Does Ground Cover Just Cover Ground?

The Selectmen and School Committee can't decide what "ground cover" is.

And their failure to agree on this definition appears to be the stumbling block in the way of drainage and rough grading at the high school.

At the moment, the Selectmen have opened the door a crack, at least, by agreeing that "ground cover" is anything that will hold down a possible dust storm. They aren't concerned about the materials used to accomplish the objective.

The School Committee, in a blunt statement to the Selectmen, noted that plans were all ready for the project when the town fathers introduced the idea of a "ground cover". The Selectmen feared

that dust from the rough-graded 18 acres behind the school would irritate and bother neighbors.

But the architects came up with the idea that about six inches of loam, plus guaranteed seeding, would be necessary to meet the Selectmen's restrictions. This might cost \$30,000 - almost all of the \$40,000 available for the entire project. Thus the School Committee directed architect Frank Crimp to work out a smaller area, which could be completed.

The Selectmen, meeting Monday night, expressed amazement that there should be any controversy. They indicated that there was no effort made to reduce the area, that work should commence quickly and without further delay, as long as

98% Response To Polio Clinic

More than 2,300 out of an eligible 2,400 children received their second dose of Sabin Oral Polio vaccine last week.

Andover is still maintaining an excellent response, with over 98 percent of all children under seven taking advantage of this opportunity to receive the vaccine.

A total of 1,600 pre-school children received the vaccine at the immunization clinic Tuesday afternoon between 1:30 and 4:30. A total of 810 school children took their drink of vaccine in class rooms during the week of June 11th. This amount represents over 99 percent of eligible school children. The clinic was directed by Mrs. Elizabeth Nadeau, R.N., agent for the Board of Health, with the cooperation of school nurses, Miss Ruth Wescott and Mrs. William Stewart.

Lane Chooses Fifth District

Congressman Thomas J. Lane of Lawrence, a Democrat, will run for re-election to the U. S. House of Representatives from the 5th Congressional District, which includes Andover.

Due to population gains by other states, Massachusetts has lost two Congressional seats. Under the redistricting law, the 7th Congressional District, which Lane has represented for over 20 years, has been "absorbed" by the neighboring 5th, 6th and 8th Districts.

Lane announced today his candidacy for re-election in the new 5th District, which includes his home city of Lawrence and the town of Andover, both in Essex County; and the cities of Lowell, Melrose, and Woburn, and the towns of Bedford, Billerica, Burlington, Carlisle, Chelmsford, Concord, Dracut, Lexington, Lincoln, North Reading, Reading, Stoneham, Tewksbury, Wilmington, Win-

chester, all in Middlesex County. Through seniority, Lane has become chairman of Subcommittee No. two of the powerful Judiciary Committee, with special jurisdiction over all claims against the U. S. Government and general jurisdiction over Judiciary matters.

He is well-known for his work in behalf of veterans, labor, and senior citizens. Lane has spoken up vigorously and repeatedly for the development of our missile and space-exploration programs. He favors aid to education so that our young people will be equipped to meet the challenges and responsibilities of a changing world.

Congressman Lane was one of the co-authors, with the late Congressman Edith Nourse Rogers of Lowell, of the so-called G. I. Bill of Rights, legislation which benefitted veterans, their dependents and families.

On the economic front, he was the first member of the House to recognize the need for industrial redevelopment legislation by introducing a bill to assist areas of chronic unemployment. An amended version of his proposal subsequently became law.

Realizing that the Nation must provide incentives for business, he urges a faster write-off for depreciation allowances.

A veteran of World War I, and a practicing attorney, Congressman Lane resides with his wife, the former Jane R. Murphy, at 20 Abbot st., Lawrence, the city of his birth.

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WHAT, EXACTLY, IS GROUND COVER

(Continued from Page One)

as ground cover is required. However, this might be any kind of mulch, watering, seeding - in short, anything the architect and School Committee believe necessary.

At a joint meeting with the Selectmen some time ago, School Committeeman William A. Doherty asked Selectman William Stewart to define what the Board wanted for "ground cover" - and urged the Selectman to write out the requirements of the Board, so that the School Committee would know what is required. However, at that time, Mr. Stewart told Mr. Doherty that all he wanted done was the providing of ground cover - without specifying what kind.

The letter from the School Committee to the Selectmen, signed by Edward I. Erickson, superintendent and secretary of the Committee, made it clear that any delay will be the responsibility of the Selectmen, as will any additional costs.

The letter, on which prompt action was taken Monday night, stated:

"The development of the grounds at the high school on Shawsheen rd. has become a matter of great concern to the Andover School Committee.

"Work on the area has been planned for the past two years. At each of the previous two annual meetings money was appropriated for this purpose without a single vote registered in opposition. It was the intent of the School Committee that work would begin as soon as schools closed this month. However, work has not started yet due to the restrictions you have attached to the plans.

"A recent conference with the

architect has revealed that it will be very expensive to cover the proposed area in a manner which will prevent dust. The cost of loam and seed for the area is prohibitive at this time, with the money available. The only alternative seems to be a greatly reduced area for development, perhaps less than one-third of the original proposal.

"It is the unanimous opinion of the members of the School Committee that your interest in dust control is not of such importance that the scheduled project should be further delayed. It appears to be short sighted and far too costly to the town for you to insist on the restrictions which you have designated.

"Since the responsibility for the delay is yours entirely, we would very much appreciate your serious re-consideration of the problems involved. We are most anxious that the project as outlined and approved at the last town meeting be advanced at once.

"An early reply is respectfully requested."

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Is Two-Thirds Necessary?

Summer-time — vacation time — won't permit much activity in the Urban Renewal program, regardless of the importance of this issue to all residents of the town.

Instead, it is probable that intense consideration will be given the proposals for about a month — mid-September to the special town meeting about the middle of October.

Whether or not townspeople can thoroughly digest all of the information in that short time remains to be seen. Naturally it is to be hoped that all voters will take the time to consider all ramifications of the plans carefully, before making up their minds. And further, they should turn out in record numbers for the special meeting itself.

We were a little doubtful, the other day, whether or not some of the town fathers actually are giving this plan the thoughtful study it deserves. Our doubts took shape when we learned that there is considerable thought being given to requiring a two-thirds vote at town meeting, when none is actually required. The approval of the agreement itself can legally be handled on a majority basis; some zoning, also any bond issues connected with the program, would require two-thirds support.

It seems to us that requiring two-thirds, when this is not a requirement, is loading the rules against the program and in favor of the opponents. Candidates for public office sometimes win by scant majorities — anywhere from one to 10 votes — and they do not refuse to take office and govern the town, just as though their majority was two-thirds.

On the other hand, as long as two-thirds will be needed on some of the articles, why not two-thirds on all?

There is some logic in thinking that there's no sense to approving this giant undertaking by a small majority, if the plan can not be implemented because two-thirds of those present and voting will not approve zoning or bond issues.

Still, we couldn't help wondering whether or not this two-thirds bit is yet another roadblock, another hurdle for Urban Renewal to meet.

For many years we have operated under rules that set forth the specific votes which must gain two-thirds support, or fail. Occasionally, perhaps, when interest was strong enough, some groups would have liked to see a two-thirds ruling made as an exception to the general rule — but this has not been done. Instead, we have generally abided by the majority vote; indeed, most people are willing to abide by a majority decision, under normal conditions.

Why, then, make exceptions in this case?

Abuse Of Position

A few weeks ago, hearings were held concerning the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, the operation of his department, and the extent to which the job can be considered full-time.

Naturally, there always is a question in people's minds concerning the political function of that office — for after all, the Registrar is a political appointee. Whether or not some harm can come to the objectivity of the department, when the boss has political aspirations, is also open to question.

And now we have, via the mails, a further example of the registrar's use of the office to advance his own political aspirations:

A big red stamp on the official department envelopes, using his name in a slogan, thusly "Clement A. Riley E" — surrounded by the words "drive with". Evidently some political sharpshooter, by adding the extraneous E, decided this would be a good way to advertise the registrar, with the excuse that the words are only intended to urge people to "drive with care".

Such an obviously political effort by the registrar, on official envelopes, used on official business, should be halted, at once. A man who wields as much power as does the registrar should be compelled to be either a full-time, or at least an objective, public servant, or take time away from the job for political campaigning. The two purposes — politics first and the registry second — don't mix at all.

There are too many people in this busy world who have a continual open season devoted to killing time.

Good judgment is built up through experience — the cost of experience being charged up to poor judgment.

At A Painting

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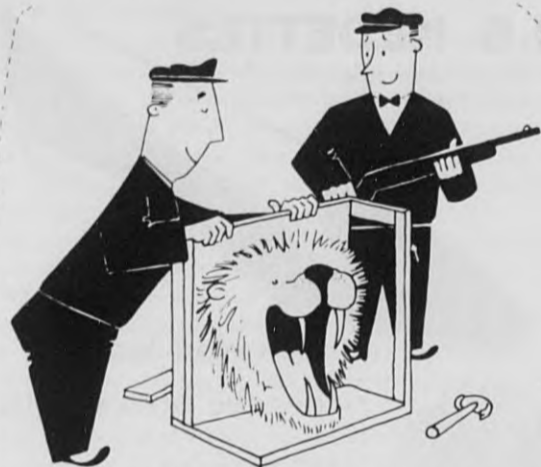
