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Town Report Itemizes "Secret" Renewal Cost

May Review Brook Plans

The Selectmen may get a chance to approve the Rogers Brook plans, for the first section of the reconstruction work, at their meeting next Monday night.

Town officials visited with Rodolphe Bissette, director of the State Division of Waterways, Monday, and received assurances that the plans will be reviewed - and if no changes are to be made, they will be sent here for local acceptance.

Mr. Bissette it is reported, assured the officials that the Division has money to pay its 50 percent share of the cost of this project, from the river to Main st. (Continued on Page 18)

There has been no secrecy attached to any funds spent by or allocated to the Urban Renewal office here.

In fact, pages 77 and 78 of the town report, issued early in March, give detailed accounts of the work done and money spent to the end of 1961.

Urban Renewal Director Ernest N. Hall has stated this week that, as of the end of March, the total approved budget for Urban Renewal is \$89,002. Of this amount, \$64,166.67 has been spent.

Major expenditures have been for planning consultants, administration and appraisals. Work yet to be done includes a second disposition appraisal, Mr. Hall noted.

Gospel Chapel Will Be Built

The Methuen Gospel Chapel, a non-denominational, evangelical Church, has purchased two lots on Lowell st., and will construct a new building on the site.

The land abuts the Loosigian farm, and has Lowell st. frontage.

William C. Watson of Andover is president of the corporation involved in the purchase from John Phillip Enterprises. Clerk of the corporation is Robert A. Watters, also an Andover resident.

Mr. Watters announced the purchase, and explained that ground will be broken this year for the structure.

The Church has been located on Center st., Methuen, for 60 years, according to Mr. Watters, and is now being relocated, and presumably will undergo a change in name after the move is completed.

No Permit For Parking

Raytheon Co. will have to look elsewhere for its off-street parking.

The Board of Appeals has denied a petition by the Champy Construction Co. for permission to create off-street parking off Fleming ave., next to the Raytheon Co.

While citing the need for town boards to cooperate with the large firm in "any legal way", the Appeals Board decided that the Champy firm did not prove that a hardship would be created by denial of the application; the Board also found that a change in the zoning should be proposed, instead of a variance.

The land in question lies off Fleming ave. and is in the residential zone, next to an industrial zone. (Continued on Page 18)

The exhibition is retrospective in aspect and clearly shows Miss Dalton's development from her early representational work to her present abstract style. Among her early works are portraits of children, for which she is well known. Done in a smooth, careful manner, they show her ability to portray the essence of the child. In strong contrast we find her present work is done in a broad manner often using thick, impasto paint. Her religious paintings, done in this manner carry great force and meaning.

Miss Dalton is a graduate of the school of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. She received the Paige Traveling Fellowship and for two years studied in Europe where she

attended the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. She was also winner of the Richard Milton Gold Medal and award and received first prize in the Lawrence Centennial Exhibition.

Although this is Miss Dalton's first one-man show in the John-Esther Art Gallery, she has been included several times in group exhibitions. Miss Dalton has also exhibited at Whistler House, Boston Museum of Fine Arts, Boston Arts Festival, Addison Gallery of American Art, Jordan Marsh Exhibits, Margaret Brown Gallery, Copley Gallery, Portland Museum, Silvermine Guild of Artists, DeCordova Museum in Lincoln, Ogunquit and Woodstock Art Gallery.

Miss Dalton has been chairman of American Art week Exhibitions. She is a member of the National Art Education Association, Eastern Arts Association and The Museum School Alumni. She is listed in Who's Who in American Art, Who's Who in American Color Slides, Who's Who in the East and Who's Who of American Women.

For the past 18 years Miss Dalton has been a teacher in Andover High School where she has been director of their arts festival. Her students have won numerous awards in both Regional and National Scholastic Art Awards Exhibits.

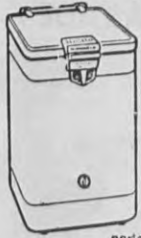

Unlike ordinary mobile radiotelephones, the new Cossor units incorporate analog computers. When the set is on 'receive' it continuously sorts the various noises heard on ordinary two-way radios and silences the speaker until it hears a valid broadcast from another fire station or firefighter. This eliminates the usual interference noises.

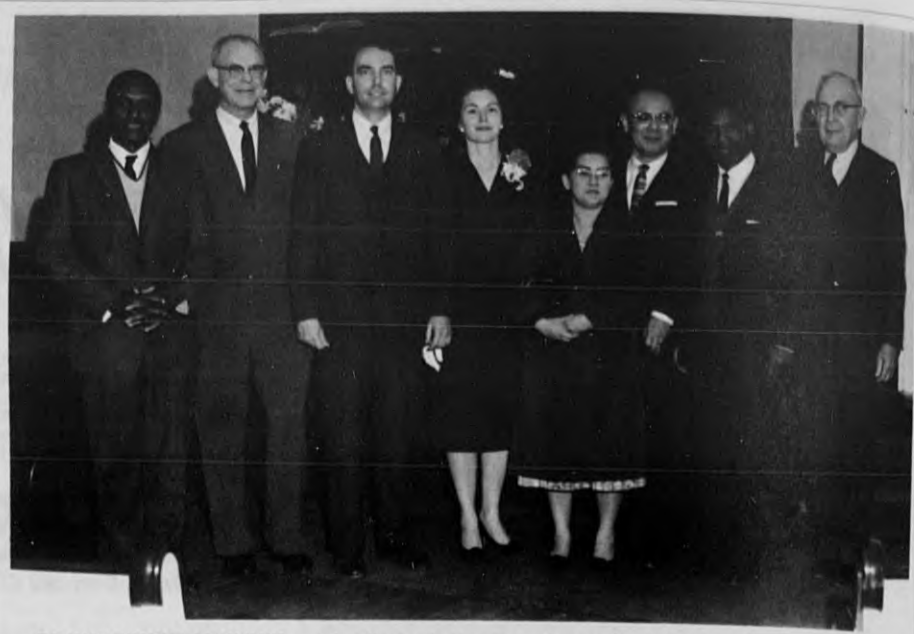

"secrecy" about the money to a missed telephone call - pointing out that one resident of the town called, asked a secretary for the information but did not receive it because she is not authorized to give out information. The lack of a second call by the individual, it is stated, resulted in charges that secrecy exists concerning the planning funds.

Posters appearing in many Main st. store windows the past few days refer to "secrecy" concerning the funds. They were distributed by Phideas G. Dantos, Frederick Flathers III and John Davidson, on their own volition. Mr. Davidson is quoted as stating that the trio believed this to be in the best interests of the community and as a matter of "common concern". The men have expressed concern that the Urban Renewal plans should be sent to New York and Washington for approval without first getting local scrutiny by residents.

Mr. Hall and other local agency officials have explained that plans must first have the approval of the federal authorities, or they cannot be acted upon by the town.

In other Urban Renewal developments, a panel discussion tonight, at a dinner meeting of the League of Women Voters, has taken on added significance.

The discussion - part of a two-year study by the League - had originally been just another in a series of fact-finding sessions by League members.

However, it is understood that at least 11 additional reservations have been made for the dinner at the Yankee Doodle restaurant, by persons wishing to ask questions of the panelists.

The League has also announced that a member of the Consumer's Co-Operative committee studying development plans for the area will be present and may be asked to throw some light on this activity. Panel members include Selectman Russell G. Doyle, Mr. Hall, Stanley Swanton and David McDonald Jr., Housing Authority chairman.

That agency, charged with the responsibility for Urban Renewal planning, has agreed to put its policy on various phases of the renewal activity on paper. It is understood that the agency will state its preference for local developers in the area; that it will state its plan to dispose of land via negotiations instead of bidding.

It is also known that the agency is studying a placement plan for stores in the area, which will create less confusion and concern among merchants than had been previously planned. Moving could be accomplished more readily this way, it is explained, without too much interference with daily business.

The first move would be temporary, allowing time for the demolition and reconstruction on the site of a modern store, into which the merchant would eventually move.

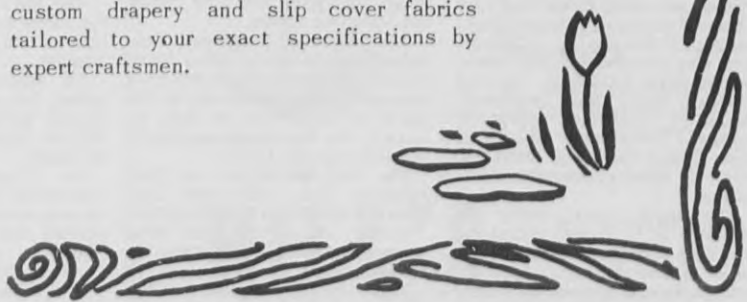

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Telephone Supplants Alarm

Most people may not realize it yet, but the audible fire alarm system is becoming a victim of progress, and may eventually be all-but displaced.

Not by more modern electronic equipment. But by that common household instrument, the telephone.

According to Fire Chief Henry L. Hilton, the number of outside alarms - via the red fire alarm boxes - could almost be counted on the fingers. Men and women alike drive right past the quickest means of calling help, to find a telephone.

Originally, of course, the outside alarm system was designed to get help for residents in outlying areas, where phones were far between. Sometimes the nearest farmer had a key to the box, and one had to summon the farmer to unlock it, before pulling the lever.

Now there are few homes without telephone service; still fewer think about using anything else, when calling for help. In one fire not long ago, a man ran right past the fire alarm box, scraped around in his pocket to find some change, and used an outdoor phone to call the department. Time was wasted, to be sure, but it appears that our minds are conditioned towards the telephone as a means of summoning aid - we don't even see those familiar red boxes on the poles.

That's one good reason why the chief isn't specially recommending additions to the old-time fire alarm service - unless the town wants to spend some money to up-date it considerably, and the public becomes aware that aid can swiftly be called, by just pulling the handle.

Be Ready To Quit

It appears that everything is "A Okay" with Rogers Brook - to use the parlance of the space age.

Apparently the state is merely awaiting some formal action by the Selectmen, in approving the plans, before calling for bids.

We hope the project continues to the satisfaction of all concerned.

But, again in the words of the spacemen, the town should keep its hand on the "abort" handle as long as possible, just in case.

Flexibility Is Key

A capital expenditures plan for the town will be an invaluable tool - one that should continue in use for a considerable time.

At the moment, professional consultants are being utilized in the preparation of such a plan, based on the original data supplied by department heads as to their needs for the next few years.

It is wise to have such a plan, and to follow it within reason. The only warning that should accompany any such document, however, is that flexibility must be retained, so that some sudden emergency will not be by-passed because of a rigid, unbending acceptance of the plan.

Constant up-dating, after receipt of the original, will help to avoid such a situation.

CAPITOL COMMENT

About the time that cherry blossoms appear around Washington's Tidal Basin each year, legislative action usually bogs down. A massive attack of spring fever sweeps the Nation's Capitol.

Not so Spring, 1962. Predictions that this 87th Congress will be adjourned by Aug. 1 could be realized.

Here's what the House has accomplished thus far, some good, some bad; some with my enthusiastic support, some over my vigorous opposition:

National Defense: Authorized \$13 billion for procurement of missiles, naval vessels and aircraft, including \$491 million for the RS-70; reorganized security and loyalty functions of the State Department; authorized the Postmaster General to notify recipients of Communist propaganda of the nature of such mail.

International Affairs: Extended and expanded the Peace Corps, authorizing \$63.7 million for fiscal year 1963; continued U. S. aid to persons seeking asylum from persecution in Cuba.

National Economy: Passed the Administration's controversial tax bill; raised the national debt limit from \$298 to \$300 billion; increased postal rates; authorized a \$435 million, 3-year program of training of unemployed in vocational schools or on-the-job retraining, to develop new skills, the first two years' cost to be paid by the Federal government, the third year on a matching basis with the states; authorized the Attorney General to compel the production of documents required as evidence in civil anti-trust investigations.

Health and Welfare: Provided grants to states which establish work programs for the jobless; extended for five years payments to families of unemployed fathers; increased the ceiling on Federal matching grants for the aged, blind and disabled; increased grants for child welfare; authorized a 5-year program of loans to colleges and universities; authorized Federal

Veterans: Increased pensions for service-connected disability.

Appropriations: Approved a supplemental appropriation of \$55 million; a Treasury appropriation of \$952 million; Post Office, \$4.4 billion; Executive Office of the President, \$12 million; Interior, \$868 million; Health, Education and Welfare, \$4.8 billion; Labor, \$264 million.

Meanwhile, House committees are meeting long hours daily, readying more legislation for report to the floor.

specifications, after recalling that this recent statement about possibly serving only part of the town had brought a deluge of telephone calls.

In connection with partial collection, the Town Employees Association has gone on record against this idea, stating that the implied promise was that all residents would have the service if they desire it.

In another phase of the town's problem with refuse and garbage, Mr. Duff said the lower end of the dump is being prepared for the sanitary land fill operation, and that specifications are being written for the big "dozer," which will be used to cover and pack the materials. Under present planning, garbage will not be dumped there, but will be carried out of town.

The land fill operation, Mr. Duff explained, will have no effect on the dump hours - the equipment operator will schedule his hours so that the materials can be covered each night. Mr. Duff said there is plenty of town-owned land available for the land fill at the moment, but expressed continued interest in neighboring land for the future. He explained that there is plenty of gravel on the adjoining land.

There will be no need for test borings at the proposed site, he continued, based on the plentiful supply of gravel.

It had been suggested by the Selectmen that borings be made because the area abuts an old quarry, and there was some thought that there might be ledge underneath the area.

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NO PARKING FOR RAYTHEON

Raytheon had agreed to private arrangements with the Champy Construction Co., if that firm received town permission for the lot. It has been explained that space must be found somewhere for the cars, because Route 495 will be slicing off part of the Raytheon parking area near the River.
The Appeals Board, in making its decision, noted that the action could not be taken completely on the basis of whether the parking problem would be solved. The

members found that conducting a parking area constitutes a business.
In other action, the Appeals Board has said "no" to a request for use of land at 131 Main st. as a parking lot. A 10-room house on the lot, it is stated, would be torn down in order to create parking next to the Andover Shop and the Coffee Mill.
There was no evidence, the Board found, that a hardship would be caused by denying the petition, even though parking might seem to be a logical or practical use of the property.
The Appeals Board decision stated that the Planning Board had

indicated a desire to see changes made in the zoning, rather than a variance of the present zoning.
Also given a negative decision is Eugene R. Doucette of Andover st., who wished to create a lot for the sale, storage and junking of automobiles at 66 Lowell Junction rd.
The Board found that the operation would be a business, and as such not allowable in the industrial zone; it was also stated that the business would be detrimental to the area, and that it would be carried on inside the 400-foot limit from the nearest dwelling.
Three "yes" answers have also been filed by the Board, two for variances on lot sizes. William Stewart can divide land on High Plain rd. into two lots; Dennis and Alice McCarthy are allowed to move a house onto Binney st., where the frontage is less than required. The S. and R. Realty Trust Co. has received permission to add a sixth apartment in a home on Salem st.

Students Heard About Railroad

European countries "show better sense than we do" by cutting their costs of transportation through allowing their nationalized railroads to set competitive rates, a railroader charged here April 5.

In contrast, the U. S. government often makes America's free enterprise railroads hold a rate "umbrella" over traffic of competitors, Oscar C. Benson, assistant, engineer maintenance of way of the Boston and Maine Railroad, told students at Andover High School at their assembly. His talk was sponsored by the Railroad Community Committee of New England.

"One of the Interstate Commerce Commission's most difficult policies to understand is that which prevents railroads from lowering their rates to a still-profitable level, to meet competition," Mr. Benson said.

He said one recent ICC rate decision conceded that the proposed railroad tariff would yield a profit, but concluded "the profit margin was not great enough to justify trying to give the railroads this right to compete."

In Europe, the speaker said, railroads in general can put into effect quickly, without delay, protest or suspension, rates needed to meet competition; can make contract rates for specific purposes by direct negotiations with shippers, and can base rates on cost of service.

Mr. Benson said the American public pays millions of dollars a year more than it should in freight transportation costs because the inherent economic advantages of the "steel wheel on the steel rail" are often negated by obsolete regulations.

He called for public support of the railroad industry's "Magna Carta for Transportation," which says all carriers would have the chance to compete on equal terms under these "Four Freedoms":

Freedom from over-regulation, freedom from subsidized competition, freedom from tax discrimination, and freedom to diversify into other forms of transportation.
