# **EDITORIAL THOUGHTS**

#### Safe Intersection?

The fatal accident on Andover st., at Dascomb rd., Saturday night serves to highlight the dangerous type of intersection that exists there.

But the specific accident, according to police reports, could not have been avoided by making Andover st. a stop street, as has been suggested by some residents.

Ever since Dascomb rd. was widened, and the new island installed, many drivers have complained about the intersection.

Originally, it wasn't even a stop street - but local police received permission from the state to make it so. Two big signs were installed, as was a warning sign that indicated drivers approaching the intersection would be required to stop.

But it seems to be the kind of intersection that lends itself to violations - drivers proceed along Dascomb rd. at a high rate of speed, see an "easy" intersection and ignore the signs.

Any change in the intersection must receive the approval of the state, whose engineers designed the intersection originally.

At the moment, police plan to take another traffic count at the intersection, to see which of the streets is most heavily used. Originally, the results of a count, over an eight-hour period, indicated Andover st. to be the most widely used. Dascomb rd. thus became the stop street.

We trust the problems of that intersection, a potentially dangerous one, will be studied thoroughly and solved, without delay.

#### **Foresight, For Once**

The study group which presented its report last week to the School Committee made a valid argument - one that we should heed.

S. Leonard Kent warned the Committee that some solutions to the school housing problem will only contribute to more difficult problems in five years or so.

He urged that any solution take into account all of the known and estimated data, through 1970 at least, so that committees in the future will have more freedom in solving their own problems in that day.

Look ahead, think of the future in broad terms.

How many times have we all wished, as various municipal problems crop up, that officials a number of years ago had been blessed with a sure knowledge of the future? We have thought, with the benefit of hindsight, that better things could have been done, so that present-day emergencies would be less serious.

Now that we have a glimpse of the future of the school housing needs, let's not pinch pennies in solving it. The cheapest solution may be the one with the greatest headaches in the future - we don't want to pass on that type of legacy to the people who will cope with the problems 10 or 15 years from now.

#### **Legislative Wisdom?**

The Legislature appears well on its way to approving a \$4,500 minimum pay for teachers throughout the state in fact, the matter may have been decided before this comment is published.

The legislation would cost Andover \$36,000 in the year 1963 - because not only will minimums be increased, but all salaries on the scale will also go up proportionately.

This is another step by the Legislature to take over what should be local decisions. It's costly; it's an invasion of the town's right to set its own salaries.

Here's how our local representatives voted on the roll calls:

Reps. Longworth and Ingalls voted NOT TO REJECT the entire bill; Rep. Williams was not recorded.

On a motion to reconsider an amendment which would have required the state to pay for the required increases, Reps. Longworth and Williams voted not to reconsider in other words, to keep the amendment which had been adopted a few weeks ago; Rep. Ingalls voted to reconsider the amendment. This was voted. And the amendment was finally killed completely.

The bill thus was returned to its original form, with cities and towns paying the entire cost.

On a vote to make the statute applicable only after each community accepted it - the usual "permissive legislation" - Williams and Ingalls voted yes, Longworth voted no.

# School Site Problems **Remain Unresolved**

The Selectmen and School Committee turned over some freshlytilled ground to do with school sites, at a meeting Monday night. But the dust never settled, with the question of land in the southern section of town remaining to be answered some other time. The School Committee is badly

split over the need for one, or two, sites in the southern part of the town. The Planning Board, to which the school officials first turned for guidance, also is split - a majority thinks two sites will

be needed. And when Member John S, Sulli-van asked the Selectmen "how do we solve this delemma?", Select-man Russell G, Doyle, chairman



school committee dilemma?"

a school committee difermina?" The meeting, lasting for about an hour, covered a lot of ground, as members discussed various possible sites and the complex problems of guessing where growth will occur will occur. Specifically, the Selectmen agreed that the Cross st. land, now owned by the town, will be considered for school purposes -

but without actually pinning it down at this time. They also agreed that the Land Acquisition Committee should in-quire about sites in the Bellevue

Gommittee had asked the Land Committee had asked the Land Committee to do this some months ago, and received official con-firmation Monday night.

The South Andover area re-mained a mystery - with School Committeemen expressing various opinions The White and D'Annalfo pro-

perties - in back of the DeVries development off Wildwood rd. and near the By-Pass - have been considered, in addition to some acreage owned by the town in the same area. In all, the site would encompass about 43 acres. This would be a central location,

if one site is needed. But if two are required, then consideration is being given to a site nearer Salem st., and one on the west side of Route 28. Selectman William Stewart

forcefully expressed his view that the larger tract of land is wet and undesirable, unless the Committee willing to assume the expense of draining it.

He also called for retention of town meeting control over recreation expenses - noting that much of the acreage not required for actual construction is being sought for future use by schools and townspeople alike.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff with his thoughts focused on the dollars involved, told the gathering that there isn't enough money in the Land Committee's account to buy all the land the school officials want. He suggested it might be necessary to ask for extensive appropriations at town meeting next March, with funds earmarked for school sites. But he suggested that cooperation will be needed from the school people, in supporting the article - something he said has been missing during the past few years.

Mr. Doyle also reminded the men that other town problems must be faced, and securing land for fire stations and other purposes is one of these. Thus he thought that perhaps land should be



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
