Fire Chief Urges Residents To Dig Out Fire Hydrants

Put Off Creating Business Position

It will be at least a year before the position of business manager is created in the school department.

After Supt. Edward I. Erickson recommended against putting the position in the 1962 budget, the Committee agreed to give the matter further consideration for the following year.

It had been suggested by members of the Committee that the superintendent could be relieved of some business administration details, by filling the job of business manager.

Fire Chief Henry L. Hilton has appealed to all residents for help in clearing snow away from fire hydrants.

With town highway and water department crews busy with snow clearance, Chief Hilton has urged residents to take a hand in making hydrants easily accessible, in case of fire nearby.

Telephone poles with a yellow band painted on them indicate the presence of a hydrant. If a yellow dot is painted above the band, it means the hydrant is on the opposite side of the street. And the position of the dot below the band indicates the hydrant is on the same side of the street.

Chief Hilton explained that the location of the dot on the pole shows the direction the hydrant can be found. A number painted on the pole actually provides the reader with the number of ordinary paces it is to the hydrant, from the pole. In the case of hydrants across the street, paces should be counted from a spot directly across from

Winter is taking its toll, in machines, men and money, this week, even as the forecasters talk about another sizeable storm headed this way.

Worn-out town employees continued to clear away last weekend's accumulation of snow this week, working with the knowledge that they may just get the snow moved when another storm arrives.

All highway department men, plus those from the tree and water departments, have been working a huge number of hours since last Saturday night. Many didn't get home to spend time with their families Christmas Day.

Town equipment, although generally standing up fairly well, has shown the wear and tear resulting from abnormal use during the two heavy storms.

Additionally, the snow loader was under repair before the storms, and has not been available for service. The big Gradall loading trucks in the Square was pressed into service as a substitute for the town-owned equipment.

Pay Plan Goes Into Effect

told the Selectmen Tuesday night that the unit costs \$175 daily - but this, he said, is perhaps no more costly than is using town equipment and men.

When the big snow loader is used, four or five men, plus one sidewalk plow, must work with it. The Gradall requires the services of one man only. It works more swiftly than the town equipment too - Mr. Duff said extra trucks are used to keep up to the Gradall while only the town trucks are needed when the loader is in use.

Duff estimated that well over \$4,500 will be needed to pay the bills for the storm - the money will be requested from the emergency fund. Similarly, the season's first snow storm some days ago cost the town about \$4,500 - and about half of this amount came from the emergency fund, with approval of the Finance Committee.

The weekend's storms - one Saturday night and the other Sunday night - certainly spoiled Christmas for the men manning plows and removal equipment.

Many worked through the night Saturday, well into Sunday, then had to return Sunday night and continue throughout Monday.

About 21 inches of snow fell during the storms, according to Highway Supt. Stanley Chlebowski.

He said there had been no more than the normal repairs to be made during the storm, despite the strain the equipment was under from continuous use.

The Selectmen Tuesday night praised Chlebowski and his men for their efforts, on motion of Selectman Philip K. Allen. He, and Selectman James D. Wilson, commented on the other communities through which they drove Tuesday as compared to Andover's condition.

Jan. 31, precinct three, Sacred Heart School on Balmoral st., 7-9 p.m.

Feb. 2, precinct four, Grange Hall, West Parish, 7-9 p.m.

Feb. 7, precinct five, fire station in Ballardvale, 7-9 p.m.

Feb. 9, precinct six, Peabody House, Phillips st., 7-9 p.m.

Feb. 13, precinct two, town hall, noon to 10 p.m.

Registrations are always acceptable at the town clerk's office during normal working hours.

Monday, March 5, is the election, with voting going on from 7-7.

Town meeting is at 9:30 a.m. March 10.





EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Top Priority In 1962

We're often astonished to see comparative figures on budgets - those of 10 years ago, as compared to the present estimates.

It's amazing to see how costs have risen - five or six-fold in the decade. And there's no reason to believe that the increases won't be as sharp in the 10 years to come.

The variety of services required by the townspeople, the increased cost of every item purchased or of labor hired, means that we will see sharp increases each year. It's as unavoidable, as the saying goes, "as death and taxes".

In order to meet these jumps in expenditures, the real estate taxpayers can expect to pay higher rates, year after year. Here, and in most communities in the state, there will be no decrease in the total dollars we have to pay into the town coffers.

But what is needed - and we should make this a number one New Year's resolution - is a broadened tax base. The town must seek industrial and commercial growth, so that the homeowners will get some relief from the burdens now imposed on them. There is a limit beyond which the homeowners can not go in paying for the costs of government - we may be getting nearer to this level than most people care to admit.

Let's make industrial development our highest priority item in the year 1962.

Fairest Presentation

It's budget time again, and politics, too, will be a major topic of conversation.

And naturally we'll be reporting on both subjects as fully as possible.

There's no telling yet what will happen in the latter category.

But in the budgetary field, we can indicate at least a timetable of events.

The Selectmen will be considering the departmental budgets during the coming weeks, as will the Finance Committee. The figures, until considered by these two groups of men, remain tentative. It has thus been our custom to await the report of the Finance Committee before presenting the budget figures that will be considered at town meeting.

If the tentative figures are offered in great detail prior to that time, confusion inevitably develops over which of the published figures is the final one. Impressions are created that can never be entirely overcome. Although this leaves a large piece of the town's business to the last minute - the report is seldom ready very long before town meeting - we feel that this presentation is the fairest, in that the figures are the final, accurate ones, which will be presented for action by the voters.

Sell Andover

As the old year bows out, and the spanking - new 1962 begins, it is time to examine the old, and figure out which of our activities can better be performed in the new year.

All of us personally can do this, privately.

And the town, as an integral unit, should collectively examine itself and find out what can be done better during the next 12 months.

We suggest that the townspeople, as a whole, might spend a few minutes considering the operation of the town government, then think of how they can offer constructive assistance in maintaining the municipal structure as an efficient governing body.

Can we, as individuals and collectively, be less critical, for instance? Can we put our problems into proper perspective, so only the important things become issues, and the smaller items are treated as such? There have been times this past year when the trifles took on great importance, while larger issues have been slighted. Many persons have taken to calling the government for help, and then persisting in the request, long past the point of reason. Can we improve this situation, by thinking, before we insist on municipal assistance to settle small problems that should not be the concern of the town?

Most important, we think, would be the effort by all of the townspeople to sell Andover. Whenever we talk about the town to others, let's talk about the good qualities, the likeable things. Let's make the year one of good feeling; with a truly cooperative spirit.

25 Years Ago - December, 1936

The Stoneham driver involved in the triple fatality in Ballardvale last month has been held in bonds of \$3,500 for appearance before the Grand Jury. Three of some 20 men aboard a truck were killed when the vehicle was hit by a train at the crossing.

The total town budget over which the Selectmen have control is \$6,000 less than a year ago, despite the fact that the pay cuts of a few years ago have been restored. The total for the budget is \$214,894.73. The Board of Public Works has not yet prepared and submitted its figures for the new year.

A large number of local employees are registering for their social security cards at the Post Office.

Mrs. Feronia R. Carpenter is the town's oldest resident, at the age of 95.

Postal receipts in the first 11 months of the year grew by 10 percent over the comparable period a year ago. Postmaster John McDonald reported the figures for this year as being \$47,924.

Tom Qualters has been picked as personal bodyguard for President Roosevelt. He left the Andover state police barracks Sunday for his new assignment, following a get-together of his many friends here.

10 Years Ago - December, 1951

All existing records were broken at the Post Office during the Christmas rush. Some 451,070 pieces of mail were put through the cancelling machine between Dec. 1 and Dec. 22 - about 20,000 more

than a year ago.

Toll charges were eliminated between Lawrence and Andover Christmas day, and about double the usual number of calls were recorded.

Outstanding happenings of the old year include breaking ground for the new schools, elimination of the telephone tolls between Andover and Lawrence, origination of the Board of Trade, pay raises for town employees, and the higher enrollment in the public schools.

The Playstead skating area will be closed for the time being, because large trucks are using the area in connection with building the new school.

A slight fire at the Town Printing office on Park st. caused indirect damage to two other establishments, Irma Beene's and the First National. A sprinkler let go, when the small fire started, and thoroughly drenched the shops below the printing firm. The fire department even borrowed extra covers from the Lawrence department, hoping to get as much merchandise as possible protected from the water.





Army Ready To Warn Of Fallout

Today we live in disturbing times. Because of this the First U.S. Army Chemical Section stands ready to give fallout predictions should it ever become necessary.

A quiet and little known, but most important activity within the First Army Headquarters is the Radiological Center located in Radiological Division of the Chemical Section.

This division is under the direction of Major Eugene E. Monk, 41, of Roswell, New Mexico, a graduate of the Nuclear Engineering Course at the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey, Cal. The staff of its Radiological Center plot weather conditions and wind directions daily to provide at a moment's notice to the First U.S. Army Commander, the First Region U.S. Army Air Defense Commander at Fort Totten, N. Y., and the New York State Civil Defense authorities, accurate fallout predictions in the event of a nuclear attack at any point within the First U.S. Army area.

When notified of the explosion of a nuclear weapon at any point within the northeastern United States, First Army's Radiological Center personnel will take one look at the wind patterns plotted on their Fallout Prediction Map and be able to tell accurately which area will receive the weapon's fallout.

For example, if a detonation of megaton size should occur in Albany, N. Y., on a given day with the winds from the west, fallout could be expected over the Fort Devens-Boston complex in eastern Massachusetts. Immediately the Rad Center would notify Civil Defense and post commanders throughout the area. At the same time all posts within First Army area would bring their fallout maps up to date. Later this section will provide information as it comes down.

In this quiet room, broken only by the ceaseless chatter of the two teletype machines, Major Monk's staff handles the drawing board, machines and background counter which takes daily count of the natural radiation in the metropolitan New York area.

Well trained and highly competent in their mission, which could spell survival for many, are: Private First Class Marilyn J. Brown, 19, of Brazil, Indiana; Master Sergeant Albert Pough Jr., 34, of Detroit, Mich. and Sergeant First Class Clarence Hungerford, 38, of Bridgeport, Conn.

Private Brown serves as a clerk-typist and teletype operator. She receives all the incoming weather data from the U.S. Weather Bureau and, later, after all the wind patterns have been marked on the map, relays the information by teletype to the First Region U.S. Army Air Defense Command and to the New York State Civil Defense authorities.

Digesting the Weather Bureau data and plotting the direction of the day's winds are two combat veterans: Sergeant Pough and Sergeant Hungerford. Pough, a paratrooper and veteran of 10 battles in Korea, makes the over-

Assisting him is Sergeant Hungerford, a veteran of the invasion at Anzio, Italy, and four other campaigns before being wounded near Mount Belvedere, Italy. He also fought in Korea.

Another of their daily tasks is the operation of a radiation scaler. This background counter provides the daily count of natural radiation in the New York area. This information is then indicated on the radiological Background Count Chart located above the machine.

In addition to the Prediction Map, there is a Fallout Situation Map of the whole northeastern area of the United States. Here, in the event of a nuclear explosion, the progress of the actual fallout will be indicated as reports come in so that Colonel Evan H. Lewis, 49, of Seymour, Indiana, First U.S. Army Chemical Officer, will be in a position to keep the Army Commander, the Army Air Defense Commander, and the Civil Defense authorities accurately informed of the danger area.

Under Colonel Lewis's direction are eight biological and radiological teams located at various points within First Army area. Each consists of approximately

They are being trained to be dispatched by local installation commanders to fallout areas to make radiological surveys, assist the Medics and help with decontamination. It will be their job to determine how dangerous a particular area is - when it will be safe for military or civil defense personnel to go in for rescue operations and the degree of radioactivity of casualties. The information which they will gather will be sent immediately to the First Army Chemical Section and to the immediate area commander to provide facts upon which to base decisions.

The First Army Chemical Section is on the job and ready to meet the challenge of a nuclear fallout in northeastern United States and as First Army's "eye on the sky" is an important cog in the overall defense of the nation.



Duff Sees Foresees

Budget Under Sharp Scrutiny

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff is working with sharpened pencils now that the year 1962 has come. In an effort to get the municipal budget ready for the even-sharper pencils of the Finance Committee. Although specific data on departmental budgets is not in final form, it already has been estimated by the manager that approximately 22 rate increase may be forthcoming - all dependent on what the voters do at town meeting, of course.

In working on the budget, Duff will be considering a request for a 10 percent wage increase from the Town Employees' Association along with several other benefits the group voted to request. These include increased sick leave from 60 to 120 days, three weeks vacation after 10 years, reduction of the fire department work week from 56 to 48 hours, a longevity
