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Garbage Pick-up Coming Sept. 10

Garbage collection will start here Sept. 10, on a twice-weekly schedule. Town Manager Thomas E. Duff announced the starting date, after conferring with Albert Fiorante of Methuen, who will pick up the town's garbage. The twice-weekly schedule will be maintained for the balance of September, according to the specifications, then will continue once a week until next summer. Mr. Fiorante will be leaving a special notice at each home, giving his schedule, his telephone number and other pertinent data, so that all calls may be directed to him. According to the manager, Mr. Fiorante plans to use two new trucks, with packer bodies. He, his two employees, will man the vehicles and collect the garbage. Mr. Fiorante is now working out the best routes, Mr. Duff continued, but he indicated that there

Sanborn School Opening Delayed

All public schools, with the exception of the Henry C. Sanborn school on Lovejoy rd., will open next Thursday. The town's newest school will open the following Monday, Sept. 10. Supt. Edward I. Erickson expects at least 3,899 students on the first day of school, but wouldn't be too surprised if the actual attendance is higher than estimated. Hours for the high and junior high remain the same, but elementary schools this year will start at 8:45 instead of the customary 9 a.m. Regular sessions will be held in all schools opening day and cafeterias will serve lunch, except

A plea for great caution by motorists, when school opens next Thursday, was made this week by Patrolman William Tammany, school safety officer. He urged special care in the vicinity of the new Sanborn School, which will open Monday, Sept. 10. Emphasizing that Lovejoy rd. must be used by about 100 children daily, Tammany announced that one additional crossing guard will be stationed at the intersection of Lovejoy and Lowell st. Officers of the department will augment the patrol on Lovejoy rd. itself, and at Dascomb rd., during the first few days of school, to determine how much extra patrolling will be needed to protect the youngsters. The possibility of a crossing guard walking the route from Dascomb rd. to the school is also being considered, if initial observations indicate this to be required. Meanwhile, Town Manager Thomas E. Duff, after receipt of a letter from School Supt. Edward I. Erickson which urged action for the safety of the children, has

Due to a number of changes, school department officials hope that parents will check the routes carefully, and have their children at the bus stop a little early for a few days, until the schedules settle down to a routine.

Junior Football League Underway

Tyer Rubber Is Expanding

In a major step toward expansion of its Rubber Roll Covering Division, Tyer Rubber Corp., a subsidiary of Converse Rubber Co., is adding a new building comprising 3,000 sq. ft. adjacent to its present plant and is converting to manufacturing additional existing space. This is the second expansion of this division in less than 10 years. The new building, now approaching completion, will be fully equipped and in operation by early November. By enabling Tyer to utilize its present productive space more advantageously, by providing additional space for the installation of new equipment and for storage, and by raising the overall efficiency of the department, it is estimated that Tyer will be able to increase the productive capacity of this division by at least 20 percent. The steadily increasing volume of Tyer's rubber roll business was the determining factor in the decision to add the new

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Public and parochial schools will open next Thursday, with a combined enrollment of at least 4,421.

Supt. of Schools Edward I. Erickson anticipates a record enrollment of 3,899 - but wouldn't be surprised if the opening day figures are somewhat higher than the estimate. At St. Augustine's, the registration this week stood at 522. Within a matter of weeks, the town should have a total of some 5,719 students attending various schools - Pike opens Sept. 12, while Phillips Academy and Abbot Academy open Sept. 17.

At Pike, Headmaster William Harding expects 230 pupils; 230 will attend Abbot Academy and Phillips will have 838 in attendance. (Continued on Page Seven)

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Association Has Elected Officers

Dr. Robert Clifton is the newly-elected president of the Andover Visiting Nurse Association - one of the oldest services offered in the town.

Now a United Fund agency, the Association was run by the Red Cross for 30 years; then under the auspices of the Service Club, a separate organization was set up in 1950.

Headquarters for the organization is at 4 Punchard ave., where Helen Woodbury, R.N., is available for appointments on the following schedule: Monday through Friday, 8:30-9 a.m. and 1-2 p.m.; Saturdays, 8:30 to 9. During the remainder of the day she makes calls on patients who have been referred through the patients' physicians. This, it is explained, is the only way that the services of the nurse can be obtained.

Among the many services are: changing surgical dressings, administering hypodermics, care of the new born, care of the aged, and general bedside care for the convalescent. Minimum fees are established for the various services, but it is noted that the visiting nurse may adjust these so that no person need go without care.

SANBORN SCHOOL OPENING DELAYED

at the Sanborn school. Although milk and ice cream will be available at that school, pupils will have to carry their lunches for about two weeks.

The entire teaching and administrative staff of the school system will report for duty on Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 4 and 5. Meetings have been planned for these two days and time will be allocated for the staff to prepare for greeting the students at the start of a new school year.

New students who have not previously registered may do so on the first day of school. Kindergarten children are to report according to notices which have been mailed to parents.

More time will be available for class instruction in the elementary grades this year, through the use of two Wednesday after-

noons a month and through the addition of 15 minutes to the school day.

More time for planning will be available by the utilization of the remaining two Wednesday afternoons for building staff meetings and for grade level meetings respectively. The Wednesday afternoon elementary school schedule will be: Sept. 12, staff meetings (elementary pupils to be dismissed at noon); Sept. 19, regular instruction; Sept. 26, grade level meetings (elementary pupils to be dismissed at noon); Oct. 3, regular instruction; and so on alternately through the weeks. On the two new "early Wednesdays", each month, all children will be dismissed to render unnecessary the serving of lunch in the elementary school cafeterias. Later in the year, the schedule will be discussed to see whether planning has advanced to such a stage that regular class instruction in the elementary grades can take the place of the monthly staff meetings.

Much has been accomplished in the nature of repairs and improvements of the school facilities, according to Supt. Erickson. Some items of major importance include: the extension of modern lighting equipment in the Junior High School and Jackson School; re-decorating of classrooms in the Junior High School; painting the ceilings of the Memorial Auditorium and Gymnasium; painting the interior and exterior of the sash and trim of the Central School; and miscellaneous painting in all other schools.

Repairs have been made to combustion chambers and all oil

burners, and boilers have been inspected and serviced. Furniture and desk tops have been repaired and in many instances re-surfaced. New equipment and furniture has been purchased for the High, Junior High and Shawsheen Schools. The cafeteria kitchen ceiling at the Central School has been replaced and the Shawsheen School Cafeteria equipment has been completely modernized.

Throughout the school system miscellaneous repairs have been completed. All schools have been thoroughly cleaned and polished in preparation for the opening.

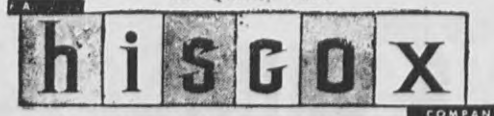

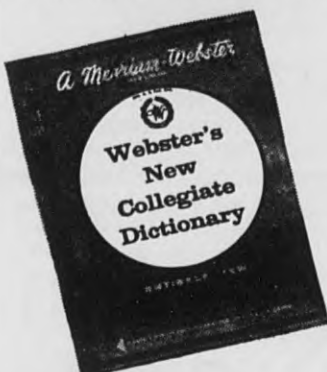

Compromise May Settle Issues

A compromise on the width of the paved surface of Lovejoy rd., when it is reconstructed under Chapter 90, appears to be the answer to many complaints from residents of the area.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff expects to ask the state to reduce the paved area from 26 feet to 24 feet, in accordance with wishes of residents along the street.

This will help save some of the trees, he explained, and may help cut down the thru-way look of the new street. Residents have previously complained that traffic on the street will move faster, with less care, when the reconstruction takes place.

The new plan, if the state agrees to it, may be ready to present to the county commissioners Sept. 11, when the adjourned hearing takes place in Salem.

Mr. Duff said he thinks many residents along the street, who were opposed to the plans originally, now have agreed to the compromise. But he said all of the objections have not been satisfied.

The section involved is from Dascomb rd. to the Sanborn School, although land takings will be made the full length of the street in anticipation of another project next year, involving the Lowell st. end of the old town thoroughfare.

At a meeting last week, residents were invited to view stakes placed where the new road lines will be placed. There was a general discussion of the objections, on the site, where Mr. Duff felt he was able to better explain the plan.

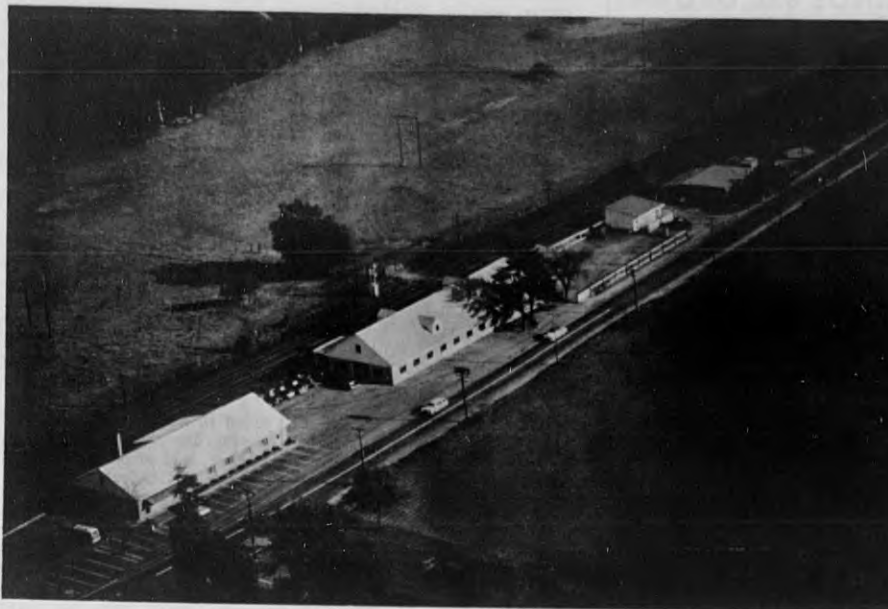

All People That On Earth
*All people that on earth do dwell
Sing to the Lord
with cheerful voice;
Him serve with fear,
his praise forth tell,

For why? The Lord our God is good,

His truth at all times firmly stood,
And shall from age to age endure.*

Called 'Old Hundred' after the 100th Psalm, this quaint old hymn has been in constant use for over 3½ centuries. It is the only hymn in present day hymnals which was sung by our forefathers in the Jamestown Colony. William Keble, a Scotch minister, wrote it while in exile in Geneva during the stormy period when freedom of thought was struggling for existence.

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New School Results In Changes In Bus Routes

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Fitting Tribute

Plans have been outlined for a fitting memorial to the late Eugene V. "Pop" Lovely, by a committee of men who studied and played football under his tutelage.

Many residents of the town today did not know Mr. Lovely - but if the loyalty and devotion of those who knew him is any measure of the man, and we believe it is, he must have been one of the great men of his day, as an educator as well as an unexcelled football coach.

We commend the planned memorial, and those who are undertaking to support it financially.

Confusing Statute

Conflict of interest laws, as they have been adopted by the Legislature for all cities and towns of the Commonwealth, seem to be far-reaching - perhaps to the point of absurdity.

We can understand regulations that forbid men in responsible positions from acting on matters from which they will profit.

It even makes sense to prevent partners of these officials from bringing items before town boards, so that there is an obvious conflict.

Possibly - although this is in a vast gray area - it makes sense to prevent retired officials from bringing matters before the town for a period of time after retirement.

But it appears possible, to a further extent, that an employee of the town might be stopped from working for a firm that does business with the town, even though no conflict of interest exists. This would be nonsense, but may well be the case.

A full interpretation of the law is needed, so that the gray areas can be examined thoroughly. The fine and jail sentence attached to the statute is no joke, specially for a man who is merely augmenting his income by working part time, for a contractor, who happens to do some town work.

Great Decisions Coming

The fall of 1962 will possibly go down in local history as the period of great decisions.

For officials of the town, and the voters, will be either acting on directly, or considering, projects that are of far-reaching importance.

Urban Renewal occupies center stage at the moment, and will come under still sharper scrutiny in the next two months, until a special town meeting makes a final decision.

But not far behind this vital question are several others, all important to the future of the town.

The School Committee will be thinking seriously about its housing problem - must we build an addition to the high school, or a second junior high? How quickly will another elementary school be needed?

The Selectmen and a special study committee will have under consideration plans for a new town hall and police station - this, regardless of the outcome of the urban renewal vote. For the town manager has described this building need as one that is pressing.

Presumably there will be considerable attention paid to planning - Route 495, although delayed, is certainly coming, and the town must be ready to adopt sensible zoning in connection with possible expansion of business and industrial areas.

These are but a few of the matters which should be decided, or brought into sharp focus, during the few months ahead. It looks like a year of great decisions ahead.

What Our Readers Say—

"I was interested to learn of the proposed urban renewal program in Andover. As a graduate of Phillips Academy, I have been interested in the town and its well-being. This interest has increased since my parents recently moved to Andover. Furthermore, as a resident of the New York metropolitan area, I have had the opportunity to observe many urban renewal projects of varied success.

"There is no question that intelligent, gradual, and above all, objective urban renewal is desirable. But I am not at all convinced that the proposed plan for Andover is the best way to do it. A number of features of the proposal, although they sound fine from the standpoint of academic planning theory, have not worked out very well in actual practice. These features include:

"The tearing down of most of the buildings in the center, even though less than half of them have structural deficiencies. Among other things, this destruction may well eliminate older, low-rent buildings which now allow new businesses to be started with limited capital.

"The closing (elimination) of streets 'in order to better handle traffic'! While at the same time making other streets one-way, will tend to foster a superhighway atmosphere in the center of town.

"The concentration of shops and offices into a smaller part of the center area, with the rest of the area consisting only of useless promenade and a vast expanse of

parking lot. There are apparently no other buildings with other uses to be in this area. The passageways and parking lots, probably deserted at night, may make the elderly tempting targets as they make their way through to the 'elderly housing' from Main st. and public transportation. For the elderly would certainly use such short cuts, just as shoppers coming from the parking lots will use the back entrances of stores, and no amount of attractive passageways will tempt them to walk around to use the front. Furthermore, the 'convenient' concentration of shops and exclusion of residences from the central area will mean that 63 households, now located convenient to the center and presumably shopping there, would be relocated 'outside of the project area' and might well take their patronage elsewhere.

"I do not wish to be too hard on the Urban Renewal office. They have obviously given the matter a great deal of thought. Their comments on finding new space for the occupants of demolished buildings, and on the fact that the illustrative site plan for shops and parking lots is merely one possibility, which requires further discussion, shows that they are approaching the problem realistically. But I wonder if it is realistic enough, and imaginative enough. I feel that by making use, to a greater extent, of what already exists, something better than the illustrative site plan can be developed. Something which is more like Andover and less like any other shopping center.

"The most sensible and cogent commentary on urban renewal that I know is the recent book 'The Death and Life of Great American Cities' by James Jacobs. While it deals mainly with big cities like Boston, I feel that there is a lot in it which has a bearing on a town the size of Andover. I would suggest that anyone seriously interested in urban renewal in Andover or anywhere else, get a copy and read it thoroughly.

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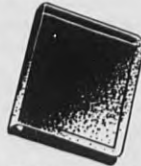

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What Our Readers Say—

To the Editor of the Townsman:
"Report has it that a city in Rhode Island is considering installing an automatic disposal in every house in the city. This would make more efficient use of the large investment in the city sewers and substantially reduce the cost of collecting garbage, if not removing it entirely. It appears this plan might be investigated to see how it would work in Andover.
"If 4,000 houses had to be equipped at, say, \$90 each, that would come to an investment of \$360,000. If that amount was borrowed for 15 years, the interest

would come to about \$60,000 for the entire period if some of the money was repaid each year. Thus the total cost of the installation to the town would come to about \$420,000.

"If garbage collection costs the town an average of \$40,000 a year, for a period of 15 years, that would come to \$600,000 for the entire period, or a cost of \$180,000 over the method proposed. That means that the individual house-to-house collection method would work out to be nearly 50 percent more costly than the plan here suggested for consideration.

"All new houses would be required to have such a device installed by the builder at his expense. Those houses presently equipped with the device could be given a \$50 rebate on taxes at

the end of six years of the new method, the \$50 to come from savings made by the new method.
"A total of \$420,000 invested in this plan would be a direct benefit for all the people of the town. On the other hand, the \$1,000,000 plus (costs and interest) which the proposed urban renewal scheme shall cost us, would merely be a localized and intangible benefit to a few citizens and the townhouse politicians."

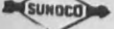

(c) The Board of Appeals may, under Section XIII of this by-law, grant a special permit for the parking or keeping, in Single Residence, Multiple Residence, Apartment and Educational Districts, of vehicles or equipment other than those allowed in 6 (a) above, provided that the Board finds such parking will not, under the circumstances, be detrimental to the neighborhood. The Board may impose such conditions as it deems necessary to safeguard the neighborhood, including limitations of time, number of vehicles, weight or capacity of vehicles or equipment. Among other things, the Board shall consider size, location of the lot, density of the neighborhood, vehicular access, garaging or parking facilities.

(d) A temporary permit, not exceeding one year, may be granted at the discretion of the Building Inspector for the parking or keeping of equipment, trucks or vehicles on construction sites.

Work Underway At High School

The bids were opened last week, and members of the School Committee met with the town manager to approve the contract.

Other bidders were L. C. Cyr Co. of Lawrence, \$40,500; Gerald Leone, \$44,400; and Gargulinski Bros., \$46,900.

The low bidder submitted the low bid on a previous set of specifications for the project, amounting to \$35,620. But included was his statement that removal of ledge would be an extra. Other bidders at that time included the price of ledge removal, but all of them were in excess of the appropriation for the job.

The new specifications are described as more flexible, allowing the playing fields to be shifted around if excessive ledge is found.

Workmen were at the High School all weekend, cleaning out brush and burning it. One of the reasons for the extra-time work was the necessity of maintaining the fire that had been started to burn up the green wood. Putting out such a fire, then starting it again, was said to be an annoying and time-consuming process.

Waiting For Radio Frequency

The town has asked for another radio frequency, for its department of public works.

Money to buy radios for the department, on a matching fund basis with Civil Defense, was appropriated at town meeting last March.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff explains that the original frequency designated for the town can not be used.

When a frequency is assigned, he has explained, other communities using it must agree that there will be no conflict. The city of Manchester, N. H., has not agreed, however, thus barring Andover from using the same frequency.

When the state designates a frequency now, however, Mr. Duff says bids will go out for some radio equipment.

Whether or not the town will buy as much as previously planned is a question, however.

The manager said this week that matching CD funds may not be available to start such a radio project - but may be available another year for the expansion of an existing facility. If this be the case, Mr. Duff hopes to buy the basic equipment in one year, then add to it under matching funds in 1963.

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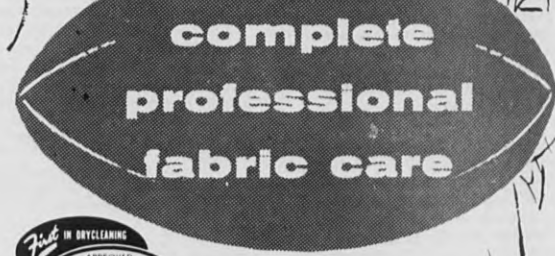
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
