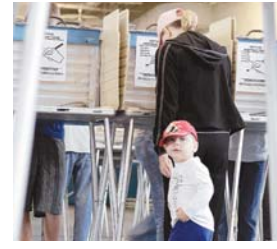

Marshalls to close in March

With supermarket, two large holes at Shawsheen Plaza

After 17 years in Andover, discount retailer Marshalls is leaving town and moving to South Lawrence.

The loss of Marshalls means that Shawsheen Plaza on Route 28 will have

two large holes this spring. Marshalls is expected to close in March, and the new Stop & Shop supermarket will not open on the other end of the plaza's main building until around Memorial Day.

Marshalls opened in 1994. Its owner - TJX Companies based in Framingham - has announced the Andover Marshalls

will relocate to the former A.J. Wright retail store in Plaza One Fourteen in South Lawrence. The Registry of Motor Vehicles is also located in that plaza.

TJX Companies owns both Marshalls and A.J. Wright. According to the

JUDGEMENT DAY COMES FOR BANCROFT

Town to vote on new school on Tuesday, Jan. 25

All of the Andover public schools will be closed next Tuesday, Jan. 25, for the town to finally have its make-or-break vote on whether to support a plan to replace Bancroft Elementary School.

Voters can cast their ballots at the Andover High School's field house from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

A yes vote supports a debt exclusion of Proposition 2 1/2 that will raise taxes above the level normally allowed under state law for 20 years, specifically to pay for the new 680-student school. The average tax bill in town is estimated to rise \$179 during the first tax year after the school is approved, with the yearly tax

increase reducing slightly each succeeding year, according to Finance Committee member Joanne Marden.

If the new Bancroft is supported, the existing school will remain open while the new school is built in front of it, facing Bancroft Road. The new school will support nearly 200 more students than the current school.

With a projected cost of \$44 million, around \$27 million will be covered by Andover taxpayers while the rest will be reimbursed

Teachers fill meeting room in quest for a contract

Negotiations move to mediation phase

Several dozen teachers appeared before the School Committee at its last meeting to express displeasure that they do not yet have a new contract. The teachers union's contract expired on July 1, 2010.

Enough teachers attended last Thursday's meeting that several teachers had to stand in the hallways outside the committee room while four teachers spoke before the School Committee. The four asked officials to work with them in creating the contract as soon as possible to cover their work for the next two and a half years.

"Teachers have worked the whole

academic year without a contract," Jen Meagher, an English teacher at Andover High School, said after the meeting. "I think it demonstrates a real lack of commitment from the School Committee to the professionals that make up the system."

For Fred Hopkins, a high school social studies teacher, the situation started a few months ago with a contract offer that he said was "a real step back for the town of Andover."

"It didn't feel like a continuation of the last contract," Hopkins said. "Instead of a 'good job for a job well done,' it felt like 'we want you to do

Town takes action against 'blight' property

Town to file criminal complaints to clean up 27 Kirkland Drive

Two town departments are seeking a court order to force the owners of 27 Kirkland Drive to clean up a property their neighbors have been complaining

about for years.

The property, where Mark Santangelo and his mother Mary live, has been a source of frustration for some other Kirkland Drive residents who believe the condition of the property is unacceptable. Among their latest concerns

is that a large metal trash container on the property is attracting rates to the neighborhood.

Neighbors asked 2007 Town Meeting to approve a Property Maintenance Code and asked 2008 Town Meeting to support an anti-blight law, both of which

would have established new rules on maintaining Andover property. The anti-blight law would have addressed residential properties that contain infestation, aren't maintained, have fire

by the state. Andover officials say 13 percent of this cost is contingency money that will only be spent to pay for unexpected problems. With a focus on lowering operating costs, officials are striving for a silver rating from the U.S. Green Building Council's Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design rating system.

Because the debt exclusion is necessary to pay for the building, a no vote, according to several town officials, would effectively kill the project.

"An enormous amount of planning work went into making this a successful project, and it will be something that the town will be proud of for a number of years," said Joe Piantedosi, acting director of Plant and Facilities and a member of the School Building Committee. "We feel very optimistic about this being one of the best schools that Andover will ever build. We are looking forward to it."

Some opponents of the school object to the project's cost, how it was planned and how it will

Approving the new Bancroft Elementary School project on Jan. 25 will allow the town to raise taxes above Prop. 2 1/2 specifically to pay for this project, without affecting the amount available for Andover's operating budget. Finance Committee Chairwoman Joanne Marden has estimated the additional impact of the Bancroft School Debt Exclusion on residential property tax bills.

The average single family residence has an assessed value for FY2011 of \$529,775. The average homeowner will pay an additional \$179 in the first year of the debt service. This assumes the town pursues a 20-year bond to cover the debt.

All property is taxed at \$14.12 per \$1,000 in value. The above chart is meant to give readers a sense of the cost of the Bancroft project for their residential property tax bill. With a standard municipal debt schedule, the amount paid goes down a little each year.

affect nearby roads, specifically West Knoll Road, a dead-end road that will be extended to become a second access road to the new school.

But supporters of the school have said replacement is

necessary because the 42-year-old school is failing and has reached the end of its useful life. Last week, two feet of snow shut down Bancroft completely for a day after other schools reopened, because workers

on both days.

"It all had to be taken off by hand," Piantedosi said. "I haven't got the bill yet, but it will have cost at least \$8,000 just for that storm."

Because of the building's design, snow is known to develop in a structurally-deficient area of the building's roof. Keeping the school closed to shovel it is a routine for the town that will continue until the building is

needed to remove snow from the roof (see below). Andover has spent nearly \$2 million in repairs in recent years to keep the school open. Work has included steel reinforcements to hold up the building's troubled roof.

"I'm optimistic that the residents will approve it, and I think they should because of all of the issues here," Piantedosi said.

Should the project get a thumbs-up from residents on Tuesday, the project will allow

for redirecting of students throughout the elementary school level, helping to create any one school from being overcrowded. It will also pave the way for the closure of one of the town government's oldest buildings, Shawsheen School, currently home to 267 students in prekindergarten, kindergarten and grades 1-2. The School Committee has said it still would need to find a new home for the prekindergarten students at Shawsheen currently.

Bancroft gets second snow day after last week's storm

It took a full team of men two days to clear the roof of Bancroft Elementary School following a blizzard that brought an unexpected amount of snow last Wednesday, Jan. 12.

While Andover's other nine public schools returned to session last Thursday, Bancroft remained out of operation an extra day while workers removed snowdrifts from the top of Bancroft that were measured to be

up to four feet high in spots, according to Joe Piantedosi, acting director of Plant and Facilities.

"It took us a whole department with a full crew of men to allow it to be reopened," Piantedosi said. "The next day, which was Friday, they were working for the rest of the day clearing the rest of it off."

Workers shoveled the snow from 6 a.m. to the end of the day

hazards or other problems. Neither was approved.

Andover health Director Tom Carbone said both the Andover Health Department and the town's building division plan to file criminal complaints, which proceed and often launch criminal court cases.

Mary and Mark Santangelo declined to comment for this story.

"We are filing to get the property cleaned up," Carbone said. "The application that we are filing will be a criminal complaint. By then, it is in the hands of the courts."

As of Tuesday, the complaint applications had not been submitted, Carbone said, but he added that he expected to submit very soon.

For the building division, Carbone said, the primary concern is a series of unregistered vehicles that local residents say have been on the property for years.

On a notice of violation issued to the Santangelos and dated Sept 21, 2010, Building Inspector Kaija Gilmore identified four vehicles in violation of local ordinance, which included an unregistered Buick Roadster with an inspection sticker that expired in August 2009 and a blue Ford Thunderbird with an inspection sticker expired as of April 2006. Neither of the two vehicles have license plates, the notice states.

The notice also outlines an orange dumpster on the property that does not have any current permits. According to residents, the open dumpster contains trash that was deposited in it as far back as June 2010.

For the Health Department, the issue of solid waste leads Carbone's concerns, he said.

The trash in the dumpster, as well as the overall condition of the property, has brought rats to the Kirkland Drive neighborhood in the last year, a sign that a serious health and sanitation issue continues to unfold next-door to their home, according to neighbors Cornelius and Barbara McLarney.

"We've lived here for 50 years. I haven't seen a rat in my life," Barbara McLarney said. "It has to be taken care of."

The situation has left some of residents who live near the messy Kirkland Drive property as prisoners in their homes, according to Bo Kennedy, who lives at 31 Kirkland Drive, next to the house.

"A few of us who have reached retirement age and considered (selling our houses) have been advised by real estate representatives to not even bother," Kennedy said. "Nobody will buy it."

Kennedy said that another neighbor had trouble selling their home.

"When they did an open house and they tried to sell it,

(possible buyers) would come over and, as soon as they saw the junkyard, they would just drive off," Kennedy said.

Local residents affected by the property have been frustrated with the speed of the town's response, or the lack thereof, as some have said. But for Kennedy, word of the applications being filed was met with appreciation.

"I'm pleased they are finally on it," Kennedy said.

From here, Carbone said, the resolution of the matter is up to the housing courts that will receive the town's criminal complaint applications.

"It is not going as quickly as we would like, but we are proceeding with court action," Carbone said.

Carbone is confident that action will be taken in response to the current complaints. The last time the town filed such a complaint against the Santangelos was in 2008, when officials took issue with a dumpster and solid waste issues on the property, according to Carbone.

"The problem was solved, and the complaint was withdrawn," Carbone said.

Marshalls leaving, food store delayed

company's website, 71 A.J. Wright stores have closed and the remaining 91 locations are being converted into T.J. Maxx, Marshalls or HomeGoods stores. The company expects to spend some \$15 million on conversions.

A Marshalls spokeswoman said the Andover closing is part of the conversion plan.

"At Marshalls, we are always assessing and reviewing real estate strategies and the decision to relocate that store is in line with this thinking," Doreen Thompson, vice president, corporate communications, wrote in an e-mail to the Townsman.

"This e-mail confirms that we anticipate relocating the Marshalls store in Andover into the A.J. Wright store location at Plaza One Fourteen shopping center, 73 Winthrop Ave. in Lawrence, sometime in March," she also wrote.

The closing surprised town officials. Director of Planning Paul Materazzo said he did not know about Marshalls leaving town.

Neither did local attorney Bob Gilbert of Andover, who owns Andover Liquors, also located in Shawsheen Plaza.

"It's disappointing to hear. Marshalls is a good neighbor," Gilbert said.

It's been quite a year for Andover Liquors and other stores in the plaza as the closing of neighboring Market Basket - and now Marshalls - affects business.

"We've been in hang-on mode since the summer," Gilbert said, referring to the Market Basket closing last June. "The supermarket closing affects us more than Marshalls closing. We are looking forward to Memorial Day."

That's when Stop & Shop representatives have said they will open a new grocery store at the former Market Basket site.

Gilbert said he's confident that his business will bounce back when Stop & Shop opens. He just signed a long-term lease for several years.

Stop & Shop spokesman Bob LaRochelle said he did not know Marshalls was closing. He also said the closing does not affect Stop & Shop. Renovation continues at the site.

Stop & Shop owns the entire plaza, which is managed by The Guys of Andover LLC. Andrew Rose of The Guys of Andover said he has "no idea" who the replacement tenant will be.

"We're focused on Stop & Shop right now," Rose said.

"It's unfortunate," Rose said of Marshalls departure. "But, a lot of renovation is going on at that plaza...we'll get a tenant."

In Lawrence, the economic director called the situation a "win-win" for Lawrence and Andover.

Patrick Blanchette said the new Marshalls location is fairly close to Andover so workers can retain their jobs and shoppers will not have far to go.

"We're excited about this," he said. "That plaza is great for both communities, so this is a win-win."

Environment Massachusetts, a statewide citizen supported environmental advocacy organization, and newly-elected State Sen. Barry Finegold invite residents of Andover, Dracut, Lawrence and Tewksbury to attend an informational meeting next Monday, Jan. 24 at 5:30 p.m. at the Memorial Hall Library, 2 North Main St. Andover.

Environment Massachusetts will present its legislative agenda and discuss no-cost Home Energy Assessments through Mass Save, it says. Attendees will also hear from Finegold about his environmental priorities for the upcoming

legislative session. Attendees will have the opportunity to ask questions and raise concerns about local environmental issues, according to a release.

"Almost 90 percent of the state's energy still comes from 'dirty sources,'" according to Audrey Richardson, a Clean Energy associate for Environment Massachusetts who will be at the event. "Massachusetts residents can do something about this. By evaluating our energy usage through a no-cost home-energy assessment, we can improve our homes' energy efficiency and significantly reduce our energy consumption."

High school bomb threat deemed a hoax

Police were called to Andover High School early Thursday morning, Jan. 13, to respond to a fake bomb threat after somebody found a threatening message written on a boys bathroom stall.

The message was written in a bathroom on the school's third

floor and gave a targeted day — that day, Jan. 13 — but no specifics on location or time. According to a letter to high school parents by interim Principal Thomas Sharkey, a police investigation determined that "the nature and appearance of the message did not rise to the level of concern

that would have us take steps to evacuate the building."

"We will always take action on the side of the community's safety when there is any doubt," the letter said. "This morning's incident did not reach that level of concern."

Later that evening,

Superintendent Marinel McGrath took a moment during a regular School Committee meeting to update the committee on the incident. She said possible suspects may have been identified already through the school's video surveillance system.

Few town races; Feb. 1 deadline

Only one or two of the five positions on the town ballot looks as if it will see a race as the deadline to pull and submit papers for public office is quickly approaching.

The March 22 election ballot will include two Selectmen positions, a School Committee seat, a spot on the Housing Committee and the moderator position. To date, at least one person has expressed interest in running for each position, according to Larry Murphy, Andover's town clerk.

For the open two-year Selectman seat, comprised of the remaining balance of recently-resigned Selectman Chairman Gerry Stabile, three candidates have pulled papers: Daniel Kowalski of 24 Enfield Drive, Douglas "Adam" Percy of 9 Basswood Lane and Larry Bruce, who also pulled papers for Selectman Mary Lyman's current seat, according to Murphy.

To date, only Bruce has returned his papers and had them certified for the two-year

position, Murphy said.

"I am pleased that we have people interested in every race, and I would encourage more people to participate," Murphy said.

As of Tuesday, current Town Moderator Sheila Doherty had pulled the nomination papers, but they not yet been turned in. Housing Authority member Daniel Grams has done the same for his five-year position.

School Committee chairman Dennis Forgue has pulled papers, returned them and been certified for his three-year seat, and a three-year position on the Board of Selectmen currently filled by Selectman Mary Lyman has had papers pulled by both Lyman and Bruce.

Other residents interested in running for public office have until Feb. 1 to pull nomination papers, obtain a minimum of 50 signatures from registered Andover voters and return the papers.

Finding balance

Ken Seifert



I have always been fascinated by other cultures. People are people the world over. I think we are more similar than different. The difference is usually a matter of style and not substance.

Take the Japanese for example. In the 1300s they began a movement called Shibui. In Europe they had the Renaissance. James Mitchener, in his book Iberia, talked about the concept. "The Japanese have a word, Shibui. It summarizes all the best in Japanese life. It has no explanation and cannot be translated. The best approximation to its meaning is acerbic best taste. It is being beautiful in a direct and simple way, without being flashy."

It would take a lifetime and a day to truly understand the full meaning. For things to be useful, I try to get simple definitions. Although the major emphasis of Shibui is on the arts, it can be applied to individuals, groups, corporations, towns and nations. It is a method of making things better.

The process is quite straightforward. You look for opposites and try to see some balance. It is usually a case of too much on the one hand and too little on the other. It is also a simple problem-solving method. All it takes is a little initiative. An example of Shibui would be to look at the problem of obesity. Too much weight - and too little dieting and exercise. What is the balance? According to the philosophy, it is your decision as to the proper balance. The next step is to answer the question: what are you going to do about it? Once again, you can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink!

A few personal examples:

THREE STEPS TO SELF-AWARENESS

Last week: Determining your gear. Are you in 'Park'?
This week: Part 2: Shibui, a suggestion from Asia.
Jan. 27: Do you feel the music?

too much talking-not enough listening, too many ideas-too little focus, too much blaming-too little recognition of the good things going on, and too much procrastination-too little constructive activity. The list is endless.

A few examples for groups, elected officials, corporations and national leaders: Too much political correctness-too little honesty, too much talk about making things better-too little time on planning and implementation, too much concern for the bottom line-too little concern for the impact on people, too much trying to do everything for everybody-too few priorities, too many meetings-too little achievement, too much driving the kids all over the Merrimac Valley-too little time for you and your spouse, and finally, too many rights-too few responsibilities. This list is also endless.

About the same time Shibui was starting, a proverb was quite popular in the Land of the Rising Sun: Advise and counsel him, if he does not listen, let adversity teach him. I have taken this proverb to heart and changed it just a little. Advise and counsel myself, if I do not listen, then adversity will surely teach me.

Joe six-pack may look at all this and say, "all we need is a little common sense to improve things." That may be true, Joe, however in Shibui terms: too much following the crowd going nowhere-too little doing the right thing. Sayonara.

Memorial Building, auditorium for Doherty, reopens

Doherty Middle School students planned to fill the newly renovated auditorium in the Andover Memorial Building yesterday, Wednesday, Jan. 19, for a special dedication and grand reopening. Student Council President Jackie Long and Vice President Julia Boyd along with student council members William Hubschman, Oliver Eberth, Emma Kaufman Leduc and Hayes Linzer were expected to join Principal Robin Wilson, Superintendent Marinel McGrath, Town Manager Buzz Stapeczynski, Director of Veterans' Services Mike Burke, and Acting Plant and Facilities Director Joe Piantedosi

to cut the ribbon following the ceremony. Former superintendent Claudia Bach and former principals Bruce Maki and Theresa McGuiness Darby were also invited to attend.

"The auditorium has been historically restored to its original splendor," said Wilson. "It's absolutely stunning."

Within the auditorium, the seats have been reupholstered and the wooden arms refinished, new carpet has been installed and elegant drapes and valances have replaced the former ones, which fell apart upon removal. The antique chandeliers now lower mechanically, safety lights

on the steps meet safety code, the restored stage gleams, and fresh paint reveals detailed, original woodwork.

"I'm most proud that the community voted to support the renovation and the way it turned out simply beautiful, both inside and out," noted Stapeczynski. "Also, the clock above the stage is working again - priceless."

The unveiling of the interior restoration is only one part of the effort. "We have been working on the auditorium front steps, landscaping, outside façade and inside renovation for three years," Stapeczynski stated. "There were three Annual Town

Meeting votes for this renovation project, 2006, 2008 and 2009."

The Andover Memorial Building received its name during a 1933 Town Meeting vote, "in grateful recognition of the war time services of our Andover boys." The building, which was first occupied in 1936, includes the auditorium, gymnasium and playstead. According to Stapeczynski, annual Town Meetings and Special Town Meetings were held there from 1937 to 1983. This past Memorial Day a plaque was hung outside the auditorium to designate it as a World War I Memorial.

Artist in Residence Perich highlights Jan. 28 PA performance

On Friday, Jan. 28 at 7:30 p.m. the Addison Gallery of American Art along with the Music Department will present music by this year's Edward E. Elson Artist in Residence Tristan Perich. The program will include music performed by Phillips Academy faculty and students and the Dither Quartet.

The performance is free and open to the public, and will take place in Kemper Auditorium located on the Phillips Academy campus, 180 Main St. Kemper Auditorium is handicapped accessible.

The concert is preceded by a gallery talk at 6 p.m. with Tristan Perich in the Museum Learning Center, Addison Gallery of American Art, located adjacent to Kemper Auditorium. Admission to the museum and talk are free and open to the public.

In all his creative activities, Perich, a graduate of Phillips Academy's class of 2000, is inspired by the aesthetics of math and physics, and works with simple forms and complex systems. The challenge of elegance provokes his work in acoustic and electronic music, and physical and digital art.

His works for soloist, ensemble and orchestra have been performed internationally by ensembles including Bang on a Can, 2008 People's Commissioning Fund, counter induction, Calder Quartet, New York Miniaturist Ensemble, Hunter-Gatherer and Ensemble Pamplemousse at venues from the Whitney Museum,

P.S.1, Merkin Hall, the Stone, Joe's Pub and Issue Project Room to Los Angeles' Zipper Hall.

In 2004 he began work on 1-Bit Music to experiment with the foundations of electronic sound, culminating in a physical "album," a music-generating circuit packaged inside a standard CD jewel case, which has been released by Cantaloupe Music. The Village Voice calls the device "technology and aesthetic rolled into one" and Surface Magazine calls the 1-Bit Music boxes "profound throwbacks to the traditional album, a response to the intangibility of iTunes and mp3s in the form hand-held artwork." Working with 1-bit music profoundly influenced his music for acoustic ensembles, resulting in dual compositions for musicians with 1-bit music accompaniment, pairing the performers with on-stage speakers, according to a release from the school. His new circuit album, 1-Bit Symphony due in April on Cantaloupe Music, is a long-form electronic composition in five movements. Its music explores the intricate, polyphonic potential of 1-bit audio, uniting simple with complex and celebrating the virtuosity of electricity.

His experimental music group, the Loud Objects (with Kunal Gupta and Katie Shima), perform electronic music by soldering their own noise-making circuits, live, from scratch in front of the audience, often on top of an old overhead projector to render transparent the meaning of their

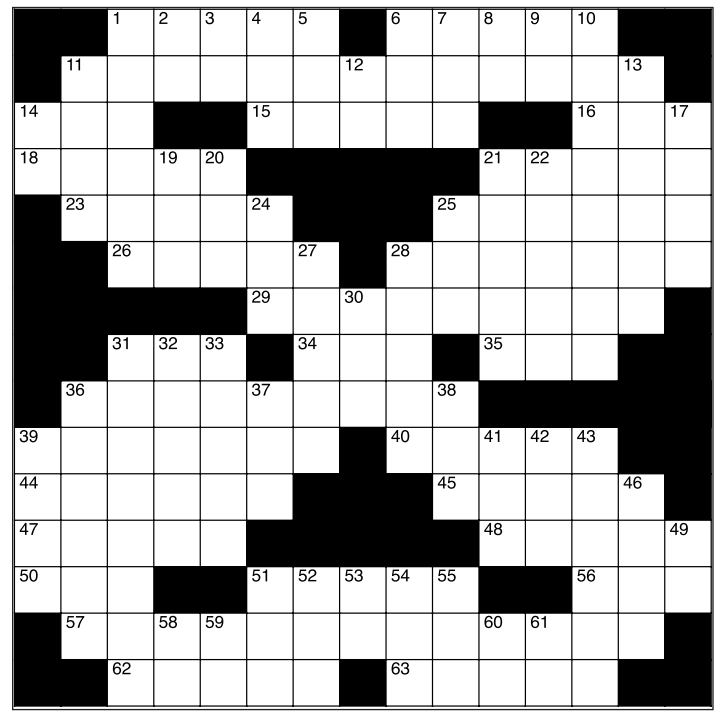

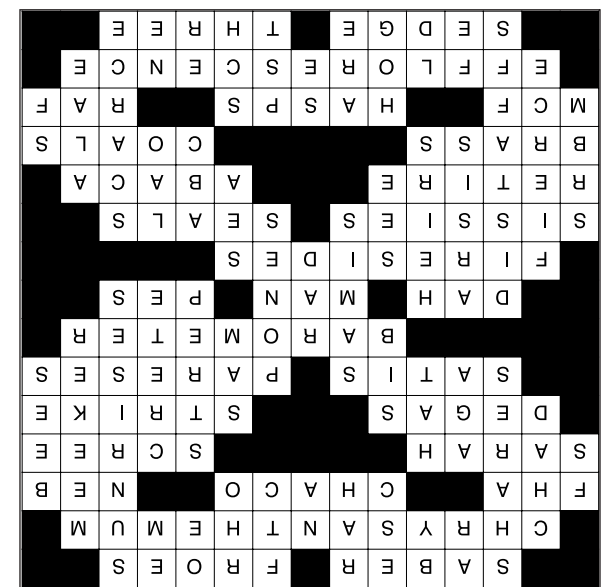

Support new Bancroft, control annual spending

Bancroft Elementary School needs to be replaced. The current plan to do so, honed over the course of years, deserves to be supported. But, in exchange for this support, Andover leaders need to help those taxpayers teetering on the financial edge by reducing the town's operating budget. They can do so starting this year by negotiating employee benefits more in line with the private sector and controlling the annual projects brought to Town Meeting.

The need to do something with Bancroft is obvious. The town has spent about \$2 million in temporary repairs to keep it open. Workers must close the building after big storms so that workers can shovel its problematic rooftop.

Several experienced Andover committees and hired experts have spent more than \$800,000 to study the Bancroft problem and develop a plan to address it. They've looked at a slew of obvious alternatives, such as renovating the current building. They've looked at some ridiculous ideas, such as renting buildings in other towns. The result is a thorough plan that will add about 200 seats to the elementary-school system; attract more state aid than any future plan is likely to; let all Andover students remain in their elementary schools during construction; allow for some of the collaboration found in the current open-classroom school, while eliminating much of its noise; create an energy-efficient school; and allow the town to close both Bancroft and the long-running Shawsheen School. [The town will still need to find a place for about 70 prekindergarten students if Shawsheen School closes. Residents should insist that this one-time expense be paid for as part of the operating budget just as many other smaller projects are.]

The project is estimated to cost up to \$44 million, but there are no cheap solutions. There are wetlands on the site, and the town must create a new access road and eventually tear down the current school. But the town will need to tear down the existing Bancroft under almost any scenario. And the state has signed off on the current plan, agreeing to pick up 44 percent of the cost. The current Massachusetts School Building Assistance program also would reimburse Andover as the project goes along, rather than pay back taxpayers once the project is over. This will save Andover on the cost of interest. The MSBA insists that more than 13 percent of the estimated cost be money set aside to pay for unexpected problems. Supporters argue that all of this money should not need to be spent, and say that construction bids have been coming in lower than estimates because of the economy.

The project addresses a variety of concerns and deserves support at the ballot box on Jan. 25.

If Andover residents commit to the new Bancroft Elementary project, Andover officials must truly commit to lowering expenses elsewhere. Virtually all town contracts are up for renegotiation, giving leaders the opportunity to create new rules for spending. The town also has opportunities for consolidation due to department head retirements and studies of things such as Andover's four IT departments.

While there are many in town for whom a tax hike will have little effect, there are many other Andover natives, senior citizens and young families struggling to afford to stay in town. They need government expenses to stop growing at rates so much greater than their ability to pay.

Even today, as private sector workers continue dealing with benefit reductions, layoffs, furloughs and other cuts, there remains an attitude with many in the public sector that "business as usual" is a starting point for discussion. That attitude can be seen in comments by teachers union member Fred Hopkins last Thursday, addressing a contract offer from the School Committee. "It didn't feel like a continuation of the last contract," Hopkins said, in part. "It felt like 'we want you to do more for less.'" Most taxpayers who work in the private sector have been doing more for less for many years. It's time for Andover government to find some ways to do the same.

Bancroft Elementary School needs to be replaced. So does the current way of doing business in the public sector. For Andover to continue to exist as it has, for it to continue to thrive, it needs to be committed to building something new on both fronts.

Time is money, act now on Bancroft

Editor, Townsman:

Voter approval of Question 1 on Jan. 25 will allow the property tax increase needed to finance the Bancroft Elementary School project. I am confident the plan developed by the School Building Committee and approved by the Massachusetts School Building Authority to replace Bancroft provides Andover taxpayers with a cost-effective solution to our long term elementary school building needs.

The school facility planning process required by the state began with a thorough analysis of student population trends and an evaluation of the capacities and conditions of Andover's public school buildings. Multiple options for repair or replacement of Bancroft School were thoroughly explored. A schematic design was developed consistent with state standards for school buildings. The whole process is designed to guarantee that a community builds what it needs

and no more.

Two independent cost estimates were developed and reconciled to within a variance of 3.45 percent. The MSBA requires that the budget for the project include contingencies equal to 13.1 percent of estimated construction costs. This insures that taxpayers know exactly what they are buying and how much it is going to cost before they vote.

To get the greatest benefit from each local tax dollar spent, timely approval for the new Bancroft School is critical. This may be our only opportunity to take advantage of a 44 percent reimbursement from the state. Bancroft is very expensive to operate and maintain. Until the existing, outdated structure is replaced with a new energy-efficient building, it will continue to strain town and school budgets. Time is money.

As a community, we have a lot invested in the development of this plan: the planning and design funds approved by past Town Meetings, the countless hours of hard work by town and school employees and members of the School Building Committee, success in obtaining MSBA approval of the project with a 44 percent reimbursement rate, and many meetings yielding valuable input from interested citizens. A yes vote on Question 1 is needed to take advantage of all of these efforts and move forward with the building of a new Bancroft School.

Project makes sense for pocketbook, safety

Editor, Townsman:

I hope you join me in voting yes at the polls on Tuesday, Jan. 25, to build a new Bancroft Elementary School. This project is the most cost effective solution to Andover's elementary school space needs. It allows Andover to replace both the Bancroft and Shawsheen Elementary Schools which are by far the most expensive of our educational buildings to maintain (each school is more than four times more expensive to maintain than High

Plain Elementary).

The School Building Committee has worked extensively with town, school and state officials to put together an outstanding school design and construction plan. They did a thorough job convincing Town Meeting of the need for this project because of its exorbitant maintenance costs and hazardous structural deficiencies.

Bancroft's structural deficiencies were shown very clearly after last week's snowstorm when that school remained closed on Thursday when all other schools were reopened for business. Bancroft remained closed so that Andover could hire outside contractors to hand shovel the roof to prevent dangerous snow loads, an extra expense that occurs after every winter storm.

Because of its structural deficiencies, Bancroft must be replaced. If we approve this project now, then we will benefit from being grandfathered into the higher rate of state reimbursement for school construction costs (44 percent versus 31 percent). This reimbursement difference represents approximately \$5 million which is funding that does not have to be raised through property taxes. This project makes good business sense for our taxpayers and sound structural sense for the safety of our children.

The Bay Circuit website describes the area as "a permanent recreation trail and greenway corridor extending through 34 towns in Massachusetts and linking the parks and open spaces surrounding metro Boston." But talk to Al French, Andover's "Mr. Bay Circuit," and you'll quickly come to realize it means much more.

While hearing his nickname makes French smile, he says it doesn't do justice to the many others who have fought to make the connections that will ultimately keep the alliance alive. French was quick to give credit to them all, as he settled in to tell its story.

The Bay Circuit concept was patterned after Frederick Law Olmsted's "Emerald Necklace," a

system of linked parks in downtown Boston. Originally, it was to be 100 miles of green spaces, roads and trails stretching from Plum Island in the north, west through Framingham, and on to Kingston Bay in the south. First proposed by a government-appointed committee in 1929, a map and plan for the Bay Circuit emerged in 1937 with the sponsorship of the Trustees of Reservations and the energy of Charles W. Eliot II. Eliot was known as an advocate of regional cooperation as it affected open space protection.

While the Bay Circuit was established by legislation in 1956, economic depression and world warfare stalled its implementation until the mid-1980s. At that time the state legislature passed a \$3.5 million bond issue, managed by the Department of Environmental Management. The concept became an exercise in open space planning, with grant money being parceled out and offered to 50 towns. The carrot for each town was that if it agreed to take part in this planning process, the state would award the town \$3,000.

French and Deena Hammond, who together had formed the

Andover Trails Committee in 1962, were named to represent the town. According to French, in those days the focus was more on preserving open space through zoning. Eventually the seed money ran out. Andover's Steve Golden, the Boston Park Service, and the Appalachian Mountain Club got involved and trail development emerged. From this energy grew the Bay Circuit Alliance, a grassroots coalition of private and public organizations formed to finally realize the now 60-year-old Bay Circuit concept. Formally incorporated in 1992, Al French was named chairperson.

Today, the Bay Circuit has grown into a 200-mile recreational tract connecting resources in over 50 towns. Membership consists of six regional, four statewide and more than 25 local member organizations, including the Trustees of Reservations, the Trust for Public Land, Mass. Audubon and the Appalachian Mountain Club. Of course, at the core are hundreds of member volunteers.

The Andover section of trail was formally dedicated on Sept. 28, 1991, making Andover the second town to do so. Consisting of roughly 16

miles, the Bay Circuit Trail enters Andover from Tewksbury on the Merrimack River and leaves for North Andover in Harold Parker State Forest. Beyond Andover, it is now possible, with but a few gaps, for hikers to traverse the entire 200-mile trail.

French credits the balancing factor to the energy of the volunteers, impressive given the fact that the Alliance itself doesn't own one square inch. He points out, however, that critical to any future plans and to the maintenance of the property, is the creation of a permanent organization so that, in his words, "When Al French retires, the committee work will continue."

The important vision, for French, is "connecting parks and open space so people can get out and walk." When asked how to make this happen, he said simply, "if you want to preserve the land, make people love it, and they will come."

more for less."

Following initial discussions of the contract, the School Committee voted to bring in a mediator because, according to committee Chairman Dennis Forgue, discussions were going nowhere.

"The School Committee felt that negotiations had reached a point of impasse," Forgue said. "We are in negotiations. We are going into mediation."

In mediation, an impartial representative from the state is brought into the discussion to guide the direction of talks towards establishing a contract.

Meanwhile, teachers continuing to work without a contract ultimately see a net reduction in pay, according to Matthew Bach, a social studies teacher at Andover High School.

"Considering inflation and expenses, most teachers who are not increasing salary due to post-graduate work will have less in their pockets," Bach said

via e-mail. "Other benefits, such as health insurance, increase in terms of premiums — so this also is a net loss to many teachers."

It isn't yet known when teachers will work under a new contract, but for Bach, the need for a contract is immediate.

"We want to keep teachers in the system. How do you keep the best people with the best jobs?" Bach said after the meeting. "We don't want to see the best candidates leave Andover. We want to draw in the best candidates."

Via e-mail, Meagher said the contract is a vital part of the employee-employer relationship. "It provides security for both parties," Meagher said in the e-mail. "When working with municipal budgets, you really can't afford not to have clearly stated, transparent commitments that are predictable and that can be monitored by taxpayers. The contract enables both employer and employee to project and budget their financial needs both short and long term."

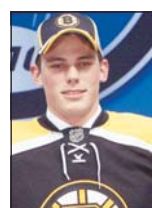

Unplowed Route 28 sidewalk unsafe for student, says resident

Resident Joanne Landers says all she wants is for her 13-year-old grandson to have a safe way to get home from school.

Currently, her grandson — an eighth grader at West Middle School — makes walks about a mile each day from his house on North Main Street to West Middle School.

Typically, this walk is no problem, but after last week's deposit of two feet of snow, state plows obstructed the sidewalk on North Main Street, forcing people to walk directly on state Route 28.

"When they get down to North Main Street, nothing is plowed," Landers said. "He can't walk on them, and I really don't think he should be walking on a four-lane highway."

Landers said Tuesday she had tried calling a number of town departments about the concern, but has not found anyone capable of solving the problem.

For the snowstorm that moved through town Tuesday, Jan. 18, Landers drove her grandson

home herself, but she's wants one of the school buses that drive past their house every morning and afternoon take him to his house, at least as long as the sidewalks remain covered in snow.

The addition of such a stop isn't possible, she has been told. "I'm getting no help from anyone," Landers said.

Overnight from Jan. 18 to 19, the day after Landers spoke regarding the condition of the sidewalks, crews cleared all North Main Street sidewalks, much to the delight of the family.

Running for office: Frozen out?

Is it possible that Andover incumbents control the weather?

For the second time, the League of Women Voter's annual "Running for Office" workshop has been rescheduled because of dangerous road conditions caused by snow and ice. The workshop will be next Thursday, Jan. 27, at 7 p.m. at Memorial Hall Library, in Memorial Hall, on the third floor. (At least, the group hopes to hold the workshop then.) The workshop is meant to inform those who are considering running for selectmen, School Committee or another town office this March. The event is free and open to the public.

Secret snow day 'formula'?

Speaking of frozen weather, the topic of what *really* causes snow days came up for discussion at Thursday's School Committee meeting, where officials entertained sage advice received from Bancroft Elementary School students earlier that day.

"There's an alleged formula for determining snow days that I heard from a bunch of elementary school children yesterday," member David Birnbach announced.

The formula begins with putting four ice cubes down the toilet — two at a time, to prevent clogging — and, that night, wearing one's pajamas inside out.

Sleeping with a spoon under the pillow is also advised, Birnbach was told.

"If you do that on the night before the big snowstorm, or the day of a snowstorm, there is a feeling that that formula will work," Birnbach said. "The feedback was it worked pretty well because there was a school today that did not have school the second day."

Officials are on record saying Bancroft Elementary, the only school in town closed last Thursday due to snow, was closed because of four foot-tall snow drifts on the building's roof that needed to be removed.

Should the formula fail, other measures can be taken to guarantee a delayed start, School Committee member Annie Gilbert shared.

"I was also told by a source, my young source, that if that doesn't work, then the next morning, ... what you do is you hope for that last minute delayed start," Gilbert said. "The protocol is that you have to run laps around the kitchen really, really fast."

Service stressed on 25th MLK Day

This year marks the 25th anniversary of Dr. Martin Luther King Day as a national holiday.

Martin Luther King, Jr. was born Jan. 15, 1929. He became a Baptist minister and civil rights activist. In 1964 he became the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace Prize for his work for equal rights. He was assassinated in Memphis, Tennessee on April 4, 1968.

It took 15 years to create the federal holiday to honor King.

Congressman John Conyers of Michigan introduced legislation for a federal commemorative holiday four days after King was assassinated in 1968. Conyers and Representative Shirley Chisholm of New York resubmitted the bill for the King holiday each legislative session.

Congress finally passed the holiday legislation in 1983. President Ronald Reagan signed it into law.

At first, the holiday was going to be Jan. 15, King's birthday. Since it was so close to Christmas, the holiday was moved to the third Monday in January.

It took another 10 years before all 50 states recognized the holiday.

This year, people were asked to use their day off to do volunteer work in their communities.

Dr. King said, "Life's most persistent and urgent question is, what are you doing for others?"

He also said "Everybody can be great, because everybody can serve."



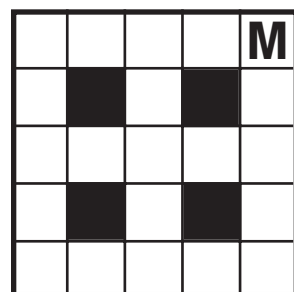

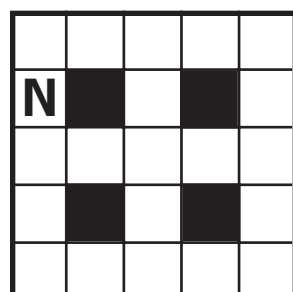

Missing piece for children in need

Helen was scared the first day she reported to court. She had received over 30 hours of training as a volunteer for CASA (Family Service's "Court Appointed Special Advocate" program), but there, in the courtroom, it was daunting. Seated high on the bench was the presiding judge, with all the functionaries around. There were parents who had been suspected of abuse and neglect of their children, their attorneys, and the professional social case workers for the Department of Children and Families.

Helen's background was in consumer services. She answered the phone for a utilities company and made people happy by getting their gas turned back on. Was Helen going to be tough enough to work through the heartbreaking wreckage of families and get their lives back together? For the last seven years, the answer has been "yes." Helen has been the missing link for children served by Family Service's CASA Program.

CASA volunteers like Helen are assigned by the juvenile court to report on whether there has been follow through on recommended services for children who have been abused or neglected. Volunteers gather information from a number of sources including schools, foster parents, homes for children, case workers, lawyers and others. Cases are so complicated, courts so overwhelmed, and DCF workers so stressed that the needs of children can slip between the cracks. Not on Helen's watch.

In 2008 Helen was assigned a family with four children, ages 12, 11, 10 and 9; three boys and a girl. The court case dated back to 1997. Helen found that the mother was reluctant to attend the court-mandated therapy sessions, in part due to denial concerning her own disabilities. The family had become insular. The children were discouraged from making outside friendships. The oldest boy was consistently belittled and called stupid. One of the younger ones had a heart condition that was overlooked.

In spite of her concern, the case was closed. But she knew they would be back in court, and they were. A part of the special nature of CASA is that Helen was there to pick up again and provide the continuity to achieve a better result. The oldest boy is now 14 and in a home for children. He has become more outgoing, has learned to dance, and has a decent prospect of finishing high school. He needed structure. He is now able to express himself openly, to achieve, to lead because of the self-confidence he has gained.

The next boy is 13, prone to temper tantrums and fights, threatening teachers, has been expelled from schools, and temporarily placed in a psychiatric ward. While the school and social workers were trying to design a plan for him, he pulled the school fire alarm, and showed no remorse. Helen's job is to keep remembering that inside him is a frightened human being, and to remind people of the reasons he is so difficult. She must follow through; work the plan.

Helen's advocacy, dedication, determination, friendship and commitment has been realized by the bonds she has established with the children she serves. But how can someone consistently volunteer for a job so grim?

Helen remembers a while back going to the hospital to see a 10-month-old girl in a full body cast, more broken bones than she could imagine, the result of an abusive mother and father. As she stood there by the bedside, the little girl somehow flashed her a smile that would melt an iceberg. Since that meeting she has been adopted, with no lasting physical effects from the abuse. Helen calls that a miracle.

To this day, Helen goes back to the present child, and looks for another one.

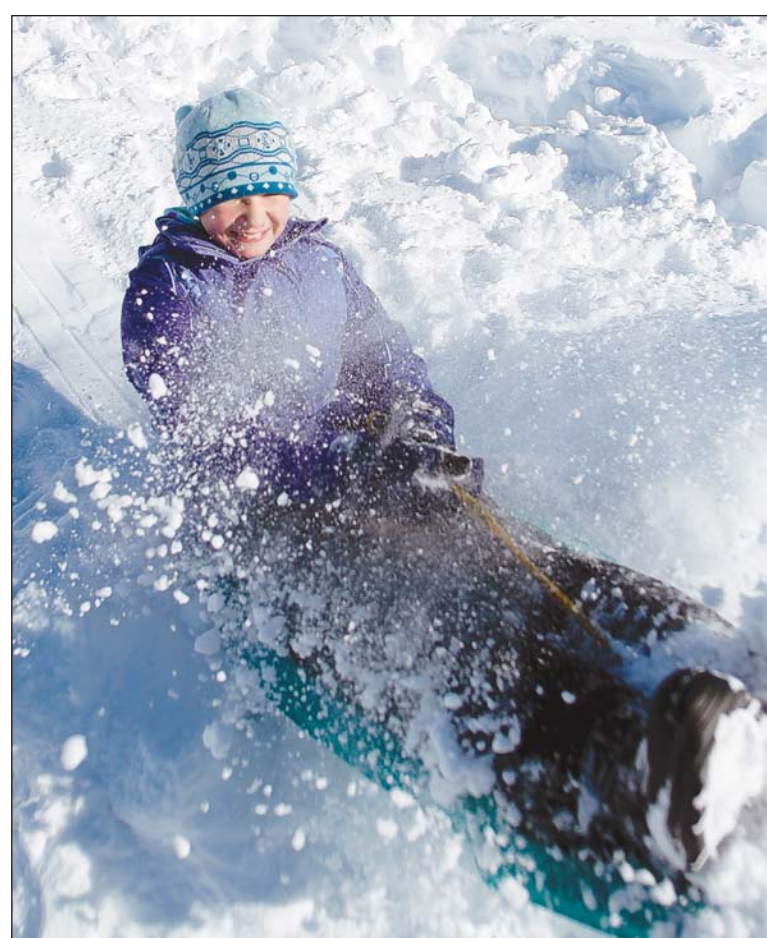

He looked at the Boston Public Library's site and found the famous 1882 pictorial map of Andover, which shows Bartlett Street spelled with two "Ts" at the end. ... It is the most interesting historical document I've seen about Andover. It allows you to scroll and zoom in on the tiniest detail, including buildings and brooks. It is amazing in its detail and you can almost imagine walking around town in those days.

... Ted Witman, commenting on my Bartlett Street columns, said he grew up on Haggetts Pond Road "when there were more cows than people" and still lives

on the same street. Years ago, a new street sign misspelled it Haggetts Pond Road (one "T" at the end). Ted knew the proper spelling from the old signs and Haggetts Pond Farm. Newer signs now spell the street properly.

... I had three e-mails from Vietnam veterans who said they had the same experience as John Doherty's when he returned from Vietnam. (I wrote about John a few weeks ago.) Those veterans were also harassed when they returned to the country. One veteran pointed out that it was all servicemen and women who were treated badly in those days, not just those returning from combat.

... How much time a week do you spend correcting big company's errors or returning something you bought that

didn't work (and is usually made in China). In my family, it's hours a week, much of it on telephone hold. And those mistakes made by these big companies - what a surprise here - are never to your benefit.

... If you want to discover ways to get around the long telephone holds, go to the website www.gethuman.com.

... Of course, the small stores are the best. Andover has a lot of good stores. To mention one, I've been visiting the Andover Shop for years - since I was a kid - and it is still a haven of civility.

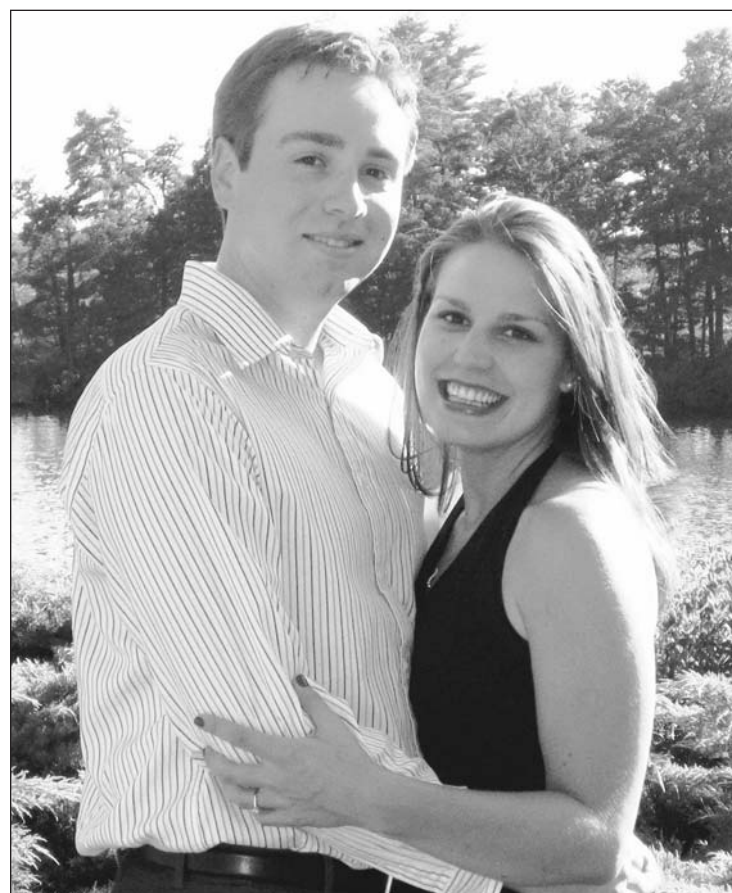
