## \$1,600,000 Budget Adopted For Schools

**PAPERS MUST BE FILED BY 5 P.M. JAN. 29**

To clear up any misunderstanding, all candidates for public office must file their nomination papers at the town clerk's office by 5 p.m. Jan. 29.

The papers filed by that time go to the Board of Registrars for certification of signatures. The Registrars must then file the papers with the town clerk by 4:30 p.m. Feb. 5.

The School Committee has adopted a 1962 budget of \$1,613,460 - greater than last year by \$151,174.

The bulk of this increase comes in salaries - boosted by \$128,000. Increases in the department's expenses amount to \$23,000 over the appropriations of a year ago.

Although the town will appropriate the total budget, the School Committee has emphasized that \$210,671.19 will be returned to the town by the state. The money goes into the free cash account when it is received, and is not applicable to the school department budget directly.

Normal increments, plus the new salary schedule adopted by the Committee in recent weeks, accounts for most of the increase in

The Selectmen are preparing to recommend many street acceptances to the town meeting for favorable action.

The streets, all of which are old, familiar ways in the town, have never been properly acted upon at a town meeting. But they have been in use for many years - some for over half a century - and have been maintained by the town.

By vote of the Board, Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien is drawing up an article, naming the streets and describing them by width and length, and location.

By voting to accept the streets, the voters will be clearing the way

**Operation Skyhook Is Underway At Jr. High**

It's full speed ahead at Andover Junior High School on project "Skyhook". This is the joint effort by members of the eighth and ninth grade science students to raise a gas filled balloon to study changes in

air pressure, radiation, and temperature in the upper atmosphere. Students are divided into a number of groups, each one seeking to overcome a particular problem associated with the project.

Teams are engaged in such phases as attaching a meteorology unit (weather instruments), a radio transmitter for tracking the balloon, a biology unit for study of altitude on living specimens and radio recording instruments. A unique phase of project "Skyhook", under the direction of Robert Bachmann, will be the tracking of the progress of the balloon through the atmosphere by radio and telescopic equipment.

The individual teams of students will meet weekly and conduct their individual research phases to completion. Then, at some later date, the various teams will put forth their joint efforts to raise the instrument-laden balloon into the sky.

This effort on the part of the student body will serve to emphasize the value of cooperative effort in science while increasing basic research skills.

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**Show Down On Rogers Brook**

Rogers Brook is headed for show-down at town meeting.

The voters will get a chance to decide whether to appropriate about \$200,000 for the section from the river to Main st., or whether to rescind their former action and forget the job for a while.

The alternatives will be presented in special articles, according to a vote of the Selectmen.

It presently is estimated that one section of the brook, from the river to Main st., will cost \$367,750. Based on the promise that the state will pay half this amount, the Selectmen decided to ask the voters for a new appropriation covering the town's half, plus a little more for contingencies. An allowance must also be made for the cost of easements.

The Board seemed agreed that it will recommend doing the section of the project, with the understanding that additional sections must be done in the next few years - either by the town alone or in partnership with the state.

However, a majority of the Board also agreed that if the voters don't want to do this, they should have available the opportunity to rescind the \$195,000 appropriated in other years. This still is listed on the town's bonded indebtedness, although the money has not been spent.

The section of the brook under consideration must be done first according to the engineers. Although the state's consulting engineers estimated the cost at \$250,000, Camp, Dresser and McKee have estimated the cost at the greater amount. It is also estimated that the next section will cost at least \$262,500 - although this is the estimate by the state and might be higher, based on the increases in costs for the first section.

**Special Program Coming At P.A.**

Beginning in the summer of 1962 Phillips Academy will participate in a program of Chinese Language, History, and Culture offered by the Institute of Asian Studies for Preparatory Students. The Institute, made possible by a grant from the Carnegie Corporation of New York, Thayer Academy, Braintree, is an educational and is open to students in the Merrimac Valley area. Applications are restricted to students who will have completed their third or Junior year of high school in June of this year.

The program is divided into two sessions: Session I - from June 18 to Aug. 24, 1962 - will be held at Thayer Academy; Session II from September, 1962, to June 1963 - will be held at Phillips Academy.

Session I will offer an intensive 10-week course in language and cultural studies; Session II, lasting for approximately 30 weeks, will offer two late afternoon meetings a week of continued language study. Tuition for both sessions is \$200. Board and Room for those unable to commute to Thayer Academy is \$700.

Applicants who believe themselves qualified, but find the cost prohibitive are encouraged to apply, as the Institute offers a number of scholarships to both day and boarding students.

Students who successfully complete both sessions of the program will be qualified to do advanced work in the field of Chinese studies in their freshman year of college. Applicants must be able to provide evidence of outstanding performance in language study, or of linguistic aptitude.

that area. Broken down, the salary picture looks like this:

Administration - \$53,236, including 12 full-time and three part-time secretaries, an attendance officer and two administrators.  
 Teachers - \$1,099,636, including principals, department heads, directors, counselors, merit and special education.

Substitutes - \$8,500; homebound instructors - \$1,500; noon-hour supervisors - \$9,812.

Custodians' salaries are listed at \$102,935, while overtime and substitutes account for another \$1,500.

Salaries of nurses will be \$12,940; salaries in the athletic department, \$2,100.

**Department Costs**  
 Looking at other department costs:

General expenses, \$8,000; text books and supplies, \$50,000; plant operation and maintenance, \$129,500; auxiliary agencies, such as libraries, health, transportation and tuitions, \$87,046; athletics and physical education, \$17,900.

A new item, legal fees, has been set at \$3,500, the reported minimum estimate furnished the Committee by Town Counselor Fredric S. O'Brien for the Dimick case.

Insurance, Blue Cross and Blue Shield, \$15,000; summer school \$7,500; evening practical arts \$2,855.

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**Late Bus Schedule**

Transportation, one of the larger items faced by the Committee, stands at \$76,196.

Included, however, is the sum of \$576 for a late bus, to serve the High School and Junior High two days a week from Oct. 1 to Dec. 21.

The late bus will provide students with a chance to do their extra-curricular activities after school, and results in extending each of the six class periods by five minutes - or a total of 30 minutes on each of the two days the schedule will operate.

Supt. Edward I. Erickson reported that the faculty committee studying this problem recommended starting at two days weekly, to see how the late bus schedule worked out. Installation of the schedule throughout the week could mean extending the academic time in school, without changing the hours of the school day, it has been explained.

**Income From State**  
 Looking back at the estimated income from the state, the Committee found that the breakdown was:

State aid, general fund, \$136,-877.14; transportation, \$41,605.27; special class reimbursement, \$11,909.58.

National Defense Education act, science, \$3,804.37 and for testing and guidance, \$354.60.

Vocational School reimbursement, for evening practical arts and the trade and industrial schools, \$2,330.67; two elementary tuitions, \$660.75; summer school, \$7,500; tuition for 13 state wards in elementary school, \$3,128.81; rentals, \$1,755; shop supplies and miscellaneous, \$654.20.

**Legal Fees Set**  
 The newest category - legal fees - included in this year's budget will cover the expenses of Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien in handling the Dimlich court case.

Supt. Erickson reported to the Committee that Mr. O'Brien estimated a minimum cost of \$3,500 for both the Superior and Supreme Court cases. Bills from Mr. O'Brien for the Superior Court work already accomplished have not been submitted for the year of 1961, it was noted.

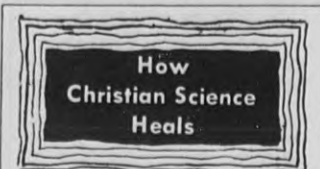

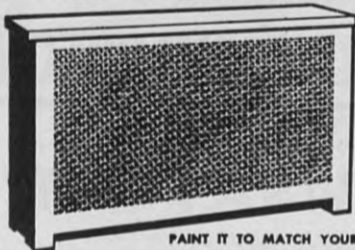

In other action, however, the Selectmen did not take action on

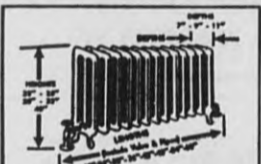

established for the purpose, as headed by Selectman William Stewart.

Members searched out old records and talked with old residents, to determine whether the streets have actually been used in the general public. Mr. O'Brien explained that if the general public not just the property owners as delivery men, had used the road for 50 years or more, it became dedicated to public use under the statutes.

The advantage of having the streets accepted, he said, is to place something in the record now, which will be there whenever the status of a street is questioned. He explained that there had been studies along the same lines twice in the late 1800's, and that it had been done again early in the 1900's.

The town, a few years ago, asked the Legislature to give its permission for the acceptance of some streets. But Mr. O'Brien said that referred to streets that had been improperly accepted by town meetings between certain dates, and does not apply to the streets listed now.

**Fire Chief Issues Report**

afterdark accidents resulting from too-tired operators.

In still another move, Ricciardi, has obtained the cooperation of the New England Tel. and Tel. Co. to build "test" pay phone booths as an experiment so drivers needing assistance in isolated areas might reach communications more handily.

The canopied "booth-type" signs were designed by DPW artist Gene DiRado and will contain a "blow-up" of the state and connecting highway systems, together with other important information for the convenience of motorists.

"It is my thinking that we can get a lot more use out of these roadside rest areas," Ricciardi said. "In addition to the signs, we should provide lighting because many drivers are afraid to pull into the dark areas at night and that is the time when they are most needed."

"This is a beginning. We have plans under study for marking such

rest areas on state maps, if that is feasible. We are also considering them as a site for distress signals.

"We do not plan to go overboard in spending money unnecessarily in this project, but utilizing the talent, materials and manpower we have right within the Department, we can make some big improvements," the DPW head added.

Mr. Dodd has stressed that as the National Foundation pushes forward in this field, the picture today is somewhat like that of polio 20 years ago. He states at present there is no actual knowledge as to the cause or preventions, or cures, of birth defects or arthritis, nor are there enough proper facilities or information for diagnosis or treatment of these patients.

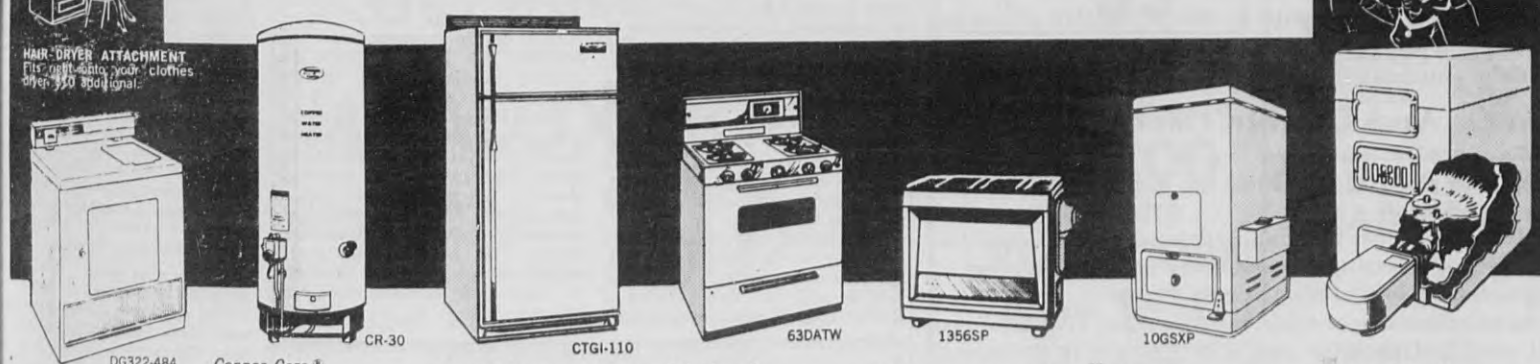

## EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

### When The Chips Are Down

As this editorial is being written, necessarily some days before publication, there are no candidates for the School Committee other than the two incumbents.

It is hard to believe that those persons in our town who have been so critical of the Committee will now ignore their responsibility to present candidates for the office.

We can all recall the strident debates of the past 18 months or longer, and the many harsh comments heard about actions of the Committee. Most of us took for granted the idea that, come election, those who disagree with the Committee would support two candidates whose views they prefer.

By doing so, the voters would be provided with a clear-cut choice. They could support the incumbents, and thereby their policies, or they could reject the incumbents and thus refute their actions as Committee members.

We are not taking an editorial position for, or against, the two candidates for re-election. Rather, it seems to us that the voters will be deprived of their rights as voters if they are not given a chance to make a judgment at this election.

If the incumbents are unopposed, then they and many others are justified in thinking that their policy decisions have been approved by the citizens nearly unanimously. Yet we know that the criticism of the Committee has come from many areas of town and thus indicates considerable discontent.

Those who disapprove of the decisions made by the Committee have the responsibility to come forward and support candidates of similar thought.

Then, and only then, can the voters arrive at a sensible decision.

And unless we can get such an endorsement or rejection of the Committee's policies, we'll be in for another year of bickering, another 12 months of criticism without responsibility.

This we do not believe is in the best interests of the town.

### Old-fashioned Town Meeting

The experiment planned this year for town meeting — an all-day affair with luncheon in the cafeteria — should be interesting indeed.

It is planned now to have the meeting continue throughout the day — allowing voters to leave the auditorium for their lunch over a period of time. There will be no adjournment, as it is now scheduled, but routine items will be taken up so that voters will not have to miss the more vital articles.

If this plan works, by bringing a larger crowd to town meeting, it will have been worth the considerable effort expended by members of the cafeteria staff, who will cater the luncheon. For it is vital to draw a sizeable percentage of the voters to the meeting.

We're enthusiastic about the possibilities.

### Check And Double Check

We heartily endorse School Committeeman John Sullivan's proposal concerning the recreation area behind the High School:

He believes that the town manager, Finance Committee and School Committee should share the responsibility of approving the plans before money is spent.

In an editorial last week, the Townsman suggested that all municipal agencies should be involved in the recreation plans, to avoid costly duplication of facilities and effort at a later date. The expenditure of an estimated \$200,000 at the High School, over a period of a few years, should provide as much public recreation, in addition to the school requirements, as is possible.

Mr. Sullivan suggests that the other interested town boards and officers be required, by vote of town meeting, to put their stamp of approval on the plans first.

Thus, he states, the town meeting can act in March on the first step of the plan, with the knowledge that agreement on the plan must be reached. If this is not done, and further study is suggested, another year could go by before starting on the project.

Providing the amendment is made and accepted at town meeting, it seems logical to act favorably on the School Committee's request for funds for the rough grading and drainage.

Arthur T. Boutwell was elected clerk, Frederic S. Boutwell, treasurer and Frank H. Hardy, auditor, at the annual meeting of the West Parish Church held Wednesday.

Albert W. Lowe has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election next March. He has been a member of the School Committee.

#### 25 Years Ago — January, 1937

The lot at the corner of Lowell and North Main sts., so long the subject of controversy and zoning disputes, is destined to become a public park. Members of the family of William M. Wood state that they have acquired the lot and will deed it to the town for perpetual use as a park, in Mr. Wood's memory. The lot has been the subject of a legal dispute that went to the state Supreme Court, and resulted indirectly in adoption of the town's zoning by-laws.

Vital statistics for last year indicate that Andover is slipping. The number of deaths recorded exceeded the births.

Mrs. Charlotte F. Carter has been installed as worthy grand matron, Order of the Eastern Star.

#### 10 Years Ago — January, 1952

The year just ended was a banner one for building, with all previous records exceeded. The value of new construction has been placed at \$2,982,276, somewhat greater than the previous record year of 1950.

The Selectmen have agreed to a proposal from the school cafeteria personnel to cater the luncheon in the school cafeteria.

Some 300 persons can be seated at one time in the room, and the meal will continue from 11 a.m. through 2 p.m., so that all of those at the session can eat.

The meeting will start at 9:30 a.m.

The Selectmen also have agreed that any deficit will be made up by the town, so that the cafeteria employees will not be responsible if there are too few lunch-minded voters.

The noon-time meal was arranged as a method of attracting more voters to the meeting, and to get the warrant finished in one day. It is planned to continue the action through the noon hour, allowing voters to go down stairs to the cafeteria as they wish, rather than voting to adjourn, even for a brief period of time.

### Dimlich Case To Come Up In Spring

The School Committee's appeal to the state Supreme Court, to reverse the lower court's finding in the Benjamin Dimlich case, probably won't be heard until some time this spring.

Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien, who has acted for the School Committee in the matter, explained that the record of the Superior Court trial is just now being studied by the Superior Court justice who sat on the case. He has the right to delete any portion of the record he wishes, before it is printed for reference to the higher court.

This will be accomplished within the next three weeks or so, according to Atty. O'Brien, and then the final documents will be sent to the printer.

In brief, the Superior Court justice found that Mr. Dimlich had

The only politically-hot item concerns the probability that the voters will once again decide on fluoridation of the water supply. Gerald Silverman, president of the Jaycees, said he believes action will come soon on the organization's legislative request to have the question printed on the town ballot. A hearing probably will be held in a week or so, he explained, followed by action in the Legisla-

ture. He anticipates passage of the bill and a subsequent campaign to get fluoridation approved again.

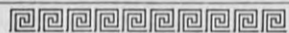
The absence of interest in the election, and the lack of candidates, have been more of a conversation item in recent days than have the names of any potential candidates for the five positions to be voted upon.

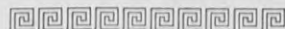

### Corruption Tax Repeal Urged

"The most powerful ally of corruption is apathy," Elliot Richardson, former United States Attorney for the District of Massachusetts, told the Andover Taxpayers' Association at Central School Tuesday evening.

"Where apathy exists," stated, "a political power vacuum also exists. This vacuum has to be filled in some way and if decent citizens do not do the job, it will be done by political opportunists who are always ready to exploit political power for their own advantage."
