## Town Leads State In Polio Immunization Response

Andover established one of the most outstanding records in Massachusetts for polio immunization of its children last week when more than 92 percent of the eligible youngsters sipped doses of the Sabin oral vaccine at a general clinic or in their school classrooms.

More than 2200 children out of an eligible 2400 were treated during the three day campaign directed by Mrs. Elizabeth Nadeau, R.N., Board of Health nurse, assisted by School Nurses Miss Ruth

Wescott, R. N. and Mrs. William Stewart, R.N.

The amazing success of the immunization program was attributed to cooperation on the part of parents who were alerted through a well planned program of advance information.

At the pre-schoolers clinic held Wednesday at the Central School, 1304 children were given the Type I Sabin vaccine.

## School Board Names Eight New Teachers

Eight new teachers were named by the Andover School Committee Tuesday night at the regular meeting during which the resignations of nine present members of the system were accepted with regret. At the meeting, preliminary discussions indicated that Andover school children will face a longer school day when sessions get underway for the fall term in September.

The board ruled that the current school year for elementary classes will end on June 19, while the high school will close on June 20. In the fall, school will begin on Thursday, September 6, a day later than usual.

District lines for the new school on Lovejoy rd. were established at the meeting, while the members agreed on the purchase of new language laboratory equipment for the Junior and High schools.

Of the nine resignations, only one indicated that the move was being made for better remuneration. Others advised that they were leaving for reasons of marriage, further study, to be closer to home, to accompany their husband to a new post or for other personal reasons.

As soon as the committee had moved to unanimously accept the resignations, the members acted with similar accord in approving eight teacher recommendations made by Supt. Edward I. Erickson. New teachers appointed and their starting salaries were:

## Armed Forces Day Display At Airport

An Armed Forces Day display will be held at the Lawrence Airport in North Andover, on Saturday, May 19, between 9:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

This is a joint effort among the 9224th Air Reserve Squadron, the Army, the Marine Corps, and the Navy Units all stationed at the U. S. Naval Reserve Training Center, North Parish rd., Lawrence.

Exhibits from service units and the prime defense contractors in the area will be seen, some of which are as follows: the Hawk missile from Raytheon in Andover; the Sparrow missile from the Raytheon plant in Lowell; the Titan ICBM a Minutemen missile, and a new ICBM re-entry vehicle from AVCO in Wilmington. A C-119 (cargo type) airplane will be on display for the public to inspect.

A T-33 (jet trainer) is expected to be one of the added attractions and efforts are being made to have this aircraft on display. The aircraft is used by the 94th Troop Carrier Squadron stationed at Hanscom Field, Bedford.

Flyovers starting at 1:30 and ending at 2:30 p.m. will include the latest jets flown at minimum altitudes.

Many other exhibits will be shown for public viewing.

Rev. Mr. Hayhow, who formerly held a pastorate in Waterbury, Conn., had an opportunity to acquaint himself with the problems of migrant workers in the tobacco fields and saw the opportunities for service to those people who move from place to place with the changing seasons.

The Women's Union of the West Parish Church served luncheon with Mrs. Clarence Remington and Mrs. C. R. Livingston in charge. Mrs. Robina Hustus was area luncheon chairman for the Greater Lawrence district and Mrs. Karl Bernhardt for Greater Lowell.

The afternoon session was opened with Rev. Howard A. Andrews leading the devotions, followed by a roll call of the various churches. Mrs. J. Thurston Powell presented the Second Mile gift dedication and Mrs. John H. Sargent read the recommendations of the board of directors.

Mrs. Wendell M. Dillon gave the offertory prayer. The offering will be divided between the work for migrants and the board of World Ministries, Veterans of the Cross.

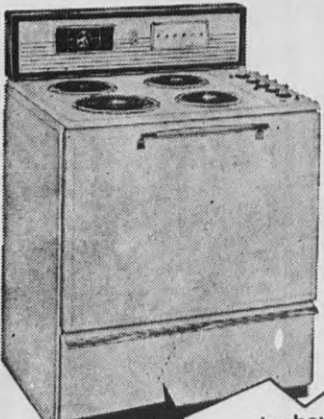

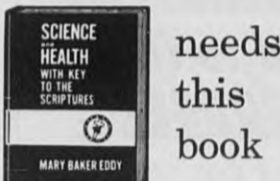

**EDITORIAL THOUGHTS**

**Short-Changed Geographically**

It's too early to tell, of course, but it looks as though two of the state's most ardent foes of corruption, on the Republican side of the aisle, may be geographically short-changed when they enter the GOP convention within a few weeks.

Both Rep. Harrison Chadwick and Rep. Francis W. Perry seek the nomination for lieutenant governor; both are broadly known for their attempts to rid the state of corruption in various forms.

Political comment seems to be that Chadwick, because he lives on the same street as does Gov. Volpe, will be unacceptable for this reason alone. Perry, it is intimated, also is in left field because his home is in Duxbury, not one of the most heavily populated sections of the state.

What a shame it will be if these two men - whose public outcry against corruption and immorality in government has awakened the voters of the state to the shameful conditions in our government - are left off the state ticket.

While recognizing that political expediency dictates geographical balance in a political ticket, we feel certain that these men are deserving of further responsibility in the management of our affairs. They've proved that, by speaking out when so many feared to be heard.

**Wonderful Record**

Parents of the town are to be specially congratulated on their insistence that their young children be immunized against polio.

The record established at the clinic, and in the early grades, last week is one we can boast about anywhere. Well over 90 percent of the town's youngsters who were eligible have received the vaccine - a percentage not even remotely challenged in many communities.

There will be another clinic late this month or early in June - that one is just as important as the first session of last week.

Parents should, of course, have their children take this second dosage, as it provides immunity against Type III polio.

Congratulations on the fine record - it's one we can all be proud to acknowledge.

**Don't Drown Bird Orphans  
Is Audubon Soc. Advice**

In a quandry as to what to do when your child comes home with an "orphan" bird? Each spring the Massachusetts Audubon Society receives literally hundreds of calls from perplexed parents asking how to care for baby birds.

The Society cautions that in most cases they are not orphans at all. The young bird has not been "deserted". Usually its parents are nearby, either waiting for the intruders to leave before resuming the feeding of their young, or caring for others in the brood.

When young birds are found every effort should be made to return them to their nests. If the nest cannot be located, they should be placed in a tree or shrub as near as possible to where they were found, and out of the reach of cats and dogs. It is untrue that young birds will be deserted by their parents if they have been handled by people.

When birds have been injured, they can sometimes be nursed back to health so they can return to the wild, but the Audubon Society makes it clear that it is not easy for people to substitute for parent birds. In addition, it must be remembered that state and federal laws concerning the possession of wild birds should be consulted and suitable arrangements made to meet these laws.

Food, warmth, and sleep are the basic needs of any young creatures. In the case of young birds, the greatest problem is food. Nestlings must have their first feeding of the day no later than 6 a.m., and feeding must continue until 7 p.m. every half hour. They awake at dawn and start screaming for food. Natural food, such as insects and worms is best, but canned dog or cat food moistened, or chopped hard-boiled egg yolk, pablum and milk, or finely chopped lean beef and liver are acceptable.

Remember that a baby bird does not need water. It can obtain all the moisture it requires from its food. Frequently a well-meaning foster parent has drowned a young bird by forcing it to drink water.

Young birds should not be over-handled. "TLC" is not a rule of thumb as for as caring for baby-birds is concerned. They should be kept where there will be room for them to exercise their wings, preferably on a screened porch, or if necessary, in a large screened box.

In general, the present thinking is for the use of Wednesday afternoons and possibly an additional 15 minutes at the beginning of the school day as additional teaching time.

All of the members of the committee expressed their approval of the progressive manner in which the problem is being studied and said that they would look forward to additional reports at future meetings.

Principals in attendance were: Miss Ann Harnedy of the Shawsheen School, Miss Isabelle Dobbie, West School, Miss Catherine Barrett, Central School, Lionel Goulet, South School and Lindsay J. March of Andover High School. William E. Hart Jr., of the Junior High School was absent because of his obligation as a reserve serviceman.

**Study Subjects**  
Principal March of the high school presented the committee with copies of the subject offerings and guide for the 1962-63 school year. He discussed the study schedules and distributed a paper showing a number of subject combinations available to high school sophomores. He was joined in the discussion of the study subjects and the course programs by Mr. Ward. This agenda matter was of an advisory nature and the committee members expressed their thanks to Principal March for his presentation.

In reply to a communication from Rev. S. Scott Bartchy of the An-

dover Council of Churches, suggesting an expansion of the time allotted in the schools for the Weekday School of Christian Education, the members voted unanimously against an extension of the period due to the lack of educational time available to school children. **New School District**  
Supt. Erickson presented the following proposed boundaries for the Lovejoy road school district:

From the Tewksbury line west of the Shawsheen River, and all children West of the B. & M. Property to Reservation Road (to include all developments) by Cutler Road, to Lowell Street; Lowell Street to Greenwood Road, Greenwood Road to High Plain Road, to Cross Street and to River Road.

He noted to the committee that the redistricting for the new school presented a two fold problem:

1. Assignment of children to the new school to relieve the situation at the present West School.  
2. Utilize the added space in the new school to relieve overcrowding or to transfer pupils from existing buildings to allow for growth expected in those schools. (South-Central - Shawsheen).

According to the superintendent's proposed redistricting program, the new school on Lovejoy rd. would have an enrollment of 371 pupils. Of these, 269 would come from the West School district and 102 from the South School district. This would leave the other schools with the following enrollments: West, 373; South, 512; Shawsheen, 386; Central and Stowe, 675.

During the discussion on the new school district, it was brought out that Andover is going to need additional new schools in the not too distant future to accommodate the increasing number of children.

The committee voted to purchase a new RCA Mobile Language Laboratory with ten student stations for the Junior High school at a cost of \$995, and a Dictaphone Teacher Console with two student stations for the High school at a cost of \$1735.28 from the Dictaphone Corporation.

Chairman Robert B. McIntyre presided at Tuesday evening's meeting at which all of the other board members, John S. Sullivan, William A. Doherty, Vincent P. Davey, and Dr. Milton J. Meyers, were present. The meeting ended at 11:36 p.m.

Property to Reservation Road (to include all developments) by Cutler Road, to Lowell Street; Lowell Street to Greenwood Road, Greenwood Road to High Plain Road, to Cross Street and to River Road.

He noted to the committee that the redistricting for the new school presented a two fold problem: 1. Assignment of children to the new school to relieve the situation at the present West School. 2. Utilize the added space in the new school to relieve overcrowding or to transfer pupils from existing buildings to allow for growth expected in those schools. (South-Central - Shawsheen).

According to the superintendent's proposed redistricting program, the new school on Lovejoy rd. would have an enrollment of 371 pupils. Of these, 269 would come from the West School district and 102 from the South School district. This would leave the other schools with the following enrollments: West, 373; South, 512; Shawsheen, 386; Central and Stowe, 675.

During the discussion on the new school district, it was brought out that Andover is going to need additional new schools in the not too distant future to accommodate the increasing number of children.

The committee voted to purchase a new RCA Mobile Language Laboratory with ten student stations for the Junior High school at a cost of \$995, and a Dictalaboratory Teacher Console with two student stations for the High school at a cost of \$1735.28 from the Dictaphone Corporation.

Chairman Robert B. McIntyre presided at Tuesday evening's meeting at which all of the other board members, John S. Sullivan, William A. Doherty, Vincent P. Davey, and Dr. Milton J. Meyers, were present. The meeting ended at 11:36 p.m.

Wednesday and Thursday. Of the public school children, 690 of the 695 eligible received doses. At St. Augustine's school, 126 out of 127 presented themselves for the treatment. This made the response from school children over 99 percent.

State officials reported that Andover was right at the top in the May immunization program in the Commonwealth's fight against polio.

Vaccine for Type III polio will be available for administration in June on dates to be announced. Eventually, children will take vaccine for polio Types I, II and III. Health officials point out that Type II polio is not as great a problem as are the other types and vaccine for this will be given later.
