School Board Sends Bus Contracts Back To Drawing Board

Tempers flaired and emotions were high during the discussion of school bus transportation awards at Tuesday night's School Committee meeting at Doherty Junior High School.

The end result was a four to one vote against the five year transportation contract recommended by Francis Paul, assistant superintendent.

Margo Tilghman, secretary of the School Committee, was the only committee member who voted in favor of the recommendation.

Paul must go back to the drawing board and put together a new proposal. "I'll have to review this (proposal) and get a better sense of the committee's intent," Paul said. He said he will probably have another recommendation prepared for the meeting on May 3.

Paul's recommendation for school bus transportation awards called for the issuance of multiple contracts. It named three companies, Parent Bus

Service, Trombly Motor Coach, and Laidlaw Transit as recipients of the contracts.

Multiple contracts are awarded, he said, so Andover won't be "held hostage" to one company if it should strike. Transportation contracts are currently divided between two companies.

The proposed contracts were presented as follows:

- Parent Bus Service — 11 vehicles, including two late trips, at \$1,533 per day.

- Trombly Motor Coach — nine vehicles at \$1,387 per day.

- Laidlaw Transit — nine vehicles at \$1,383 per day.

The total annual cost of the school bus transportation amounted to \$774,747.

The proportion of business allotted to Parent Bus Service was the root of much discussion.

Parent Bus Service has worked for Andover for 17 years, and it was the lowest bidder. The cost factor is an important consideration, according to the company's lawyer, Peter J. Caruso. Awarding Parent Bus Serv-

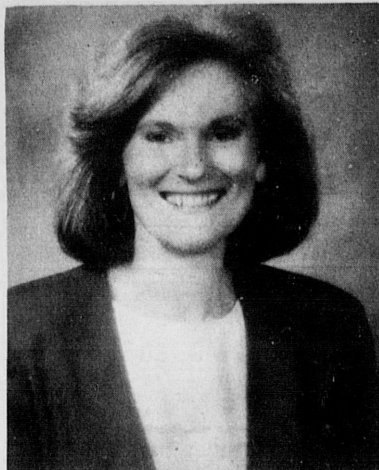

Andover residents Gina Riddiford, Robert Wegner and Pam Green and North Andover residents Gerrie Berube, Barbara Grasso, Jane Guild, Leslie Hopkins and Barbara Vogel were among the more than 150 concerned parents who met recently to learn how to make drug and alcohol education a priority in their communities at the first statewide parent conference, presented by the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs.

The parents learned about organizing public awareness campaigns stressing the need for drug and alcohol awareness, developing a needs assessment and plan of action for their communities, the hidden secrets of commercial advertising aimed at selling alcohol and prescription drugs, and how to enlist neighbors, friends and other leaders in fighting the problem of substance abuse.

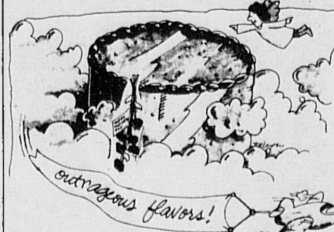

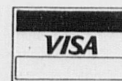

Named Chairman

Receives Grant For Services

Senior Partners, a non-profit agency serving the Andover area, has received a grant of \$477,241 from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation under the foundation's supportive services program for older persons. The funding is to be used over a three-year period in continuing support of Senior Partners' efforts to develop innovative at-home and community services which enable older people in Essex County to remain living independently.

"We're very excited to have been awarded further funding. "The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation recognized this growing need and has created funding to support programs that will help elders to remain living in their own homes."

Senior Partners launched its first service, the Handyman Program, earlier this year and has plans to begin offering at least two more service this year. A membership program for persons over age 60, the Handyman Program provides affordable, quality repairs and a variety of other benefits to older person.

Senior Partners is an equal partnership of the Visiting Nurse Association of North Shore and the VNA of Greater Lynn.

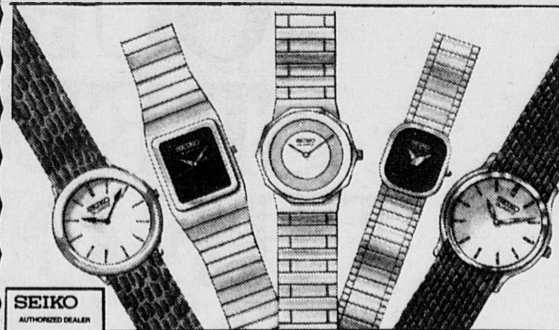

Bostonian Society Member Gives Students Glimpse Into Past

Maintaining historic heritage is important, according to Glynn. She volunteers at the Old State House in Boston, speaking to tourists and visitors about the colonial history of that city.

She also speaks at schools in surrounding areas and explains their town's role in the historic

revolution. Peg Hughes, assistant to the director of the Andover Historical Society, helped Glynn gather information directly related to Andover.

After the Boston massacre, Andover voted to support Boston in oppression against tyranny, Glynn said.

"Life was intense and real in those days of waiting," she said.

Glynn explained the scenario in Andover on April 19, 1775. She said church bells rang in the early morning, signaling the residents about trouble in Concord. Corn was left unground and ox were left unattended as Andover men marched towards Concord.

Since the British had retreated, the men from Andover pursued the soldiers to Arlington and later set up camp in Cambridge, Glynn

said.

Andover residents who weren't able to fight brought food and clothing to the men in Cambridge.

Andover, according to Glynn, was aware of its importance as a town. "She (the town) was sure that when she spoke, she'd be heard."

"April 19, 1775 was the opening battle of the Revolution, and we're all deriving the benefits," she said.

At 82 years old, Glynn is full of energy and enthusiasm for her work. Her job at the Old State House began two and a half years ago. She had worked for the state for many years, she said, and felt it would be a way to show her thanks. "I love my city and I felt I should do something."

Students Broaden Horizons

Learning comes in all forms—including the knowledge gained from an understanding of different cultures. Living a new lifestyle is an excellent way to broaden one's horizons, and nine Andover students are participating in an exchange program that enables them to do just that.

Students from Brignoles, France visited Andover for three weeks and in return the Andover students went to France. They are currently abroad and are spending almost three weeks studying and traveling before their return Friday, May 6.

Paris, Nice, Corsica—all are cities the students will see during their travels. In addition, they will live with the French students in Brignoles and will have the opportunity to attend some high school classes.

The 21 French students lived with Andover families during their stay. A banquet for the French students and their host families was held Friday, April 15 at Andover High School.

The hosts presented their French counterparts with American and French flags as mementos of their visit.

This is the second year for the Andover/Brignoles exchange, and coordinators Jean Paul and Mireille Martinod of France and Roger Thurber, Andover High foreign language teacher, say they expect it to continue.

There was an abundance of students who wanted to participate. "Thirty families would've liked to have come but there wasn't enough room," Mireille Martinod said.

The enthusiasm from the students is obvious. The French students talked excitedly about all of their experiences, and the Americans were equally eager.

Sophomore Lesley Brammer noted the friendships that have formed. "You've seen relationship changes," she said. "As their English improves, the (French) kids have become more open, and we've

Editor's note: This is the final article of this school year on Andover's computer plan written by Kenneth Kwajewski, computer education director for the Andover public schools.

Over the last few months I have reviewed the targeted goals of Andover's computer education plan. Over 250 computer systems have been added to the schools this year and many fine technology programs have been begun throughout the system. The goals for this year included an awareness program at the kindergarten level, keyboarding at first grade, Logo programming at the third grade, applications courses at the eighth and tenth grade, telecommunication activities at the elementary and high school levels and word processing and computer programming components at the high school. This year in grades kindergarten through 12th, science and special needs teachers used computer hardware and software to improve their program of studies.

One of the major reasons that the first year of the plan has been so successful is due to the energies of Andover's teachers. More than half the staff of 350 professionals have enrolled in computer-related in-service courses this year. Teachers have learned how to use the computer as a tool for word processing, spreadsheet and data base manipulation. Teachers have also taken courses in Logo, software evaluation, programming, CAD/CAM, graphics and desktop publishing. They have also learned how to use the computer in curriculum areas such as science, mathematics, language arts and social studies. Many extra hours of outside time have been given freely by teachers to learn how to use educational software to enhance their educational programs. Nothing works perfectly from the software box and it is a credit to them that they have worked so diligently to make this year a success.

Our work is by no means complete. The programs started this year will need to be further developed and evaluated. Curriculum guides will have to be established for some of the courses that were introduced this year and modifications will be made accordingly. However, I would expect that each new year will be easier for the teachers involved. This has been a learning year for all. The potential of the computer as a supplement to a teacher's arsenal of

materials is still to be determined. This year has only begun the process of using technology to upgrade our educational program.

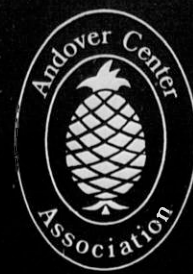
Looking ahead to next year finds the computer plan expanding into other exciting areas. The keyboarding course begun this year at the first grade will become more formalized at the second grade. All students will be expected to learn how to correctly use their fingers to type most of the keys on the computer keyboard. Logo programming will be expanded to the fourth grade and all teachers will be trained this summer to earn this problem-solving language. An exciting science component will be added to the sixth grade with the introduction of an integrated multimedia package entitled "Voyage of the Mimi." Sixth-grade teachers will be trained this summer to use this package with our SCIS curriculum. The accounting course at the high school will have a microcomputer component so that all students will understand how to manipulate modern accounting software. Students at the high school will also be able to use the computers for CAD/CAM and desktop publishing activities. Both the industrial and graphic art departments will use computer technology to enhance their curriculums.

Four major curriculum areas will view the potential of the computer as a learning tool. The areas of language arts, mathematics, social studies and foreign language will decide how to best integrate computer technology. One major goal for next year is to coordinate the use of the computer for word processing throughout the system. It is planned that students in grade three will begin word processing activities and it is essential that it be coordinated by all teachers and administrators. I have stated before that it is not the goal of Andover to acquire a vast amount of educational software, but rather to coordinate the use of a few exemplary programs. We hope to expand the fine programs that were begun this year. Telecommunication capabilities may be expanded at the high school and introduced at the middle schools and the use of videodisk technology will also be expanded to other curriculum areas. It is our goal to help students use technology for the information-dominated world of tomorrow.

Andover High School will be one of nine schools participating in a mock constitutional convention at Lowell Memorial Auditorium Monday, May 2, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The convention, part of the three-year celebration of the bicentennial of the Constitution, is sponsored by Lowell National Historical Park, Lowell High School, the city of Lowell and Burger King and funded through a grant from The First Foundation.

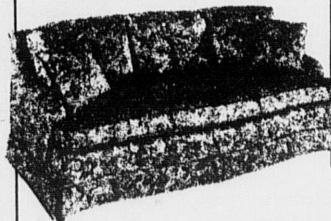

The festival is open to the public and will run continuously from mid-afternoon until about 9 p.m. Tickets will be available at the door.

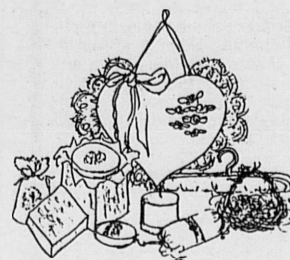

Pike School Students Study In Quebec, New Hampshire

The next three days mark a special time for foreign language students at the Pike School. Eighth-graders studying French will practice language skills in Quebec. Eighth- and ninth-graders enrolled in Spanish are part of a cultural immersion program in New Hampshire.

French students departed this noon for an extended weekend in Quebec City and a program which will enable them to hear and speak French in a real-life situation and be part of a culture in a city with a decidedly French flavor. They will spend tomorrow morning attending classes at the Ursuline School of Quebec, a French-speaking school. Meals during the next three days will give students exposure to a variety of local fare. Their itinerary includes seeing sites of historical and cultural importance as well as opportunities for shopping. Planned activities include seeing a feature-length film in Spanish, playing recreational games popular in Spanish countries and discussions of the lives of Spanish-speaking people in the United States. Examination of holiday and family customs is part of what has been designed to broaden the awareness of Pike students.

The challenge of the weekend for both groups will be to see how successfully students can utilize their classroom knowledge to communicate in a foreign language.

Formal study of foreign languages at Pike begins with French in sixth grade and Spanish in eighth grade.

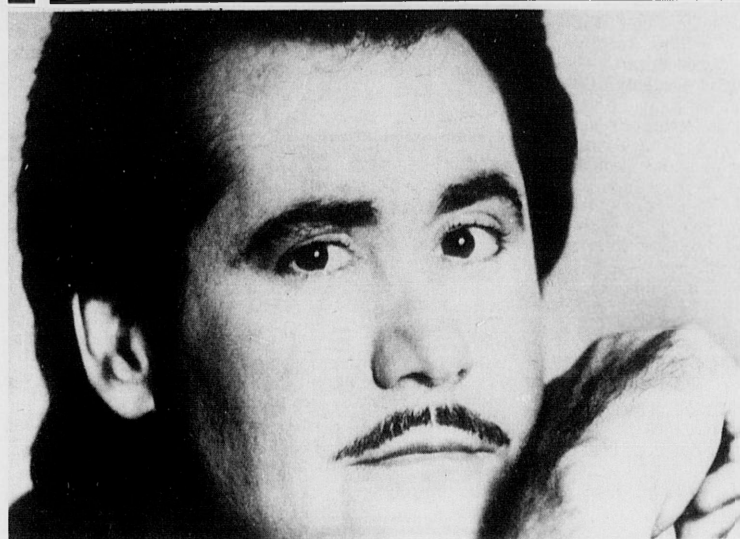

Jazz Ensemble To Perform

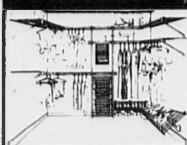

Sheep Shearing Festival To Bring Flocks To Museum

The Museum of American Textile History's 16th annual Sheep Shearing Festival will be held on the Old North Andover Common Sunday, May 15, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

A variety of events will include sheep shearing, a crafts fair, sheepdog demonstrations, 4-H Club open sheep show, sheep-to-shawl demonstrations, a spinning bee, hands-on children's activities, yarn competition, historic walking tours, fleece auction, live music, free museum tours, a guard dog exhibit, flax demonstrations and food booths.

This annual festival is an outreach program provided free by the museum and has become a community and family event.

Sheep will get their annual spring haircuts throughout the day from professional shearer Dick Rosenburgh, who will explain sheep shearing techniques. The North Andover chapter of the American Field Service will sponsor a crafts fair featuring more than 50 exhibitors displaying and selling original work.

Members of 4-H Clubs in Essex, Middlesex and Worcester counties will participate in a sheep competition. Dressed-up sheep and their owners will parade in the 4-H sheep costume competition at 1 p.m.

One of the most popular events is the sheepdog demonstrations by Betty Levin, Ellen Raja and Virgil Holland. Their dogs will follow verbal commands to herd a flock of sheep through gates and into a pen at noon and at 3 p.m. A sheep guard dog exhibit will be provided by the Hampshire College Livestock Guarding Dog Project.

The Kearsarge Roving Spinsters from

New Hampshire will give a day-long, sheep-to-shawl demonstration showing each step in turning fleece into fabric. Area spinners, correctly known as spinsters, have been invited to bring their wool and wheels to a recreation of an 18th-century spinning bee. Barbara Noonan will give an Oriental rug demonstration and the Colonial Life Group will provide a flax-to-linen demonstration.

Food booths will feature traditional fare as well as lamb shish-ke-bab. Live musical performances will be given by the Sweet Adelines at 11:30 a.m. and The North Andover Citizen's Hometown Band at 2 p.m. The museum will be open all day for free tours of the current exhibits: "Factory Labor: Shaping Work in America," which features antique textile machinery in operation, and "A Museum Is..." which provides a behind-the-scenes look at what makes a museum.

The North Andover Historical Society will lead historical walking tours at 10:30 a.m. and at 2 p.m. Other activities include hands-on activities for children by the museum's interpretive staff; a fleece auction by the Essex County Sheep and Wool Growers Association; and a yarn competition by the Boston Area Spinners and Dyers. Sheep souvenirs include sheep shearing t-shirts, tote bags, teddy bears, pencils, posters and buttons. The museum gift shop will be open with a variety of books, postcards and gift items for sale.

The Sheep Shearing Festival is made possible through the generosity of AT&T Network Systems, Merrimack Valley Works. The festival will be held rain or shine.

To Present Concert

Under the direction of maestro George Monseur, the Merrimack Valley Philharmonic Orchestra will present a concert Sunday, May 15, at 3 p.m. in the Cochran Chapel on the campus of Andover's Phillips Academy with guest soprano Beda Polanco.

Polanco, a voice instructor at Phillips Academy, has sung with Opera New England and currently sings with the Boston Opera Company. She has toured the United States and Spain and worked with Pablo Casals for three years as assistant director of the Casals Festival Chorus. Born and educated in Puerto Rico, Polanco began her singing career at the age of 16 and came to the United States to complete her degree work at the Boston Conservatory. She will sing Richard Strauss' "Four Last Songs," composed in 1948, a year before his death.

Monseur has also selected the First Symphony, subtitled "The Titan," by Gustave Mahler. A major work in four movements, Mahler's music has been described as tone-painting, movie music before there were movies, a cosmos of sound.

ice the entire transportation contract would save \$302,000 over the five year period, he said.

This monetary issue raised doubt among some Andover citizens. Dave Gossard of Holt Road, questioned spending more money for the same service.

Paul explained his rationale for the recommendation. He said he considered the lowest bidder. In addition, he looked for the most responsible and capable bidder.

Paul said there were two areas to consider when choosing a contractor, road operations and administration.

He noted some administration problems with Parent Bus Service, such as supplying his office copies of driver's licenses, proof of insurance, and physical examinations of employees. Paul also noted the lack of radios for communication between buses, in case of a problem.

Caruso defended his client by addressing each of the problems raised by Paul.

Money wasn't the only issue discussed.

Currently, Parent Bus Service is responsible for operating 20 buses in Andover. The new contract cuts this to eleven, eliminating the need for nine buses and drivers.

This aroused much resentment amongst the company's employees. "We transport your kids; we do our best, but what do we get out of it? Zip," said busdriver, Debbie Duran.

Her reaction was typical of the numerous busdrivers who expressed their point of view. "All of us feel we've done our very best for the town and we're being stabbed in the back," said Robin (Parent) La-

Barre, busdriver. "And," she added, "it's a waste of money."

Trombly Motor Coach was represented by its lawyer, John Bryden. He noted Trombly's qualifications as a bus service. He also spoke in favor of the multiple contracts and said he stood by Paul's recommendation.

An employee from Laidlaw Transit defended his company and any bad publicity they've received about their performance. "Laidlaw has bent over backwards to fulfill our commitments," he said.

The final decision is in the hands of the School Committee, and will most likely be made at its next meeting.

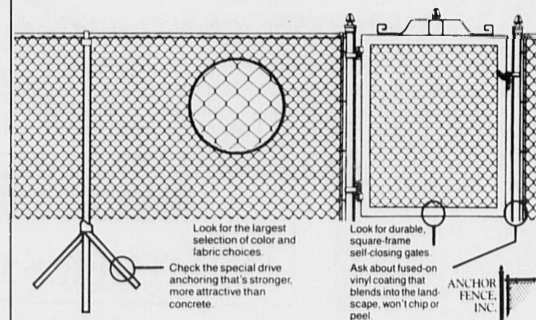

Collaborative Agreement Nears Completion

An agreement between Andover and Lawrence with respect to the establishment, operation and maintenance of a Lawrence/Andover collaborative school is progressing towards its final stages.

School Committee member Richard Neal presented a revised agreement at Tuesday night's committee meeting. He pointed out several areas that had been reworked through a negotiation process between the subcommittees of Andover and Lawrence.

"There have been a number of revisions in the agreement," Neal said. He pointed out that enrollment would be voluntary and noted some revisions in school governance, funding and tenure of teachers.

Questions were raised regarding several key issues in the agreement.

•The state will finance the Collaborative School through the local school systems.

If the state does not provide 100 percent reimbursement, the local school committee would be responsible for paying the balance.

School Committee Chairman Donald Robb said

he was concerned with this type of arrangement. This gives the Collaborative School Committee fiscal autonomy, according to Robb, who said no other school committee has that power.

Robb said the local school systems need to have the power to review the Collaborative School budget when it exceeds state reimbursement.

•Teachers for the proposed school will come from within the local systems. But the status of the support staff, such as custodians, cafeteria help and secretaries, is still an open issue that must be addressed.

•The collaborative budget is part of the local school budget. Dennis Richards, Collaborative School Project director, said connecting the Collaborative School with the local schools has always been the intent. But some people say the budget should be considered separately at Town Meeting. This would enable the townspeople to be aware of where the money is being spent.

•Termination of the agreement was also discussed. Jack Dziadul, head of Citizens for Neighborhood Schools, questioned the wording of the section because he said it gave Lawrence veto

power. If termination did occur, there was a question regarding the disposition of the property.

After a great deal of discussion, the School Committee voted four to one to accept the agreement in spirit, to direct the subcommittees to explore the areas of concern and to report back to the School Committee with possible revisions.

Committee member Susan Poore opposed acceptance of the agreement. The issues raised should be considered before approval of the draft, according to Poore. She says a townwide survey should also be conducted. "It's time for us as a committee to stand back and get input from the community before moving on," she said.

The remaining four committee members say it's necessary to have an agreement between the two towns before conducting a survey. "The agreement does not predispose community sentiments," Neal said.

The School Committee voted to prepare a questionnaire for parents of all children 11-years-old and younger regarding their preference to the proposed Collaborative School.

Gillette Still Awaiting Directors

The future of Gillette's board of directors is still up in the air. The official results of the election between the Coniston Group and Gillette directors will be available next week.

This election has proved to be controversial because a Coniston victory will most likely lead to the sale of the company.

This has raised some doubt about the security of the Andover plant on Burrill Road. But Coniston attorney Augustus K. Oliver said he thought new owners would work hard to maintain company growth. "Buyers don't pay a premium to start shutting down plants," he said.

The Coniston Group made their pitch for the board of directors Thursday, April 21 at Gillette's annual meeting at the Andover plant.

The Coniston Group maintained their belief in a "corporate democracy."

Oliver said if elected, the group would ask the board of directors to retain an investment banker to obtain bids for the sale of Gillette. He says estimates show that a sale would increase the value of company stock.

The four-member group seemed optimistic about winning the seats on the board of directors. "We're positive about things," said Oliver, who based his confidence on support the group has received.

Supporting the Gillette directors, however, was the prevalent attitude among the 1,000 stockholders who attended the meeting.

Stockholders who spoke in favor of the directors received overwhelming support and applause from the audience.

"I seriously doubt that the Coniston Group cares as much about the company as I do," said Allan Moyers, a Gillette employee who has worked for the company for 29 years.

According to Moyers, there is a problem because "the emphasis is on dealing business, not doing business," he said.

In a series of press releases to stockholders, the board of directors emphasized Gillette's successful track record and the company's commitment to maximize value for all stockholders.

According to the releases, 1987 was a year of record sales with a 12-percent increase from 1986, and it stated that profit was up 28 percent in '87.

Planners Deny Permit To Reduce Parking Spots

By unanimous vote Tuesday night, the Planning Board refused to approve a special permit for the owners of the old Andover Lanes to reduce the number of required parking spots.

Benjamin Osgood and G. Bradley Richards, who purchased the building in 1986 planning to convert it to a retail shop, had run afoul of a parking ordinance written the previous year that requires developers to provide adequate parking when the business use is changed.

After being turned down by the Zoning Board of Appeals and subsequently filing a lawsuit against the town, Osgood and Richards turned to the Planning Board for a special permit that would have waived their 87 space requirement. The former bowling alley, located behind Old Town Hall, currently has spots for 12 cars.

After noting the partner's application suggested no alternative parking alternatives—a special permit requirement—the board flatly rejected their request.

Board members Susan Stott and Russ Moran noted that the 1985 parking law was written to "put developers on notice that the town wanted developers to provide parking solutions," said Stott.

Reginald Marden, an attorney representing Osgood and Richards, told the board his client had spent the past 18 months looking for more parking, but that in the largely developed downtown shopping area, their options were limited.

The town, with its powers of eminent domain, should take the leadership role in creating more downtown parking, he said, not developers, whose ability to acquire property to create parking is limited.

But, what the authors of the bylaw were looking for were "future applicants to provide more creative solutions," said Moran. "Your solution is that there is no solution."

"The taxpayers of the town should not be required to pay for the situations you create," said Stott.

The board also pointed out that the ordinance was in place before the partners purchased the property.

The developer was misled, said Marden, by at least five previous town decisions that let other firms change uses.

Marden described a stationery store that was allowed to become a bank without requiring more parking spaces. He did not mention the name of the store, nor gave any further examples other than saying specifics were available upon request.

Selectmen Won't Use Grant To Woo Winn

Andover survived a minor hostage crisis situation Monday night—without the use of counter-terrorists.

Although several angry townspeople urged them on, the Board of Selectmen decided against using a state grant worth nearly \$500,000 as leverage to force housing concessions from Winn Development Co., the firm that recently won approval to build 168 apartments at the Brookside

Estates tract; 18 more than the 150 recommended by the selectmen and the Andover Housing Partnership Committee.

Instead, after the public hearing was concluded, the selectmen voted 4-0 to support the grant in return for a half-promise from Winn to install extra sewer line to service an abutting neighborhood.

Andover Kids Put Beat In Feet

A bunch of kids from across the state are learning that dancing is fun and a great way to make new friends.

Women and children played a highly visible role in the strike. The poem was later put to music, and the performers will sing this touching song.

In addition to the 500 youngsters, who will dance and sing, the program will feature guest appearances by Jacques d'Amboise, founder and artistic director of National Dance Institute, as well as Liz Walker, WBZ-TV anchor, and Steve Aveson of *Evening Magazine* in Baltimore.

Since founding NDI in 1976, d'Amboise, a former New York City Ballet dancer,

has brought his dream of making dance a part of the life of all Americans to thousands of children, hundreds of them from New England.

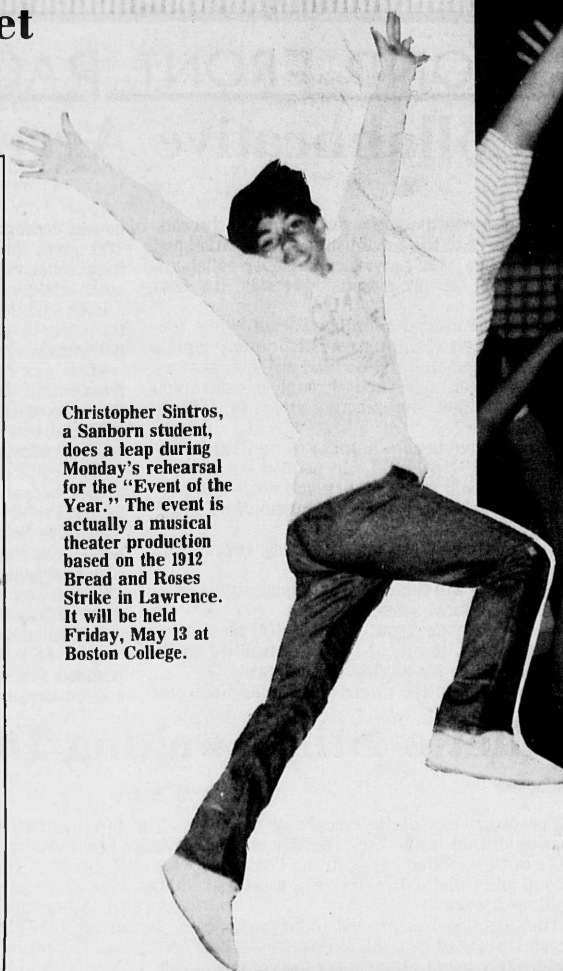

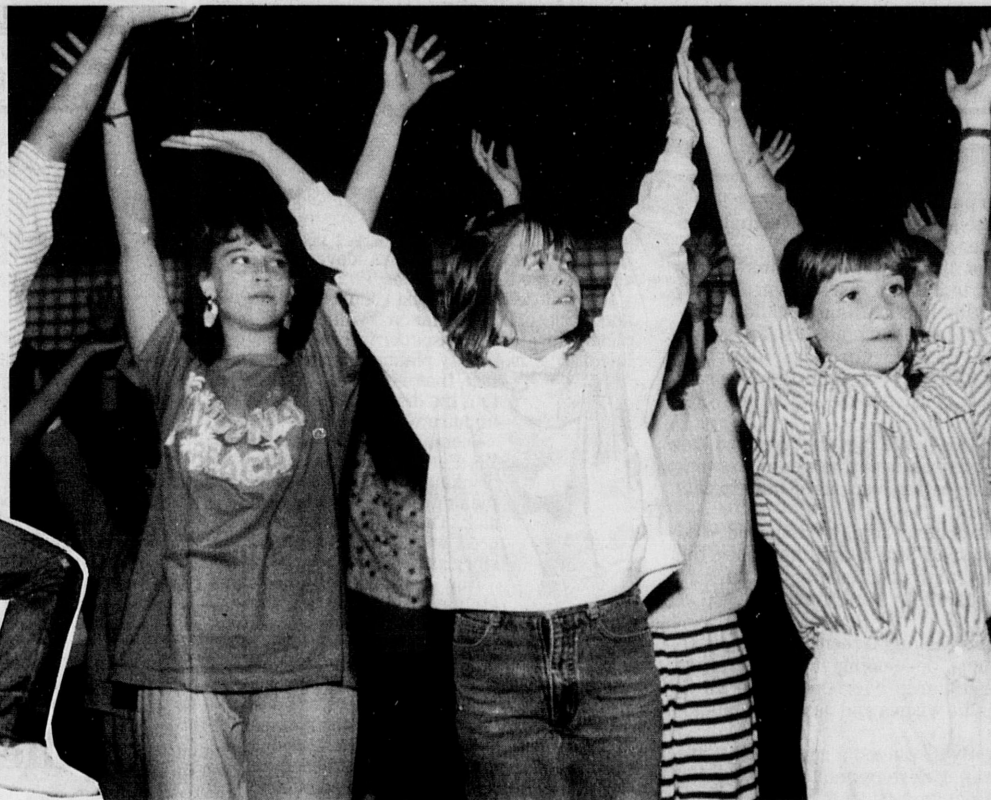

Worth Examining

A proposal to swap some land for conservation to allow construction of a condominium complex off Lowell street is certainly worth examination by town officials.

The plan, presented to the Planning Board Tuesday night and scheduled for hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals next Thursday night, involves acreage owned by Harry Axelrod.

The proponent wants to build 33 luxury condominiums on about 25 acres of land to the rear of the Rolling Green Motel, which he once owned.

In return, Axelrod would give the town considerable acreage for conservation purposes and maintain a public golf course on the property— which virtually assures no further building there.

While the overall plan deserves more scrutiny, the package seems a good one on the surface.

Naturally one would expect the neighbors to be opposed. It is only natural that those who have purchased property next to open land would anticipate its remaining in a natural state or at least not developed to any great extent.

But such things do not happen in Andover anymore. Development and growth continue to be rampant here, and only proper control as exercised by the planning department provides any safeguard.

It therefore seems proper to thoroughly examine the Axelrod proposal from various perspectives.

First and foremost, there is protection of the Haggetts Pond watershed area, which would be gained by the donation of the acreage to the town

for conservation purposes.

Retention of the golf course also accomplishes the same purpose.

Development of luxury condominiums hardly becomes a threat to increased school enrollment, since more than likely, such units would be acquired by those in other than child-bearing years.

Condominiums would seem more desirable than 27 single family units which the property owner could freely construct should the town reject the current proposal.

Underlying all this is the fact that Axelrod has displayed a willingness over the years to work with town officials in the various developments he has undertaken.

Over a quarter-century ago, he acquired Wild Rose Farm on Lowell Street and developed the area with single family homes, facing difficult and strict rules set forth by the Planning Board at that time.

He developed the Rolling Green starting with a small complex and developing it into a major business and resort area over the years, all in cooperation with the wishes and desires of municipal officials.

He has constantly displayed a cooperative attitude in all his major developmental work in the community in which he resides.

And, while not giving tacit approval to this current proposal, indeed, due to his display of cooperative effort in the past, municipal officials should give the project close examination in the best interests of the community.

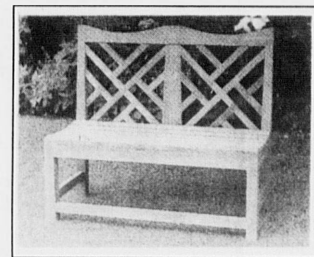

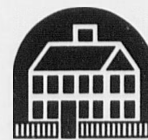

Not that some board members didn't have second thoughts. Absentee selectman Gail Ralston sent a statement that supported using the grant to negotiate Brookside units down to 150. In his first regular selectmen's meeting, new member Jim Barenboim asked Winn representatives to consider increasing the number of affordable housing units.

Selectman Gerald Silverman, who, in the past has expressed strong resentment of the state's approval of the Brookside comprehensive permit, said he could find no reason to move against Winn.

If the board disapproved Winn's \$480,000 Community Development Action Grant request, "We'd be holding them hostage," he said.

What the selectmen settled for was Winn attorney Jerry Cohen's statement that it was "probable" the company would install extra sewer line. Although members of the audience audibly sneered at Cohen's concession, Town Manager Ken Mahony replied, saying, "Mr. Cohen's word is worth a lot of contracts."

The CDAG grant was earmarked to run sewer pipes up North Road to service the future apartment complex. However, the state requires the municipality to file the application papers.

Approval is practically automatic in nearly all cases. Except here.

Breaking with the selectmen and the AHPC, the town Zoning Board of Appeals, after lengthy negotiation with the developer, earlier this year recommended 168 units, a figure subsequently approved by the state.

After Cohen made Winn's presentation Monday night, Selectman Charles Wesson began discussion by acknowledging that hard feelings still exist over the extra 18 units.

But, Cohen rebutted, the state approval has already been given and "I think we're at the point of 'let's get on with developing.' Why are we still struggling over this 18 unit difference?"

Cohen's plea didn't stop Brookside neighbor's from asking for denial of the CDAG grant support—unless the project was scaled down.

"If Mr. Cohen is wondering about the hassle over the 18 extra units" why doesn't he just eliminate them? commented Joe Arujo.

Barenboim was the only board member who asked for changes in the Brookside plans.

With the increased profits made possible through the grant, Winn could provide more affordable housing, said Barenboim.

Currently, 25 percent—42 units—are designated in the Brookside development as affordable.

Lange's arrangement will consist of a welded metal sculpture constructed from antique forge tools found in the factory of ancestors of the J.H. Horne and Sons Co. of Lawrence.

Baseball Tryouts On Weekend

The Andover Blue and Gold Pony League baseball teams will hold their annual spring tryouts this Saturday, April 30, and Sunday, May 1, from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Andover High School varsity and junior varsity fields.

All youngsters between the ages of 13 and 15 are eligible. No candidate may turn 16 years of age before August 1. All positions are open, with returning players required to earn their way back on their respective team.

All 13-year-old players should report to the high school at 1 p.m. both days and be prepared to work until approximately 3 p.m. All 14- and 15-year-old players should report at 3 p.m. and be prepared to work until approximately 5 p.m.

Last summer AG won its division title during the regular season for the third consecutive year, but lost a one-game semifinal playoff to Lynnfield to snap a string of four straight league titles (two in the Greater Lawrence Babe Ruth League, 1983 and 1984). Gold had won five league championships in six years before Lynnfield snapped the ring of successes.

Blue and Gold will play league schedules of 14 to 18 games and may also play several non-league and/or pre-season games. If either or both finishes first or second in the division, they will qualify for the playoffs.

There is also the possibility of some post-season tournament play around the state in August, although a final decision will not

be made until the season begins.

Taxable items would include garden tools, hardware, peat moss, lawnmowers, sweepers, spreaders, building and fencing materials, hoses, lawn and flower seeds and certain plants.

REHAB TAX CREDITS

QUESTION: Does the latest Tax Reform Law eliminate tax credits for rehabilitating historic and very old buildings?

ANSWER: The Tax Reform Law reduces, but does not eliminate, the big tax credit for rehabilitating certain types of buildings. The credit is equal to a percentage of the cost of rehabilitating older commercial and industrial properties and certified historic structures (including residential properties).

Under the old rules, the credit was 25% for historic structures, 20% for nonhistoric buildings at least 40 years old and 15% for nonhistoric build-

ings over 30 years old.

Now there are only two credits: a 20% credit for rehabilitating historic structures and a 10% credit for commercial properties placed in service before 1936. Remember, a tax credit is more valuable than a deduction. A deduction reduces taxable income but a credit is subtracted from the amount of taxes owed.

Axelrod Townhouse Plan Raises Questions By Planning Board

Hoping to land in the green Tuesday night, the owner of the only public golf course in Andover saw his attempt to win full approval of the planning board for a 33-unit townhouse development run afoul of the water(shed).

Although they praised portions of Harry Axelrod's plans as being environmentally sensitive, the board concluded that the project was too dense and too close to the sensitive protected watershed area located near the Sheraton Rolling Green golf course.

For John Crowe, Inc., the firm representing Axelrod, Tuesday night's meeting was actually a sort of dry run, leading up to a May 6 public hearing before the Zoning Board of Appeals, which will make the actual decision on whether to approve 10 variances and two special permit requests.

At the meeting, Planning Director Nancy Jeton asked the board to make a statement to the ZBA over

the watershed concerns.

The problem with the plans, she said, is that several of the luxury condominiums lay within 50 feet of protected wetlands that are likely to be disturbed during construction.

"I think the intent (of watershed protection bylaws) is for developers to stay the hell out, even if (work lasts) just for a few minutes," she said.

As drawn, Axelrod's condominiums "come too close to environmentally protected areas that our bylaws mean to protect," said Jeton.

The board agreed with Jeton, Chairman Michael Houghton asking Crowe "Why is 33 (planned units) a magical number? You're pushing this and asking for variances I don't really think you need and are (not) appropriate."

"You need to look at the highest and best use here. (I believe) you're taxing the land."

Although the total amount of land owned by Axelrod amounts to 50

acres, under his proposal, the 33 units would be built on 11 acres. Wetlands and the golf course make up the balance.

Crowe and Tom Kelsch, the project manager, who earlier had given a half-hour presentation detailing the project, had little response except say that less than 33 units would not be profitable at current market rates.

Kelsch also briefly commented that the project would need to "push into the golf course to maintain 33 units" if the condominiums were sent further away from the wetlands.

It was a succinct contrast to the first part of the planning review, during which details such as water drainage were praised.

Currently water running through Fish Brook stream on its way to Haggett's Pond creates flooding problems, swamping one neighbor's driveway every time it rains, said Kelsch.

Crowe Inc. would bypass the present drainage system and route the major water runoff directly into Fish Brook, said Kelsch.

Other public benefits of the project, he said, include maintenance of the nine-hole golf course and a gift of 25 wetlands acres to the town.

Axelrod will also petition the ZBA to let his golf course stay in business.

As part of Axelrod's Sheraton Rolling Green hotel complex, the golf course did not violate zoning bylaws until he sold the hotel.

Now a separate entity, the course steps on a town bylaw that requires "outdoor recreation club" to occupy a minimum of 50 acres.

The violation was not noticed until town planners began studying Axelrod's condominium proposal.
