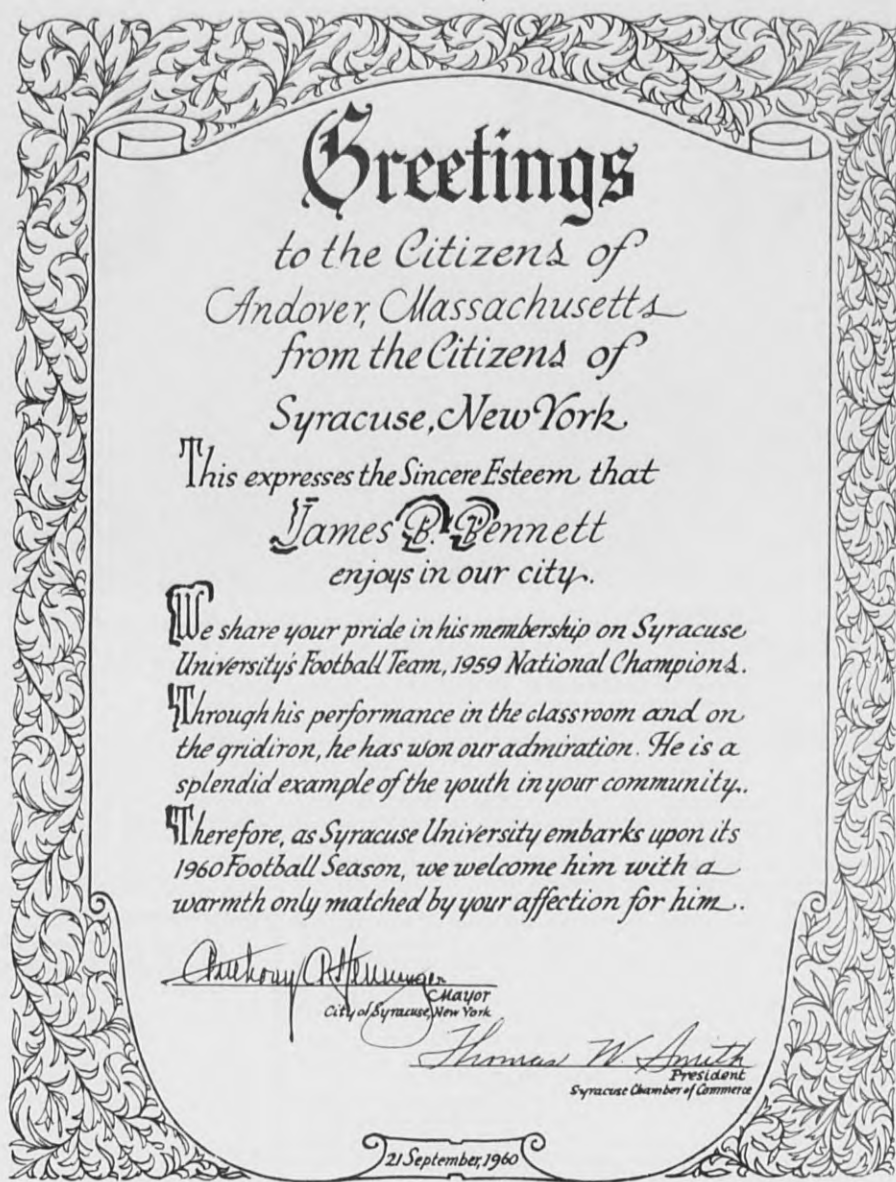

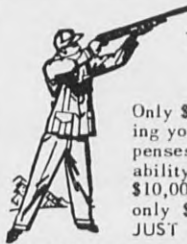

trees, and will be an excellent area for anyone interested in studying them. There are excellent groves of hemlock and pine, he explained, and a grove of horn bears.

The land runs from the Power Co. lines to the west, to a point behind the Loosigian farm on River rd. to the east.

Included in the area is the mouth of Fish Brook.

Mr. Retelle pointed out that the area will be open to all who wish to walk through it, and will not be posted to prevent hunting. He said the AVIS decided not to prohibit hunting in this favorite area, because it is large enough and far enough away from homes to make hunting practical.

He also explained that, although the land becomes a buffer between a portion of the town and the River, he can foresee no difficulty in terms of an access to the River for anyone needing this as a water supply.

This reservation is the sixth owned by the Society, and brings the total AVIS acreage up to some 200 acres.

Other reservations are Indian Ridge, the Vale Reservation, Baker's Meadow, Curtis Wood Lot on Dascomb rd. and Stevens Pond.

The Society keeps the areas in their natural state, making them available for those who wish to use them.

League Heard About Community Colleges

Walter M. Taylor, executive director of the Board of Regional Community Colleges, spoke at the Fall Luncheon of the League of Women Voters Sept. 20.

Part of the League's program this year is to study Public Higher Education in Massachusetts. Mr. Taylor's particular field, Regional Community Colleges, is the most important new facet of this problem. He gave some background of the enabling legislation which gives authority to the state and his board to set up Community Colleges throughout the state.

Mr. Taylor defined Community Colleges as institutions different from Junior Colleges, even though they offer only two years courses. He made the following distinctions: A Community College is geared to the needs of its community; it makes use of community resources; it offers both the first two years of a liberal arts or engineering course for those who wish to transfer to other colleges plus technical terminal courses such as Business Administration, electronics technician, nursing, etc.

League members questioned Mr. Taylor about the cost of these institutions and he answered that they are one third supported by the tuition and two thirds by the state. The local community only furnishes existing buildings. Cost per pupil of a community college is much less than either regular state universities or private ones for many reasons. Elaborate buildings, campuses and stadiums are not apart of the program. Part-time teachers can be used. Neither dormitories nor cafeterias are included in the plans.

Mr. Taylor is working at this time on plans for community colleges opening in Haverhill, Hyannis and Boston in the fall of 1961.

The meeting was opened by Mrs. Jerome Andrews Jr., president of the League, who introduced several League chairmen who spoke briefly on committee work for the coming year. Mrs. Charles Leigh reminded members of the Town Survey to take place in April. Mrs. Paul Crane spoke of the study group on foreign economic policy and Mrs. William Washburn announced the coming discussion groups on state politics.

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

One Plan - One Agency

Recreation, for both youngsters and adults, is a topic that has excited considerable interest in Andover - so much interest, in fact, that we wonder just who is responsible for planning this part of the community program.

The Recreation Committee logically should be the responsible agency - but we also have a town-wide Recreation Council which is attempting to ascertain the desires of the townspeople and do something about them; and we have the School Committee, which also is considering recreational matters.

It's entirely possible that there will be too much overlapping among these three groups, and that one plan should be prepared instead of three.

The School Committee, in its consideration of the proposed school in West Andover, is thinking about the possible use of the extra acres for recreation - not just for children at the school but for town use as well. There has been a continuing effort by members of this elected group, and school officials, to move forward in planning recreational areas.

The Council sent home questionnaires via school children for all parents to answer, which should offer a look at the recreational desires of the adult population. Presumably this group will come up with suggested areas of action.

The Recreation Committee, however, is the only official agency now charged with this specific task. We think it should come up with the plans for recreation, after carefully considering the facts that any other groups have in their possession.

It seems far more logical to have this official agency fulfill its responsibilities in this fashion, than it does to have three plans, all of which may at some points overlap or contradict the others in point of emphasis.

Too Little Time

Along with millions of other Americans, we watched the "Great Debate" between presidential candidates Monday evening.

And it seemed to us that the effectiveness of the debate was lessened considerably by the necessity of discussing so many important topics in such a short time.

Anyone with an actual interest in the candidates' ideas on one of these major topics would have been disappointed to have such a short time spent on it.

This was not, of course, the candidates' fault - it was a limitation automatically imposed when the time limit on the debate was set at one hour, and other restrictions were placed on the time available for discussion of any one point.

No one can quarrel with the program, nor with the worthwhile purpose of bringing the two candidates together. But wouldn't it have been even better to spend additional time on vital questions, so that voters with real interest in them could be satisfied that the topics had been fully explored?

Register, If You Want To Vote

Registrations are now open, for those residents of the town who have not been placed on the rolls of eligible voters.

And there probably are many who have not yet registered. We urge you to register - the dates are set forth in a news story in this week's issue.

One of the most important decisions of your life will be made Nov. 8, when the country elects a president and Massachusetts elects its constitutional officers.

It is your obligation to take part in this decision by voting in the election. And this you can not do unless you have registered.

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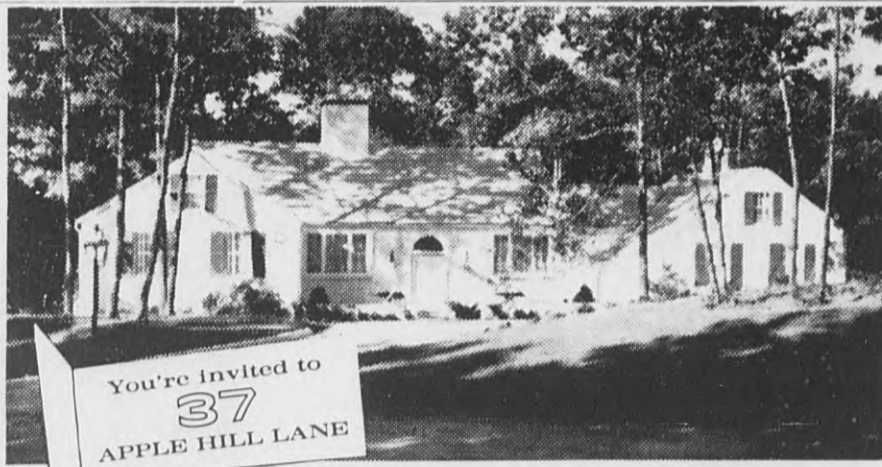

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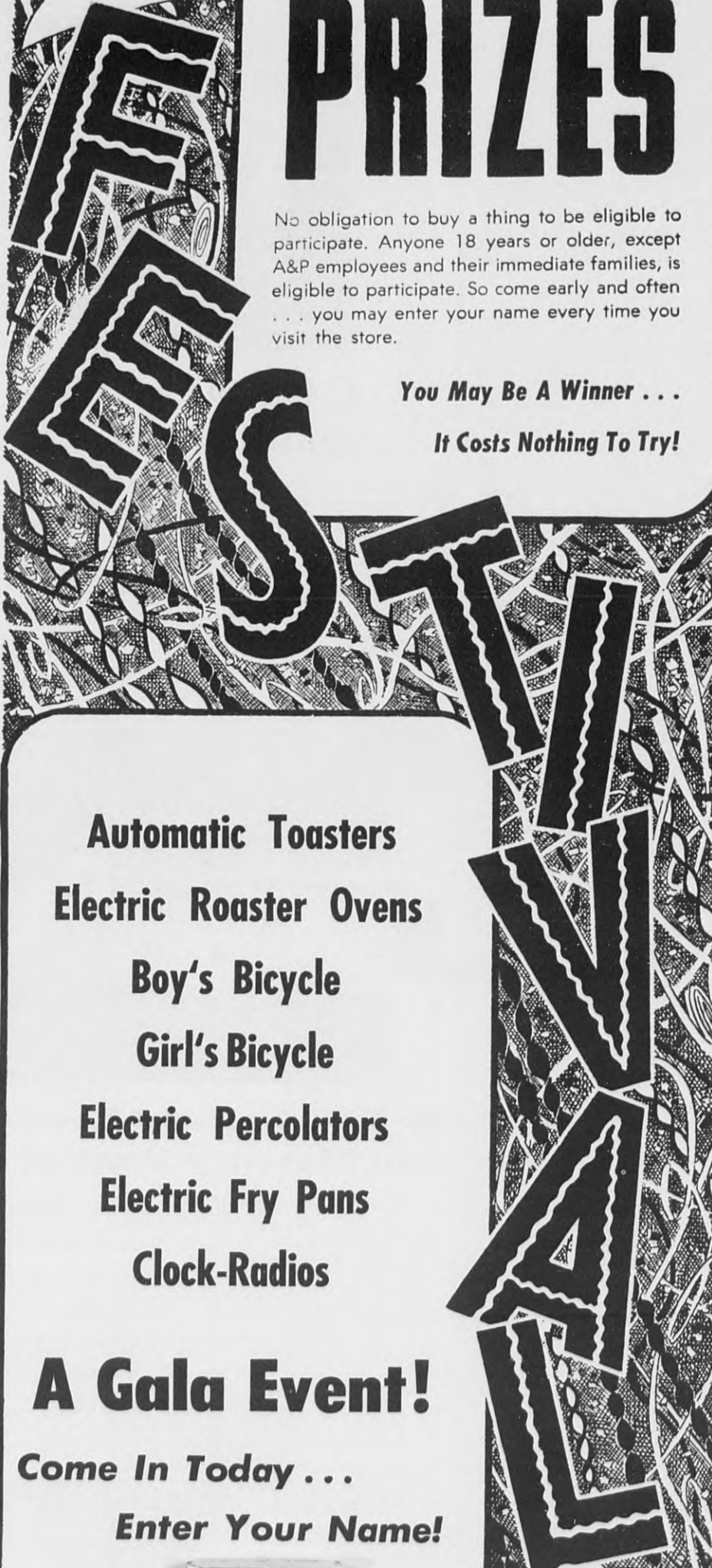
