Brook Situation Is On Agenda

The Selectmen will again be discussing Rogers Brook next Monday night at the regular meeting of the Board.

Duff believes there will be some decision reached as to whether the town should go forward now, or whether recommendations should be made to town meeting in March on possible alternatives. The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, D. D., retired presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church and president of the World Council of Churches, will dedicate Memorials honoring the late rector of Christ Church, the Rev. John Shapleigh Moses, D. D., at that Church Wednesday evening, Nov. 1, at an 8 o'clock service.

At the All Saints Day Service, Bishop Sherrill will dedicate a Memorial Tablet on the wall of the Chapel in remembrance of Dr. Moses' ministry at Christ Church. The carved walnut tablet is decorated with the seals of the four institutions Dr. Moses loved - Christ Church, Trinity College, The Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, and Phillips Academy, where Dr. Moses was an instructor in religious studies. The dean of the Episcopal Theological School Very Rev. John B. Coburn, D. D., will present a Scroll to the Parish representing the John S. Moses Scholarship Fund at that school, given by the people of Christ Church in memory of Dr. Moses. Bishop Sherrill will also dedicate a silver Chalice given by Mrs. John S. Moses in memory of her husband.

During the month, the various department heads will meet with the manager to discuss the figures, so that preliminary budgets can be prepared by the first of December.

The budgets, specially the comparative figures with expenditures for the current year, are tentative at that time, because the expenses must be projected for the balance of the year.

Finance Committee deliberations and consideration of the budgets by the Selectmen normally begin in December, continuing for many weeks.

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Methuen Selectmen Roger E. Ingalls and Lawrence Democrat Charles A. Buckley will be opponents in the Nov. 14 special Fifth District election.

They won endorsement from the voters Tuesday, in a primary that saw about 30 percent of the eligible voters participate.

In Andover, the average was much less - 19 percent of the voters turned out.

Ingalls defeated Atty. Albert Pettoruto of Lawrence by 110 votes. Pettoruto carried all precincts in North Andover and Ward One of Lawrence, five of the six Andover precincts, and lost all of the Methuen precincts by heavy margins.

Statistically, Andover's leading precinct was precinct three, where 21.6 percent of the voters - 407 - turned out. Precinct one was close behind, with 445 voters, for a 21 percent mark. Only 11.5 percent of the voters in precinct five voted, 89. In precinct six, 420 voted, for a percentage of 20.7. Precinct two had 230 votes, 16.3 percent; precinct four, 277, 16.4 percent.

A total of 1,868 voted, out of

The winless Blue Devils of Andover High travel to Methuen Saturday for the traditional game with that town's Rangers.

Methuen, boasting a 3-2 season, rules as a favorite in the contest, according to most observers.

In last Friday night's game at Newburyport, The Blue Devils faced the prospects of a 6-6 tie until the waning minutes of the game, when Newburyport scored to make the score 12-6. Newburyport had gone winless in the season until meeting Andover.

A blocked punt resulted in the first 'Port TD, when the ball bounded into the end zone and was recovered there by Newburyport's Paul Maguire.

Andover scored late in the final period, with Quarterback Ray Collins firing to Boyd Reynolds at the 14. Reynolds cut across field and into the end zone, but a try for the two-points after the TD failed.

Only 1:45 of the period remained when Andover tried an on-side kick-off, which Newburyport recovered at midfield. Bill John-

Addison Gallery Exhibit Interesting

Thirty years ago the Addison Gallery opened its doors to the public.

In the intervening time, a succession of special exhibitions, as well as the noteworthy collection of American art, have attracted visitors from all over the world. Now, until the end of November, selections from the expanding collection provide a special interest. Painting, sculpture, drawing, watercolors and prints reveal the wide scope of the collection with respect to the artists' medium and style, but its variety is also demonstrated by the contrast of antiquities more than 200 years old with those works of art executed within the past decade. A hooked bed cover, dated 1741, the bequest of Henry P. Moseley, was once the proud dowry treasure of Phoebe Billings whose family had settled along the shores of the Connecticut River. A geometric composition of nylon thread by Sue Fuller is an example of modern preoccupation with spatial order that underlies so much of abstract art.

Photography, too, plays its role in the representation of American art. Although this aspect of the collection is not numerically large, a considerable range of experimental work reveals the photographer as a poetic individual, not merely one with a mechanical eye.

A special feature of the survey is a selection of acquisitions made during the past five years since the 25th Anniversary of the Museum. Here, too, are vivid contrasts, for example, the pastoral twilight of an Italian landscape by the 19th century painter, George Inness, gift of the late Stephen C. Innes, for attention with the brilliant hues of a masterfully-executed painting by the present day artist, Hans Hofmann. Yet both give testimony to the high caliber of the collection as a whole, its chief characteristic since its inception. Although the installation is in no sense chronological, there is ample opportunity for anyone who wishes to grasp the cultural history of America to do so.

Urges Use Of Seat Belts

"More than 200 lives could be saved in Massachusetts traffic accidents every year - and countless thousands of injuries prevented or alleviated - by the simple expedient of wearing safety seat belts," according to the Associated Safety Councils of Massachusetts and Associated Industries of Massachusetts.

In announcing a state-wide campaign for automobile seat belts, a committee of four organization presidents have lined up behind this life-saving effort. Committee members are Raymond H. Blanchard, Associated Industries of Massachusetts; Charles L. O'Reilly, Massachusetts Safety Council; Winslow A. Stahle, Safety Council of Western Massachusetts; Andrew B. Holmstrom, Worcester County Safety Council.

"Seat belts can prevent death and injury," the seat belt committee states, "by packaging the wearer protectively inside the car. If the worst happens, the seat belt softens the blow and prevents bone-breaking ejection from the car onto concrete."

League Studies Urban Renewal

Members of the Andover League of Women Voters discussed various facets of the proposed Urban Renewal Program for Andover as part of their continuing study of Urban Renewal at unit discussion meetings held last week.

According to the co-chairmen of the Urban Renewal Committee, Mrs. Thayer Warshaw and Mrs. George S. Laaff, the League to date has not taken a stand either favoring or opposing Urban Renewal. Rather League members are gathering pertinent information about all phases of the proposed plans in order to appraise their total effect upon the Andover community.

In these preliminary discussions, League members reviewed the background of the Urban Renewal Program in Andover, outlined the mechanisms of implementing the proposed program.

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In these preliminary discussions, League members reviewed the background of the Urban Renewal Program in Andover, outlined the mechanisms of implementing the proposed program, and considered the possible time schedule for its accomplishment.

In addition, participants speculated as to the cost of program with emphasis upon its possible effects on both the local tax rate and the tax base of the community.

League members reviewed the federal government surveys under which Andover's eligibility for federal funds for urban renewal was first established. They also examined maps defining the six parcels of land, totaling 26.2 acres, already selected for renewal.

Resource groups of the League under the direction of Mrs. Warshaw and Mrs. Laaff also described the methods under which Urban Renewal could be achieved locally with specific references to possible items in the town warrant. They also summarized the suggested steps in the phased demolition and rebuilding of blighted areas.

Of particular interest was the disclosure that under a new federal law, Andover, as a community of under 50,000 people, is eligible for a greater percentage of federal aid than originally anticipated. Under this recent legislation the federal government will pay for three-fourths of the cost, the state government one-eighth, and the town of Andover only one-eighth.

Inasmuch as the total area to be involved in Urban Renewal is as yet undetermined, the possible cost of the total program to the Andover community could not be established.

However, members learned that authorities estimate that the assessed values of the properties involved in the site already selected for renewal would double from the present two-and-one-half million dollars to five million dollars.

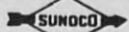

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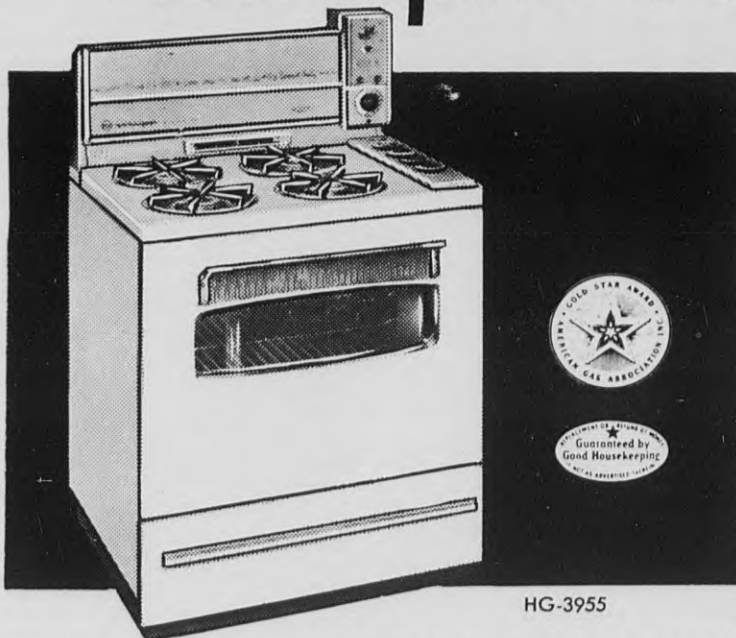
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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

How About A Roster?

When the Selectmen were discussing the appointment of an Urban Renewal Citizens Committee recently, Selectman William Stewart remarked on the frequency with which certain names are proposed for municipal activities.

He felt that the community is not so bankrupt in interested citizens that the same men and women must be appointed again and again to study or other committees.

And we agree that this is so.

The only reason the same people are suggested frequently is their availability, their known willingness to serve. It's easier, after all, to suggest those people who are obviously interested, where there will be no hesitation in accepting.

But even so, we go along with Mr. Stewart's contention that there are many interested residents who would be glad to serve on some of these committees if they are asked to do so.

Perhaps it would be to the town's advantage to have a roster of interested citizens, for reference purposes when such committees are to be appointed. It's difficult to think of the names on the spur of the moment — such a list would enable the Selectmen to make appointments with the knowledge that the persons are interested in serving their town. If the town fathers could draw up such a list, and if the people on it could be asked ahead of time whether they would serve in some capacity when asked, there would be a constant supply of names from which to draw. This would spread the work out some, and get refreshing points of view from those who are not often consulted.

Your Help Is Needed

Although it is normally not our practice to urge support of endeavors other than the strictly local, there comes a time when state-wide, even New England-wide efforts can not be ignored locally.

This is the case with the effort now being undertaken to raise \$1,500,000 for educational radio and television station WGBH.

The funds are badly needed, for as most persons know, the station was destroyed by fire Oct. 14. Complete rebuilding is the only solution — and this can only be accomplished if listeners and viewers throughout the area contribute to the fund.

Channel 2 has been recently praised by the chairman of the Federal Communications Commission as "probably the best station in the country". News and magazine media have also been constant in their praise and commendation.

Although the station has been able to resume broadcasting through the kindness and cooperation of the commercial stations and the Catholic television station in Boston, it is obviously necessary for WGBH to re-build, and quickly.

Projects Repeat Themselves

There isn't much new under the sun — only repetition of the same subjects, dressed up in different words.

Rogers Brook has been debated for 50 years — just go back in old records and you will find discussions of the appropriations needed to fix the brook for all time; and the voters then thought a few thousand dollars were too much to spend on it.

The need for a new municipal building was a subject of great concern 25 years ago, when some town offices were moved into private buildings nearby because of a lack of space. This subject has been coming up again and again over the years — but never with any final decision being made.

These are but two of the many recurring municipal problems — sometimes solutions have been just plain put off, sometimes half-way measures have been employed to solve the particular problem for the time being, and according to the best judgment of the officials then in office.

When we sometimes feel the pressing weight of so many problems, it doesn't hurt to reflect on the fact that our fathers and grandfathers faced the same questions — and took whatever action they thought best, in the light of facts available then. Whether they were right or wrong, in our judgment many years later, is not the point. What matters is that action was taken, or left for future generations to take, according to the dictates of reason and judgment.

3-Eyed Picture

Tubes For Bombers

"Three-eyed" picture tubes will fly in the Air Force's B-52 bombers. The special tubes now being produced by Raytheon Company's Industrial Components Division at Newton resemble round TV picture tubes but, in addition, have two more eye-like windows at their sides.

One window "eye" looks at a map and feeds this electronic picture to the tube face to provide airmen with a continuously oriented background against which other aircraft and targets reported by the radar are displayed. The other window is a camera eye that also looks at the tube face through the inside of the tube and captures a permanent record of the composite picture on the screen making an historical record for subsequent analysis.

Raytheon is manufacturing a substantial number of the "three-eyed" tubes under a contract from Warner-Robbins Air Force Base, Macon, Georgia. The first shipments will be made in November.

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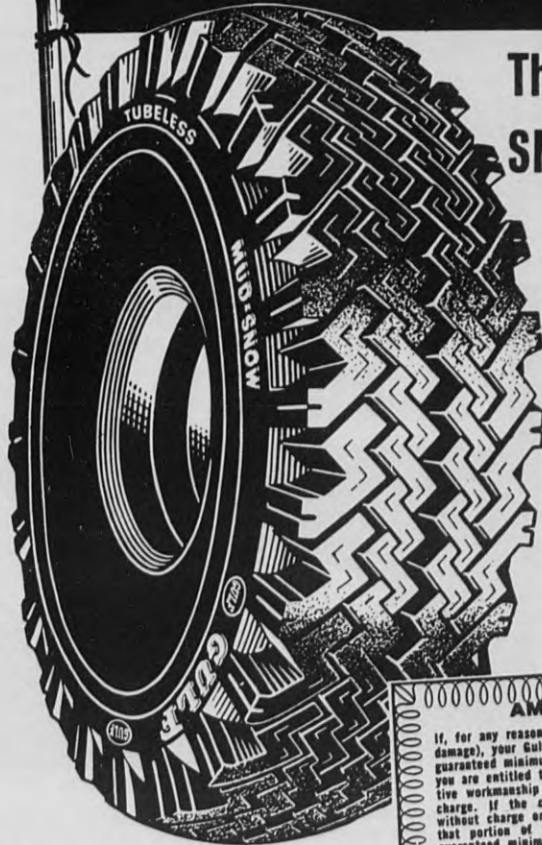

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Asks Reports On Fallout Danger

Is fallout a menace to Andover's water and milk supplies? James E. Casselden, 1 Brookfield rd., waited patiently at the Selectmen's meeting Monday night to talk about the answer.

He told the Board that interest has been at a peak, and that many persons have been disturbed by reports that fallout may be evident in the milk supply at some future date.

However, stressing his belief that this probably is not happening, he suggested that the town issue statements assuring residents that the supply of milk, and the town water supply, are not being contaminated to a dangerous level.

Mr. Casselden also asked whether the municipal water supply, from the wells alone, is adequate in case the open water at Haggatt's Pond is contaminated or otherwise unavailable. This would not be true, according to the town manager, who said the wells alone can not pump enough water to take care of normal requirements.

Mr. Duff noted that the milk and water supplies here are continually
