Year Ahead Will Be One Of Stabilization

For the lown of Andover, predicts

Town Manager Kenneth Mahony, 1987 will be a year of apparent stabilization. "While I don't expect development to slow," he says, "I suspect that the per-ception of development will be that it will elaw." slow.

Beg pardon?

Take, for instance, says Mahony, the town's acquisition of conservation land. Although Andover will continue to try to acquire greenspace-and presently has authorization to acquire "at least a dozen more parcels," he says, "We're going to try to get more 'into' the management of property we already have.'

Or, too, there's the housing market: Mahony predicts that it will seem less harried than it has been. There are plenty of homes on the market; more are being readied for occupancy on speculation every day. With more homes than buyers, he feels, the buying and selling will be there-but the panic and turmoil should not.

The year 1987, in short, should present a good chance for the town to continue to set its various houses in order.

Accordingly, the coming year will bring an increased emphasis on preparation. The Fire Department will undergo intensive training in 1987, says Mahony. The Police Department will continue to examine its systems and methods, and work to bring itself to a level worthy of accreditation-which, says the town manager, should come in mid-1987.

And town personnel will undergo crosstraining in order to find out what happens in other departments. "We've got a lot of new people who just don't know the whole operation," says Mahony. The enlightenment sessions for these individuals and departments will be preserved on videotape, he adds, and used to trair new employees.

"So you see," he says, "We're into the computer age here.

Which reminds him—the town plans to broaden its use of its computer systems. Barring all complications, says Mahony, the year should bring a number of

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completions. Probably the most hopedfor and visible of these will be the addition to the library.

Yes, Virginia, says the Town Man-ager—it will be finished in 1987. The Riverina pumping station should

also be completed; if Lawrence finishes its companion project, it should be on line relatively soon.

And, of course, there are the Shawsheen Village lights; installation should begin this spring.

Mahony also foresees a number of impressive beginnings for 1987.

The paperwork is now in order for the building of a new central post office on Stevens Street.

The water processing operation at Haggetts Pond should-"God and the Environmental Protection Agency willinterjects Mahony-begin coning." struction on a supplementary system that will double the plant's capacity. And there is Emerson College.

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



Preliminary Plan Is Approved

On Dec. 23, the Planning Board approved preliminary plans for "Tucker Farms,"a four-lot subdivision planned for a location off Tucker Road.

The board disapproved preliminary plans for another potential subdivision, "Clover Field Estates," planned for 34 acres off Chandler Road.

Definitive plans for a third subdivision, "Hawk Ridge," which would comprise seven lots off Rattlesnake Hill Road, were withdrawn by the developers with the board's permission.

The board also heard staff presentations of two site plan reviews—for the expansion of Old South Church, and for the renovation of the Reginald Marden law offices. No recommendations were made; the staff will re-present the reviews, with additional information, at the next Planning Board meeting on Jan. 13.

Attended Training Course

Steven Migliori of Andover's water department attended a two-day training course on water fluoridation sponsored by the dental division of the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. Andover has been fluoridated since 1969.

The course included demonstrations and discussions on various pieces of fluoridation equipment and hands-on work with testing equipment. The health benefits of fluoridation were also stressed. Fluoridation reduces tooth decay by up to 70 percent and osteoporosis (brittle bones) among older persons by up to 40 percent.



The Park Street Village mall's newest tenant, the BEVERLY SAVINGS BANK Andover loan center, was officially opened...The Andover High School Warrior basketball team placed third in the Eleventh Anniversary Greater Lawrence CHRISTMAS FESTIVAL after losing to Lawrence High in an upset during the semifinals...Statistics indicate that Andover's SCHOOL BUS SERVICE ranks high in safety and cost effectiveness above most other Merrimack Valley systems...The Andover Choral Society presented a special taped recording of its performance of Handel's "Messiah" to Society founder/mentor J. EVERETT COLLINS at a reception in his honor, held at the Prescott House ... DR. LINUS CORDES joined Ratheon Company as general manager of the firm's Andover-based Microelectronics Center. One of the town's HISTORIC HOMES, built in 1845 at 174-176 Andover St., received a special permit to be converted for use as a real estate management firm by owners Roy Umanzio and Christine Zander...Town selectmen have agreed to lend their support to study of the DAY CARE situation in Andover, as it relates to the school system. While definitive plans for MILL DAM ESTATES, a subdivision slated for construction between Woburn Street and Rattlesnake Hill Road, were approved by the Planning Board, developers of the project were still locking legal horns with abuttors Karl and Charlotte Soderberg over easement rights through the land to the couple's landlocked 13-acre parcel...Andover rocked to the music of Twist king CHUBBY CHECKER at the Collins Center...Andover's oldest existing insurance group, THE ANDOVER COMPANIES, announced that they will be putting their historic corporate headquarters building in Shawsheen Village up for sale. The companies will move to new headquarters, which will be built on a 27-acre parcel off Old River Road...A 24-acre parcel of Shattuck Road land belonging to the GCA CORPORATION has been sold to the development firm of Cabot, Cabot & Forbes...West Elementary School students raised a HALF-TON OF PENNIES for the restoration of the Statue 01 Liberty...Approximately 75 people gathered at Christ Church for an ECUMENICAL SERVICE OF CELEBRATION of the life of Dr. Martin Luther King on Jan. 20, the first national holiday designated for a black man...Preliminary figures indicated that the MUNICIPAL BUDGET could reflect an increase of more than \$2.5 million over last year...The KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS sold its Frontage Road building to developer Gus Sheehv. who granted the organization the old Guild building at 10 Brook as part of his down payment for the property...At a public hearing, Chandler Road residents turned out in force to oppose a REZONING ARTICLE set forth by the Planning Board, which would change a 300-foot-deep strip of the road from ID to SRC. 





Historical Society Offers Programs In January

By Virginia Lopez Begg

The Andover Historical Society will continue to hum with activity in January. Women and woodworking provide two of the featured events.

The society will present a narrated slide show entitled "West Parish Women in the Nineteenth Century" on Sunday, Jan. 4, at 2 p.m. The event is open to the public and there is a nominal admission charge.

The program deals with the lives of the women of the West Parish community from childhood through adulthood. It focues on their role in the community and the organizations they formed from the founding of the church in 1826 through the next half-century.

The slide show is narrated by Joan Patrakis, who did much of the research as part of a longterm project, and Marsha Rooney, former director of the Andover Historical Society. They were assisted by Doris Newton, Betty Gorrie and Nonie Newell who played the parts of West Parish women Susannah Jackson, the daughter of the first minister, Mary Susan Cutler, who spoke at the church's 100th anniversary, and Sarah Merrill Wilson.

The records used in preparing the show are original documents beinging to West Parish Church which are preserved at the Andover Historical Society. Don and Jan Sagaser, society members, will introduce the program and lead house tours following the show.

The Andover Historical Society will also offer a.m. a

an unusual opportunity to learn about old woodworking skills in a four-week workshop conducted by John Ross, Cambridge authority and collector of antique tools, on Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The workshop will begin January 10 in the society's newly recreated 19th-century woodworking shop. Non-members and prospective participants can register through the Andover Historical Society office.

Historical Society office. Students will first learn the use of hand tools and foot-powered tools of the late 19th century. Ross will familiarize them with the resource books available and assist in choosing a project commensurate with abilities and experience. Wood will also be selected at the initial session.

In remaining sessions, students will work on their projects with one-on-one assistance from Ross. For this reason, the class will be limited to six participants.

Ross, who teaches at Belmont Hill School, has previously taught old woodworking techniques through the Andover Historical Society, the Peabody Museum of Salem and others. He brings his personal collection of tools and books to class.



Police Undergo Rigorous Review For Accreditation

The Andover Police Department is currently in the process of receiving accreditation from the the Commission of Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies along with 22 other Massachu-setts agencies. It is a voluntary process by which a local agency holds itself up for comparison against the strictest of

standards on the national level. Beginning in June of 1986, when the town invested the first half of the \$7500 accreditation fee, the department began working toward meeting the 944 individual standards currently imposed by the commission. This requires full documentation of all policy and procedure.

The commission was formed in 1979 after the standards for law enforcement agencies were developed by the International Chiefs of Police, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, the National Sheriff's Association and the Police Executive Research Forum. The commission is an independent organization, having no relationship, financially or otherwise, to

any local, state or federal government. The accreditation process begins when a law enforcement agency asks the commission for applicant status. Once agency eligibility has been confirmed, the two sign a contract which identifies the re-sponsibilities of each in the accreditation

The agency then completes and files an Agency Profile Questionnaire, providing information about agency size, man-dated responsibilities, and functions performed. The commission uses this information to determine which standards must be met by the agency

process.

A list of those standards to be met is then forwarded to the agency which then confirms the applicability of those standards to the department, and then begins the process of self-assessment.

When the agency is satisfied that it meets the standards set for it, it notifies the commission which then sends out a three-person assessment team for several days to examine the proofs of compliance that the agency has compiled. The

assessment team may consist of a police chief from an accredited department, an accreditation manager, and a policy writer for another accredited depart-These assessors may speak to ment. those involved in policy making or gener-al law enforcement to ensure that the requirement is met should they feel the need for further explanation.

After the on-site visit, the assessment team submits its report to the 21-member commission, which either grants or denies the agency accreditation. The failure to meet even one of the mandatorequirements will result in denial of the application.

According to the Accreditation Policy Handbook, the standards are designed with five points in mind.

They reflect the best professional practices in each area of law enforcement management, administration, opera-tions, and support services. They also reflect "what to," without telling an agency "how to " agency "how to.

Standards are created to make accred-

itation attainable. Compliance may be difficult in some instances, but the standards themselves are not unreasonable for any well-managed law enforcement agency.

Every accreditation in itself is a test not only of the standards already set, but the entire accreditation process

The commission, when revising standards, looks to already accredited agencies for advice and counsel.

Det. Don Mooers, who was chosen to direct the accreditation process for the Andover police department, has stated that all of the mandatory requirements and 80 percent of the optional requirements must be met-no easy task when one learns that the department must prove compliance, whether it is by writ-ten documentation or other means.

The standards relate to everything from the law enforcement role and responsibility to relationships with other agencies. From organization, manage-

1986 A Productive Year For A Town In Motion

From the window of Town Manager Kenneth Mahony's office in the town hall, a visitor looks out on a street lined with settled, older homes. There is no turmoil; to the untrained eye, the life be-neath that window flows peacefully day to day with little overt change.

When Mahony himself looks out on the town of Andover, however, he sees beyond Bartlet street-to the new library wing, with its scaffolding; to the public safety buildings and the programs inside their brick skins. To Routes 93 and 495 and beyond, where motels sprout from bare ground in a season, and high-tech plants tower above trees that once shaded livestock.

It is a town in motion, Mahony's Andover. And, for this town, 1986 was a 'productive" year

Physically, Andover underwent a substantial amount of development last year, says the Town Manager. There were notable beginnings; there were important finishings; there was much construction and expansion.

Puffing on his cigar, Mahony ticks off the projects: an addition of 475,000 square feet for Digital; a new building for Raytheon; an addition for Physical Sciences; renovation and reuse of the old Export Warehouse on Tewksbury Street. Two new Marriott hotels-one breaking ground and one about to be occupied. Construction on the "Woodlands" property, a 130 acre office park. Office space built by Trammel Crowe; office buildings being readied for occupancy by

Prudential. The old "Infinet" building on Shattuck Road, now being re-occupied by M.K.S. Instruments. The Vazza and Hoffman Winn buildings, both finished and occupied.

Downtown, there is the Barnard block. wearing its upbeat new look after a year of renovation. The Bank of Boston building. The bowling alley ("Something's happening there—God knows exactly what," says Mahony).

Mahony take a last draw, then snuffs out the cigar. "That's a pretty good year," he says. "And the quality is very good-these are buildings that are going to be with us for a long time. And paying



Donn Byrne: The Consummate Andoverite

This is one of those cases where you wished you said it before. Like somewhere around a week ago at the

latest, while a young man like Donn Byrne was around to appreciate it.

But newspaper people aren't a lot different from others, in that we tend to put off such things as paying tribute to a person's dedication to the community, because he is still involved.

It was a week ago Monday, at probably the most difficult time of year, when for reasons none of us comprehend, Donn Byrne, selectman and former Finance Committee member, and, above all, family man, succumbed to an aneurysm at the age of 49.

Having known him for many years, due principally to his municipal involvement, I feel priviliged to refer to him as the consummate Andoverite.

He wasn't a native.

But he lived and loved Andover for so many years that I think even his colleague on the board of selectmen, Bill Dalton, would honor him with the title 'Townie.

His interest in the town's manicipal life ex-tended beyond his days of elected or appoint-ive service to the community.

For many years he attended school committee, selectmen and finance committee meetings as an observer

Then he was appointed to the FinCom and became an ardent observer of the town's finances

After six years on that board, he went on to become selectman, and no doubt would have sought re-election to that board this spring. In all his activities, he was dedicated to the

task assigned him by either the appointing authority or the electorate. Outspoken, he had little fear of questioning administrators and suggesting, albeit not always success-fully, changes he felt would lead to better administrative practice or economic im-provement for his town.

As an Andover official, he look criticism as

well as praise graciously. When editorials appeared in this space, critical of his stand, there would be a phone call, with a comment, 'I guess it's my turn. When praise came his way in the same space, the conversation would probably be, 'Thanks, I needed that.

Underlying all this was a man dedicated to family and community, the love for both undeniable.

The finality of death is a difficult reality. eased by time and tender memories. It is under such circumstances that we reluctantly accept the loss of a dedicated, devoted servant

ment and administration to personnel. And from law enforcement operations, operational support and traffic law enforcement to auxiliary and technical services.

According to Mooers, there are many reasons why accreditation is important to the Andover Police Department—and to the residents of the town.

"Accreditation has the potential for adherence to, and recognition of, professional standards. The town is actively pursuing accreditation, not only because of our quest for professionalism in law enforcement, but because of our pride in the dedicated men and women who work for the Andover police department."

"We also see the entire image of law enforcement changing," said Mooers, "There are more college-educated entry level staff and others with master's degrees and advanced training. We have all this education and we need to insure that we are a top-notch organization that uses its resources to constantly upgrade."

A list of uniform standards of practice gives residents and officials of the town a "measuring stick" by which they may evaluate the department's performance. Accreditation also ensures periodic review and updating of the department's

policies and promotes an even-handed approach to their application. Andover Police Chief James Johnson

Andover Police Chief James Johnson believes that accreditation will also help avoid civil litigation, and insurance companies are very happy about that. Johnson added that, although there were no areas where the department was performing poorly, they have found during the self-evaluation phase that there were better ways to conduct some activities like record keeping. Johnson favors the idea of giving po-

Johnson favors the idea of giving police personnel "professional standing" and said that the fact that someone from the commission will visit every couple of years to check on the department "keeps us all on our toes—which is healthy."

Town Manager Kenneth Mahony commented that it is the process, not the actual piece of paper signifying that accreditation has been earned, that is the most important aspect. "All the people (in the department)

"All the people (in the department) are looking at all the issues in a cooperative manner—panels, committees." Mahony commented, "The department has the maturity to analize (itself)."

"We have a superior police department" he said, and the accreditation process allows the staff to analize "why something is right or why something is wrong" without just doing it because the commanding officer said to. This, Mahony added, is where the maturity of the members of the department comes in, and he believes that what is already a superior police department may become, through the accreditation process, an outstanding police department on the national level.

According to Mooers, the department should be ready for the commission's onsite visit by some time in November, once all compliance documentation is gathered or prepared.

as playing space for soccer and baseball. In 1986, the town also did a bit of needed repair on its physical plants. Mahony says that the West Junior High School received a new roof, and that work was done on the air-handling system at the high school.

Although buildings and greenspaces form the most visible part of the picture of the year's progress, Mahony is very pleased with what 1986 added to the human side of the town ledger.

There were two major turnovers among the heads of town services in 1986, In Municipal Maintenance, director Joseph Dion retired and was replaced by Frederick Jaeschke.

In the Fire Department, Chief William T. Downs retired from his position in Au-

gust. Harold F. Hayes is the new chief. Three-year contracts were settled for teachers, firefighters, police officers, and town staff and employees, both blue collar and white, says Mahony.

The Police Department is undergoing a certification process. Begun in early 1986, it should be completed, says Mahony, in mid-1987. Certification is more

"The biggest thing it does is, it says to the Police Department, 'Here are univer-sal standards-examine yourself.' "

Mahony lauds the process because it brings officers of all levels together to communicate with each other on both large and small matters. "It allowed us to create a dialogue within the department," he says, "where they review all of these standards."

According to Mahony, the command structure of the Police Department has also undergone some significant renovation during the year. Changes have been made that, without hiring more supervisors, allow more trained supervision per sors, allow more trained out young de-shift. "We have a relatively young degoal of this is to keep the control sergeant on the street with his men." It also will help the department better manage its court load, he adds.

Also, in 1986, the Police Department was released from a civil rights "concent decree" that had been in effect for a number of years. Predicated on the theory that the staff's racial balance was not proportionate to that of the town, the decree governed police hiring practices.

The Police Department now has complied, says Mahony. Andover has two "minority" officers, and two women offi-cers, one of whom has recently been promoted to the rank of sergeant.

Mahony notes that 1986 brought two important actions from the town plan-ning department. The two-the recent revision of the Subdivision Rules and Regulations, and the enactment of the Watershed Protection Overlay Zone, approved at town meeting-were long overdue, he says.

For Mahony himself, 1986 had a particular significance. The year's end also marked the end of his first five year term as Town Manager. Key to the success of those five years spent minding the Andover beyond the office, says Mahony, has been the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen.

Since he came to the job five years ago, he says, there have been three changes in the board—changes made gradually, and resulting in minimal dis-ruption. The present members have worked together as a group for the last two years.

"The degree in which they agreed on their role and on policy made it easy for me to follow their instructions," says Mahony. "It has made it seem more like a continuity of five years than five individual years.

Very recently, he notes, the board lost long-term member Donn Byrne. Mahony says that the town will feel the loss. guess, for better or worse, a lot of this year is going to be thought about in terms of Donn Byrne," he says.
