Cut Clerical Staff In Favor Of Education Birnbach Urges

School Committee member David Birnbach called for a "lean and mean" budget regarding the indirect labor from the clerical staff attached to the school system.

"School enrollment has decreased in recent years but figures show that the clerical support has increased," Birnbach said. "The secondary school enrollment has decreased by 350 students but the clerical staff has gone up. With the advent of computors taking some of the work from the clerical staff, this shouldn't be the case."

"Each year the State Department of Education has called for more and more reporting and we must look toward principals and program advisors to assist school administrators. The state has hired 26 additional employees because of Chapter 188 (The Educational Reform bill). It's a paper horror show," Business

Manager Frank Paul informed Birn-bach.

Birnbach proposed cutting the clerical staff to put more money into direct labor, teacher training and toward student education.

Birnbach's proposal of re-directing funds, primarily from the clerical staff, would be filtered into a Teacher's Institute for the 304 full-time teachers in the Andover school system and for plans such as the Paideia proposal and the Curriculum Instruction plan. The proposal called for a six-week training program for 100 teachers in each session, on a rotation basis, that would center around teacher renewal and curriculum development. The teachers would be paid \$500 per week for the training sessions.

Birnbach estimated that the program could be funded from 2.8 percent of the total school budget, at a cost of \$450,000. The breakdown would include, \$300,000 for teacher salary and \$50,000 for program costs and an additional \$100,000 for teacher in-service programs throughout the school year.

"You have some very valid points, but we have been squeezing the system for the past several years," School Committeeman Michael Giammusso told Birnbach. "We've cut teachers and made other cutbacks, and gone around and around again. I would be speaking against motherhood and apple pie, but I think we need to be increasing funds for the school system not pinching a dollar here and a dollar there."

Committeeman Richard Neal expressed the opinion that trade-offs, not additional dollars, should be used to institute administration proposals such as the Curriculum Instruction plan

"We need to be informed what the trade-offs in the budget would be needed to
put into effect the curriculum plan. I
don't mean trade-offs like not teaching

To Perform Mass In C

Beethoven's Mass in C, Op. 86'' will be performed by the Phillips Academy Cantata Choir and Chamber Orchestra, under the direction of William Thomas, on Friday, Feb. 28, at 8 p.m. at St. Mary's Church in Lawrence. Soloists will be Beda Polanco, soprano, Suzanne Tanner, P.A. '81, alto, Allen Combs, tenor, and Santo Cataudella, bass. The

The "Mass in C" was commissioned from Beethoven in 1807 by Prince Esterhazy for his chapel. Beethoven presumably considered Esterhazy's vast resources when scoring it for four soloists and chorus and an orchestra with two each of flutes, oboes, clarinets, bassoons, horns and trumpets, plus timpani and strings with double-basses and organ in the continuo.

Beethoven completed the Mass in the summer of 1807 at Heiligenstadt, the charming village near Vienna, and it was first performed in the Esterhazy chapel on September 13. It was said to have been greatly under-rehearsed and, therefore, made an unfavorable impression. Beethoven eventually dedicated the work to Prince Ferdinand Kinsky and it was not until 1812 that the publisher agreed to publish the Mass after continually arguing that there was no demand for church music. Beethoven replied, ". . I do not like to say anything about my Mass or myself, but I believe I have yreated the text as it has seldom been treated."

Beethoven must have welcomed the opportunity of de-claring his faith in the Mass, for by 1807, his profound sense of vocation to his art had helped him overcome his despair over the increasing deafness which had afflicted him for many years. He had adopted a truly religious resignation to his malady and we can believe that the words he inscribed above the credo of the "Missa Solemnis of 1824," "God, God alone has never deserted me," were true of his whole adult life.



Decathlon Team Finishes Seventh

Andover High School's academic decathlon team returned to Cambridge Ringe and Latin High School on February 8 to compete in the semifinals of the United States Academic Decathlon competition. Designed to reward achievement in academics rather than athletics, the U.S.A.D. held competitions across the nation similar to the one Andover participated in. Each team consisted of two "A" students, two "B" students and two "C" students to avoid having too many "eggheads" from one school. The winners in each state will compete in the national

finals in Los Angeles in April.

By finishing eighth in the quarterfinals last November, Andover High earned the right to compete for the Massachusetts championship against the top teams in the state. Lauren Pickard, Susan Sofia, Mary Robb, David Maguire, Erin Kaufmann, David Pouliot and alternate Kim Guild represented Andover High School. In addition to the rigorous testing in math, science, language and literature, social science, economics and fine arts that they went through last November, the decathletes also had to give a fourminute speech, write an essay and be interviewed by judges for the semifinal competition.

When all scores were finally totaled after more than seven hours of competition, Andover had come in seventh place out of 16 schools. This was quite an accomplishment when one considers that these schools had budgets larger than Andover High's and preparation more complex than that of the Andover team. In addition, when medals were awarded in each subject to the three categories (A, B or C), Andover won three gold medals, Mary Robb for her speech and Susan Sofia and Erin Kaufmann for their interviews; a silver medal, David Maguire for his essay; and two bronze medals, Lauren Pickard for her speech and Mary Robb for her interview.

Credit for the success of the Andover academic decathlon team should be given to Mrs. Ruby Easton, head guidance counselor, who coached the team, for the most part, by herself. Many thanks should also be given to School Committee Chairman Donald Robb who coached the decathletes in economics and went to Cambridge with them to lend support. Andover didn't win this year, but by their improving each time out, it's just a matter of time until Mrs Easton takes her



Pros And Cons Of Business Zone Changes Presented Planners

By Susan K. O'Neill

At last week's meeting the Planning Board heard arguments for—and against—zoning changes from Residential to General Business for five land parcels. The discussion—concerning two board-proposed changes at 12 and 14 Bartlet Street, and three parcels proposed by owners—reflected the reluctance of local residents to add property to the GB zone.

Principal Planner Nancy Jeton explained that the board had requested the Bartlet Street changes because the two pieces of property suffered from a "hardship" posed by the intrusion of adjacent General Business property.

As defined by the board, said Jeton, "hardship" occurs when a lot in a residential zone suffers from severe visual intrusion from the General Business District on more than one side, and when it fronts on a street which experiences a significant volume of business-related traffic, such that the property would be rendered unsuitable for residential

In discussing the board-proposed properties, hearing participants advanced the argument that such "spot-zoning" simply expanded GB boundaries by creating the same sort of hardship for neighboring residential property

when the rezoned property takes on a business use. Chairman Margaret Bradshaw explained that the board had also discussed the point. To avoid the situation, it had considered the parcels for the new proposed Multi-Family zoning designation, but had ultimately decided that a GB rezoning would be more appropriate. She further explained that the board had established criteria for future rezoning, preferring to do so on a street-by-street or neighborhood basis; "That's what we're making for a rec-

ommendation in our report to the town," she said.

The Bartlet Street properties, she said, were being put forth as candidates for rezoning on a "one-time" basis; they were the board's only choices for such action under the hardship definition.

A member of the audience suggested that Andover town meetings have historically turned down attempts to rezone residential parcels to business. Because the owners had bought the property as residential, he said, it should present no hardship for them to keep it as residential.

Marion Colgate, the owner of 12 Bartlet St., explained that she had tried to maintain her home as a residence, but that doing so had become impossible. "I myself have difficulty getting in and out of my driveway, because patrons of a business across the street parked in front of her house to pick up their orders.

She added that she could not allow her daughter to ride

her bike in front of the house, saying, "That, to me, is what a residential district is.

Questioned about the difference between her situation now and the way it had been 10 years ago, when a Purity Supreme supermarket had stood next to her land, Colgate said, "The character of the traffic has changed...There are many more people; much more traffic."

She added that a change to Multi-Family would not improve her situation, because the property would still not enjoy an appropriate residential character. Elaine Katz asked the board if it was their intention to seek out new business from "outside" by expanding the

GB zone through the zoning changes. Chairman Bradshaw answered, "No—I think we're trying to meet the needs of a growing town." As for the specific issue, she added, "We're just trying to correct a

zoning hardship in this case."

Howard Yezerski of Park Street agreed with the board's proposed changes. "Andover is not what it was 10 years ago," he said. "It's really short-sighted and reactionary to try to stop the clock." He commended the board on trying to "work within the present situation." to "work within the present situation.

Atty. Dominic Terranova presented the privately-sponsored rezoning proposals—for a triangle-shaped area including parcels at 24 Central St. and 6 and 8 Chestnut St.—on behalf of Helen Comeau, the owner of one of the properties. Terranova argued that the same "hardship" criteria used in the public articles apply to the private. "They share the same burden and should get the same consideration from the board.

Planner Jeton said that she and board members had walked the parcels; they had been reluctant to propose them for rezoning because they were not large enough to provide for parking if converted to business use

Participants in the hearing once again reiterated their opposition to "spot" rezoning because it presented a potential hardship for neighboring properties—which in this case include the historic "Rose Cottage."

"What would be the public benefit (of rezoning)?"

Bradshaw asked Terranova.

"The same as the green spot on the map," he answered, referring to the Bartlet Street parcels, which had been colored green on the display map.

Bradshaw maintained that a change would present a hardship for residents across the street. "We've considered it before," she said; "It has residences across the street, not King's Subs."

When Terranova did not respond with specifics to a question about the proposed use of the parcels, one member of the audience suggested that the owners might want to level their houses and put up a large building for business purposes

David Sand of Abbot Street said that the neighbors in the area were opposed to expansion of the CBD in their direction and would probably speak against it at Town

In a separate hearing, the board discussed landscape and buffer standards proposed to shield residences in the GB from neighboring businesses. There was little public comment on the article.







School Budget Discussions Continue

The School Committee will continue discussions on the 17.1 million annual school budget this weekend.

The budget reflects a seven percent increase over last year's school budget and includes a proposal for a second-ary school leadership program by Asst. Supt. Les Loomis. "Planned, concerted forward movement within the sec-

ondary schools during 1987-'88 is dependent upon establishment of the teacher leadership positions," Loomis wrote in his budget narrative. "The present head teacher roles result only in performance of the minimal department functions necessary to keep the schools operating on a daily basis.'

Loomis's proposal includes release periods for 6.4 teachers to work in the teacher leadership positions. An additional \$50,000 above current Head Teacher stipends was requested.

Adoption of the proposed positions would result in initiation of increased leadership and coordination in the development of curriculum, collegial work toward improved instruction. At the junior high level, increased attention



Marriot Signs Agreement To Lease River Road Hotel

William Walsh, owner of Ocean Properties Ltd, of Bacon Raton, Fla, signed an agreement in Washington, D.C., last week that will allow the Mariott to lease a 295-room luxury hotel, which is the first phase of a 15 million development off old River Road.

The development will include a five-story hotel that will be connected to a one-story commercial building and a three-story office building on an 18-acre lot which fronts the Route 93 interchange. Work has begun on the luxury hotel, overlooking the Merrimack River, with rooms ready for occupancy in July and the common area due for completion in September, according to Town Manager Kenneth Mahony.

The hotel chain should create up to 300 new jobs in the area, according to Atty. Gerald Cohen, who is representing Ocean Properties Limited.

The hotel will be built of red brick in the New

England style and will feature very extensive and lavish landscaping. Other facilities will include, an exercise room, indoor swimming pool and jacuzzi. The Andover Mariott will have 7000 square feet of banquet facilities, a restaurant and lounge.

The Marriot hotel corporation considers the 300-room luxury hotel in the Lawrence Riverwalk mill complex, located five miles from the Andover Marriot, scheduled to open sometime in 1987, to be for different market areas, according to Riverwalk Marketing Director Dan Bumagin.

"The Marriot considers a three-mile radius to be a whole different market area," Bumagin said.

Andover's Mariott should not have any negative effect on the Riverwalk Marriot, according to Bumagin.



Year's Delay Requested For **Chandler Road Rezoning**

Thursday night, Chandler Road land-owners, through their attorney, asked the Planning Board to delay a year in seeking a zoning change that would attempt to limit the road's traffic load. But board members held out for a more even-handed moratorium-one which also would restrict landowners, for one year, from filing subdivision plans claiming access to Chandler Road.

As proposed, the board's current warrant article asks town meeting voters to rezone a 300-foot-deep strip of land on the north side of Chandler Road from Industrial D to Single Residence C. The board had proposed the change in order to restrict traffic access from large area industries to River Road by barring it from Chandler, a largely residential

At a public hearing in January, Chandler Road landowners balked at the zoning change and agreed to work toward a non-zoning solution to the access issue. They recently sent a letter to the board, in which they indicated that they would agree to a year's moratorium on building if the board would put off submission of the article for a year. During this grace period, the landowners would work to-gether to reach a permanent legal agreement.

According to the letter, landowners would retain their rights during that year to file subdivision plans which could claim access to the road—an action that could "grandfather" that access against

Board Chairman Margaret Bradshaw noted that, by filing a subdivision plan, a landowner could place his land beyond the scope of rezoning immediately; upon plan approval, he would buy himself eight years' time for action. Granting that landowners would probably not be able to put together a solid subdivision plan in the brief time before this year's April 7 Town Meeting, Bradshaw told presentor Marilyn Sticklor, legal counsel for landowner GCA Corporation, "What you're saying is that you'd like a year; during that time, you could certainly put together a full-blown plan."

A good faith agreement should include flat moratorium, she continued-one which would bar landowners from proposing subdivision plans during the year of deliberation. "Unless you're willing to do this," she said, "We're willing to go to Town Meeting with this proposal

Sticklor cited the cases of two landowners-GCA Corporation and Sarkis Sarkisian, who would require Chandler Road access, or negotiation with neighbors who have River Road access, to develop their land parcels. Without the year's moratorium, she said, the two parties would not have the time to find a solution to their complex situations. "It would be an unfair price to ask the landowners to give up the one right they do have," she added.

Board member Michael Houghton proposed that the two-sided moratorium be set in place, with no action to be taken by either party from January 1986 to January 1987. If agreement should not be reached during the hiatus, both parties would have roughly the same grace period they now have (in relationship to Town Meeting), upon expiration of the covenant, to file their respective actions.

Representatives for GCA seemed to

find merit in the proposal.

But board member Paul Curley did not. He restated his support of the proposed warrant article for this year. He further suggested that, if voters approved the article this year, a later agreement among landowners could prompt the board to submit a subsequent article next year for changing the zoning back to ID from SRC.

"I don't think that's a good way to do it," said Houghton.

He added, "I think the effects of rezoning are much more far-reaching than having an agreement between landowners not to access Chandler Road."
"If we agree to this," said Bradshaw,
"We're saying we're willing to take a

gamble on a good faith agreement.'

Curley remained opposed, musing at one point, "If we back off from our reasonable position and we get stung..

Ultimately, Bradshaw advised Sticklor that the board would assign the issue to its agenda for March 11, so that member Donald Ellsworth—who was absent from this meeting—could also consider it.

In separate actions, the board:

· offered its comments, at the request of the building inspector, on a site plan review for one segment of a proposed office and Research and Development park planned by National Development Associates for a 130-acre parcel of land bounded by Route 93, River Road and

Selectmen Adjust Articles To Deal With Town Hall Future

Two articles that deal with the restoration and future of the old town hall were adjusted prior to insertion in the town meeting warrant by selectmen Monday

The board worked on refining the warrant, but did not take any action on making recommendations relative the variety of issues which will face the electorate at the annual session.

The board did not vote approval or disapproval on any of the articles.

The first of the Old Town Hall articles, tentatively titled P-27, would have authorized selectmen to lease space in the building to "AVIS, Andover Historical Society, or to the U.S. Post Office...and the Andover Federal Credit Union."

At a previous meeting, board members

had argued that the article limited the use of the building to the named agencies, and that, should any of those prospective tenants move or decide not to rent, renting space to others would have to be done on a month-to-month basis.

Monday night, Selectman Donn Byrne moved to remedy the situation by deleting the names of the listed organizations.

There was no second.

'I would agree with leaving an option," said selectman Gerry Silverman,
"I just don't want to leave it wide open." suggested adding "and other nonprofit or government operations" to the list of prospective rentors.

The board voted unanimously to follow Silverman's recommendation.

The second Old Town Hall article had

requested the raising of \$1,300,000 for remodeling, reconstruction and/or "extraordinary" repairs to the building. Upon request from Town Manager Kenneth Mahony, the board agreed to reduce the sum to be raised to \$150,000-for planning and design.

Mahony later explained that the renovation project will probably be done in two phases; the new dollar figure will pay for the design phase. Funds for actual construction will be addressed later.

Two articles concerning the acquisition of land for the ongoing River Road improvements-one dealing with the land-takings, and a second with funding-were combined, and a request for the authorization of a \$300,000 bond was added. Mahony explained that the money

would be used, if necessary, in the acquisition of the land

Mahony also told the board that a request for transfer of \$75,000 from available funds for a police and fire computer system, now known as article P-34, has been changed. The money is now earmarked to cover the purchase of school computer equipment, and represents a continuation of two earlier appropria-

Board members also discussed at length an article for the appropriation of \$200,000 to connect Burtt Road with Ballardvale Road. Selectman Donn Byrne took issue with the item, saying, "We're

Clearing The Old Fashioned Way

The echoing sounds of chain saws cutting down trees in a 15 acre spot of the Harold Parker State Forest is about the only motor type sound one can hear. When it's time to haul the cut trees away, the workers resort to the original horsepower our forefathers had to use---the Draft Horse. For the next six months, members of the Yankee Draft Horse Association from Essex will work in Harold Parker State Forest, clearing about 700 particular trees from the area. Al Craig, president of the organization, and other members will guide their Draft Horses (that range from 1600 to 2250 pounds) in dragging about 700 particular trees from the area. Al Craig, president of the organization, and other members will guide their Draft Horses (that range from 1600 to 2250 pounds) in dragging trees from the woods to the open trail before being hauled away by truck. Draft Horses are being used instead of manmade equipment so the ground will not be damaged by heavy machinery. Using the horses also makes it easier to move around trees not being taken down. Hugh Littlefield of Maine, a veteran horse logger, got the project off the ground, giving his professional advice to Al Craig on handling this particular job. The workers can be seen one to two days out of the week, guiding their power sources as they pull trees cut in lenths of eight to 15 feet to the open trail. Fifty trees have been cleared so far. Draft horses come in a number of breeds. The most popular ones being the Clydesdales, Belgians, Percherons and Shires, a horse more popular in England but increasing in popularity here. 












A Forward Step

Andover's planning board has taken a forward step in looking positively at the rezoning of a Bart let street property parcel from residential to general business.

Planners this year, through their actions, have taken an overall more positive attitude in their examination of the area on the fringes of the Central Business District, unlike a year ago when, possibly through time constraints, planners opposed any alteration of those properties outside the business district.

Their actions this year indicate a recognition of a growing community, one in which changes have dictated recognition of a substantially altered downtown area in recent years.

The particular properties involved in the planning board nod of approval are 12-14 Bartlet Street. Planners indicate that the particular parcels represent hardship if left in their current residential classification.

True, as some people argued at a public hearing a week ago, current owners may have purchased them as residential and could possibly continue within that class if granted a multi-family designation.

But, the residential character of the neighborhood has been altered completely from the date of original purchase.

The result has been that these properties now become spot zoning in reverse.

Residential property, which was across the street years ago, has since become commercial or business.

Traffic flow has increased markedly with the creation of the new municipal parking lots and the move of municipal offices to the former East Junior High building.

A new shopping mall has been developed to the side and rear of the property in consideration.

All of these create a small pocket of residential property which for all intents and purposes doesn't fit in with the general tenor of the neighborhood.

The planning board has plainly seen all this in looking with a favorable eye toward rezoning of the area.

Also to be applauded is the board's attentiveness to other fringe area properties, in the creation of multi-family housing which will indeed respond to a need in the downtown area.

Planners have responded to the needs of the town as promised this year.

When several proposals were presented a year ago, the board asked that they be allowed time to adequately examine the areas abutting the Central Businss District, promising to come back at this year's town meeting with specific recom-

Despite a heavy schedule in reviewing subdisiion plans as part of their regular routine, the planners have kept their promise and, from initial observation, are worthy of the support of the townspeople when they appear before town meeting in April.

Andover Police Constantly Updating CPR Equipment

Within the past two decades, the Andover Police Department has been updating their resuscitation equipment and adding safety devices that protect patrolman against communicable diseases, while they are performing C.P.R. (Cardio-Pulmonary-Resuscitation).

The original resuscitation equipment

was heavy and had to be transported in police cruisers and ambulances, which would not allow the patrolman to carry it on his person, thus delaying the time that C.P.R. could begin to be administered, according to Andover Police Chief James Johnson.

"The old equipment used a "force-

fed," type of system that would sometimes force against two fields. The updated system allowed the breathing apparatus to shut-off, once the individual began to breathe," Chief Johnson said.

Within the past five years, small plas-

tic pocket masks, with holes that create a seal, have been introduced, according

to Chief Johnson.

"In cases such as heart attacks, the pocket masks do the compression and allow one man to start C.P.R. immediately, without having to go to the police cruiser for resuscitation equipment, while the other could begin to work on his chest, according to Chief Johnson.

The plastic pocket masks can be wash-

ed and sterilized, Chief Johnson said.

In the early 70s we worried about communicable diseases, such as mononucleosis and hepatitis, recently we have had individuals in the Police Department, express concern about AIDS.

The Andover police chief has sponsored information and training classes centered around AIDS. Disposable hoods, gloves, pants and booties are provided to patrolmen who might be directly exposed to a victim of the disease.

'Lack of knowledge about the disease can create a form of hysteria. You have to treat the individuals with dignity, while maintaining the safety of your offi-cers," Chief Johnson said.

"I can't say enough for the Andover


The fire was under control by 4 p.m. and fire and smoke damage to the kitchen was estimated at about \$1,000, according to Deputy Fire Chief Harold Wright
