Attention Travellers: Aircraft Grounded

For a 12-hour period beginning

For a 12-hour period beginning at 1 p.m. Saturday, North America's airspace will be cleared of all except military aircraft engaged in a realistic - and possibly noisy - test of this country's air defenses.

Called Sky Shield II, the continent-wide exercise will be staged by the North American Air Defense Command. Exercise requirements call for complete freedom of movement at all altitudes by U. S. and Canadian military aircraft, in addition to a small number

craft, in addition to a small number of British bombers.
High-speed bombers simulating attacking forces will attempt to jam far-flung radar and communications networks in testing probes of aerospace defenses, while air defense command fighter aircraft make mock intercepts.

Since large numbers of super-sonic aircraft will be involved, sonic booms may be heard over much of the North American continent.

An estimated 70,000 commercial and general purpose aircraft will be grounded and more than 125,000 travelers will either sit it out or seek other means to get to their destinations. Also grounded will be all foreign air carriers normally operating in the U.S.



And on the latter answer may hinge the fate of the project. If the estimated cost can be determined with sufficient accuracy, and this appears reasonable, then it is understood that Mr. Duff favors asking the state to call

There is the chance that less than the full matching funds would be needed, according to the manager.

Queried as to his opinion on whether the full matching funds could be used up on a section, perhaps from the River to Main st., Duff noted "We'd have to be relatively sure that the bids would come in reasonably."

He thinks that good competitive bidding should help keep the prices

down.

Asked whether the muchpublicized granting of extras within
the Division of Waterways could
have any effect on the eventual
cost, Duff said there should be a
contingency fund for such things
as extra ledge. He said this is a
normal procedure, and that the
state's resident engineer handles

normal procedure, and that the state's resident engineer handles these matters on the job. The town is notified of extras, he explained, but has no control over them. Mr. Duff said the town might have to put up its share of the matching funds, for however much of the project is completed, before it begins. Or, he explained, it might be some time after it is all over be some time after it is all over before the state asks for the money. he agreed that the town would have to pay half the cost of extras, as well as the original bid price, and also share the cost of engineering

service on the construction.

In the manager's opinion, the possibility of studying the section from Main st. to Whittier should be considered, to determine whether plans can be adapted for a less expensive project. a less expensive project.

In thinking about the future of the Brook, Mr. Duff said he believes it is important to get it reconstructed, even if this means aching future. asking future town meetings for additional matching funds.

He said the Selectmen may have reached some decision by next Monday night, when they meet publicly.





EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Begging For Trouble

The town is asking, even begging, for trouble by continuing to seek a partnership with the Waterways Division of the State Department of Public Works.

In a practical sense, the town can lose money - even be forced into spending funds it doesn't want to spend by its "partner", the state.

The very administrative practices and policies that strip the town of many of its rights have been under severe attack. While these practices are under investigation, the town, on moral grounds, should not enter into a partnership

Let's be specific:

The state awards all bids; the town has little to say.

The state will award a contract if the bid is within the appropriation. If the state and town have \$100 to spend, and the bid is \$95, it will be awarded, even if the town thinks it is too high.

The state, through engineers on the job, approves "extras". The cost of these items can't be foreseen. The town has nothing to say about them, but must pay half

The state either uses its own engineers, or pays a consulting firm to supervise construction. In either case, half the cost is borne by the town, without having any choice in what individuals or firms are employed.

These practices lie behind most of the published charges of gigantic extras, shifting of contracts from firm to firm, excessive payments to engineering firms, awarding of contracts to low bidders that eventually, through extras, become the high bidders.

Such alleged practices, if true, and if encouraged by communities such as ours, will continue. They are costly to those who participate.

This is the moral reason for abandoning this project

The practical reasons are equally obvious.

It's possible the entire \$390,000 available now - with state and town sharing the cost equally - could be used up in doing one section of Rogers Brook, either through outright bids alone or by the granting of extras along the

Having done one section, the town would be bound to a continuing construction program, including further appropriations to be matched with state funds. There is no known end. The job was estimated most recently as costing \$640,000, but might go way over that amount if done in bits, over a few years.

No firm reliance can be placed on any ostensible agreement with the Division, unless it is in a solemn document, in view of the strange fluctuations of estimates of cost, and of Division promises regarding state participation.

Thus we have both a moral and a practical reason to get out while the getting is good before we are committed to a partnership without equal rights, except when the bills must be paid.

Journalism, therefore, demands of its practitioners the widest range of intelligence, of knowledge, of experience, as well as natural and trained powers of observation and reasoning. To its opportunities as a chronicle are indissolubly linked its obligations as teacher and interpreter."

13 Ministers Faithfully Served South Church Begins Anni

The fifteen pastorates since the founding of South Church in Andover have been filled by a succession of illustrious men, many of whom are distinguished in New England history.

Samuel Phillips, the first

Samuel Phillips, the first minister, was ordained on the same day that the new church was founded, Oct. 17, 1711; but he had been preaching to the parish since April 30, 1710. The church voted its desire for his continuance Nov. 2, and the parish voted unanimously Dec. 12 that he should be their "settled minister". It was because of his unwillingness to assume so important a charge so young that his ordination was postponed to the

following year.

Mr. Phillips was educated at
Harvard College and, after
teaching for a year at Chebacco,
now Essex, he devoted himself to the ministry.

The ministry of Mr. Phillips

The ministry of Mr. Phillips was exceptionally prosperous and successful. Andover was a growing community. Its chief problem, the forays and depredations of the Indians, was at this time a diminishing one. Religious meetings were well attended. The bursh and the article property of the problem of the problem of the problem. ings were well attended. The church and the parish were unified. The minister was a warm and kind leader of his congregation, admired and respected by his parishioners. His admonitions were stern but practical. His preaching was highly regarded and much in demand by neighboring parishes, particularly for special occasions.

He continued his active ministry

He continued his active ministry until a few weeks before his death June 5, 1771, at the age of 81, after more than 61 years of

service.
In addition to his outstanding ministerial ability, Mr. Phillips was an able manager of his personal affairs. His salary was small sonal affairs. His salary was small and he donated one tenth of it for religious and charitable purposes. Nevertheless, he educated his family liberally and accumulated a large estate. His children and grandchildren also demonstrated a high order of ability and idealism. a high order of ability and idealism. Of his three sons, Samuel and John were joint founders of Phillips Academy in Andover, John was sole founder of Phillips Academy in Exeter, N. H., and William was a trustee of the Andover academy, to which he contributed liberally.

Jonathan French, the second minister, was ordained Sept. 23, 1772. He was born at Braintree and at 17, enlisted as a private soldier. At the age of 27, he resigned from the service and entered Harvard College, where he was graduated in 1771. After his graduation he remained at Cambridge to study for the Cambridge to study for the ministry. He had intended to be-

ministry. He had intended to become a missionary to the Indians but was induced to preach as a candidate at Andover, where he settled and continued as pastor until his death July 28, 1809. Mr. French was best known for his hospitality and friendliness. By precept and example he encouraged his parishioners in the practice of Christian virtues while he steadfastly avoided entering into the great theological controversies which raged during his versies which raged during his pastorate. During his years at Castle William he had studied Castle William he had studied medicine and practiced surgery. With this experience, he was often able to help his people with their minor medical problems, always free of charge. He was a staunch patriot and supporter of the Revolution, which came early in his ministry. When on a Sunday morning he heard of the battle of Bunker Hill, he straightway set forth with his musket and surgeon's kit for the battlefield, where he kit for the battlefield, where he gave aid and comfort to the wounded.

It was during his ministry also that Phillips Academy was founded in April, 1778. Mr. French was one of the 12 original trustees and

continued to serve until his death.

For three years after the death
of Mr. French there was no settled minister at South Church. But in 1812, attention was centered on young Justin Edwards, then a member of the middle class in the Theological Seminary. Mr. Edwards was called by an almost unanimous vote, and was

ordained Dec. 2, 1812. He was born in Westhampton April 25, 1787, and at the age of 17, resolved to enter the ministry. He entered Williams College as a sephanore. Williams College as a sophomore and was graduated, valedictorian of his class in 1810. After teaching for a few months, he joined the Seminary in Andover.

Mr. Edwards entered upon his ministry with the same vigor and decisiveness which characterized his whole life. He often visited 10 or 15 families a day, reading the Bible, conducting family prayers, and taking the names of all children so that he could supply them with small religious books and tracts. He formed a society called the "Andover South Parish Society for the Reformation of Morals" aimed primarily at the evils of profanity, Sabbath breaking, and intemper-ance. This was the first of many similar societies which he formed. In 1827, Yale College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of

Divinity, and Oct. 1 of that year, he relinquished his pastorate at South Church. The fourth minister was Milton Badger, who was ordained Jan. 3, 1828. A native of Coventry, Conn., now Andover, he was born May 6, 1800. He prepared for the ministry

at Yale Divinity School and Andover Theological Seminary, with the class of 1827.

pastorate at Andover, his only pastorate, was a time of religious revival. During his 71/2 years of ministry, 330 new members were added to the church, most of them by profession of faith. The memory of these years had a profound and lasting years had a protound and lasting influence on the parishioners of that time. Frederick Boyer Noss, the present minister of South Church, is serving the 15th pastorate in its 250-year history.
Friday, Nov. 3, 1961, 17 days after the 250th anniversary of the founding of South Church, will be the 30th anniversary of his installation as minister. He ranks third in length of service among the 13 men who have filled these pastorates. The first and second longest terms of service are those of the first and second ministers, of the first and second ministers, respectively, Samuel Phillips, who served almost 60 years, and Jonathan French, who served almost 37 years. These two men were the only South Church ministers in its first 100 years of ministers in its first 100 years of history. The next period of 50 years saw six ministers come and go. In the last 100 years, the seven remaining pastorates have been filled by five other men. Charles Smith and Frank R. Shipman each served two pastorates pastorates.

pastorates.

Mr. Noss was born of missionary parents in Sendal, Japan, June 3, 1901. One of a large family, most of his life has been spent in America. His college training was received at Princeton University, where he was graduated in 1923. He studied for the ministry at the Theological Seminary in Lancaster, Pa., where he was graduated in 1927. His first ministry was at the Boxford Congregational Church, where he served from December 7, 1927 to Oct. 1, 1929.

He came to South Church as

He came to South Church as associate minister during the brief second pastorate of Mr. Shipman, and was installed as minister after and was installed as minister after Mr. Shipman's retirement. From the beginning of his ministry in the depths of the depression, through the second world war, and up to the present time, the membership and work of South Church have increased greatly. In order to accommodate the burgeoning Christian Education program, an addition to the meeting house was addition to the meeting house was built which was dedicated Oct. 7,

Richard R. Niebuhr, guest minister at the opening worship service Sunday, at South Church, is associate professor of Theology at Harvard University. He has been a member of the Harvard faculty since 1956.

A native of Chicago, Dr. Niebuhr was graduated from Harvard in 1947, from Union Theological Seminary in 1950, and received the Ph.D. degree from Yale in 1955. He was minister of the First Church of Christ, Congregational, in Cornwall, Conn., and lecturer on religion at Vassar College before

religion at Vassar College before joining the Harvard faculty.

He is the author of "Resurrection and Historical Reason: A Study of Theological Method" (1957), and he helped prepare a statement of faith for the United Church of Christ. He has served on the Executive Committee of the International Congregational Council, and on the editorial committee of A Library of Protestant Thought.

He is the author of six books and a regular contriof six books and a regular contributor to various magazines and periodicals. In 1948, he won The Churchman's Award and \$1,000 prize for the best sermon of the year, a sermon which was later dramatized and presented over a national network. In 1957, he was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by Amherst College.

A native of Somerville, Dr. Pearson was graduated from Harvard College, magna cum laude, Phi Beta Kappa in 1935, and from Andover Newton Theological School, cum laude in 1938. Since 1938, he has had four pastorates, including Consequences. including Congregational churches in Amherst and Lexington. During in Amherst and Lexington. During the pastorate at Amherst, he was given brief leave of absence for service with the Chaplain Corps in Texas. He spent the summers in 1951 and 1957 in England, Scotland, and Wales preaching for the National Council of the Churches of Christ in America and for the International Congregational Council. For several summers, as volunteer pastor with the Maine Seacoast Missionary Society, he preached at outlying islands and fiching acts and several summers. fishing ports along the Maine coast.



ponsibilities of the Commission, and then asked for the expression of approval. The meeting, scheduled for several weeks, is the second of a series, during which the Selectmen will meet with all of the town beards and departs. all of the town boards and depart-

In general, Mr. Haselton ex-plained the function of the IDC in Andover, and its specific problems. He noted that the town's situation is entirely different than that in Lawrence, where a specific industrial park is set up, under the control of a developer. Numerous persons own industrial property here, he explained, and no attempt is being made on an official level to put the parcels together in one package.

He noted that three members of

the Commission serve on the Greater Lawrence Industrial Committee, and felt that there is no contradiction in the double service.

He explained that the experiences learned while serving in one capacity are of assistance in the other; and noted that there is no conflict of interest because the problems of the communities are so different.

A plea for understanding of the situation was also presented - on the basis that Andover is actually part of the Greater Lawrence Community and not an island.

The Commission, it was stated, has prepared a loose-leaf cover, for a brochure made up of prepared material that can be stapled into the document. This material presents most of the data available about the town and what it has to

by this group. The remarks stated:
"Last week I read an article
in the Townsman relative to plans by the Recreation Group and the statement that it was not possible to obtain confirmation for the use of the high school facilities from the superintendent.
"Mrs. Medick telephoned me a

few weeks ago to ask for the use of the high school two evenings a week. I told her that I would be glad to discuss the matter when I had received her proposed pro-gram. The reason that she did not obtain my approval is because she has never submitted her plan, as to the use of the building, to my office. "The town of Andover has a school plant valued in excess of

school plant valued in excess of seven million dollars.

"One of the responsibilities of the superintendent, according to School Committee rules, is to supervise the rental of the various areas of the school property. Article XII, Section 2, reads in part as follows: 'Indiscriminate use of any and all school buildings would prove, in the long run, to be would prove, in the long run, to be a costly proposition as well as a difficult problem to administer. "When we rent, or allow groups

when we refit, or allow groups to use a facility, arrangements are made with some one person who will accept the responsibility to be certain that the school will be used properly in such matters as:

A. Smoking privileges; B. The way the building and equipment will be used; C. Responsibility for keeping out persons who do not belong there; D. Care to restrict expense for needless and uneconomical lighting and heating;
