## All-Day Meeting Next March

The possibility of having an old-fashioned town meeting - an all-day affair with lunch available mid-way - is under discussion.

The Selectmen Monday night seemed generally agreed that a morning starting time on Saturday would make it more attractive for the voters.

Chairman Eugene A. Bernardin Jr. first mentioned the possibility, and other members quickly responded with favorable comment. They hope that the town meeting - scheduled for March 10, 1962 - might start around 9:30 and continue until the warrant is completed.

Sandwiches would be available, the thinking went, perhaps in the cafeteria.

Board members expressed the conviction that meetings which are adjourned to Monday nights are poorly attended.

## No Report Due From By-Law Study Group

### Mrs. Buchan Seeks Re-election

Reta V. Buchan, 81 Central st., will seek re-election to the School Committee next March.

There's only the slimmest of chances that proposed revisions of the town by-laws will be ready for town meeting action next March.

Whether or not the revisions actually change the meaning of the by-laws, or whether they just alter the method of presentation, with clarifying wording, seems to be a major point of discussion.

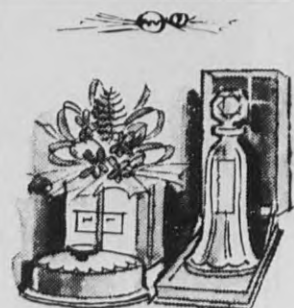

the present meaning of the by-laws, while attempting to improve the format and clarify any ambiguities. He agreed, however, that when such a major change is being accomplished, it is possible to inadvertently change meanings.

He suggested that the Planning Board must first be satisfied with the proposals before they are presented to other boards and officials of the town. But when this will take place he could not predict.

**No Time, Now**  
Mr. Zollner said the Planning Board is considering the third draft of the revision - the other two having met with disapproval. Based on time factors alone, he believes that agreement can not be reached with the Planning Board before April, at least, and at that time copies of the by-laws will be presented to the Selectmen, town counsel and any other officials who have responsibility for them.

Only after all the officials have a chance to read and comment on the by-laws will they be made available for public study.

Mr. Zollner expressed the hope that there will be ample time for this study, as the changes in format and wording should be thoroughly understood by the voters.

Whenever the town meeting considers them, it is apparent that a two-thirds vote will be needed to adopt the by-laws, even if no meanings are changed.

Atty. Zollner explained that legal requirements must be met, and the safest method is to seek a two-thirds approval so the laws will not be later challenged on this ground.

### Non-Conforming Uses

One of the problems yet to be faced, he said, is that of non-conforming uses. His committee has not yet studied fully the implications in revoking the old by-laws and adopting new ones, as to whether this would create a new date by which to establish which businesses or land uses are non-conforming. Under the present by-law, land uses prior to adoption of the zoning by-laws in 1936 are continuing, as non-conforming uses, and are subject to many legal restrictions. The committee will be faced with the possibility that adoption of a new set of by-laws will establish a new date for this purpose - possibly thus legalizing businesses or uses that are presently in violation of the zoning requirements.

Mr. Zollner thought that this possibility might not be at all desirable, and that thorough consideration of the legal steps involved in adopting new by-laws should be considered to see how such a situation can be avoided.

Although this situation was presented as a problem, it appears not to be the only one facing the study committee.

**Meaning Changed?**  
Mrs. Virginia Hammond, secretary of the Planning Board, told the Townsman this week that, in her opinion, there are substantial changes in meaning within the revised by-laws. She explained that these may be merely accidents, occasioned by drastic changes in the format and wording, but must be checked out completely by the Planning Board before approval can be given.

That board has had to compare the revised by-laws line-for-line with the present ones, to determine where any changes are made, and to correct those they feel should be different than the proposals.

She expressed herself as "far from satisfied" with the revisions as they now stand, and explained that it is essential to be certain that all "implications" of the revised by-laws are thoroughly understood before action is taken.

She agreed that the Planning Board would have to eventually advertise the by-laws and hold a hearing on them, as required by the statutes. This requirement, plus the continuing lack of agreement on the revision, were reasons for her feeling that no action can be taken at the March town meeting.

the voters approved the committee and appropriated \$1,000 for its use.

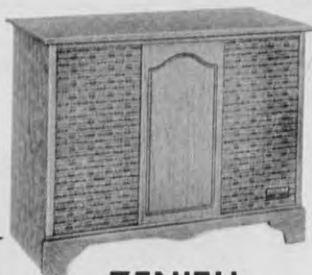

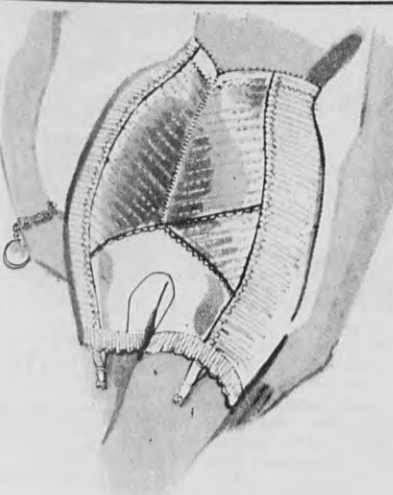

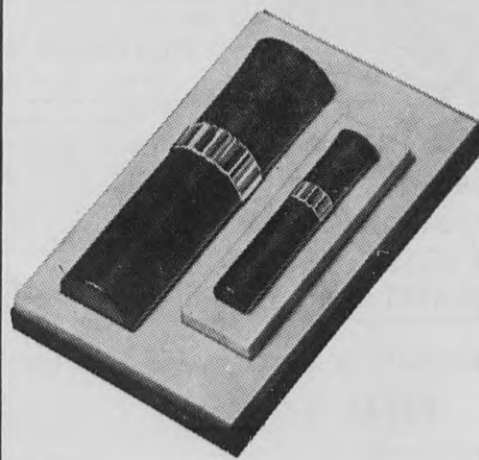

**One-Hour Parking  
On Four Streets**

One-hour parking has been established for Arundel, York, Carlsbrooke and Argyle streets.

And by doing so, they hope to discourage the game of "musical chairs" played daily by employees at Raytheon.

Residents of the streets complained that the drivers appear regularly at two-hour intervals, to move their cars from place to place. This keeps one step ahead of the patrolman, who can't give a ticket if the car has not been parked longer than two hours in one place.

Action came after receipt of a petition from Arundel residents, asking for a no-parking ban. They promised to have their own cars off the street at times, too.

Town Manager Thomas E. recommended that the no-parking request be denied, because it would tend to merely move the cars onto other streets, where the same problems would occur.

Selectman Russell G. Doyle, the Board that he has received assurances from "someone at Raytheon" that negotiations are underway now for more land which additional parking spaces can be placed. He urged temperate action until this can be accomplished "in the near future."

However, he suggested that one-hour limit be imposed in the meantime. This requires special approval, so the time change would go into effect until this is received.

During the discussion of parking in Shawsheen, Police Chief Daniel L. Nicoll pointed out that 324 cars are now parked on the street there, but only one or two parking places remain vacant in the Raytheon lot. Thus there is a need for more space, he agreed.

It was also brought out that Raytheon will lose some of its present lot, when Route 495 goes through, making it even more essential to create additional parking spaces elsewhere.

Alan F. Dunlop of Arundel speaking for residents, said existing situation is dangerous to the children and annoying to residents.

Selectman James D. Wilcox agreed, and urged some immediate action by the Board. He commented that the situation has "worsened" during the last few years, despite efforts to have problems solved cooperatively.

Mr. Doyle, in asking for a decision in such a step as a no-parking ban, said he feels a responsibility to all of the residents - and wondered whether banning parking on one street, only to have the same problem created somewhere else is a real service to the people.

Chief Nicoll commented during the discussion that adoption of a towing law - which can be done at a town meeting - followed by approval of a plan for towing zone would be a help. Cars can not be towed away for over-t

## One-Hour Parking On Four Streets

One-hour parking has been established for Arundel, York, Carisbrooke and Argyle sts., by the Selectmen.

And by doing so, they hope to discourage the game of "musical cars" played daily by employees at Raytheon.

Residents of the streets claim that the drivers appear regularly, at two-hour intervals, to move their cars from place to place. This keeps one step ahead of the patrolman, who can't give a ticket if the car has not been parked longer than two hours in one place.

Action came after receipt of a petition from Arundel st. residents, asking for a no-parking ban. They promised to have their own cars off the street at all times, too.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff recommended that the no-parking request be denied, because this would tend to merely move the cars onto other streets, where the same problems would occur.

Selectman Russell G. Doyle told the Board that he has received assurances from "someone at Raytheon" that negotiations are underway now for more land, on which additional parking spaces can be placed. He urged temperate action until this can be accomplished "in the near future".

However, he suggested that the one-hour limit be imposed in the meantime. This requires state approval, so the time change won't go into effect until this is received.

During the discussion of parking in Shawshen, Police Chief David L. Nicoll pointed out that 324 cars now are parking on the streets there, but only one or two parking places remain vacant in the Raytheon lot. Thus there is a need for more space, he agreed.

It was also brought out that Raytheon will lose some of the present lot, when Route 495 goes through, making it even more essential to create additional parking spaces elsewhere.

Alan F. Dunlop of Arundel st., speaking for residents, said the existing situation is dangerous for the children and annoying to the residents.

Selectman James D. Wilson agreed, and urged some immediate action by the Board. He commented that the situation has "only worsened" during the last five years, despite efforts to have problems solved cooperatively.

Mr. Doyle, in asking for a delay in such a step as a no-parking ban, said he feels a responsibility to all of the residents - and wondered whether banning parking on one street, only to have the same problem created somewhere else, is a real service to the people.

Chief Nicoll commented during the discussion that adoption of the towing law - which can be done at town meeting - followed by state approval of a plan for towing zones, would be a help. Cars can not now be towed away for over-time

parking.

Chief Nicoll, agreeing that one offender now has 54 tickets this year, said that possibly towing the car a couple of times would cure the man. In general, he said, the areas nearest to the plant are most desirable as parking places, and some people accept the fine as an inexpensive charge for parking their cars.

Chairman Eugene A. Bernardin Jr. told the meeting that Raytheon has been as interested in solving the problem as has the town. He said officials of the firm have met frequently with town officials and have been as worried as anyone else about the situation.

It was noted, however, that the company can not force its employees to park in the lots provided for their cars. Advantageous places within the lots have been reserved for those who use a car pool and other inducements have been tried, he explained.

## EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

### Legalize The Violations

Violations of the zoning by-law — some small, others large — continue to plague town officials.

For they are in muddle over how the by-law can be enforced.

It has been stated that official complaints will be considered, but that the town won't go looking for existing violations. On the other hand, new or prospective violations will be stomped on before they begin.

This is almost impossible to do. If one man conducts a business in a residential area, the next man — even if he's only starting up — wants to know why he is being picked on, and the other guy is allowed to continue.

The only answer one could give is that the older violation is allowed just because it exists — not by any right of law, nor by any specific decision of town boards.

We think it would be humanly impossible to go back and dig out all the violations, and force each businessman to give up his business or move it into a business zone. But allowing them to continue now only adds fuel to the fire, because each new business uses the existing ones as an excuse. Those persons who ask questions about a prospective business are told they can't violate the zoning by-law; those who just go ahead and ask no questions almost always continue in business even after their violation becomes known.

The only solution that appears half-way workable — if it is legal — is the adoption of an official date by town meeting, after which no further violations will be tolerated.

Such a statement of intent could, perhaps, recognize the presence of many violations by specifying that these become non-conforming uses, and may not be enlarged upon nor changed substantially. As each of these violations dies out, the business use of the property would be denied. Thus, gradually, the violations would decrease in number, while strict enforcement keeps others from cropping up.

In the long run, this might give us a practical way to get rid of the violations while not unfairly treating those already in business here.

### Community Carol Sing

The town's newest choral group — The Andover Community Chorus — presents its first local public concert Sunday evening at the High School, in what may become a traditional Christmas program.

The group will offer a variety of Christmas music, and end the program with a community Carol Sing.

The members of the Chorus have been working hard to develop this first annual program into an entertaining and worthwhile event.

And we suggest that wide public support of this latest community effort will be appreciated by the Chorus, and of considerable musical benefit to the residents of the town.

### Who Wants It?

Last week's special town meeting in Methuen, where the representative form of town meeting has been in use for some years, seems to prove the wisdom of keeping our open meeting.

Elected town meeting members in Methuen, over 100 strong, did not attend the session, which took up an appropriation of nearly two million dollars for a new school.

It seems to us that we do not want that sort of system here; voter apathy in Andover is bad enough when it comes to town meeting attendance. It seems that the type exhibited under an elective system is even worse for the community.

### Broader Tax Base

The annual adjustment of the teachers' salary schedule appears inevitable to most members of the School Committee.

Comments made at the various meetings indicate that the procedure will go on each year, regardless of how permanent the members wish the schedule might be.

Competition with other systems is one factor; others include the meddling of the state legislature in establishing minimums and requests for increases by the local teachers, to meet costs of living.

From past experience, it appears that the statement is quite correct — there will be annual changes in the schedule. And unless the country faces another serious depression of the variety experienced in the thirties, the

salaries will not be revised downward.

It appears that the current schedule makes sense; the Committee has come up with plans and policies that seem practical.

And we mention the possibility of further increases a year hence only to highlight the need in this community for additional sources of money. Probably the town, as it stands, couldn't afford further increases on a yearly basis, but certainly the town should seek industrial and commercial tax dollars, which help mightily in meeting the increased expenditures.

We hope that more and more townspeople will see this need, and make it apparent that they want sensible industrial growth.

## Toys For Tots Campaign Going

Each year about this time, Marine Corps Reserve units throughout the country undertake to help make Christmas a little brighter for underprivileged children.

This undertaking, nationally known by now, is the Marines' "Toys for Tots" campaign. Toys are solicited from anyone who cares enough to share his happiness. Toys collected in the campaign are presented to charitable organizations for distribution to youngsters who might not be fortunate enough to enjoy the pleasures that most children experience on Christmas Day.

Captain John J. Corbett, 670 Pearl st., Reading, commanding officer of the local Marine Corps Reserve unit, supplied the following information concerning "Toys for Tots":

The program, now in its ninth year, is conducted by each Marine Corps Reserve unit as a community project. All toys collected will be distributed within the community. The Third Ordnance Field Maintenance Company is collecting toys from the Greater Lawrence, Lowell, and Haverhill areas, and will donate the toys to the Catholic Charities and Salvation Army in those areas. The charities will make further distribution to needy youngsters.

The drive for toys will run until Dec. 20. Those wishing to bring some happiness to an unfortunate child in this community may do so by stopping by a station in the area and donating a toy or two.

Because of limited repair facilities available, toys contributed to the program should be new or in

youngsters be creative, but see that they follow these two basic rules suggested by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service: (1) Keep the centerpiece low enough so the guests can see over it, and (2) Make it in proportion to size of the table.

An easy yet attractive centerpiece may be made by rolling a piece of colored paper into a cornucopia. Decorate this with a ribbon, bits of sparkling glitter and perhaps a sprig of holly. Then fill it to over-flowing with pieces of fir, pine, spruce, or arborvitae.

Another easy-to-make centerpiece requires only a flat square of plastic foam, a candle and some evergreen branches. Use the plastic foam as a candle holder. Force the candle into the center of the block, then push the ends of evergreen branches into the sides. Keep adding greens to the sides and top of the foam until it is completely covered. Add red berries for a finishing touch.

A simple door piece may be made by wiring two-foot boughs of evergreen together at one end and adding a cluster of cones and a huge red bow. The cones may be painted silver, gold, or various colors for added decoration.

To make a wreath, fasten small clumps of evergreen together with soft fine florist's wire. Bend a wire coat hanger into a circle and, starting at the hook, wire the clumps of greens to the hanger.

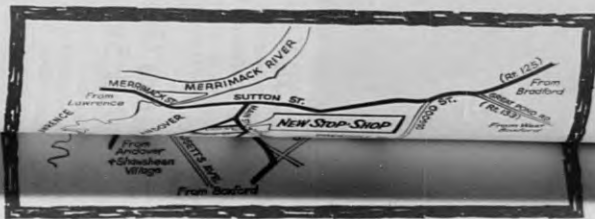

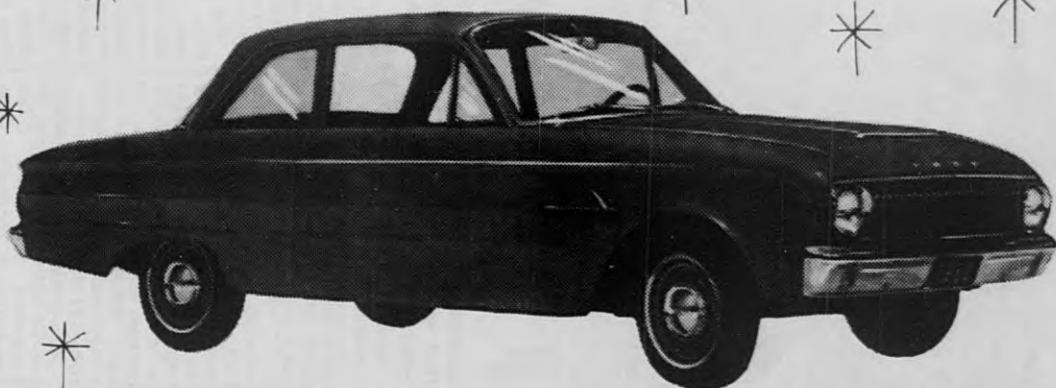

Candidates have roughly another month to make known their intentions.

The last date for filing nomination papers with the Board of Registrars is Jan. 29, at 5 p.m. That Board then has a week to certify that 92 valid signatures have been filed, before turning the list over to the town clerk.

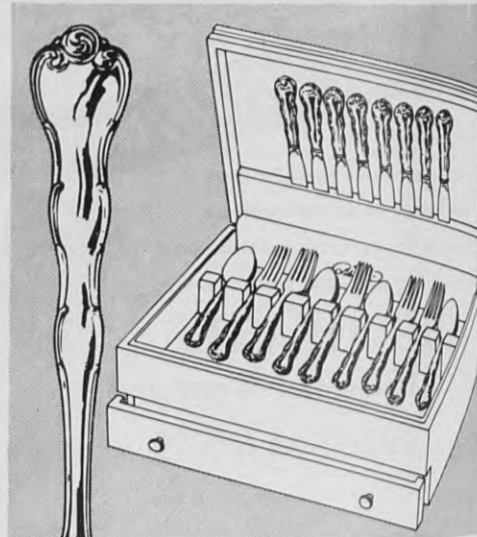

Martin Luther has been called the "father of evangelical hymnody." It was through the efforts of this great man that the lost art of congregational singing was restored, and the Christian hymn again was given a place in public worship. This militant man who wrote "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" was also the tender man who wrote "Away in a Manger."
