## Show choir, genre popularized in TV series 'Glee,' new to AHS

A group of sweaty, red-faced Andover High School students stood in a circle, extending one hand to the middle as teacher Mark Mercer said a few inspirational words about the year ahead.

No, this wasn't the end of an intensive pre-season camp for a high school sports team.

More than 40 students spent two days last week learning choreography and singing their hearts out in Andover High's newest choral ensemble, a show choir. Mercer isn't their coach, he's the high school choir director.

Popularized by the television series "Glee," show choirs dance and move around stage as they sing popular, jazz or show tunes, usually wearing costumes or coordinated outfits. Especially popular in the Midwest – "Glee" is set in Ohio – high school show choirs can compete in regional and national competitions.

"It's made choir cool again," said Mercer.

Andover High seems primed for a show choir, as Mercer, an Ohio native, is in his second year teaching in Andover. For its inaugural year, 70 students auditioned for 48 spots in the show choir, named

## State sales-tax views shared by candidates

Of the dozen state legislative candidates running to represent Andover this fall, only the two Andover representatives who voted to raise the tax say they support that decision.

The Townsman asked each of the candidates for state senate and for the two state representative seats that represent Andover the following questions about the Massachusetts sales tax:

- Do you support an annual tax-free weekend?
  - Do you support the recent increases in the state's sales tax?
  - Do you support the recent sales-tax increase on alcohol?
  - Do you support a citizen initiative to lower the sales tax rate from 6.25 percent to 3 percent?
- Each of the candidates was then given up to 150 words to

further elaborate and to answer the question "In general, what are your opinions on the state's sales tax policy?"

Candidates answers can be found on page 4.

The state primary will be Tuesday, Sept. 14. Precincts 1, 7 and 8 will vote at the Andover Senior Center on Whittier Court, near the Park. Republicans in that area of town will select who will

challenge Barbara L'Italien. Precincts 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 9 will vote at the Collins Field House at Andover High School, 80 Shawshen Road.

This election will be a three party primary: Democratic Party, Republican Party and Libertarian Party. Registered voters who are registered but not enrolled in a party may choose which party ballot they want.

## Selectmen to appoint 5th member

Selectmen plan to appoint their board's fifth member, to fill the seat being relinquished by Jerry Stable Jr. – and they are already receiving plenty of interest in the job.

The person selected will serve from October until an election in March.

Citing the demands of his career, Stable has announced he will resign at the end of August, five months after being re-elected to a three-year term.

The four-member board voted Aug. 23 to appoint someone to fill the vacancy until a replacement can be elected to fill the remaining two years of Stable's term at town elections in March 2011.

Selectmen agreed the alternative – keeping a four-member board until the election – would result in more tie votes and greater pressure on the four remaining members to avoid scheduling conflicts.

Alex Vispoli, selectmen chairman, said about 12 people have

already approached board members and the town manager to show interest in being appointed.

"We do know we'll have the election in March. Selecting someone (who intends to run) will automatically give them a leg up, going in. It would make them an incumbent," said Selectman Brian Major.

Selectmen Mary Lyman and Ted Teichert agreed to draft an applicant questionnaire this week. Interested residents will be asked to explain their relevant experience, expectation of running for office in March and nights they would be available to attend other committee meetings as a liaison.

Selectmen expect to approve the questionnaire at a 7:30 a.m. meeting on Aug. 31 and accept applications for the two weeks following. They'll discuss the pool of applicants at their Sept. 13 meeting, possibly voting to appoint someone, said Vispoli.

Lyman emphasized the appointee must have experience, because he or she will be jumping into the

## Residents vote on new school Dec. 6

Mark your calendars: a Special Town Meeting to approve plans for a new multimillion elementary school will be held Monday, Dec. 6.

Selectmen approved the date on Monday, Aug. 23, giving residents the chance to add items to the meeting warrant between Sept. 20 and Oct. 22.

The board also approved Tuesday, Jan. 25 for a ballot vote, if necessary, to approve funding for the new school. Earlier in the summer, the School Committee cancelled school for Jan. 25 because polling

stations at Andover High School are expected to swell with a high voter turnout if there is a secret ballot vote for a debt exclusion override of Proposition 2 1/2.

Bancroft Elementary School, built in 1969, has structural problems. If plans for a new school on the Bancroft site are approved by the Massachusetts School Building Authority, the state will reimburse Andover for a minimum of 40 percent of building costs.

The School and School Building Committees approved the Dec. 6 and Jan. 25 dates over a month

## CHOIR: New program inspired by hit musical TV show

"From Start to Finish."

Last week, the steady beat of "Mercy" by Welsh pop singer Duffy blared from the choir room's speakers as students, wearing matching red T-shirts, moved in synch. Following choreographer Beth Kennedy, a fifth-grade teacher at South Elementary, choir members worked up a sweat as they memorized steps and motions while singing in harmony.

"Most of these kids have never done something like this. It's not easy," said Mercer, as he watched the group. "This is a huge thing for kids. It teaches much more than music — life skills, confidence, working with other kids and depending on yourself. They've formed a bond of friends, people they can always go back to."

The show choir met for the first time last week, learning routines in an intensive two-day camp, dubbed "Sing!Sing!" a play on the name of the famous New York prison. Roughly half of the choir are freshmen students.

"This is a great way to spend vacation. It's a lot of fun, but it's

hard work. I'm definitely drained at the end of the day. But it's an accomplished feeling," said AHS junior Summer LeCain at the close of the second day of Sing!Sing! camp. "We all came in wanting to do this. It's great to see how far we've come. We've really come together as a group."

The group is polishing routines to four pop songs, including "Eye of the Tiger." The choir will rehearse once a week after school and once per weekend.

If the choir seems ready, Mercer said he is considering entering them in a show choir competition later in the year.

AHS juniors Bobby Hawes and James Conley said they hope From Start to Finish will compete, eventually. "We have the potential to be great. We're just working the bugs out," said Conley, breaking into a smile. "Show choir is about having fun. Even if we come in last place, we're starting from the ground up."

The best friends admitted they joined show choir because it sounded fun and for one more reason: "There are six guys in show choir, with about 30 women.

The ratio is definitely in our favor," said Hawes.

Last year, Mercer arraigned for a high school show choir from West Virginia, in the area for a conference at Berklee College of Music, to perform at AHS and have lunch with Andover choir students. The visit sparked interest in the genre, and students began asking him if AHS could have a show choir, said Mercer.

"This is not like 'Glee' at all. This is more work, and more full-on ensemble singing. It requires a ton of team work. The point is it's not about one person, it's about the group," said Mercer.

Show choir offers an alternative to students who can't fit the school's traditional choirs into their schedule or are not interested in classical choral repertoire, said Mercer. For others, it's a fun extra-curricular on top of band, choir or other classical groups.

Show choir music is learned orally, mostly by repetition, said Mercer. Students wanting to delve into reading notes and learning music theory can find that in numerous other ensembles at AHS, he said.

Mercer was hired at the start of the 2009-10 school year as vocal music director of AHS and Andover's three middle schools. He travels between the four schools to teach and conduct a total of 10 choirs.

Between Mercer's first and second years in Andover, choir participation has doubled. By growing interest in choir in the younger grades — Mercer has 350 students singing in choirs between the three middle schools and eventually would like to start an all-town elementary choir — he hopes to strengthen the AHS program.

"I want the kids to have something to work for, something to be proud of," said Mercer.

He's found support in a dedicated group of choir parents that have formed a new nonprofit booster program, called the Andover Public Schools Vocal Music Association. They're raising money to cover everything not funded by the school budget.

"I don't expect the school to provide for all the things I want to do. It's going to be on parent support to make this happen. I can't do it myself," said Mercer.

ago, as plans for the new school are coming together over the summer.

If the School Building Committee's design is approved by the MSBA at a Nov. 17 meeting, the town has 120 days to get resident approval at a Special Town Meeting and a ballot vote.

"We don't have the flexibility to push it off," said Town Manager Buzz Stapczynski as selectmen discussed scheduling Monday night. "It's a 120-day window we're bumping up against."

Residents would need to approve a debt-exclusion override, which allows the town to temporarily raise taxes above the limits set under Proposition 2 1/2, to pay for the new school. If the new school does not pass by a two-thirds majority at the Dec. 6 Town Meeting, there will be no need for the special election.

Stapczynski advocated for having the warrant open for just one month, as the town clerk's office is already handling a state primary and election through the fall and

winter and the Finance Committee would need time to crunch numbers and produce its report.

It remains to be seen if a project to relocate the town yard will be included in the Dec. 6 Town Meeting.

"If the Town Yard Task Force is ready to go, those dates would work (to approve a town yard project). It's just a question of if they'll be ready," said Selectman Brian Major, liaison to the Town Yard Task Force.

A \$21.9 million proposal to

relocate the town yard was withdrawn from the April 2010 Town Meeting warrant. Town yard, located on a roughly three-acre parcel off Lewis Street, has fuel pumps and a maintenance garage for town vehicles, salt and sand for winter roads and overnight parking for some, but not all, of the town's vehicle fleet.

The December Town Meeting warrant will be open Sept. 20 to Oct. 22; residents looking to submit articles should visit andoverma.gov/clerk or call 978-623-8255.

middle of projects to relocate the town yard, build a new elementary school and fire station in Ballardvale as well as negotiate employee contracts, including the town manager's.

"We have a lot of work ahead of

us," said Major.

The March 2011 town election ballot will have two selectmen positions: a two-year term to fish the rest of Stabile's term and a three-year term as Lyman's seat is up for re-election.

Stabile attended the board's

closed-door executive session on Aug. 23 but was absent from the 7 p.m. open meeting. After the meeting, Vispoli said Stabile had to leave before the open meeting for a business trip.

Chandler Road resident Larry Bruce, who came in third behind

Stabile in March 2010, attended the Aug. 23 meeting. Bruce has said publicly he'd like to run again.

Vispoli did not allow for comments from the public during Monday's discussion on how to fill the board vacancy.

Once the questionnaire is approved by selectmen next week, Town Manager Buzz Stapczynski's office will handle the application process. For contact information, scroll to the bottom of the page at andoverma.gov/selectmen

## State senate, rep. candidates to appear at League forum Aug. 30

Ten of the 12 candidates running for state offices and appearing in the primary have agreed to participate in the League of Women Voters of Andover/North Andover pre-primary Candidates' Forum on Monday, Aug. 30 at 7 p.m. at Memorial Hall Library, 2 North Main St., Andover.

Republicans James J. Lyons, Jr. and John O. Thorlin are running for the 18th Essex District State Representative seat, which covers parts of Andover, Boxford, Georgetown, Methuen, North Andover and Haverhill. Incumbent, Rep. Barbara

L'Italien does not have a Democratic challenger in the State Primary and will not attend the forum.

Republicans Paul Adams and Salim R. Tabit, and Democrats Patricia Commane and Frank J. Bonet are running for the 17th Essex District State Representative seat which covers parts of Andover, Lawrence, and Tewksbury.

Frank Bonet has not yet responded to the League's invitation.

Republicans Patrick Rahilly and Jamison Tomasek, and Democrats Barry Finegold,

Debbie Silberstein and John J. "Jack" Wilson Jr. will attend the forum. They are vying for the 2nd Essex and Middlesex District Senate seat being vacated by retiring Sen. Sue Tucker. The district covers Andover and parts of Lawrence, Dracut and Tewksbury.

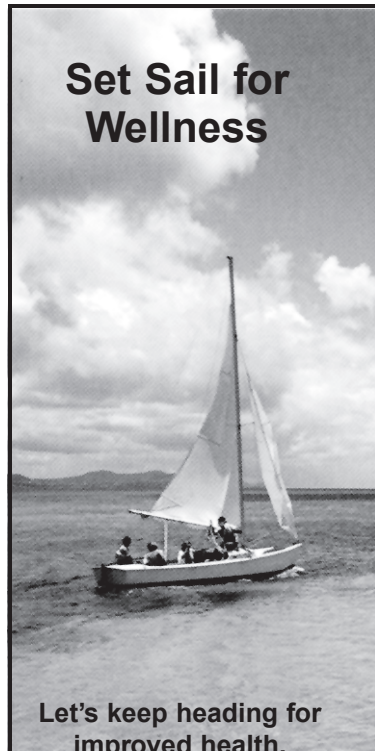

Each of the candidates for state senate or a state representative seat was then given up to 150 words to further elaborate and to answer the question "In general, what are your opinions on the state's sales tax policy?"

### 17th Essex District

## Candidates vie for open state representative seat

Residents will vote in the primary Sept. 14 to choose the candidates who will represent each party in the general election in November. Voters not registered in any party can choose which party ballot they would like to fill.

With incumbent Barry Finegold running for state senate, the 17th Essex state representative seat representing two-thirds of Andover is open.

### In general, what are your opinions on the state's sales tax policy?

#### Republicans

##### Sal Tabit

Our state's current sales tax policy is anti-business, anti-job growth, and anti-consumer. The situation is amplified for those communities like Andover and Tewksbury that are so close to the border of other states that those states take advantage of our short-sightedness by either having sales taxes lower than our own, or no sales tax at all.

I believe that one of the ways

towards a robust economy is implementing a sales tax policy that allows us to compete with border states, ensuring that Massachusetts residents spend their money in Massachusetts, creating jobs and revenue in the process. We only need to witness the lines out the doors of our retail establishments during the recent Massachusetts "tax holiday" weekend to understand that our current policy is foolish.

##### Paul Adams

The sales tax is a significant component of our crushing tax burden. Together with the state corporate income tax, the second highest in the nation, businesses face an overwhelming tax burden, which threatens their

survival. These taxes are a drag on investment, increase unemployment, and drive companies to other states.

If the rollback is approved by voters, I will fight to honor the people's will—something the legislature has purposefully avoided, even after the approval of numerous ballot initiatives this past decade.

I actively fought to avert last year's 20-percent increase in the sales tax, new taxes on meals, hotel/motel stays and on alcohol. As your representative, I will fight for sensible tax policies that will once again make Massachusetts the engine of economic growth it was when we were a disciplined two-party state.

#### Democrat Pat Commane

The state has faced unprecedented revenue shortfalls and have cut the overall state budget significantly. Republicans Jim Lyons and John Thorlin, both Andover residents like L'Italien, will face off in the Republican primary on Sept. 14 to see who will challenge L'Italien in the general election.

### In general, what are your opinions on the state's sales tax policy?"

#### Republicans

##### John Thorlin

The sales tax is bad policy for our district. Any candidate who wishes to represent our interests should advocate cutting it as far as possible. It should not even be a partisan issue. I believe in cutting state spending and allowing citizens to spend more of their own money. However, even if one wanted to maintain or increase state spending, a high sales tax is an economically wasteful way to reach that goal. The presence of sales tax-free New Hampshire mere minutes away from our district means that increases in the sales tax here drive would-be customers of the businesses in

our district to the Granite State. That hurts our businesses and reduces any gain in tax revenue since the tax base shrinks. Given the current weak economy, we can't afford to have our legislature giving economic stimulus to New Hampshire through a tax levied on only Massachusetts citizens.

##### Jim Lyons

## YOUR GUIDE TO HISTORY

Andover man gives tours about Bread & Roses strike

Those who forget the past are doomed to repeat it, says the old cliché. There's less need to worry with Richard Padova on the case.

The Andover resident leads the Bread and Roses tour at Lawrence Heritage State Park every Wednesday at 11 a.m., teaching people about the events of the mill workers strike of 1912. There is an introductory video at 10:30 a.m.

The strike of 1912, otherwise known as the Bread and Roses strike, was over workers' rights in the mills. Massachusetts was the center for the textile industry and Lawrence outranked most cities in production of wool and other products. Conditions in the mills were poor and unhealthy with employees overworked and underpaid.

Workers started to strike on Jan. 12 and the work stoppage lasted two months.

One of Padova's favorite aspects of the job is telling

random bits of information. One of his favorite bits of trivia is how the strike got its name.

"It wasn't called the Bread and Roses strike at first. For a long time it was called the Great Strike of 1912," said Padova. "It got its name because during the strike workers didn't have much money so they couldn't afford food like bread. Also, women strikers, who were an important part of the strike, were seeking dignity and roses represent dignity. That's how it became the Bread and Roses strike."

Eventually, the mill bosses met the workers' demands for wage increases, extra pay for overtime, and a promise of no repercussions for strikers when they came back to work.

Padova takes tour goers around Lawrence to the focal points of the strike all the while enriching them with local history of the city. Padova has been giving this tour for six summers and his love of history — especially local history — is

what made this job so appealing to him.

"I enjoy teaching people the history of Lawrence and local history in general," said Padova. When he isn't giving tours, he teaches history, government and geography at Northern Essex Community College. He's been teaching at NECC for six years.

"I enjoy talking about the past and how we can learn from it and how it pertains to the present and future," said Padova.

He grew up in Lawrence and spent his first 30 years in the city. He eventually married and moved to Andover. Padova believes it is important for all local residents to come and experience the history of the tour.

"Most people who live in the suburbs like Andover have ancestors from Lawrence," said Padova. "It's their ancestral heritage. This is the perfect place to learn where they came from and about their past."

## Partnership brings new band to NECC

The Northern Essex Community College Music Program, under the direction of program coordinator Ken Langer, will partner with the Merrimack Valley Concert Band to bring new classes and performances to the college this fall.

Beginning in September, the Merrimack Valley Concert Band, under newly appointed director Anthony Beatrice, will rehearse regularly on the NECC campus in Haverhill. Students at the college will be able to become a member of the band and receive college credit by registering for the concert band class. All music majors at NECC are required to be a member of a performing ensemble and this partnership will provide an additional opportunity for students who have played in a concert band to continue their studies and to fulfill requirements.

The Merrimack Valley Concert Band is a traditional community concert band with its roots in West Newbury. The band of about 40 includes members from many towns in Massachusetts and New Hampshire, the ages and music backgrounds of band members are varied.

Outgoing band director Karen Mundo said the partnership is a welcome one, adding, "It will raise the profile of the band as well as give it a central location to meet. It fills a need at the

college where there is currently no concert band ensemble and it provides Northern Essex students with college credits."

When the band begins rehearsals in the fall it will be under the baton of Beatrice, a 2002 Pentucket graduate and Pentucket Regional High School and Middle School concert band director and music production teacher. He holds a bachelor's and master's from the University of Massachusetts Lowell.

NECC offers a general studies degree with a music option that "provides a foundation for success in musical performance, music education, and music computer technology. Students gain skills in music theory and ear-training, experience music from all cultures and styles, learn how to read and write music, and take part in performance workshops. This degree will transfer to four-year music programs," according to a release from the college. The college also has a certificate in music technology which covers designing and implementing a musical recording studio.

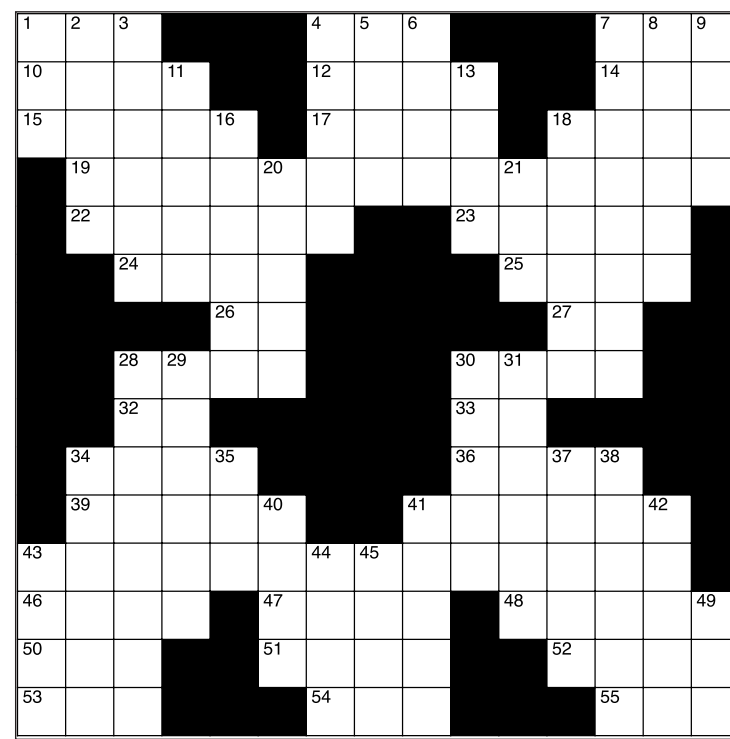

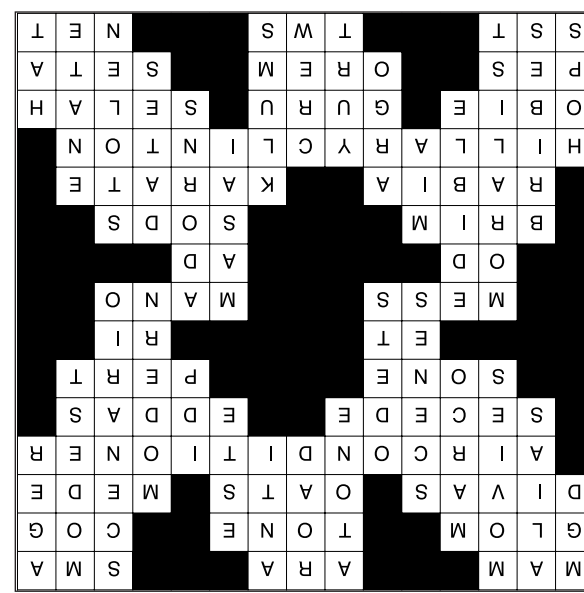

### Andover's Hanigan now a mainstay for streaking Cincinnati

He had just finished his first full season in the major leagues. He was receiving glowing reviews from the Cincinnati Reds organization and had become a favorite among his team's pitching staff.

But Andover's Ryan Hanigan knew one aspect of his game was lacking.

"I knew my defense was consistent," he said. "But I wanted to be a dangerous hitter. I wanted to be able to drive in runs and contribute with the bat. So I decided to make some adjustments to my swing."

Having already overcome the odds to travel the road from Aumais Park to the major leagues, Hanigan has proven that he accomplishes what he sets out to do.

"Nothing has ever come easy to me in baseball," said Hanigan. "I already had the chip on my shoulder, and I always will."

Less than one year later, Hanigan is firmly entrenched as a key member of the Reds, Major League Baseball's Cinderella team of the 2010 season.

"I am having a blast," he said. "We have a great team that is getting plenty of production from a lot of different guys. Being in the major leagues is great, but knowing that you are in a pennant race and that every game matters is what you dream of."

Hanigan has thrived in his role, sharing the catching duties with former All-Star Ramon Hernandez, finding himself in the lineup approximately every other day.

Through Monday, Hanigan had played in 49 games for the Reds this season, hitting an impressive .287 with three home runs and 31 RBIs. That crushed his previous career-high for RBIs of 11 set last season in 108 more at bats than this season. It is also nine more than he had total in his first 126 combined major league games.

"Offense is a big part of baseball," he said. "A lot of players have come through in the clutch for us this season, and to be able to deliver in those situations is great. They make a huge difference in the outcome of the game."

Hanigan exploded out of the gates this season, hitting .351 through May 28. But that was interrupted when he was sidelined with a

broken thumb suffered sliding into a base.

"That really stunk," said the 29-year-old. "I was really swinging the bat well, so it was really unfortunate. Then it was the waiting game, and rehab was tough. I was so anxious to play, but when you are out that long, you lose your timing. I struggled a little when I came back, but I feel like I have straighten things out."

During his time off, fans began to long for Hanigan, with one blogger writing, "Hanigan is THAT good behind the plate with his handling of the pitching staff."

While his offense has been a big addition this season, Hanigan's greatest contributions are still behind the plate and working with pitchers.

With Hanigan playing catcher this season, the Reds pitching staff has a 3.24 ERA and held hitters to a .225 batting average. That is

considerably better than when Hernandez is behind the plate, with the Reds positing a 4.70 ERA and a .281 batting average-against.

Now in his fourth season of major league action — and third in which he has appeared in at league 30 games — the Rollins College product feels he has taken on a greater leadership role.

"The one position in baseball that cannot be offensive-minded is catcher," said Hanigan. "You control the flow of the game. Helping pitchers make smart decisions and understanding the scouting reports of opposing hitters, you can't allow what you do with the bat to rattle you behind the plate."

"I want to be at the point where the team feels it can rely on me. I know the league now, I know the hitters and the ballparks from experience, paying attention, and scouting reports. An important part of my job is preparation, and I have the

knowledge to work with our young pitchers. Play speaks for itself, and I have gotten nothing but positive feedback"

With the help of Hanigan, through Monday the Reds sat at 72-53, 2 1/2 games ahead of the St. Louis Cardinals for first place in the National League Central. If they do make the playoffs, it would be the first trip for the Reds to the postseason since the 1995 season.

Cincinnati also ranks No. 1 in the National League in both runs scored (615) and batting average (.272). That after the Reds finished 78-84 in fourth place in the NL Central a season ago.

"This is what we play for," said Hanigan. "This is a different attitude than we have had in previous seasons. This is a team that is very comfortable being where we are. We expect to win. Everyone is contributing, and I am happy to be one of those guys."

## Phillips Academy buys Methuen land for its crew program

Phillips Academy's crew team will be practicing in Methuen, not Andover, within the next few years.

Phillips Academy has entered into an agreement to purchase 5.8 acres of property along the banks of the Merrimack River in Methuen. The site at 620 Lowell St., Methuen, currently serves as the General GMC truck dealership.

Phillips Academy plans to refurbish the site for use by its varsity and instructional crew programs. "The development plan will largely be one of restoring the landscape — it is currently a large parking lot — and sprucing up the building to serve as a boathouse," said Michael

Williams, the academy's director of facilities, in a release.

Other work includes the construction of a boat launching ramp and docks. Given the time needed to acquire the necessary permits, he said, it likely will be about two years before any site work could begin, and another six to nine months before the project is completed.

The private school said it plans to explore all possible partnerships with the local community. This is Phillips first purchase in Methuen.

PA's crew program will continue to operate from its current site in Andover, behind the Greater

Lawrence Technical School on River Road, until the site in Methuen is ready for occupancy. Officials from Phillips Academy, the town of Andover and the Greater Lawrence Technical School have worked cooperatively over the last 19 years to find a mutually beneficial solution to the challenges posed by the current riverfront site. As a result of the joint effort, it has become clear that issues such as cumbersome vehicle and pedestrian access and a substandard building cannot be resolved without a significant financial commitment from the Academy, according to a release.

Given the investment required to resolve the access issues

identified, the Academy's Board of Trustees asked the administration to seek an alternative site for its crew program, one that would be much less expensive to develop.

"Phillips Academy recognizes the significant energy and time dedicated to this initiative and intends to honor the spirit of what was to be a tri-party agreement among PA, the town of Andover and the Greater Lawrence Technical School. The Academy remains committed to ensuring reasonable access to the river for the residents of Andover and will grant the necessary easements for this access prior to any future sale of its property," the school said in a release.

# Time to turn to weighty issues of fall

There's no question the area needed the water. But the cool, wet, overcast weather this week brought with it the relative gloom and reality that summer is coming to a close. You know, real summer – where kids are off from school, vacations are more plentiful, the sun is out past 7:30 p.m., and the town beach is open. With the start of school next Wednesday, Sept. 1, many will devote more attention again to the issues of the day – issues that don't involve sunscreen. Among those deserving of immediate attention are the upcoming state primary, and the plan to replace Bancroft Elementary with an approximately \$35 million new school.

For the first time in years, there will be a wide-open field, with primary contests for Andover's state senate seat and both its state representative posts. Sen. Sue Tucker is stepping down, and the current field means there will be primary battles on both the Republican and Democratic senate ballots. Independent Jodi Oberto's presence then guarantees a three-way senate race in November.

The Massachusetts State Primary will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 14, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. During the next three weeks, the 12 candidates for the three Andover legislative positions will be asked questions. This week, the topic is the state sales tax, and candidates answers can be found on page 4. The Townsman has a long-standing policy of not accepting letters to the editor about candidates in the issue immediately prior to an election. That makes next week the last week for candidate endorsement letters, at least until after the primary.

Residents may want to set aside Dec. 6, which will be a Special Town Meeting to vote on whether to spend around \$35 million to replace Bancroft Elementary School with a debt exclusion override of Proposition 2 1/2. If approved at Town Meeting, residents would need to vote again at the ballot box on Jan. 25. The state is expected to cover at least 40 percent of the cost of building the school, if it is approved. It's possible that residents will also be asked on these dates to approve a more than \$20 million plan to move the town yard out of the downtown and into a larger space. If so, town officials would be wise to make that information available as soon as possible after the opening of school.

**The seven signs**

If you're driving from River Road to the high school this weekend, you'll notice a series of signs leading the way.

The signs will be placed at the intersections of River Road and Shattuck Road, Federal and North Streets; North Street and Chandler Road; Chandler Road and Beacon Street; the intersection of Lowell and Beacon Streets and Shawshen Road and at the entrance of Andover High School.

**Tips from the Coupon Queen**

Jill Cataldo saves hundreds on groceries by making the most of the common coupon. You can, too. Here's how.

**Can Stores Invent Coupon Rules?**

Q: "Our grocery store will not double coupons until a shopper has purchased items totaling \$25. They will only double six coupons. Is the store allowed to set its own rules?"

A: We've visited the topic of stores' coupon policies many times in this column, and it may surprise you that the answer to your question is Yes. A store can absolutely choose to require a certain amount of spending before it doubles coupons, or limit the number of coupons it will double or choose not to double coupons at all. A store can choose to accept competitors' coupons or turn them down. It can even choose not to accept any manufacturer coupons at all.

While I gather from your email that you might find this policy restrictive, it's definitely at the store's discretion to implement whatever rules it feels are necessary to maintain a profit margin while still enticing customers to shop there versus a competitor.

So why might a store implement a policy like this? Remember, when a store doubles coupons, it also "eats" the cost of doubling. If a store doubles a 50-cent coupon to \$1, they're willingly giving up 50 cents of profit as an incentive to get you to shop in their store. In limiting the number of coupons doubled per transaction, the store is also reducing the loss it will take on the coupons it accepts.

No major supermarket in my area doubles coupons. The closest grocery stores that offer double coupons are more than 40 minutes' drive from my house. With three major supermarkets just five minutes away from my door, it's not terribly practical to drive further to enjoy some coupon doubling. But occasionally if I'm in the area, I absolutely stop and shop. These not-so-nearby supermarkets will only double two like coupons per transaction. But, if I plan to use two coupons for detergent, two for salad dressing, two for shredded cheese, and so on, I can still put a nice trip together and maximize my doubling, even with the restrictions.

As for your store's \$25 minimum purchase, again, the store is ensuring that customers won't come in and just "skim" the best sales at the store. As an extreme example, a shopper could buy 100 items priced at \$1 each, use 100 50-cent coupons - which, doubled, make those items free - and walk out of the store paying only tax.

While this sounds like fun for shoppers, it's not as much fun for the store if they take a financial loss on those items. In requiring a \$25 minimum purchase, the store ensures that it will get at least that amount spent in the store, pre-coupon.

This isn't an uncommon practice, by the way. One supermarket in my area offers great store coupons in its flyer each week. Because they're store coupons, I can stack manufacturer coupons with them and really bring down the prices of the featured items. For example, a recent flyer offered a store coupon reducing the price of a bottle of laundry detergent to \$2.99. I also had a \$3 manufacturer coupon for the detergent; stacked with the \$2.99 store coupon, my detergent was free! But in order to use that great coupon, or any of the store coupons in the weekly ad, I also need to spend a minimum of \$10 in the store.

Again, while this may seem slightly frustrating, if enough of those store coupons bring prices down into the great-deal range, the \$10 minimum doesn't seem too bad to me. If I buy milk, produce and a few other items, I'm usually over the \$10 mark and can enjoy getting the coupon items at bargain prices.

As always, check with your store to learn exactly what their coupon policy states regarding the terms of coupon use at that chain or location.

## FOUR YEARS AT SEA

### Andover couple ends 'adventure of a lifetime'

After nearly four years of living afloat, Sara and Bob Knapp of 1 Woodland Road sailed back into their home port of Salem, Mass. earlier this month with their yellow labrador, Bentley aboard.

The couple reported visiting 70 islands, representing 23 countries, 11 currencies and six languages.

"The trip exceeded our expectations," Sara said. "We met so many wonderful people, both other cruisers and locals."

The Knapps left on what they said was an adventure of a lifetime on Oct. 9, 2006 after spending three years fixing up their 38-foot sailboat. They sailed south through New England and down the Intra-coastal Waterway to Florida. From there they crossed over to the Bahamas and then down the Caribbean island chain to Trinidad, South America before returning home, they said.

The Knapps offered their observations on the trip in written form, with Bob Knapp saying that despite the storms and other challenges the toughest part of the trip was "the preparations to get ready to go."

"Once we left the dock," he said, "we just figured out everything as we went along."

"Leaving the dock was definitely the hardest part," said Sara Knapp. "We delayed our departure so many times that I finally set a date and said, 'If we are not off the dock by then we are not going.'"

The Knapps sailed through several storms, even at the beginning of the trip.

"On the way south, we had one storm after another every few days," said Bob. "We kept

thinking that if we just get a little further south we would be OK, but then we would have another storm."

The worst storm they experienced was Thanksgiving week 2006, in Manteo, N.C., where winds were recorded at 117 mph at the airport nearby, they said. Fortunately there was advanced warning and they were able to get the boat, Windscape II, securely tied in a slip at a marina, they reported.

"I thought I would never hear Bob say, 'We need to get off the boat,' but it was getting so bad by 3 a.m. we were actually getting ready to leave the boat; and then the winds suddenly died," said Sara. "By morning it had become a beautiful day."

Time with their family was what the couple missed most while on their boat for so long, according to Sara, but "we were home for several blocks of time throughout the trip which helped a lot."

The couple was also home several other times to bring their dog back and forth since he was not able to travel in the Caribbean due to restrictions. They said they were not willing to lock away Bentley for two months in quarantine; and he could not do the longer distances between the Caribbean islands because he needed to go ashore twice a day.

Another trip could be on the horizon for the Knapps. They said they would like to take a similar trip again someday, maybe across to the Mediterranean.

### ALL THOSE YEARS AGO

#### 75 Years Ago Aug. 23, 1935

The annual water carnival is to be held tomorrow afternoon at Pomp's pond, bringing the season to a close at both public swimming beaches. The Pomp's pond committee is sponsoring the event this year, since the Legion members are attending the convention in Lowell. A truck is to stop at Shawsheen Village to pick up any children who wish to attend.

Three breaks were reported to the local police department this week. Nothing except some food was reported missing. Saturday morning a break was reported to have been made at the camp of Fire Chief Charles F. Emerson at Foster's pond. The thieves enjoyed a lunch, but did not steal anything else. A jimmy had been used to force a window. Sunday night or early Monday morning a break was attempted at the City Cleaners and Dyers Shop. A side window, boarded up, was found to have been loosened, but nothing was taken, and it is doubtful if entrance was gained.

Andover's World Series is to start tonight on the playstead at 5:45 when the Miller team, winners of the second half title in the Recreation league, will meet the Laundry, winners of the first half. The Miller team annexed the title this week when it defeated the Laundry 7 to 6. The series will be a two out of three affair, with the second game scheduled to be played on Sunday afternoon.

#### 50 Years Ago Aug. 25, 1960

Picked teams of counters will be selected by wardens in all six precincts, to get the Sept. 13 primary ballots counted as speedily yet accurately as possible. The men - there are no women poll workers in the town - will be paid \$3 hourly for the time they work after the polls close at 7 p.m. Those who are on duty during the 12-hour period when the polls are open will also be paid their usual \$17 per day.

William R. Hickey - better known to most of Andover as Ray - will wind up 26 years of police work next Wednesday. Sgt. Hickey, whose tour on the Andover Police Department began back in April 1934, went on the department when times were tough, in the middle of the Depression. And thus he became, quite by chance, the first man to take an examination for the job. He recalls that 49 men applied for the one police opening that year—and the Selectmen were ill at ease. How to choose one out of 49? So they asked the state to prepare an exam, not under civil service, and promised to appoint the top man. Hickey headed the list, and joined a force that numbered a total of seven officers.

#### 25 Years Ago Aug. 22, 1985

Officials from the Andover Police Department are working with the Haverhill Police Department on the physical similarities of the man responsible for the two armed robberies that have taken place this week in the Merrimack Valley. At 3:50 p.m. Monday, a man entered the Bank of New England at 84 Main St. with a handgun, a paper bag and a note. He held a handgun to the teller's face, passing a note to the teller that demanded the money, (bank officials have yet to determine the amount) according to Andover's Det. Sgt. John P. Houlihan.

## New boardwalk at Pustell Reservation

Move over Snookie! Andover has a brand new boardwalk in town.

Andover's boardwalk story has a lot less drama than Nicole "Snooki" Polizzi's reality TV show Jersey Shore, set on a New Jersey boardwalk. Here, it's all about an Andover teen who simply wanted to do something nice for his hometown.

He's Evan Doyle, an Eagle Scout candidate who's about to be an Andover High School sophomore. An avid hiker who uses local walking trails in town, he selected the Robert Pustell Reservation as his Eagle Scout project. At Pustell Reservation, there was no way to connect to other nearby trails - unless you wore knee-high boots and long sleeves.

The entrance to the reservation was swampy and overgrown with brush. Doyle set out to change that.

Doyle, 15, designed and built a 60-foot boardwalk and woodchip-covered path at the Pustell Reservation that will benefit local walkers and hikers for years to come. He was required to keep track of time spent on the project and it added up to 149 hours and 18 minutes of Doyle dedication.

"Through Evan's fantastic planning, dedication and effort, the town now has a beautiful

new access trail to this reservation," David Bunting of the Andover Trails Committee wrote in a recent e-mail to "Andover Trailheads."

Located on Powers Road, which is off Woburn Street, the Pustell Reservation is flat and enjoyable, but very swampy in the spring and during wet summers. Now, it's a nicely finished trail with a two-foot high boardwalk over that formerly swampy section.

The reservation transformation happened Saturday, Aug.

7. Doyle Lumber (no relation) delivered already-cut, pressure-treated wood to the scene. Doyle said he had a team of 23 volunteers ready to work. The volunteers were from his Scout Troop 77, Troop 75, AVIS, the Andover Trails Committee and his family. Doyle had the needed tools set up in marked orange buckets and a set of directions for everyone.

"We just went to work," said Doyle, who lives on Tiffany Lane with his family, parents Nila and Tom Doyle and sister,

Sara Doyle. "The eight-foot posts went six feet in the ground, so it's very sturdy."

A Scout for the past eight years, he said he enjoys being outdoors. He's also a member of the Andover High School Environmental Club and volunteers at his school's sustainable garden. Every Saturday, he volunteers at Andover Farmers' Market and sells vegetables from the AHS garden.

He wanted to get involved with an Eagle Scout project "that would benefit his community."

"Andover's got some good

trails that I like, so I thought this project would be good," he said. Meetings with the Andover Trails and Conservation committees followed. His search for a sponsor ended with Pfizer donating about \$500.

Doyle Lumber gave a discount and cut the wood for free. The River Road lumber company also delivered wood for free and gave Doyle some construction advice. The town donated the wood chips and delivered them to the site.

"Everyone really worked together," Doyle said.

## Readers recall the great Andover storms of '54

space and no houses were damaged," wrote Margaret Blake in response to my column about the two summer storms of 1954. The first and more violent of the two storms was Hurricane Carol, which was the storm Margaret mentioned. It had top winds of 125 mph and was

followed by the flooding rains of Hurricane Edna two weeks later.

Margaret describes how her family coped. "We were without electricity for two weeks, but we had a gas stove and were able to cook. We had ice delivered and had it in the set tubs in the basement where we could keep milk and butter. My father's family had been in the laundry business and my mother had two of the flat irons from when they closed the business in the depression. We would heat the irons on the stove and iron our clothes."

When he was 11, Michael Connolly watched Hurricane Carol from a friend's house

on Stratford Road. Two years ago he described the memory in my column, saying, "There was nothing gradual about the storm's arrival; it was in full fury. Everything was in constant motion. The trees never stopped gyrating. What was amazing was how a tree could have its branches all moving in a different direction at the same time. There was a tree in the front yard that served us as an anemometer until it was split in half by the wind. It was like watching a 3-D movie as the falling half fell toward the house as if it would crash through the living room window where we were standing. It fell only inches short."

Michael wrote of conditions immediately following the storm. "A different world greeted us from the one we'd left a few hours earlier. You could hardly recognize the

neighborhood. Whole trees, tree limbs, branches, leaves, and pieces of leaves were scattered everywhere. The green of

displaced vegetation so dominated the scene that the homes on Stratford Road, which then were universally white, simply retreated into the background. The pavement was completely covered in a layer of wet, green leaves. It appeared that nature had reclaimed the area."

Michael continued, "On Chestnut Street was where the biggest tree fell. It was a tall elm directly across the street from my house in front of my friend John O'Conner's house at 110 Chestnut. It fell parallel to the street along the sidewalk, and since it wasn't blocking traffic it was left where it fell. We kids played in its branches all week. My mother took a black and white snapshot with her Kodak Brownie camera showing my sisters and me standing on the fallen trunk, posing like 19th-century lumberjacks."

Judy Stevens of Haggetts Pond Road remembers the hurricanes and said that the barn just up the street went over in

one of them. She also mentions a bit of history heard from her dad, who lives with her. Her dad told her that he had a large rake attached to the bumper of a Model A Ford he once owned. When lots of the roads in Andover were still dirt, they would get messy, especially after a storm. The town paid drivers to rake certain roads or parts of roads, and the town installed the rakes on the bumpers of the cars. Her father couldn't remember how much he was paid for raking.

I lost my favorite tree in Hurricane Carol. It was a giant blue spruce that towered over our house and everything else around, and it was filled with bird nests. I'd built a small platform about a third of the way up where I'd climb and read or just sit and watch the cars and people on Chestnut and Whittier streets. You couldn't see it from the ground, and it was a little piece of the world that belonged to me. I was 11 years old in the summer of '54, and when Hurricane Carol hit I knew that tree was going to go

down. It was just too tall to survive, and it swayed back and forth, back and forth. There was a danger it would fall on the house, so there was some relief when it fell in the other direction, but it made me sad to watch. The crash when it fell was so loud you could hear it above the wind and the rustling of the leaves, which were as loud as a freight train.

For many years I've thought of that tree and the platform where I learned to love reading. This year I planted a blue spruce, exactly my height, in our front yard and planted 18 smaller ones all over the property. I'll not live long enough to see any of those trees grow into giants but the one in the front yard is very beautiful, and it already has its first sparrow nest. Maybe some day a young boy or girl will make a little platform in the tree and find a place of peacefulness.

## Character and (not and/or) competence

About 30 years ago, I had a most interesting conversation with a gentleman from France. He was an executive for one of the computer companies in our area. We were very open with each other and could speak our minds. At one point, in our lively discussion of many topics, he shared a comment that has been etched in my mind since that day.

You have the best form of government on the face of the earth. Because of this, you believe you are the best people on the face of the earth. You exude an air of confidence that all nations envy. However, it is a false confidence because as a nation you lack character. A democracy does not guarantee good character," he said.

Naturally I was a bit defensive and asked what he meant by character. He said, "Character is moral vigor and firmness as in self-discipline." I have learned that when a person offers sincere and helpful criticism, it is prudent to listen. He who does not listen to negative feedback is a fool.

Through the years I have applied his observation. It has merit. So here we go again.

Isn't it interesting the graduate schools of business are now teaching a new field of study - ethics in the work place? Guest lecturers make appearances on the topics; how to be honest, how to treat employees, and greed is not good. What wonderful gems of enlightenment.

We have very competent lawyers whose main legal expertise is to find loopholes in the law. They make recommendations to the corporation on how to make millions and stay within the law. Do they get paid by the billable hours or commission on the profits? Some may get both. Where are they on the character yardstick?

Every day we hear about people receiving paychecks for the rest of their lives because some doctor said "Sammy the Scam Artist" is no longer capable of doing an honest day's work. Within a month he has miraculously, through the benefit of prayer, become healed. The stiff next door goes to work while the scam

artist plays or works another job. Nah, it can't happen in this country.

It seems for some there is a new morality and a source of income. The ones who are the most successful usually follow four basic steps:

Keep doing what is not right until you get caught

■ If you get caught, get as much publicity as you can. Throw in a lot of legal arguments.

■ After suitable recognition, apologize. Present a well-crafted statement. You can get people who will construct one for you if you don't know how. All will be forgiven.

■ Write a book, make a movie or go on a tour. There are thousands of people who will pay millions to find out what really happened. They never do find out. Most of the authors lacked character to begin with.

Unfortunately for Clemens and Woods, they failed to learn that competence and character are two essential ingredients in becoming an all-around hero and role model. In the parade of life, character is worth more than competence. Tiger Woods is a most competent golfer. Mickey Mantle could really whack a baseball and run like a deer. However, using character and competence as the main criteria Hank Aaron gets my vote for baseball and Jack Nicklaus for golf.

If we were to run a survey and ask how do we compare with other nations of the world when it comes to character, where would we place? What is on the list of virtues that makes character?

Elena Kagan grew up in New York City. Her mother, Gloria, was an elementary teacher. Her father, Robert, was an attorney. Kagan followed in her father's footsteps. Her two brothers became teachers like their mother. Kagan was pictured in a judge's robe and holding a gavel in her high school yearbook.

Kagan graduated from Princeton University, Oxford University and Harvard Law School (1986).

Although Kagan has never

been a judge, she has experience working in the courts. She was a law clerk for Judge Abner Mikva of the U.S. Court of Appeals. She also clerked for Justice Thurgood Marshall of the U.S. Supreme Court. Justice Marshall nicknamed her "Shorty" because she is only 5 foot 3 inches tall.

Kagan worked as an attorney in Washington, D.C., then began teaching at the University of Chicago Law School in 1991.

She worked for President Clinton as an attorney and as a domestic policy advisor.

After her service in the White House, Kagan taught at Harvard Law School.

In 2003, she became the first woman to serve as Dean of the Harvard Law School.

She became U.S. Solicitor General in 2009, the first woman to hold that post. That office represents the government in cases before the Supreme Court.

All eyes in the country will focus on Kagan as she makes some very difficult decisions in the next few years. Watch the news to see how she does.
