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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Whole Town Grows

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In recent months we have heard the suggestion that all areas of town government should put building needs in the background, because of required school construction. To be sure, we can see the wisdom of planning to spread out construction over a number of years, when this

is possible. But it occurs to us, as it must to others, that the very reasons which compel us to embark on school construction

also require expanded facilities throughout the town. So it is virtually impossible to let all other municipal

construction go by, while concentrating on schools. The population growth demands so many other town services. Rather, we foresee increasing responsibility for the

capital expenditures committee, recently appointed by the Selectmen. That group could schedule the projects, with some over-all objectivity.

Lingering Doubt

We view the probability of having the vocational school within the town borders with mixed feelings.

All that has been said about the advantages of the school to the area is true. And probably the site on River rd., across from North st., is one of the best available.

Yet there is a lingering doubt in our minds as to the ultimate benefit of removing real estate from taxation, as will be the result in this case.

We have also wondered some about placing the school in an area where close to 100 percent of the students must be transported. There is no public transportation to the area. About five percent of the students will come from Andover, leaving 95 percent of the enrollment for Lawrence, Methuen and North Andover. Obviously transportation must be provided, and this could be an increasing annual burden.

The Regional School Committee has the authority to acquire a site, without consultation with the communities. It is reported that 11 sites have been studied, and the River rd. area has been chosen. So there's little to be gained in terms of a review of the site.

But we'll always wonder whether or not, from the Andover view point, this is the wisest course of action.

Protection From Bikes

A few weeks ago, one of our readers suggested that children on bicycles be prevented from riding helterskelter along Main st., during the course of the Memorial Day parade.

We have another one to add.

Last weekend's Sidewalk Bazaar was a real success; the crowds were dense, and the street was full of pedestrians.

Yet many children - some appearing to be teen-agers and others a few years younger - zipped through the crowd on their bikes. They disregarded the safety of pedestrians, by weaving through the crowds and up and down the street.

The young people who have so little regard for the rights of people on foot should be, in some way, taught that their actions are wrong. Certainly the police can't patrol such an event sufficiently to keep wild bicycle riders under control, there aren't enough men for that.

Perhaps it comes down to the issuance of an official ultimatum that bicycles may not be ridden on the town streets, if their owners do not show sufficient care for others. One way or another, the relatively few children who ride this way must be brought under control.
