Planning Board In "Quandry" Over Renewal Plan

Voters Swarmed To Polls Tuesday In Show Of Strength; Followed State-Wide Pattern

Sixty percent of the town's eligible voters turned out for the primary Tuesday, in a demonstration of interest in the selection of candidates for November's election.

A total of 5,696 men and women cast ballots, out of a total registration of 9,483.

Republican and Democratic voters here followed the trend of the state, in most part. One exception was the support given to Democratic the convention-endorsed candidate for attorney general. While former atty. gen. Francis E. Kelly rolled up a wide lead throughout the state, Andover gave Lawton 594 to Kelly's 487.

In local contests, Rep. Arthur Williams led the field, and went on to capture one of the three Republican nominations for the House. Raymond LaRosa, in the Democratic primary, also was nominated.

Dean Webster impressively clobbered opponent George Marad in the Republican senatorial contest - 3,193 to 396. Webster was nominated in the district and will face incumbent James Rurak of Haverhill in November.

This is the final step required before bids can be sought on the Chapter 90 project. Town Manager Thomas E. Duff hopes some work can be done this fall, including a sidewalk between Dascomb rd. and the new school.

FinCom Is Studying Facts

The Selectmen are now waiting for word from two appointed committees concerning Urban Renewal.

At a joint meeting Monday night, Chairman Russell G. Doyle told the Planning Board and Finance Committee that a decision should be reached as soon as possible, followed by a meeting with the Selectmen. He urged each of the boards to act quickly in meeting with the Housing Authority, then make up their minds on the plan.

The Selectmen have indicated they wish to hear the advice of the two boards, before making up their own minds. Mr. Doyle reminded the groups that the Selectmen have agreed to make known their opinions, prior to the Nov. 19 town meeting.

At the Monday session, Planning Board chairman Harold King said his board is "still in a quandry" about Urban Renewal.

Conflicts Can Be Problem

Town department heads had a fast look at the state's effort to legislate ethics - the lengthy and far-reaching conflict of interest law - Tuesday morning.

And most seemed in agreement that the legislature should revise the statute before its effective date May 1, 1963.

Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien discussed the law with the municipal employees, as he will with the Selectmen and other town boards.

He told the meeting that the penalties seem out of proportion - but indicated that, unless revision is accomplished, the law must be obeyed.

The basic concept is that a town employee should not accept a fee for any action in which the town is a party, or has a direct and substantial interest.

But defining "direct" and "substantial" are more difficult, according to counsel.

In one hypothetical case, he suggested that the town has a "direct" and "substantial" interest in zoning. Thus an employee, who is a surveyor on his own time, probably could not help someone locate a house lot so that it would conform to proper zoning.

Certainly, it was indicated, the employee could not submit a subdivision plan to the town, even though this was done in a private capacity.

Additionally, what a town employee's family does makes a substantial difference.

The family is defined as the spouse, parents of both, brothers and sisters of both, and their children.

According to the interpretation,

Lovejoy Road Closed To Traffic Mornings

Charges Hurlled At Meeting

Charges that one School Committee member was putting another "on the spot" were hurled at the session Sept. 11.

Dr. Milton J. Meyers accused member Vincent P. Davey of putting Chairman Robert J. McIntyre "on the spot" by asking him to state his reasons for approving the appointment of a Junior High school principal when all of the board could not be present. McIntyre was at Great Lakes Naval Training station at the time of the appointment, and gave his verbal approval to the Committee's taking immediate action, via a telephone conversation with Supt. Edward I. Erickson.

Mr. Davey said he had many requests from residents, seeking to know why McIntyre gave this approval for action while he was away.

Mr. McIntyre replied that he believed it essential to have an appointment made at that time, and he would not return for some time, felt that the remainder of the

Lovejoy rd. will be closed down for a half-hour each morning, while youngsters walk to the Henry C. Sanborn School.

But at noon and at closing time, safety patrols and crossing guards will handle the traffic.

The Selectmen concurred with Police Chief David L. Nicoll, by formally voting to establish this procedure.

The action came after members read a letter from the School Committee requesting that the street be closed three times daily.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff reported that the police are satisfied with the present arrangements. Only a few children are on the street at noon, he explained, and these are mostly kindergarten pupils.

In the afternoon, by having a crossing guard walk along with the patrols - towards Dascomb rd. and Lowell st. - the children's safety is protected without closing the street.

Mr. Duff commented that the children struggle to school in the morning, so that there is no chance of setting up a patrol. But in the afternoon, school officials can organize this group of walking

Phillips Sees Many Changes

There are many changes apparent today as Phillips Academy, one of the nation's oldest and largest independent boarding schools, begins classes for its 185th year.

The school is bigger than ever, with 840 students; new dormitories and recitation buildings are in operation for the first time; and Headmaster John M. Kemper announced that the school would be functioning on a record budget of more than \$3,000,000. When he came to his post 14 years ago, the total was just about half that.

There will be 777 boarding students this year, and 63 day boys, most of the latter from the immediate Andover-Lawrence area. Increases in both figures are part of a general plan to make the school contribute to a larger group of deserving students. Last year the enrollment began at 828. In 1953, it was 740.

Advertising For Rt. 495 Bids

Commissioner Jack P. Ricciardi has announced the advertising of bids by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works for the construction of about 3.4 miles of an Andover - Lawrence segment on Interstate Route 495. The DPW estimated cost is \$6,157,490.15. Specifications, which include the erection of 12 bridges, call for a double-barrel expressway, with three 12-foot travel lanes and a 10-foot breakdown lane in each direction.

This project, scheduled for completion in 970 calendar days, combines two which were previously advertised. The low bids at that time were rejected by the Department of Public Works.

CONFLICTS CAN BE PROBLEM

(Continued from Page One) the business activities of any member of the family could put an employee into a conflict of interest situation.

And according to definition, a town employee is any paid employee, any appointed member of a board or committee, whether paid or unpaid, and any elected official.

One category of employee is set apart from all others, however. A special employee is one whose responsibility to the town is limited to a specific area. And in brief, the town manager can, in writing, agree that the individual has no conflict of interest as far as that specific area is concerned. If this is done, the individual may serve within the prescribed, limited area.

Mr. O'Brien felt that the Selectmen may, at some future time, wish to designate certain persons as special employees, thus allowing them to serve on some committees or boards.

The extent to which the new statute can be enforced is presently difficult to state.

But throughout his remarks, Mr. O'Brien stressed examples which indicate that a conflict of interest can exist under many conditions that are far less obvious than those which might come to mind.

Even the section of the law allowing town employees to seek written interpretations from town counsel came under scrutiny.

One department head suggested that if an employee sought the opinion of town counsel, then subsequently was charged with a conflict under the law, the counsel would himself be involved in the conflict of interest.

Mr. O'Brien noted that he represents the town at all times, and is doing so under this statute. But he agreed that there was something to the suggestion that it's difficult to advise a person, then represent the town against the person.

However, he thought that most of the rulings he will be asked to make are those of an anticipatory nature - prior to the creation of the situation - so that the conflict is not likely to arise.

In another section of the law, he noted that if an employee does not rid himself of the conflict, and remains in violation beyond May 1, 1963, he can be prosecuted by the police or the district attorney. Further, the person may be prevented from doing business with the town for a year or longer.

The town, in a civil action, can negate any contract where a conflict is discovered.

CATERPILLARS PREPARE FOR COLD WINTER

It's going to be a cold, early winter.

But the weather will moderate somewhat during the middle of the season, only to turn much colder by winter's climax.

Lovejoy Critical Of Meeting Policy

School Committee members had a brief debate over not meeting in the summer, when the Board met Sept. 11. Member Vincent P. Davey, stating that some of the names appearing on a list of teachers and administrators hired during the summer were unknown to him, claimed that the Board should have met. He said hiring teachers is one of the prime responsibilities of the Board and should not be put over.

Early last summer, Supt. Edward Erickson was given authority by the Committee to engage teachers required during the summer. Mr. Davey gave special attention to the position of assistant principal at the High School, now held by Charles Q. Adams of Waterbury st. He said the com-

ment was not intended to reflect on Mr. Adams ability, but to the point that such administrative positions should be first considered by the School Committee. The debate briefly centered around the fact that the Committee had given its approval to the hiring of teachers during the summer. And there also was a difference of opinion over the relative importance of the administrative posts in the system. Some thought that the Committee should only interview candidates for the higher administrative jobs - such as the curriculum coordinator - while Mr. Davey maintained that this should be the practice for all administrative positions.

this week with the emergency vehicle pressed into service as a substitute for the ambulance. The police station wagon, meant to be used only as a back-up vehicle in emergencies, has been used extensively since the 1956 ambulance was laid up with a ruined engine.

However, the station wagon also is used on regular police work, and is not always readily available when calls are received. In cases where a patient needs a stretcher, it has been necessary to summon the wagon from some other part of town; or in some cases, a cruiser has responded.

It has been estimated that a new engine for the ambulance will cost up to \$1,500. On the basis of Chief Hilton's comments that the vehicle has needed constant attention and repair since 1956, the FinCom believed it unwise to put more money into it.

The fire department budget for 1962 contained funds to buy a new ambulance, but at that time the Finance Committee felt that repairs could be carried on for at least another year. At that Committee's request, the item was dropped from the budget last winter.

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Basic Facts Forgotten

The Selectmen, Planning Board and Finance Committee discussed Urban Renewal Monday night, with members of the Housing Authority and Director Ernest N. Hall.

Frankly, we were shocked to find that some basic facts, which have been repeated many times, are still misunderstood by some members of those boards.

We can not help wondering, amid the wealth of detail and the more-or-less complicated financial explanations, whether some of the basic procedures of the renewal plan have been lost. If so, it is difficult to foresee sensible action by the voters Nov. 19.

If, as appeared to be the case, some town officials still do not have the basic facts in their minds, then is it too much to expect the townspeople to do more? Perhaps so.

Possibly the Housing Authority will have to provide some of these facts and procedures for the townspeople once again, thus going back to the fundamentals that have previously been covered. This is the only way that agency can be at all certain that the voters understand the basic issues — for obviously, a few of our town officials do not presently have a clear picture of the facts.

Revision Needed

Under provisions of the conflict of interest law passed by the Great and General Court this year, the town can be stripped of many officeholders and many unpaid board members.

For the law is so vast in its outreach that hardly a businessman will dare to serve on a town board; few lawyers with local clients, nor engineers with area affiliations, will dare to become involved.

The extent to which the town will be deprived of the valued services of professional and business men is only now being appreciated. And as the law becomes more clear, the need for revision is obvious.

Our legislators adopted a conflict of interest law at a time when they were forced by public opinion to vote in favor; to do otherwise would have placed the legislator on record as favoring sin — something no public official is willing to do.

But there was scant attention paid to the ramifications of the law, how far it would reach into the lives of the townspeople and the municipal employees.

In addition to declaring obvious conflicts to be punishable by fines and jail terms, the law extends outward and onward — affecting a town employee's family and outside business associates. In fact, legal counsel isn't sure where the end can be found — even remote conflicts by definition under the law may be punishable, where actual conflict does not even exist.

Town Counsel Fredric S. O'Brien has the job, under provisions of the statute, of interpreting the law as it applies to each specific case. Employees of the town — and this includes all board members, elected or appointed, salaried or unpaid — can seek his specific advice.

But he is hampered by a lack of precedent, of interpretation by the courts.

Hopefully, by the time May 1, 1963 rolls around, the legislature will have revised the law. That date is the effective date of the law — set far ahead of the date of passage.

We think every citizen should stress the need for revision with his representative and senator — otherwise the town will be hurting badly by next spring.

No Delay, Please

The Finance Committee has given tacit approval to the purchase of a new ambulance, by authorizing the fire chief to call for bids.

There should be not the slightest deviation from the decision to purchase a new vehicle immediately.

The town is without an ambulance now, because the 1956 model needs a new engine, if it is to be used. But it seems to us, as it does to the Selectmen and the Fin-Com, that putting up to \$1,500 into the old ambulance is a waste of money.

Meanwhile, emergency cases are being handled by the police-owned station wagon. This car is equipped with a

stretcher, but it is not normally pressed into use unless the fire department vehicle is busy, or there is a serious accident with many injured.

The police department uses the station wagon on police business — thus it is not centrally located when it is needed for emergencies. Not many days ago, a potentially serious accident occurred near the center of town, and the station wagon was out on the far end of Haggett's Pond rd. A cruiser had to respond, and luckily, the accident turned out to be less serious than feared. Had it been necessary to transport a patient with serious injury to the hospital, it would have first been necessary to wait however long it takes to get clear across town.

There is a real need for the new ambulance — we're happy to see that steps are being taken to get one. As soon as bids come in, the expenditure should be clearly and explicitly authorized, so that no further delay takes place.

Senator Saltonstall, who will have vacancies at all the academies, urged students in their junior or senior years to apply to their Senators, their Congressman and the Vice President of the United States for appointment. "Many students do not know that they can apply through all sources of appointment simultaneously, thus increasing their chance of being a principal or alternate nominee," said the Senator.

Principals were informed that application forms and sample examination questions would be furnished promptly to applicants, who must return their completed applications to the Senator by Oct. 20.

The designation examination is held by the U. S. Civil Service Commission for members of Congress who desire it as part of their selection procedure. Senator Saltonstall has used it throughout his tenure in the Senate. In selecting nominees, he considers prime factors to be: motivation and desire to serve one's country, leadership qualities, excellence of school record, and of course a good grade in the designation examination.

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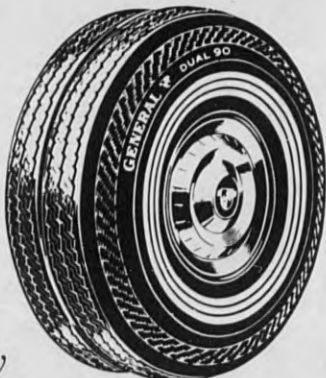

Board should act.

Dr. Meyers, noting that members often disagree, charged that Mr. Davey's comments and questions were designed to put the chairman on the spot. And he noted that, as far as he was concerned, Mr. McIntyre has fairly and impartially conducted the meetings. "I like the way you've been acting as chairman", he told Mr. McIntyre.

Mr. Davey, denying the accusa-

tion, said he merely was trying to find out the answers.

He stated that two qualified persons were available - Principal William A. Hart and former principal Benjamin F. Dimlich. Dr. Meyers stressed the point that this was Mr. Davey's personal belief and not that of the Committee. He also noted that Mr. Davey's feelings, and Mr. McIntyre's reasons, are in the minutes of the early summer meeting, available for anyone to see.

Member John S. Sullivan noted that several appointments hinged on making that particular decision at that time, rather than waiting until much later in the summer.

The board has not discussed the cost figures, he told the meeting, and several other questions remain to be answered, he declared.

Chief among these was the possibility of some rehabilitation taking place in the present plan, rather than complete demolition and re-building.

Parking also takes precedence with the Planning Board, with Mrs. Virginia Hammond asking that a clear policy be worked out prior to any adoption of the plan.

She expressed the view that parking must be planned as an entity, whether it be privately owned or a municipal function. Otherwise, she feared that small parking areas for each building would give the whole project an undesirable appearance and a parking system that will not function well. Her argument centered on the design, rather than the amount of parking. The latter requirement is set forth on a ratio basis.

Mr. King also noted that, in his opinion, there is insufficient room on the west side of Main st. for a developer to create all the parking the plan requires. Thus, he said, some of this required space must be furnished on the opposite side of the street - and he wondered how a developer could be required to do this.

Mr. King, at one point, was almost literally shouted down by members of the Housing Authority. He had just made the statement that all buildings would be torn down, then the developers would be sought, when Housing Chairman David MacDonald Jr. and other Authority members interrupted.

Mr. McDonald stressed that no buildings will be torn down in the Renewal area, until a developer's plan for the area has been approved by the Housing Authority with the formal concurrence of the Planning Board and the Selectmen. He indicated that this portion of the procedure, within the plan, has not been changed in any way from the

early days of the project, when it was explained to the various town boards.

Thus, it was pointed out, such matters as parking could be controlled by requiring a developer to provide the area according to town wishes, prior to approval of the plan.

Mr. King, who said he had thought that all structures on the Main st. would be torn down at once, suggested that the required approval of the three boards might help solve the parking problem. However, throughout the meeting, the subject continued to be presented as one requiring further discussion.

Urban Renewal director Ernest N. Hall commented that changing the parking areas to municipal ownership would require a complete re-drafting of the financial structure, and this, he said, would take a long time.

There also was a brief discussion of whether assessed values of new structures would reach the anticipated \$3,000,000 if the town owned the parking. One view has it that the structures and the businesses housed therein receive the value of the parking, and thus can be assessed as if each building had its own. Another view has it that the assessed values would fall off somewhat, being decreased by virtue of that fact that the property owner can be taxed only for what he has.

An anticipated tax income of \$90,000 was briefly discussed, and it was agreed that this is a projected figure that can not be other than a "guesstimate" at this time. Throughout the meeting, Mr. Hall emphasized that, at this point, the Selectmen and Planning Board have been conferring on many of the problems for some time. And he suggested that the plan as now presented represents the work of all three boards.

Town Manager Thomas E. Duff received a strong second from Finance Committee Chairman Phillips B. Marsden Jr., on the necessity for continuing the town's capital expenditure program.

Both men stressed the need to consider Urban Renewal costs as superimposed on the financial structure of the town, not forgetting that other expenditures are required beyond the normal maintenance and operation. The Finance Committee has not, it was indicated, made up its mind on the subject, but will seek to meet again with the Housing Authority for clarification of details.

Dormitories Finished At Merrimack Col.

The final four wings of the Merrimack College dormitories have recently been approved by college officials. The approval completes the construction of the housing units which began two years ago when one wing and a core area of each dorm was erected. Built with the aid of a federal housing and Home Finance Agency loan, the dormitories are valued at over \$2,300,000. Both Austin Centre, the men's quarters, and Monican Centre, the women's quarters, are designed and built in like ways with the three wings meeting at the core. The cores house two lounges, a reception area, phones, and artistically designed fireplaces. The basements contain coin-operated washing and drying machines.

Two of the three wings in each dormitory have three room suites with accommodations for four students per suite. The rear wing of both structures is built along more conventional lines. These have rooms for two students and house fully equipped four room infirmaries. The basement recreation rooms have facilities for television lounges, health rooms, ping-pong, shuffleboard and assorted vending machines. The completion of the dormitories will enable the college to accommodate 600 resident students. It also heralds the beginning of a new era for the rapidly expanding institution.

Many unenrolled voters took part. There were 3,648 registered Republicans prior to the primary, while 3,746 GOP votes were cast. Not all registered Republicans would have taken part in the election, however, indicating that many voters preferred to participate in that primary.

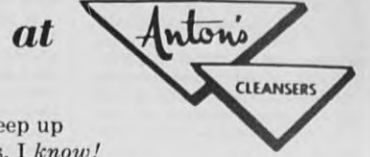

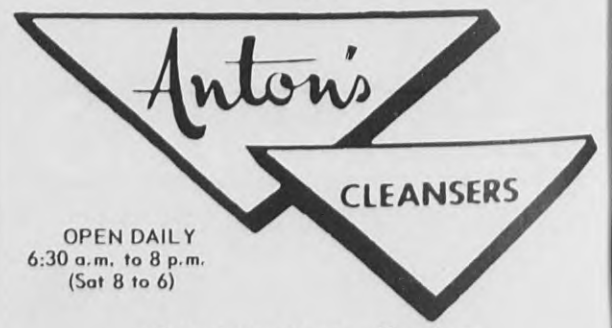
