

Don't Drown Bird Orphans Is Audubon Soc. Advice

In a quandry as to what to do when your child comes home with an "orphan" bird? Each spring the Massachusetts Audubon Society receives literally hundreds of calls from perplexed parents asking how to care for baby birds.

to care for baby birds.

The Society cautions that in most cases they are not orphans at all. The young bird has not been "deserted". Usually its parents are nearby, either waiting for the intruders to leave before resuming the feeding of their young, or caring

for others in the brood.

When young birds are found every effort should be made to return them to their nests. If the nest cannot be located, they should nest cannot be located, they should be placed in a tree or shrub as near as possible to where they were found, and out of the reach of cats and dogs. It is untrue that young birds will be deserted by their parents if they ahve been handled by people.

handled by people.

When birds have been injured, they can sometimes be nursed back to health so they can return to the wild, but the Audubon Society makes it clear that it is society makes it clear that it is not easy for people to substitute for parent birds. In addition, it must be remembered that state and federal laws concerning the possession of wild birds should be consulted and suitable arrangements made to meet these laws.

Food, warmth, and sleep are the basic needs of any young creatures. In the case of young birds, the greatest problem is food. Nestlings must have their first feeding of the day no later than 6 a.m., and feeding must continue until 7 p.m. every half hour. They awake at dawn and start screaming for food. Natural food, such as insects and worms is best, but canned dog or cat food moistened, or chopped hard-boiled egg yolk, pablum and milk, or finely chopped lean beef

and liver are acceptable.

Remember that a baby bird does not need water. It can obtain all not need water. It can obtain all the moisture it requires from its food. Frequently a well-meaning foster parent has drowned a young bird by forcing it to drink water. Young birds should not be overhandled. "TLC" is not a rule of thumb as for as caring for babybirds is concerned. They should have should for the proof of the should be a sound to be a



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

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
