Hart, Normandy Were Elected By School Bd.

Board Of Appeals Will Study Plans

Deficiencies in plans for the first four apartment units next to the Shawsheen Plaza were noted by the Planning Board, during a Board of Appeals hearing a week ago.

William F. D'Annolfo, whose firm plans eventually to build nine apartments on the former Golden Farm, agreed to study the plans in light of the Planning Board findings. But he also informed the Appeals Board that he had not seen the report as it had been completed only about 3 p.m. the same day.

He had told the Board that the buildings will be of colonial design. Each of the apartments - four of which would be constructed now - will cost about \$100,000, he continued.

The land was zoned as a garden apartment district at town meeting in March.

The Planning Board report, presented by member Robert Goodwin, listed several areas in which the Board said requirements were not being followed. These included: building not set back far enough from the street lines; parking areas too close to property lines; insufficient street widths, inadequate provision for drainage, undersized water mains, inadequate sewer lines, too few hy-

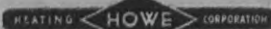
The charges result from the accident at Dascomb rd. and Andover st. May 26, which claimed two lives.

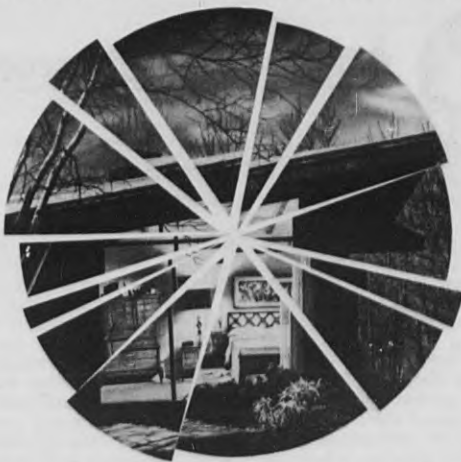

Sanborn Was Revered By All

Henry C. Sanborn, for whom the new school on Lovejoy rd. has been named, served Andover as superintendent of schools for 22 years - between 1916 and 1939.

He was born in Webster, N. H., but was graduated from Reading high school. He received his Bachelor's degree from Dartmouth College, then spent a year studying languages at Goettinger University in Germany.

He served as superintendent in Franklin, N. H., and Danvers, before coming to Andover.

He introduced the junior high system here, and vigorously opposed retention of the old one-room, multiple-class arrangement. During his early days here, the last of the single-room schools was closed.

Mr. Sanborn's son, George K. Sanborn, is a resident of the town, and has been on the faculty at Phillips Academy for a number of years. He is an instructor in mathematics and the author of several text books on the subject.

The School Committee of 1939, following Mr. Sanborn's death on the day he would have officially retired, adopted the following "Appreciation" of the superintendent, and included it in the records:

"Henry C. Sanborn became superintendent of schools in Andover in the summer of 1916. He was admirably fitted for the position. A graduate of Dartmouth in 1896, he had had broad experience in a similar position in Danvers and previous to that, six years in Franklin, N. H. It was a difficult time to assume the new responsibility. The construction of the present Punchard building had just begun, within a year our country was to enter the war. Unusual problems of administration and of policy were constantly presenting themselves - problems that required a cool, unbiased mind and an abundance of tact for their solution. Mr. Sanborn met them with characteristic efficiency. The school committee soon recognized that efficiency and gave him a free hand in administration. During the war years he gave unstintingly of his time and work to assisting all the agencies of town, state and

nation that needed the co-operation of the public schools.

"The absolute integrity of his life, his self-effacing modesty which forbade his seeking the personal or professional limelight, his utter fairness in dealing with the personnel of the school system, have created a respect for him among his co-workers and friends that any man may envy. Few people realize the constant demands for decision that are made on the superintendent's office. No personal consideration or friendships have affected Mr. Sanborn in arriving at these decisions. 'Is it for the best interests of the young people and of the town?' was the question which was the keynote of his policy. Progressive without being carried away by every new 'ism' he held to the things of proved value from the first, yet recognized the great changes in public school conditions which had occurred for the most part during his work here and he did his best to adapt our methods to those changes.

"The Shawsheen School, the present Junior High School and the fine Central building containing the auditorium, gymnasium and cafeteria are the lasting material monuments of his administration, while he leaves to his successor a united school system imbued with the spirit of public service which he did so much to inculcate.

"The death of Mr. Sanborn, following so closely upon his resignation, was a shock to the school organization and to the people of Andover. We had hoped that he would be spared to enjoy

his well-earned retirement for a few years at least, and that he would continue to share with us his richness of his long experience, ripened wisdom and sympathetic understanding of school affairs. He will be sorely missed.

"The Andover school system, for which Mr. Sanborn more than anyone else was responsible, is a lasting memorial to his long term as superintendent and to the unselfish devotion with which he served the schools of Andover for more than twenty years of his life."

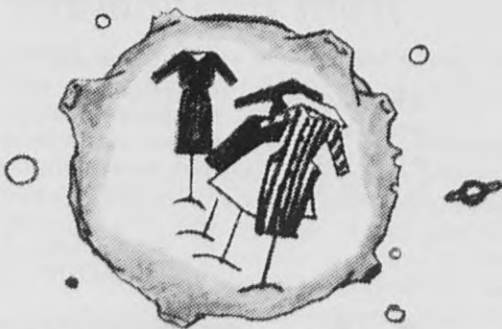

He indicated that the final contract provisions are now being written, and that following an invitation to bid, 15 days must be allowed.

Then the bids must be taken under advisement, he explained, while being studied. Whether there would be any delay, following awarding of the contract to the successful bidder, can not be forecast, Mr. Duff continued.

At a recent Selectmen's meeting, Mr. Duff explained that although town meeting restricted the amount of money that can be spent in a year, to \$25,000, it is legal for the Selectmen to bind the town for three years.

Thus it is believed that a three-year contract will be signed for the garbage collection. This question had been one of the legal stumbling blocks, until receipt of town counsel's ruling. It has been generally understood that bidders would have to be assured of a three-year contract, or their prices could not be competitive.

No breeding purple martin has been reported in the Greater Lawrence region since 1903, when the late Miss Florence I. Abbott at Elm and Chestnut sts., observed nesting martins, prior to the cold rains of June 1903 that killed many purple martins and caused their extirpation in eastern Massachusetts. The Poores are hoping to discover positive evidence that their bird visitors are actually nesting.

High Court

Reversed Ruling

The Benjamin F. Dimlich case apparently came to a close late last week, when the state Supreme Court reversed a lower court decision, and held that a majority of the School Committee acted within its rights in refusing reelection to Mr. Dimlich.

The Supreme Court, in effect, stated that more than three consecutive years in the position is necessary for tenure; that a previous case "Kelley vs School Committee of Watertown", governed in this case, even though some facts are different.

The decision noted that Mr. Dimlich served as acting principal from 1949-'50; from 1950 through 1957, a single supervising headmaster was appointed and Mr. Dimlich was a teaching submaster;

that in 1957 he was elected principal and was re-elected in 1958 and 1959.

The decision also stated that a reduction in pay, from \$6,700 as principal to \$6,300 as assistant principal at the High School, was valid. Mr. Dimlich is presently assistant at the High School and is teaching mathematics there.

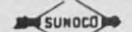

The consulting firm - used also by the Planning Board - has reached some tentative conclusions, which are being discussed with department heads. But Town Manager Thomas E. Duff believes the final plan won't be available until October.

The plan for the next seven years to 1970, will attempt to predict tax rates, based on various community decisions. It also will provide a suggested priority listing for various town projects, the cost of which will also be used in estimating the rate.

Mr. Duff explained that the forecast will be based on alternates - if urban renewal and industrial development take place, or if they do not happen, and the tax base grows correspondingly less.

He emphasized, however, that the final report - as far as the predicted tax rate is concerned - will be just an estimate or prediction, and can not be taken in

any other way. The consulting firm, in addition to studying a capital expenditures plan, is also preparing a study of the urban renewal area and the fringe areas round it, for the Planning Board.

A joint picnic of the Ballard Vale United Church and Sunday School was held at Rolling Ridge in North Andover. Swimming, softball, horseshoe pitching, candy hunt, and picnic lunches were enjoyed by all who attended.

Will Develop Smaller Site

The School Committee is going along with a plan to develop about seven acres of the 18-acre recreation site at the High School, instead of sub-grading the entire area. On advice of the architects, the Committee voted to call for bids on the smaller job, which will include a baseball field, football practice field and a girls' hockey field. The area will be finished, under the proposal.

During the discussion, the architects maintained that it will not be practical to drain and sub-grade the 18 acres then place a ground cover of any sort, to prevent dust from blowing around the neighborhood.

The latter requirement was initiated by the Selectmen, and had been the subject of some considerable discussion between the members of the two elected groups.

It was noted during the meeting last Friday night that the smaller portion of the job probably would attract more small businessmen. This, in turn, may mean tighter bidding and less expense to the town. If this pattern exists throughout the over-all project, the architects feel it may not cost any more than previously estimated. There had been some mention of spending one-third more than planned, if it became necessary to do smaller portions of the job.
