# Hart, Normandy Were Elected By School Bd.

### **Board Of Appeals** Will Study Plans

Deficiencies in plans for the first four apartment units next to the Shawsheen Plaza were noted by the Planning Board, during a Board of Appeals hearing a week

ago.
William F. D'Annalfo, whose firm plans eventually to build nine apartments on the former Golden Farm, agreed to study the plans in light of the Planning Board findings. But he also informed the Appeals Board that he had not seen the report as it had been completed only about 3 p.m. the same day.

He had told the Board that the buildings will be of colonial design. Each of the apartments four of which would be constructed now - will cost about \$100,000. he continued.

The land was zoned as a garden

apartment district at town meeting in March.

The Planning Board report, presented by member Robert Goodwin, listed several areas in which the Board said requirements were not being followed. These included: building not set back far enough from the street lines; parking areas too close to property lines; insufficient street widths, inadequate provision for drainage, undersized water mains, inadequate sewer lines, too few hy-





## **EDITORIAL THOUGHTS**

### Pigs, Anyone?

Town Manager Duff says he hopes to get the garbage collection specifications out to bid, and a contract awarded, very soon.

And of course the hotter the weather, the more important this becomes, if it is to be done at all.

What we can't understand is the slow pace with which this piece of town business has been handled. It's quite a while since town meeting, when the money was voted; in fact, we suspect most voters thought it would begin at least by June 1.

Even acknowledging the necessity of writing to other communities to find out what they do; then of conferring with the Board of Health and the special study committee; and of consulting town counsel on legal aspects of the contract; and re-wording and polishing the contract and specifications - what takes so long?

Maybe it would have been easier to buy pigs, either animal or electric, for all the townspeople who wanted

At least the garbage would have been disposed of, and that's more than you can say now.

### Let's Understand One Another

The art of communication - of understanding what the other fellow means when he speaks, and of expressing your own ideas so that they, in turn, can be understood as you meant them - is taking a back seat.

And as a result, two town boards are at odds.

The School Committee and Selectmen seem to be having trouble in saying, clearly and concisely, what they mean, and understanding what is meant.

Some evident hard feelings have developed between the two elected boards - and it appears to us that most of it is generated by misunderstandings.

The Selectmen have mentioned a lack of "control" over future recreational sites at schools; it appears that this may have been taken to mean personal control by the Selectmen. But what was meant is quite different - control by the voters at town meeting, by keeping the recreation items out of the school department budget. Thus a lack of understanding has resulted in bad feelings.

When the high school recreation area was discussed, the words "ground cover" were used - no one defined them. Thus several days of fretting and fuming were experienced, until the definition was given, and the project could again go forward.

Members of all boards should carefully examine what they say on policy matters, so that others can understand them fully. It's easy to say things with the full knowledge that the speaker knows what he means; it's more important to be certain the listener understands.

### Good Example For Town

The neighbors in and around Lockway and Carmel rds. demonstrated, on the holiday, the interest that exists in celebrating the Fourth of July "at home"

Their street party - a smaller edition of the celebration sponsored by many towns - should serve as an indication that the community might better promote its own celebration, as an encouragement for residents to stay home over the many-times dangerous holiday. Other towns have found, much to their own surprise on occasion, that hundreds and thousands of residents will stay around and will take part in holiday festivities, if given the chance.

One of the plans for 1963 should be a real observance of the Fourth, on a town-wide basis. It would be lots of fun, and a whole lot safer than taking to the highways to find the same type of celebration in some other town.

Every American who cherishes his freedoms and who respects our free institutions should be deeply concerned about charges made on the House floor recently by Congress man Gerald Ford of Michigan. Ford alleged that Department of Defense officials had contacted private defense concontacted private defense con-tractors, urging them to seek to influence their representatives in Congress to vote for an increase in the public debt limit to \$308 billion, threatening cancellation or curtailment of Government contracts unless the ceiling was raised the Administration had pro-

The implications of Congress-man Ford's charges are ominous. The inspired genius which gave s the Constitution of the United

States set up three independent branches of the Federal Govern-ment - the Executive, the Legislative, and the Judicial. For almost 200 years our system of checks and balances - of three Branches Government with independent

integrity - has served America well. For the Executive Branch of proper influence over the Legislaproper influence over the Legisla-tive Branch would rapidly lead our nation down the road to totalitarianism. Certainly, the Ford charges, if true, constitute such an improper influence in my view. For non-elected employees of the Department of Defense to seek to influence an important vote in the Halls of Congress by threatening economic blackmail is a blatent attempt to strip the people of this nation of their sacred right independent, representative

Government. Upon hearing of Congressman Ford's charges, I took the Floor of the House and demanded an immediate investigation of the entire matter. Congressman Ford's sub-committee, the Defense Appropriations group, allocates the mammoth defense budget to the military. My subcommittee, Military Operations, is the watchdog over the use of these

Henry C. Sanborn, for whom the new school on Lovejoy rd. has been named, served Andover as superintendent of schools for 22 years - between 1916 and 1939. He was born in Webster, N. H. but was graduated from Reading this School. He received his igh School. He received his lachelor's degree from Dartmouth college, then spent a year studying anguages at Goettinger University

He served as superintendent in Franklin, N. H. and Danvers, before coming to Andover.

He introduced the junior high system here, and vigorously opposed retention of the old oneroom, multiple-class arrange-ment. During his early days here, the last of the single-room schools Mr. Sanborn's son, George K.

No personal consideration or friendships have affected Mr. Sanborn in arriving at these decisions. 'Is it for the best interests of the young people and of the town?' was the question which was the keynote of his policy. 

## Capital Expenditure Plans Ready For Town In Fall

Early fall is the deadline for receipt of a capital expenditure plan, now being prepared by Adams, Howard and Greeley for the town

The consulting firm - used also by the Planning Board - has reach-ed some tentative conclusions, which are being discussed with department heads. But Town Man-ager Thomas E. Duff believes the final plan won't be available until

The plan for the next seven years to 1970, will attempt to predict tax rates, based on various community decisions. It also will provide a suggested priority

will provide a suggested priority listing for various town projects, the cost of which will also be used in estimating the rate.

Mr. Duff explained that the forecast will be based on alternates if urban renewal and industrial development take place, or if they do not happen, and the tax base

do not happen, and the tax base grows correspondingly less. He emphasized, however, that the final report - as far as the predicted tax rate is concerned will be just an estimate or pre-diction, and can not be taken in

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any other way.

The consulting firm, in addition to studying a capital expenditures plan, is also preparing a study of the urban renewal area and the fringe areas round it, for the Planning Board.
