Recreation Site Status In Selectmen's Laps

Town Employees Seek Explanation

The Town Employees Association will hold a special meeting, to discuss the existing wage and salary plans.

The meeting has been called on petition of many organization members.

According to former president Raymond LaRosa, the hiring of two employees at salaries exceeding or equal to maximum pay indicates the need for a revision of the pay schedules. Otherwise, he explained, the town will be going back to the old system of establishing salaries for individuals.

The Selectmen are being bluntly informed this week that their insistence on ground cover, over the rough-graded recreation area at the High School, may result in increasing project costs by at least one-third.

And the Board will be asked to forego the requirement, so that the full sub-drainage and rough grading project can be carried out as planned.

The School Committee has \$40,000 in appropriated funds - but members have been informed that it will be completely impossible to rough grade the 18-acre site, then put enough loam on the area for proper seeding. Architects for the project have estimated that proper ground cover, at this stage of the project, could well run into thousands of extra dollars.

At a long discussion Tuesday evening, the architects agreed that there is currently no information about the depth of peat in the area; that possibly a culvert size may require re-examination and change

Foresee 3,899 Fall Enrollment

An estimated 3,899 children will be attending public schools here in September.

Supt. of Schools Edward I. Erickson, stressing that the figures are only estimates at this time, provided the data for the School Committee Tuesday night.

The project enrollment represents an increase of 223 over the September enrollment in 1961, and an increase of 349 over September of 1960.

Mr. Erickson commented that last year's estimate, at approximately the same time of the year, was about 30 higher than the actual enrollment on opening day. And he noted that the estimates now may

Renewal Plan Is Approved

Urban Renewal Director Ernest N. Hall expects to receive formal approval of the town's proposed renewal plan within a matter of days.

Notice of federal approval has already been received, but the formal notification through appropriate channels has not yet been accomplished. However, the local director has indicated that this now is only a matter of transmitting the documents from Washington, to New York, then to Andover.

Mr. Hall, obviously pleased that the federal stamp of approval finally has been obtained, said it should be possible for the subject to go to a special town meeting in October, as planned.

But whether or not the plan presented to that town meeting will be exactly the same as that now approved is something of a gamble.

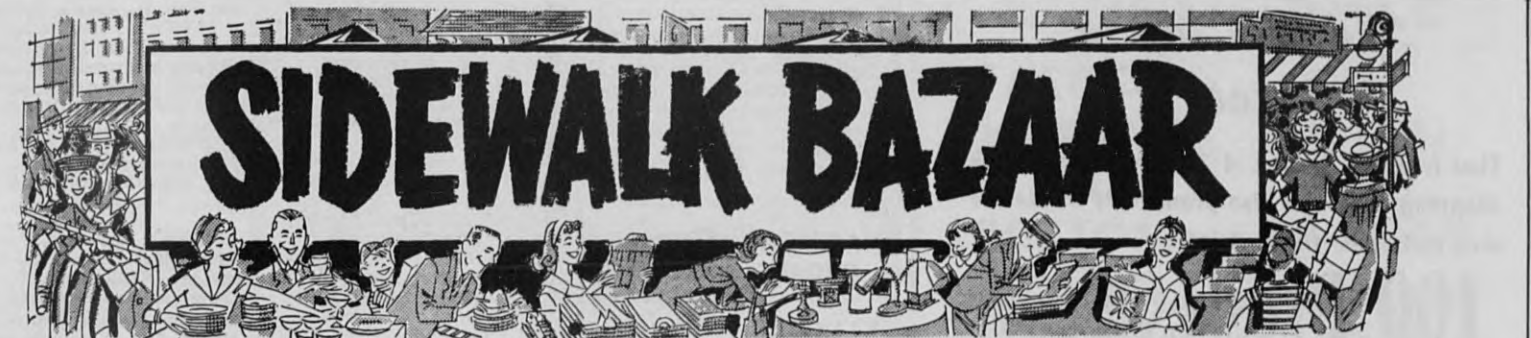

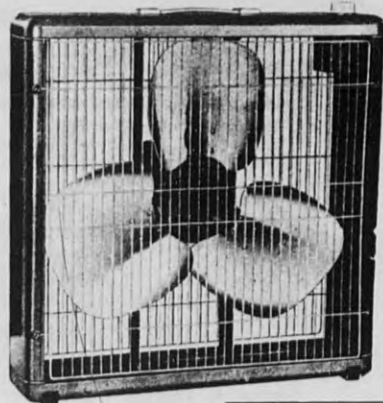

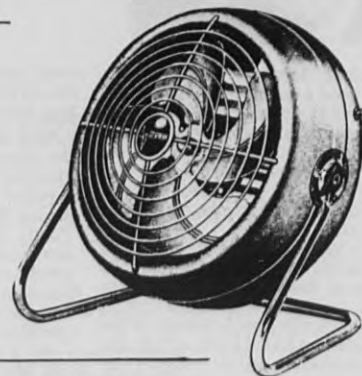

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

"Control" Is The Question

"Control" seems to be a big factor, whenever the School Committee and Selectmen discuss recreation areas at the schools.

And the discussions are not without some strong feeling, some mutual antagonism and misunderstandings.

At the root of the question is the desire of the Selectmen to have the town retain control over budgetary matters. They are unwilling to have additional recreation expenses lumped into the school budget, where voters can not exercise their judgment to the same extent that they can, if the expenses are in a separate itemized account.

The School Committee doesn't feel that this is the case - they don't apparently believe that the recreation expenses are hidden away in the school budget.

There must be a meeting of the minds on this subject, or we'll never have the recreation areas - just a lot of bickering and confusion, then a lot of blame when nothing is done.

If a recreation area at a school is primarily for the use of the school children, during the school year, then naturally the school department should pay the bills for it.

Incidental expenses for use of the area during the summer, when school is out, should properly be paid by the recreation department. It seems to us that a proper plan for use of the facilities, agreed upon between the town's recreation director and the school officials, could be worked out. Then the question is merely one of budgeting a proper share of the expenses at town meeting time.

This newspaper urged, before the last town meeting, that the Selectmen and recreation director have some voice in the planning stage of the high school area. We felt then, as now, that overlapping could be reduced to a minimum by foresight.

We did not suggest - nor do we believe it is necessary - that the Selectmen act as a watchdog over the school department.

It appears to us that more effort is being wasted in checking on the activities of the school department, while less-than-enough work is going into coordination of plans for both school and public use of the recreation area.



CAPITOL COMMENT

"More bang for a buck!" has long been a watchword among Congressional probers of Defense Department expenditures.

Although facetiously phrased, the slogan points up a serious attempt to eliminate waste, duplication and extravagance in our military.

It's refreshing to report that a big stride has been made towards plugging one of the biggest money leaks in the Defense Department.

Historically, each branch of the service has had its own supply and procurement section. On identical items, one branch might pay two or three times as much as another. The Army might issue bids on an item at the same time the Navy was selling the same item as surplus at a loss. Coordination was completely lacking. For 14 years the Hoover Commission, business organizations, and congressional committees have urged that purchasing divisions of the military be coordinated under one agency. Always sensitive to any proposal to unify, the branches of service protested vigorously. Congress hesitated to take action. Finally, in 1958, under President Eisenhower, Congress gave the Secretary of Defense the authority to "place under one agency or one department any activity common to more than one of the military services."

Last year a group of colleagues joined with me in an effort to urge executive implementation of various Hoover Commission proposals. Prime among them was the Defense Supply Agency. We petitioned the White House. We were rewarded - and the taxpayers

even more so when Secretary McNamara established such an agency last August.

The new agency is charged with the management, procurement, and distribution of certain common supplies and services; it consolidates 12 existing organizations. There will be tremendous standardization in purchasing which could save taxpayers millions of defense dollars yearly.

Just this month the Military Operations Subcommittee of which I am a member held hearings on the new Defense Supply Agency. We sought to examine the scope of its authority and operation in purchasing, stocking and distributing to the services the common supplies essential to their operations. The new agency head, Lt. Gen. Andrew T. McNamara, has said he expects a \$25 million reduction in annual operating expenses alone and an initial \$200 million inventory reduction. Next year, the agency will buy about \$3 billion worth of material, will manage about \$2.6 billion in inventory, and will issue some \$3 billion worth of material to the services. Presently, its assignments include central management of food, clothing, medical, petroleum, general and industrial supplies. It is in the process of taking control of construction and automotive supplies, and on July 1, 1962, will begin to control electronics supplies. A lot of your money will be saved.

Studies are underway to see whether three other important types of supplies should be handled by the agency: industrial production equipment, chemical supplies,

Summer Begins Officially Today, Longest Day Of Year

Summer - it's supposed to follow spring, a season that's almost a stranger to New England - arrives in our part of the world today, at 5:24 p.m.

Heralding its arrival have been the gradually lengthening days of the last six months, says the Charles Hayden Planetarium at Boston's Museum of Science.

They point out that ever since the first day of winter last Dec. 22, the sun has been moving northward in the sky, a little bit each day. With the coming of summer it reaches its most northerly position and begins once again to move towards the south.

It is this northward motion, says the Planetarium, that causes the longer days and shorter nights. For example, June 21, the longest

day of the year, the sun rises at 5:07 a.m. and doesn't set until 8:25 p.m. This gives us a full 15 hours 19 minutes of daylight, or six hours, 13 minutes, more than we had on the first day of winter.

Just because the sun is highest and the day longest today doesn't mean that our hottest weather comes at this time, says the Planetarium. For several weeks after this date, we continue to gain more heat during the day than we lose during the night, and temperatures keep on rising until late July or early August. After that, the balance shifts, and our part of the world begins to cool down.

Below the equator, it's just the opposite. Right now, they are girding themselves for a season of ice and snow as winter comes to the southern hemisphere.

Do You Know When Your Lawn Is Thirsty?

Two simple tests can be used to determine when the lawn needs water, says Bob Fitzgerald of the Essex County Extension Office.

The best recommendation is to water the day before the grass wilts. And if this sounds strange, wilting is indicated by the color of the lawn and footprinting.

Just before wilting, the grass takes on a darker color, often a bluish-green. In addition, the fine grasses and clover will show foot prints and don't recover quickly from trampling.

Another method of determining moisture needs of the lawn is prob-

ing with a long shanked screwdriver. When soil is moist you can easily push the screwdriver down into the ground. When you can push it down only about three or four inches into the soil, this indicates the lower levels are drying out and it is time for a good soaking.

Fitzgerald also adds that gardeners should become aware of different climates that exist around the yard. Areas on the north or those that are shaded may not need water as often. Other areas such as southern slopes or those bordering curbs and walks may need moisture more frequently.

Screwdriver probing will reveal the areas of need.

A little more than an inch of water is recommended for application at each watering. This is usually adequate for a week, although in early spring it may be sufficient for two to four weeks, and as little as four days during extremely hot, dry weather.

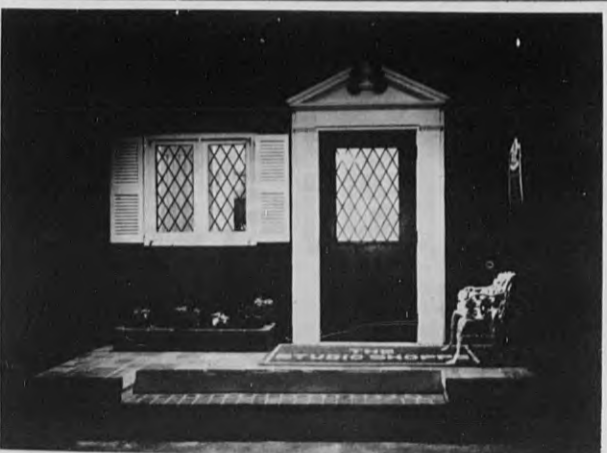

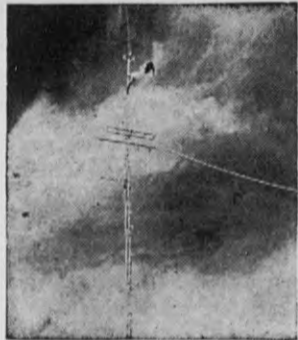

The Planning Board has engaged its consultant to study the central area - larger geographically than the specific Urban Renewal area - and this may result in some changes, according to Mr. Hall. He explained that the consultants will probably come up with proposed zoning for the larger area, patterned after the restrictions already involved in the Urban Renewal plan.

But he emphasized that the Planning Board may wish to make some suggestions as to changes in the Urban Renewal plan itself - and these must be considered by the Housing Authority before October. Such changes might involve leaving a building now scheduled for demolition, or other changes in the re-use plans, Hall indicated. He said, however, that these changes can be incorporated into the plan, and presented to town meeting.

Although he did not indicate that changes or suggested changes will be included, Mr. Hall made it clear this week that the public agency responsible for Urban Renewal can make "minor" alterations - and seek approval from the government after town meeting has acted.

Even the voters at town meeting could amend the plans, he said, but whether the federal authorities will approve amendments of substance, from the floor of town meeting, is unknown.

Speaking of town meeting, Mr. Hall has also explained that the actual vote on Urban Renewal can legally be taken on a straight majority basis; only two small zoning changes need two-thirds approval. However, any town appropriation involving a bond issue - such as that possibly needed for a new town hall and fire station - would require a two-thirds vote.

The Selectmen, he stated, have been considering the possibility of having the entire subject worded in such a way as to demand two-thirds approval, regardless of necessity. Mr. Hall also pointed out that legal opinion now states that the Selectmen have the authority to approve Urban Renewal plans, without going to town meeting. Once approved, the voters would have to, in effect, ratify the action by appropriating funds and altering zoning as needed. There has been no indication that the Selectmen will do this, however.

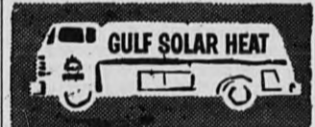

Shepherd of Tender Youth

*Shepherd of tender youth,
 Guiding in love and truth,
 Through devious ways;
 Christ, our triumphant King,
 We come thy name to sing,
 And here our children bring
 To shout thy praise.*

Considered the oldest Christian hymn, it was written by Clement of Alexandria in the second century A.D. Born in Athens, about 140 A.D., Clement found little satisfaction of soul in Greek philosophy. Through Pantanus, head of the Christian School, he found in Christ the "All in All" he had been seeking. He rose to succeed Pantanus, and became a great leader in the early Christian Church.
