While '87 Featured Construction Schools Will Be Focus For 1988

Things went as expected last year, according to Town Manager Kenneth Mahony.

"There was a little more action in the comprehensive permit area, but I wasn't really surprised," said Mahony.

Eight affordable housing projects proposed for Andover were featured in headlines all summer.

One of last year's goals—the Riverina pumping station—has been realized. The station needs two more weeks of work before it's completely ready for operation, although its official opening was Saturday, Dec. 12.

Training at the police station is on-going, Mahony said, and he thinks the department will receive accreditation during 1988.

Getting a new radio band for the fire station is in the works.

Mahony said the town is making progress on widening of River Road.

Memorial Hall Library is in the middle of renovations. Now that the new wing is complete, all the books and resources have been moved from the original building, so restoration can begin there.

"Things have gone about as well as expected," Mahony concluded.

While much attention was focused during the past year on such major projects as Memorial Hall Library renovation, anticipated renovation of the old town hall and the construction of the Riverina Road purning station, the coming year is expected to be concentrated on school issues.

Two major decisions will be made in the early part of 1988, one dealing with the grade structure of the town's school system, the other

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
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
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


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Duo Recital At Phillips

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



New Day Care Center Scheduled For Spring

After four years of planning, the groundbreaking for Cuddle Care Day Care Center at 511 S. Main St. (across from Santina's) took place Monday, Dec. 28.

According to director Gwen Hedrick, the location is readily accessible to many surrounding towns as well as to people commuting to Boston.

The one-story building was designed by Gerald Bruno of North Andover and will be constructed by Michaud Construction Co. of Methuen. A wide U-shaped driveway will make drop-off and pick-up easy for parents.

Hedrick says it's evident that "there is a large segment of our children who are being denied quality care because of the lack of available day care facilities, during their most crucial developmental years."

She says statistics show that 52 percent of working women have children under the age of 6. By 1990, it is estimated that there will be 23 million children under 6 whose mothers will be in the workforce and who will require child care. The fastest growing segment of the labor force is the category of mothers of preschool children.

Hedrick said she got the idea to start the center because of the experiences of her own children trying to find day care for their youngsters.

Companies Apply For Town Hall Renovation

Three companies have placed bids for the renovation of Old Town Hall and a decision is expected to be made by the first of the year, according to Kenneth Mahony, town manager.

Masco Inc., Woburn, submitted the lowest bid of \$1.6 million. Anchor Construction, Lowell, proposed a bid of \$1.9 million and Didio Construction, North Andover, bid \$2.2 million. All three are smaller than the approved budget of up to \$2.8 million; however, the lowest bidder won't neccessarily win the contract.


Since renovation work is being done on a historical building, state law permits Andover to review all contractors and to choose a company with the most restoration experience. Even then, cautions Mahony, the bid offer won't necessarily be the bottom line figure. Expenses such as permit fees are not figured into the bids, he said.

The old Town Hall was the first public building built after the Andover/North Andover town split in 1855. After about 70 years, the building first saw some renovation work done in the 1920s, but by the time the 1940s had rolled around, citizens began talking about tearing the structure down, said Mahony.

When Mahony arrived on the Andover scene as town manager in 1982, interest in doing something with the old building had been revived. Money for renovation was finally appropriated at a town meeting in 1987.

Mahony pointed out that many civic events were held inside the old building's brick walls but, he said "the key to its use is not only for historical value, but as a means to draw people downtown." When all the work is completed, hopefully in 18 months, Mahony says, the venerable building will be the site for community theater, dances, art shows and benefits of all types. The old Town Hall will become a new community center.

Most of the work that will be done is pure renovation. Brass tacks-style work like complete replacement of all plumbing, heating and electrical systems will be done.





A New Year

It hardly seems possible that another year has slipped into the record books.

Seems at this time every year, we look forward to a new year, the dawn of new promises and hope, anticipating that time, indeed, is on our side as we face the challenge of a new year.

Then, suddenly, it's over and there is another new beginning.

The year ahead, of course, will be as challenging as any other, with maybe some added incentives along the way.

There will, of course, be the national election process which will occupy much of the attention during the course of the year as the long, arduous task of selecting a new President culminates in November.

But, at home, Andover will be facing several challenges to which response will have far-reaching effects.

As the new year dawns, the town still wrestles with the matter of low and moderate income housing proposals. Differenes remain between municipal leaders on the merits of the various proposals, the result being that in some instances response to this most pressing need for the young of our community as well as those on fixed incomes, remain unresolved.

Then, of course, there is the matter of the proposed collaborative school, a decision due early in the year on whether Andover and Lawrence will join together to present this educational opportunity to the youth of the two communities.

The proposal has already spurred controversy particularly among Andover parents, fearful that their children will be compelled to attend to meet Andover's commitment of 400 attendees in the 1,200-pupil school.

The building itself is planned for the Beacon street area of Andover, provided environmental standards are met.

Too, there is the possibility of combining grades within the town's school system to more efficiently distribute the student population and relieve overcrowding.

It has been suggested that sixth grades in Andover be assigned to the town's two junior high buildings, thus creating a middle school concept.

This has been met with opposition by some parents who have expressed considerable concern about the plan being presented at this time of year when their youngsters will have to adjust to attending school with older youngsters at the beginning of a new school year.

Then, there is the matter of the 'moral vacuum,' an issue presented Andover residents by Supt. of Schools Kenneth Seifert when a report indicating drug use continued to be rampant in Andover and that there was an uncaring attitude about the community by many residents and parents, and presented to selectmen a short time ago.

The furor caused by Seifert's remarks clouded the basic issue. Even some school committee members admonished the superintendent for making the remarks without first informing them of his intentions, a matter which could be doubted.

The report and its following controversy, however, has focused on an issue which is in need of attention by Andover residents and has produced some ideas currently being explored by municipal officials, such as a teen center, among other thoughts.


Inherent in all of this would seem to be the need for Andover as a community to make a firm resolve as this new year dawns.

That commitment should be to have an open mind about all these issues and to study the proposals and the ramifications of the far-reaching decisions which will be ultimately be made in the year ahead.

There is sufficient time to study the issues, digest their effects on a growing community, consideration of the decisions on the future of the community.

There is value in having time to study the matters, provided one views the proposals with an open mind rather than a pre-disposed opinion.

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

Last week, for the first time, natural gas began to flow directly from Canada to consumers in New England. The new gas supply is being delivered to the 241,000 customers of Bay State Gas Company through an idled crude-oil pipeline that has been converted to natural gas.

To announce the start-up of the Portland Gas Pipeline Project, energy officials from the United States and Canada joined the project developers, Granite State Gas Transmission, Inc., a subsidiary of Bay State Gas, and Shell Canada Limited, in the ceremonial opening of a pipeline valve in Portland, which allowed the Canadian natural gas to begin flowing to area consumers.

The Portland Gas Pipeline Project will dramatically increase our company's gas supply and help meet the growing demand

Marie Whelen, MS, RD, nutritionist and program leader, said, "It's better to be patient and lose weight slowly and safely, about a pound or two a week, and know that it can be a permanent weight loss, rather than losing five pounds in a week, only to regain it soon after." A computer dietary assessment will be completed for each participant to assess their nutrition and vitamin/mineral intake.

for energy in our region," said Charles T. Ellis, president of Granite State, which converted and is operating the gas pipeline. "The new gas supply will enable thousands of additional residential and business customers to take advantage of this cleanburning, premium fuel and it will help us hold gas costs down for our existing customers as well.

"Because the Canadian gas feeds into the northern end of our system, it also adds an element of security to our supply that could not otherwise be achieved," he said. Ellis added that, because the gas is flowing through an existing pipeline, project costs were minimized and the surrounding environment was left undistrubed.

Deliveries of gas will be made on an interruptible basis until November 1988 when additional pipeline facilities will be completed in Canada, allowing deliveries to begin on a firm basis and increase to a level of 25 millilion cubic feet per day

Granite State is leasing and operating the 160-mile United States' portion of the 18" diameter pipeline, owned by Portland Pipe Line Corporation, which runs from Portland through New Hampshire and Vermont to the Canadian border at North Troy, Vermont. Shell Canada Products Limited, a subsidiary of Shell Canada Limited, will lease and operate the 70-mile Canadian section of the same pipeline that runs from the border to a point in Quebec where it connects with the Canadian natural gas pipeline network. The converted oil pipeline intersects the existing Granite State transmissionline at Portland that runs from the Massachusetts-New Hampshire border at Plaistow, N.H., to Portland.

with a proposed collaborative school.

The restructuring of the town's grade levels has already evoked conroversy with the suggested creation of a middle school.

This would place the town's sixth graders in the pesent two junior high buildings and move ninth graders in a four-year high school.

Parents already are opposed to the plan based primarily on the decisin being made late in the current school year and not providing enough time for youngsters, currently fifth graders, to adjust to a new school envionment with older voungsters.

A decision on the matter is expected to be made by the school committee at its Jan. 5 meeting.

The collaborative school concept has also created considerable controversy among the townspeople.

The school which is scheduled to be built on Beacon Street, would house 1200 pupils, 400 of which would be from Andover the rest from Lawrence.

The state-funded program would have limited class size and provide modern educational programs for those attending. Pupils would attend on a volunteer basis, although some Andoer parents are con-cerned that failure to obtain sufficient volunteers would result in some students being assigned to the school, a condition education administrators affirm woul not happen.

A decision on the proposed collaborative school is expected at the annual town meeting.

Also in the area of education, the school committee and superintendent are expected to come up with a master plan for the town's school system in the year ahead.

Town Manager Kenneth Mahony announced the appointment Monday night, receiving the selectmen's approval.
