No Trucks Ruling Relaxed Except For Clark Road

Monday night, the Board of Selectmen voted to re-establish truck access to all town roads except for Clark Road. The vote, which negated previous "no truck" rulings on such residential thruways as Lovejoy and Greenwood roads, was prompted by petitions from two separate groups of Andover residents who had felt aggrieved by the prohibitions

Although they were served by a single solution, the problems of two petitioning groups-and the groups themselveswere distinctly different.

Safety concerns lay at the heart of the first petition, which was signed by 30 residents of High Plain Road. "Recently, 'No Trucks' signs have been posted for Lovejoy Road and Greenwood Road., began the text. "This has resulted in a

noticeable increase in truck traffic on High Plain Road.

The document further noted that the street has no sidewalks, and that it is heavily traveled by small children who walk to the nearby West Elementary School. The residents asked that the board also prohibit trucks on High Plain.

The second petition dealt with commerce. In its text, 13 individuals who own and/or operate businesses employing trucks charged that it was "unfair that agencies of the Town of Andover choose to bar the use of our vehicles on certain Town streets." The ban not only increased truck traffic on boardering roadways, said the document, but also



Town House Topics

To Interview Zoning Board Candidates

Monday night, the Andover Board of Selectmen agreed to interview the five residents who have applied for the seat that is vacant on the Zoning Board of Appeals. The interviews which, said board members, will be open to the public—will be scheduled for 6:30 on Jan. 12 (prior to the regularly-scheduled 7:30 meeting) in the Town Hall third floor meeting room.

The selectmen also finalized the Eminent Domain Taking of three parcels of conservation land, owned by the Maksian, Boloian and Simpson families. Two of the parcels, the 22-acre Maksian and 52-acre Boloian holdings, are located in the Unandler Road/Route 93 area and are crucial to the protection of the Fish Brook watershed. The third, the 10-acre Simpson parcel, will become an Andover piece of the "Emerald Necklace" of linked greenspaces planned for eastern Massachusetts. The \$500,000 in funding for the acquisition has been awarded in two equal amounts to the Patriot National Bank and State Street Bank, both of Boston.

Finally, the board voted to approve the installation of a pole on River Road by Mass. Electric Company and New England Telephone.

School Program To Recieve State Grant

Andover will receive \$5,300 in Early Childhood Education grants between this past October and next June, State Education Commissioner Ron Raynolds announced.

The early childhood education grants are to be used by districts "for developmentally—appropriate preschool, enhanced kindergarten, day care, extended day and transitional kindergarten programs," said Raynolds, adding that "local councils and local needs assessments are required" for participation in the program.

The funding comes under the School Improvement Act of 1985, Chapter 188.

Academy Hill Historic Certificates Available



The Andover Historical Society, 97 Main St., extends an invitation to all property owners in the Academy Hill Historic District to collect their National Register certificates, which are issued by the Massachusetts Historical Commission. National Register properties are distinguished by having been documented and evaluated for historical importance according to uniform standards. Listing in the National Register also qualifies the owner for federal tax incentives and other preservation assistance.

Academy Hill Historic District comprises most of Phillips Academy campus plus a small array of residential structures on School, Main, Wheeler and Highland Streets, including 160 buildings, walks, a tower, gates, a cemetery, a pond and more than 450 acres. The "hill," as it is locally known, represents the landmarks of three separate educational institutions: Phillips Academy (1778), Andover Theological Seminary (1807) and Abbot Academy (1829). While Phillips Academy is recognized as the oldest American incorporated boarding school, none of the original wooden buildings survive. Bulfinch Hall, made of brick and named for the noted Boston architect, was built in 1819 as the third academy building and is the oldest surviving structure. Graves Hall, electic and ornate in its use of brick, is one of the few representative late 19th century masonry buildings extant in And-

over. In the early 20th century, a major development plan was executed after Phillips Academy acquired the Andover Theological Seminary buildings. New construction, like the Addison Art Gallery and Cochran Chapel, occurred, relocation of older structures such as the 1824 Samaritan and 1828 Stowe Houses resulted and major landscape renovations of the campus were carried out.

Though the institution of the Andover Theological Seminary has left the community, the lecture halls, dormitories and faculty homes remain. Foxcroft (1808), Pearson (1818) and Bartlett (1820) Halls reflect the utilitarian design of early institutional architecture and the federal style. Whereas the residence of the first seminary president, located at 189 Main St., represents a high style example of the federal period.

The School Street campus, formerly Abbot Academy, is a continuum of architecture between 1829 and 1921. Abbot Hall was originally erected facing School Street and retains its imposing presence with a two-story center pavillon supported by Ionic columns. The facades of Draper (1890) and McKeen (1904) Hall with irregular massing and arched openings, contrast the 1907 art gallery with its classical details and the scrolled metalwork of the 1921 Merrill Memorial Gateway. Equally important to the setting of the historic district is "The Grove," a wooded area to the rear of Abbot Circle laid out in the 19th century with paths, benches and a garden. Many of the buildings can be located by using "A Walking Tour of Phillips Academy" available at the Addison Art Gallery.

Along with the architectural and historical significance of the Academy Hill Historic District is the contributing importance of the persons associated with these institutions. The list reads like "Who's Who" in American history.



Endangered

The roseate tern, a dove-sized coastal seabird with a black cap and long forked tail, has been propsed for addition to the U.S. List of Endangered and Threatened Species by the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The proposed rule would classify the population that nests in northeastern North America (primarily from Maine to New York) as endangered. The primary causes for the roseate tern's decline are displacement from suitable nesting islands by expanding numbers of Herring and Black Backed Gulls, human activity and predation.

A strong flier that feeds mainly on small fish, which it catches by plunging headfirst into the water, the roseate tern nests on the ground, usually on small islands. It gradually migrates very long distances in mid-to-late summer to its wintering areas in the waters off northern South America from the Pacific coast of Colombia to eastern Brazil.

In 1986, nesting was known to have occurred only in Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New York and Florida, plus a few pairs in adjacent areas in the provinces of Nova Scotia and Quebec. In relation to vacant land with frontage on Old River Road, The Andover Companies have submitted two petitions. He Provided The Spirit Of Christmas

Time was short. I had staved at the office too long; back at my dirty and disordered home, my in-laws were due to arrive any minute.

So I was not filled with good cheer when the editor handed me a photo that had been taken last year. I was, he said, to track down the fellow in the picture and get information for a small article about him.

Oh, joy, I thought as I trudged up to the door of the man's house. With all this work, when was I going to get time for Christmas? Maybe, I prayed, he wouldn't be home.

But he was.

As it turned out, it was fortunate for me that he was. If I'd rushed off to orchestrate my holiday and missed Harold Livingston, I would have passed up a very real, and rare, little ray of what Christmas is all about.

Harold Livingston's slight frame is stooped beneath the weight of his 87 years. He wears hearing aids in both ears. He's not an educated man, in the high-school-and-college sense.

What Livingston is, rather, is a cross between an elf and Santa Claus. He is a craftsman and a giver and, in the mix, a truly decent person. Ten years ago, Fr. Tom Walsh of Merrimack College noted that the creche that housed the

nativity figures for the chapel's Christmas dis-play was in disrepair. So he asked Livingston, a retired man who had been "handy" about the campus, if he would make a replacement.

Livingston-neither a Catholic nor a Merrimack alumnus-agreed to help.

Now, you or I might have knocked a few planks together with nails and called the job done. Not Livingston.

After consulting a book on religious symbol-ism, obtained through the Masons (he had been a member for a half-century), he decided to make the stable of cedar—a "spiritual" wood of great significance in the bible.

The infant's crib, he decided, would be crafted of acacia, the non-rotting wood from which the biblical Ark of the Covenant was constructed.

Acacia grows in the tropics, not in Massachusetts. Livingston, however, had been a florist for 45 years prior to his retirement in 1962. He had grown his own acacia tree in his greenhouse.

Livingston puttered in his cellar workshop for two weeks on the project, working the logs with a table saw, a hand saw, and, when necessary, a chainsaw. When he finished it, the stable mea-sured approximately six by four by three feet. "I'm not like the fellow who built the boat, and

it was too big to get out of the cellar," he told me. "I made it collapsible, so it could be put together with eye hooks." One or two people can set the creche up in fifteen minutes. The stable stands at Merrimack College to-

day. In it, the infant rests in a cradle hewn of wood from Livingston's acacia tree.

In the living room of his little house on Abbot Street, the old man showed me pictures of the stable. And of other projects he had made and given to others.

He showed me the furniture he had madebeautiful pieces in his own home. Harold Livingston told me that he doesn't

make many things now; the eyes that twinkle with such good humor behind the rimless spectacles are, he says, pretty poor for such pro-

Warriors In First Place Chinese Next On Agenda

The Warriors didn't beat the Lowell Chiefs in two tries, losing the season-opener by a goal and then dropping a re-match at the Volpe Complex by a deceiving 6-4 margin, but, there's nothing else to be glum about in summarizing the Merrimack College's hockey team's first-semester performance.

The Warriors went into exams with a 10-3 record, including a perfect 9-0 slate in ECAC II play that put them at the top of the ECAC East standings. They played in three tournaments, won two and shutout 1984 NCAA Division I national champion RPI in the consolation final of the other one. They out-scored the opposition 31-9 in the third period. "I'm very happy," fourth-year head coach

Ron Anderson reported as he began preparations for an exhibition game against the Chinese National team at Harvard on December 27. "I felt going into the year we had the potential to have a good season. Our record is a little better than I expected it to be at this point.

Merrimack's perfect divisional slate includes wins over ECAC II powers Babson (6-4), Capitals in June, sophomore goalie Jim Hrivnak Plattsburgh State (6-3) in the finals of stopped 36 shots to shutout the Engineers. Just Plattsburgh's own tournament and Salem State (7-2), a semester-closing skirmish in Salem that

snapped a five-year Merrimack losing streak in Salem's Rockett Arena.


The win at Salem State was very big, particularly when you consider Merrimack's scoring at Rockett Arena in the previous two years equalled no goals in 120 minutes of hockey. 



Additional measures will include selling or discontinuing several small business units, phasing out investment in oil and gas properties and selling several real estate properties.

"These actions, when coupled with long-standing programs of strict control over product costs, overhead expenses and working capital, should accelerate the previously planned rate of profit increase for the future, while assuring vitality in major existing product lines. The cumulative impact of these efforts is directed towards maximizing stockholder value," said Colman M. Mockler, Jr., chairman and chief executive officer.

The board has authorized, depending upon market conditions and other factors, the purchase of up to $7\ million$

shares of stock from time to time in the open market or in privately negotiated transactions. The company has begun making purchases under this authorization. The board of directors declared the regular quarterly dividend of 34 cents per share payable March 5, 1987, to stockholders of record on February 2, 1987.
