Appeals halt new Bancroft construction

Neighbors worry about water runoff

Bancroft Elementary School property abutters, frustrated with plans for a new school, have filed multiple appeals against the project, effectively putting construction of the school on hold until the state reviews plans put together by the town.

According to Maria Maggio, acting director of Plant and Facilities, planning for the project is expected to continue as the appeal process moves forward, but work on an access road to the existing school and construction of the new building will go nowhere until after the state reviews and comes to a decision on the project.

"Right now, we can't start construction," Maggio said, adding that it is currently unknown how long the process to review the project will take and how it will affect funding for the project, which includes over \$16 million in reimbursements from the state.

The four appeals were put together by residents of Holt Road, South Main Street and West Knoll Road, a road to be extended for the school's access road.

The appeals primarily raise concerns over storm water management related to construction of the access road and other features on the property.

Previously, Maggio said that

construction on the access road — depending at the time on whether the Conservation Commission and Planning Board supported issuing permits for the project — could start in October.

Mark Johnson, chairman of the School Building Committee, had said that work on the school itself would likely start in January. Both timelines were a few months behind original construction estimates released at the beginning of the year.

For safety purposes, the access road must be in place before the new building can be constructed, officials have said.

The Conservation Commission voted to issue its order of conditions, thus supporting the road's construction and allowing the entire project to move forward, on Aug. 17. From that point, opponents had 10 business days to appeal the project.

The Planning Board also voted to support the project, at an Aug. 23 meeting, a vote that can't be appealed.

What will happen next with the access road project and the school construction itself is not yet known. Johnson said he hopes that the state expedites its review of the project so a decision can come sooner rather than later.

Beyond that, not much else can be discussed until Andover's

Keeping Andover beautiful, one bucket at a time

At night, Whittier Street resident John Pasquale is often found in the audience at town board meetings, where he frequently reprimands town officials for their actions and often refers to himself in the third person when sharing ideas.

But by day, he walks the streets and picks up trash using a bucket labeled "PRIDE PATROL." And he isn't the only one.

"Personally, I like going out Monday

mornings," Al Retelle, a Reservation Road resident and member of the patrol, said. "It is a good way to start the week."

Working through the Senior Center's SCRPT tax work-off program, Retelle and Pasquale each receive a \$675 abatement on their real estate taxes for 100 hours of community service every year, which they provide by keeping Andover beautiful.

"I went to the Board of Selectmen and said, 'You know, what we need around here is a champion,'" Pasquale said.

"They looked at me, and I said, 'I have a lot of pride. I spend my mornings picking stuff up.' The next day, I got a call from the Senior Center."

Working his way through The Park, Pasquale walks with a grabbing tool in one hand and his Pride Patrol pail in the other. He snaps up everything from cigarette butts to soft drink cans dropped by people — or spread by crows — throughout the day.

"We're commissioned to keep this

Cleanup continues after Irene hits home

The winds have died but trouble lives on.

Tropical Storm Irene moved through the area this weekend with heavy winds, drenching rains and thousands of headaches as trees seemed to occupy Andover's roads much more frequently than cars.

As National Grid crews and town employees continued to dig through the damage done by the storm on Tuesday, two days after Irene, officials are saying that

practice with other forms of New England weather made perfect in emergency response.

"This is not the first storm, whether it be a snow event or a rain event, that we've been involved in," Buzz Stapczynski, town manager, said. "Between (Police Chief Brian Patullo) and the division heads, the department heads, they've been through a hundred storms of varying degrees, and they know what they're doing."

Many residents still didn't have power more than 48 hours after the storm. As of Tuesday evening,

546 of the town's more than 13,000 National Grid customers were still without power. Full service was expected to be restored by 3 p.m. Wednesday, after Townsman deadline, according to Vanessa Charles, a spokeswoman for National Grid.

"We're seeing our poles snapped like twigs, several substations flooded," Charles said. "We're doing a significant amount of restoration, and this is going on 24 hours a day."

Work to clean Andover's streets of tree debris large and small, on and off the road, has been going

nonstop and is expected to take weeks, according to Maria Maggio, acting director of Plant and Facilities.

"It's going to take them a few weeks to clean everything up," Maggio said. "All the trees are off the roads, and a few we had to wait for (National Grid) to come up and clear out live wires."

While the trees have been taken off of the roads, they are still in the area and will be destroyed with wood chippers or other equipment. In addition, the

legal counsel, Tom Urbelis, has had an opportunity to discuss the appeals with the building committee, which was scheduled to take place yesterday (Wednesday) in a closed-door session after Townsman deadline.

Abutters "filed an appeal and town counsel is going through it. We'll discuss it Wednesday," Johnson said earlier this week. "Anything else will be premature."

The appeals, filed last week with the Conservation Division and Town Manager Buzz Stapeczynski, call for the state's Department of Environmental Protection to issue a superseding order of conditions over the order issued by the town's Conservation Commission. This would force the town to take its plans for the access road back to the drawing board, according to Conservation Director Bob Douglas.

The DEP "could find that the concerns of the abutter haven't been met by the applicant and require (the town) to come back with a revised plan," Douglas said.

STORM WATER CONCERNS

The concerns identified in the appeals relate largely to how construction of the access road, as well as other work around the site in the project's first of three phases, would impact the flow of storm water. According to two of the appeals that have been submitted, the town made incorrect calculations in storm water management that would cause nearby, abutting properties to be flooded by storm water during strong storms.

Two abutters "hired an

engineer to look at storm water management, and they feel there is some issue," Maggio said.

In a review of the plans, Robert Cummings of Engineering & Management Services in Murrieta, Calif., said that "one of the most significant flaws (in the plan) is an error made in developing" the storm water model.

In the review, Cummings said that plans for a drain line from one part of the property to another would face problems because "the flow rate generated during the 100 year storm far exceeds the capacity of the existing drain line and as a result the system will surcharge, with the overflow running in a westerly direction directly towards (Green Court Realty Trust)."

Dana Willis, a South Main Street resident who is named in an appeal filed by his attorney on Aug. 25, is a trustee of Green

Court Realty Trust, according to the appeal. A second appeal was filed the next day, Aug. 26, by the same attorney on behalf of MSL Realty Trust, located just down the road from Willis and owned by the Mann family, according to Peter Flynn, the attorney representing both Willis and the Manns.

The review also contends that "there has been no proper evaluation of runoff and related stormwater controls during construction."

"In addition to a general lack of control, the plans show temporary parking areas to be constructed adjacent to the existing modular classrooms," the review says. "At the present time that area is not paved so this temporary parking will represent a significant increase in runoff in that direction during the construction project. No mitigative measures other than placing hay bales and silt fence are shown in that area."

"In general, due to the errors in the stormwater calculations, the impacts to adjacent wetlands

and residential properties have not been properly established," Cummings' review says. "Unfortunately at this point, your only recourse is to appeal to the Mass-DEP for a Superseding Order of Conditions. During that process, the applicant may provide revised plans and calculations that may address these deficiencies."

When reached by phone, Cummings declined to comment further on his review of the plans, preferring that the review be quoted directly.

An appeal filed by West Knoll Road resident Tom Garesché on Tuesday, Aug. 30 also discusses the problem of storm water management while also raising the issues of the town's reliance on outside state aid to pay for the school and the way the Conservation Commission issued its order of conditions on Aug. 17.

"Not only were the Peer Review and Order (of) Conditions not made available to the public prior to their vote, but the Order of Conditions were only distributed to the members of the Andover Conservation Commission only

hours prior to their meeting on August 17, in draft form," Garesché wrote. "Then instead of reviewing and presenting the Order of Conditions in full, they debated some minor edits and pushed for a vote, over the objections of the public."

Douglas said he disagreed with the characterization of the meeting, saying that it was only the final meeting in a process that started back in May.

"This was a big process," Douglas said. "Anybody and everybody had their chance to speak during the course of the hearing, so I would not say that this is an accurate summary at all."

A final appeal filed on Aug. 30 by three pairs of Holt Road residents — Thomas and Jennifer Boshar; Todd Jackson and Caroline Ren; and Thomas and Lisa Williams — addresses additional mitigation measures the residents say are necessary to ensure that abutting properties aren't harmed by the project.

"The Applicant has taken a number of steps and proposed several design features to mitigate the impact of the project on wetlands and storm water," the final appeal says. "We believe that due to the particular sensitivity of the site and surrounding areas, there are many additional mitigation measures and even design changes that can further reduce the potential impact of the project to the abutters."

COURT ACTION EXPECTED

Throughout the history of the project, residents have opposed certain plans and raised concerns about several details, covering everything from the placement of the access road to where soccer fields would be located.

The Manns and Willis filed appeals because of the project's impact on them and the way it was handled.

"They're unhappy with how this has unfolded, the placement of the building and the

remediation of the whole process," Flynn said. "I know from my general understanding that there has been discontent in this whole process."

Flynn said he was first approached by Willis on this topic several months ago. Now, he believes that more calls for a state review of the plans are expected.

"If everything I am hearing is accurate, there are going to be others joining the appeals or filing other appeals," Flynn said Monday, prior to two more appeals being filed on Tuesday. "I believe you're going to hear about a challenge in the Superior Court to the Andover wetlands bylaw with relation to this project. We have been advised to proceed with that action."

Douglas said that action in the state Superior Court is typical when appeals have also been filed.

He declined comment on any other possible actions, responses or outcomes, directing questions to town counsel. Town Manager Stapeczynski also referred all questions to town counsel, who did not return a phone call for this story. Douglas and Johnson said they are confident the state will side with the town and not issue a superseding order of conditions.

"We do believe (the town's order) is a good order, and we feel it is an important project," Douglas said. "The project is in their hands at this point to review."

"We have discussed the project with abutters," Johnson said. "This project was well vetted with the Conservation Commission, sent out to a peer review, and we are comfortable that the decision of the Conservation Commission is well supported."

(area) spotless, and we do," Pasquale said, reaching down for a flattened McDonald's french fry container. He grabs it and looks at it briefly before putting

it in his bucket and moving on. "They eat well in this town," he says. Moments later, he walked up to a crushed green tea can and holds it up briefly. "When the lawn mower hits this, it is shrapnel," he said,

putting it in the bucket. "People are throwing everything... Soft drinks, not too much booze... You run the gamut of different stuff."

Pasquale and Retelle work in different parts of town and on different days. Favoring Monday, Retelle said he covers parts of The Park and nearby parking lots, such as the one next to Park Street Village.

Pasquale cleans up The Park as well, but he also works in

other areas, including Main Street, Elm Street and around Old Town Hall.

"You get to be a nut about trash," Retelle said. "You see it everywhere and want to pick it up, no matter where you are."

Sometimes they find money along the way, Pasquale said.

"The most I ever got was \$11 in the grass," he said. "It was rolled up. Kids were rolling around in the grass or something."

Pasquale and Retelle said they hope more residents help them and join the SCRPT program in the future.

"It's just the two of us. We're supposedly getting a third guy," Pasquale said. "What we're trying to do is recruit other people. If we just doubled us, this place would be spotless."

Town Manager Buzz Stapeczynski said that Pride Patrol is a good idea.

"I took his suggestion and ran with it," he said. "I'm very proud of them."

Stapeczynski said Andover doesn't "do enough as a town to keep our seniors here."

"In terms of taxes, this is an expensive place to live," Stapeczynski said. "Anything we can do, that is important. And the SCRPT program is just another thing we do to make our town a senior-friendly town."

A Vision of a Parent Coaching Center

Like many others, I have concerns that our children and grandchildren have some challenging times ahead.

With some preparation, they have a future that can be met somewhat successfully. On the other hand, we can wait for it to happen and take our chances with the winds of fate. It reminds me of the sign I had in my office: There are three kinds of people in this world: people who make things happen, people who watch things happen and people who wonder what happened. I suppose each generation has the feeling, tough times ahead, strong children needed. However, I do believe we are really headed into uncharted waters. I also believe deeply, children can be coached effectively while experiencing childhood and still be prepared for the many uncertainties as they become adults.

It is time for the home, school and community to form

a true partnership. Recently, the Andover School Committee has publicly made two very significant policy statements that should be applauded. The first is a desire to have a meaningful strategic plan. The second is to become an innovative school system. A definition for both policies would be helpful in communicating its vision to the community.

The strategic plan could contain a community-based school reform movement. Successful schools understand the concept of "communities of learners" Institutions like school and family establish a community for raising children only when they collaborate effectively with one another. Successful schools also recognize and support the important role of families in the education of their children.

The schoolhouse is the ideal place for a parent coaching center. The primary purpose for such a center would be a place where parents can meet, share information and ideas, develop strategies and discuss critical issues in meeting a fast approaching new world. Educators and community members could also volunteer to assist parents in the coaching process. The two fundamental areas that would receive major

attention are competence and character.

William Damon in his book *Greater Expectations, Overcoming the Indulgence in America's Homes and Schools* (1995) describes the need for such a balance:

"Even if our children were being raised to become the best informed, most artistic, and healthiest children the world has ever seen, it would all come to nothing unless they found some things beyond themselves... Even if children took their math homework and piano lessons far more seriously than they do now, they still would need to develop a sense of social responsibility. They would still need to care for other people, to work for the good of others... Otherwise they could not live together in a decent society, nor pass along what is left of the culture to their own children."

Wherever this center is located, it would contain the curriculum and instruction regarding what needs to be done and how to implement the specifics of competence and dimensions of character. Curriculum frameworks, suggested literature and "how to" suggestions would be in the parent library. A computer or two would be available.

Demonstration clinics would be conducted. Problem solving activities could be developed after surveying the needs of the parents. Parents and teachers could be televised as they conducted lessons with real children. Such videos would become a part of the resources for future reference. As examples, a parent working with his child, using the math frameworks on the favorite topic of fractions would be recorded and kept. We could have a kitchen table as a prop in the center. A tape for teaching children responsibility could be a discussion on strategies followed by a session with a child. This too would become part of the center. Parents might discuss the strengths and weaknesses in what they had seen. The center can be as simple as a math lab for parents for coaching their children in the area of mathematics or a comprehensive innovation with detailed strategies on the balance of competence and character. It all depends on the interest and motivation in building a parent and school community of learners.

Hype aside, Irene still packed a serious punch

Irene, overhyped?

Well, yes — and no.

Yes, the scenes of television reporters being sprayed with sewage foam, providing live updates on the ankle-deep water in lower Manhattan or description the “terror” of Irene’s winds as onlookers frolicked on the beach behind them were a bit overblown.

But television news lives for weather events. They make people tune in and watch. That was the case even before WBZ planted poor old Shelby Scott in a snowdrift for every blizzard that rolled through the region.

And yes, it is true that the National Hurricane Center and other weather experts blew their forecasts on Irene — at least in part. They had the storm track — across North Carolina’s Outer Banks, up the Jersey shore and into western New England right on days in advance. That’s no small feat with something as unpredictable as a hurricane.

But the weather experts missed terribly on the storm’s strength. Irene was predicted to be a devastating Category 4 hurricane packing winds of 131 to 155 mph when it hit the Outer Banks and a strong Category 2 storm when it crossed the New England coast.

Instead, Irene hit North Carolina as a Category 1 storm with 80 mph winds. It degraded further to tropical storm strength by the time it hit New England.

Clearly, there’s something about the internal dynamics of hurricanes that is not well understood.

Given the projected track and strength of Irene, the warnings and advance preparations were well warranted.

Look at the damage done by a storm that was far less potent than predicted, even given those early preparations — 26 dead along the East Coast, 20 homes on the Connecticut coast destroyed, massive flooding in eastern Pennsylvania, northern New Jersey, upstate New York and across Vermont, 700,000 without power in Massachusetts and 150,000 in New Hampshire.

Now consider the impact if the storm had been as powerful as predicted.

We in New England can look to our own history for a lesson in facing a hurricane unprepared. The infamous Hurricane of 1938 hit the Connecticut coast as a powerful Category 3 storm with hurricane force winds reported across much of southern New England.

The Blue Hill Observatory south of Boston reported sustained wind of 121 mph and a peak gust of 186 mph. The damage was incredible: 564 dead, 8,900 homes destroyed, more than 15,000 homes damaged, 2,600 boats destroyed. Estimates of property losses in 2011 dollars exceed \$40 billion.

It’s easy to rely on hindsight and laugh at the hype surrounding Irene. Indeed, some of the news coverage was laughable. But those who forecast the weather were relying on the best information available from computer models that are imperfect at best. They did the best job they could with the tools at hand.

It is far, far better to have prepared for a serious storm that did not fully materialize than to not have prepared at all. The worst lesson to take from Irene is that weather warnings need not be taken seriously.

Given our location and the relatively cool ocean waters off our coast, it is difficult for hurricanes to reach us while maintaining devastating strength. Difficult, but not impossible.

Irene demonstrated that even a tropical storm can deliver substantial, if isolated damage. Think Irene was nothing but hype? Ask your neighbor who is pulling a tree out of his living room what he thinks.

Ask someone like Ernie Lesperance of Methuen, who had a tree fall on his house and pickup truck. He estimated the falling tree caused \$15,000 to \$20,000 damage to the house. It totaled his pickup.

“I went upstairs and saw rafters and floor joists moved. The tree just pushed the whole house,” he said.

There were downed trees and power lines across the region.

Hurricanes are dangerous, unpredictable and capable of causing extreme damage across a wide area. We are well advised to treat them with the respect they deserve.

Court upholds public’s right to monitor police

A recent decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit in Boston is rightly being described as a victory for the First Amendment.

In a unanimous decision, the court upheld the right of a young attorney to sue police who arrested him for using his cell phone to make an audio and video recording of officers conducting an arrest on Boston Common in the fall of 2007.

“A citizen’s right to film government officials, including law enforcement officers, in the discharge of their duties in a public space is a basic, vital, and well-established liberty safeguarded by the

First Amendment,” the court stated.

Indeed, it is the height of hypocrisy for police, who routinely employ surveillance cameras to monitor activities on streets, in parks and at other locations, to arrest someone for employing similar technology in a public setting.

The Suffolk County district attorney’s office, representing the Boston Police Department, maintained that Simon Glik had violated the state’s wiretapping law which prohibits anyone from secretly recording another individual’s words.

But the court held that since Glik had made no effort

to conceal the cell phone with which he was recording the officers’ actions, he could not be accused of doing so “secretly” in violation of the statute.

“Simply put,” the court noted, “a straightforward reading of the statute and case law cannot support the suggestion that a recording made with a device known to record audio and held in plain view is ‘secret.’”

Glik’s right to sue had previously been upheld by U.S. District Court Judge William Young. And there have been previous decisions, including one involving the recording of police actions following an

altercation outside a downtown Salem bar, upholding the right of citizens and the media to record police actions as long as they are not endangering the safety of others or interfering with officers in the performance of their duties.

“Police officers must be trained to respect the right of people to openly record their actions in public,” according to David Milton who represented Glik on behalf of the local chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union. “Simon did what we hope any engaged citizen would do, which was documenting what he thought looked like an improper use of force.”

Highway Department is expected to sweep streets throughout the town in the days ahead to get rid of any twigs, leaves and small branch pieces still on the ground, according to Maggio.

As of Tuesday, power had been restored to all but one of Andover's public schools. Teachers and staff at Bancroft Elementary School, which was running on generators while employees at the school were days away from the scheduled opening, worked in the heat of a low-powered, unventilated building.

Some residents, including Pleasant Street resident Linda Lieberman, have been

frustrated with the utility's response to calls for restored power. While saying that hers and a few other houses on her

street had no power, she said crews that were in the area and able to do work had to leave to restore other, larger outages. "I am amazed," Lieberman said. "I have neighbors that are let in the black. I have four neighbors that had to throw everything out."

Stapczynski, Maggio and Charles all said that the company restores power in order of priority, seeking to knock out larger outages before focusing on smaller ones. According to Charles, the company started Sunday with over 500,000 outages, a number that was narrowed to 165,000 by Tuesday afternoon.

In the meantime, police were still receiving reports of downed lines throughout the town. According to Charles, residents should assume that any line coming from a utility pole to the ground is a live power line.

"If for whatever reason customers come across wires down, they need to act as if it is a live wire and call the company immediately," Charles said.





A-maizing Corn Re-appears

When I was a kid, my brothers, Dad, and I would each devour a dozen or more ears of corn at a sitting, and on every ear

we slathered butter and shook lots of salt. The butter melted on the warm corn and formed a pool on my plate that filled with dropped kernels falling from my greedy lips as I chomped my way through each ear. An old Disney cartoon showed Mickey Mouse eating corn to the sound of a typewriter, and that is the mental picture I have of myself when I eat corn.

The best corn I ever had was from my Dad's backyard garden, and he called it "native corn" or sometimes "bantam corn," but both names meant the same kind of corn to me because the ears were small, the kernels light gold or white and the flavor sweet, with a slight nutty touch. Dad said the native corn was the same corn the native Indians taught the early European settlers to grow. Indians put corn seeds (kernels) in small mounds where they also planted beans whose shoots would grasp and climb the corn stalks. A dead fish was placed under each mound and that fertilizer was the key to having great corn and beans. Dad didn't grow corn like the Indians, but he put down a layer of manure each April and turned it deep into the soil, planting the corn soon after.

The corn was ready for harvest in early August and we ate it as soon as possible, as native corn is famous for losing flavor so quickly that its said many folks have water boiling to cook the corn as its being picked. Dad's small corn patch soon emptied, but local farm stands filled in our needs.

In 1917, the European Corn Borer was discovered in North America — in fact, in Mass. From here it spread all over the US and Canada. The advantage of anything "native" is that it is disease resistant to native pests. The disadvantage is that native plants quickly succumb to foreign attackers. However, small gardens and

some small farms, especially in colder climates, were hidden from the corn borer for years, but one day Dad checked his corn and thought the stalks looked frail and the corn small, so he pulled off an ear and shucked it. "Damn it," he said. I looked at the ear and saw an ugly worm and that many of the small kernels were gone. "Corn borer," he said. After two more years of trying, Dad gave up growing corn.

By the 1950s, methods of fighting the corn borer along with the development of hybrid corn resistant to borers were appearing in supermarkets, having been used to feed livestock since shortly after 1917, when hybrids were first developed. Hybrid corn for human consumption was of a lower priority, and the first hybrids for humans were awful and they didn't improve for many years. When we first ate these hybrids we said they were "horsey," meaning they should have gone to farm animals. (Yes, I know horses shouldn't be fed corn, except some eat the stalks, but "horsey" was the word.) Horsey corn was mealy and tasted like bad mush, but once in a while we'd see a farm stand advertising "native corn" and we'd buy as much as we could and eat it all that night. Dad had a deal with one farm stand, and they'd call him and save some native corn. We'd pick it up in a hurry.

Dad died in 1983, too early for really good hybrid corn. Each year the sweet corn, also called "butter and sugar" or "cream and honey," improves. Recently, from a place I won't disclose, I had sweet corn that almost made me forget the old native corn, and once again I watched kernels drop into pools of butter — actually, noncaloric fake butter and, of course, there was no salt — as I chomp away, thinking of a typewriter. Writing this column has required me to eat some of this secret corn, which my wife has waiting on the table. See ya later.

Okay, back again after that excellent corn. I found a seed company that sells native corn resistant to the borer. The seeds are pricey, but I'll try it next year for old-times sake and let you know.

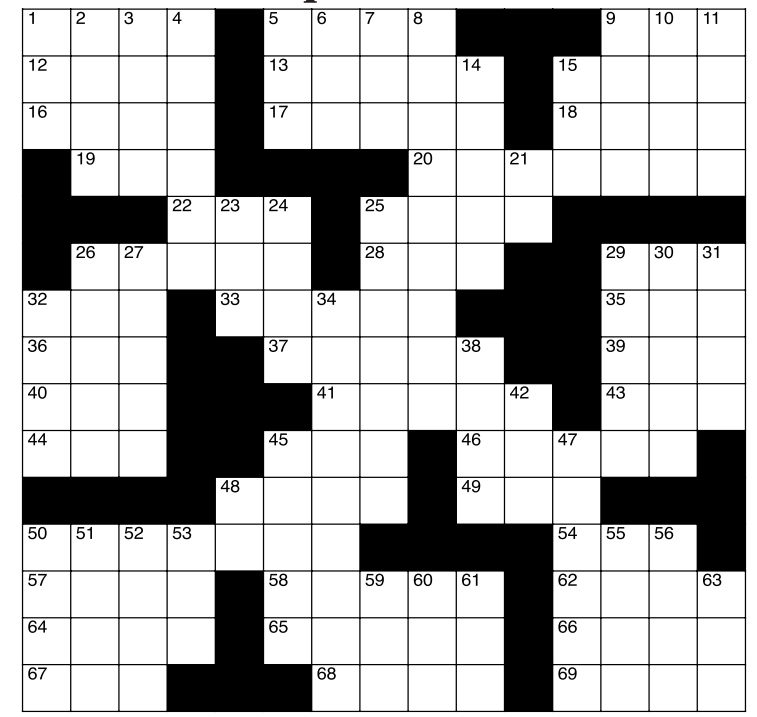

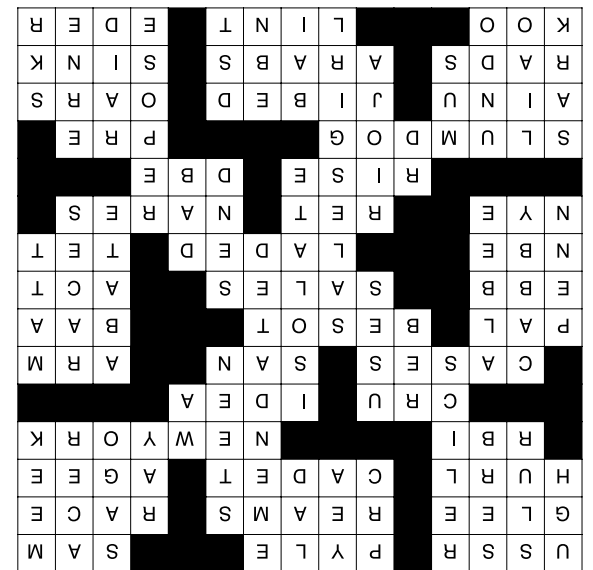

Interns give Andover healthy boost, says town

Having improved Andover's web site and its monitoring of deer ticks, two public health summer interns have completed their work for the Andover Health Division.

Debora Case and Andrew Solomon are both candidates for a Masters in Public Health degree at Boston University, and were assigned to Andover through a program sponsored by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. The program allows students to learn about the functions of local public health while completing a project for the community.

Case is a Massachusetts native studying biostatistics. She assisted the Health Division in reviewing its web-site content, and making suggestions on what to add to make it more user-friendly. She also reviewed and developed information that should help residents prepare for emergencies, with the documents eventually being populated to the web site.

Andrew Solomon is from Minnesota and is studying epidemiology. His project was to develop a protocol to sample for deer ticks in the community, so that the town can monitor deer

tick populations over a number of years and verify any possible trends the enhanced bow hunting will have on the ticks. He identified two ways to capture ticks, one called "flagging", which uses a white cloth to drag through grasses to capture ticks, and another using dry ice to attract ticks to tape where they are trapped. His work will allow future volunteers to conduct sampling that should be valid for long-term observations, according to a release from the town.

Both students had the opportunity to be involved in the routine health division work, including food-service inspections, septic systems operation, and swimming pool inspections. They also learned about local government and how the health division interacts with other municipal departments and residents.

The interns presented their projects at the Board of Health meeting on Aug. 15, and spoke with the board about their future aspirations. Their work will be on display in the second floor reception area of Town Offices, 36 Bartlett St.

'ROAD TO FOXBORO'

Andover football sets sights high for 2011

ANDOVER — Last year was historic for Andover football, earning its first league title and postseason berth since 1975.

But the Golden Warriors have even higher goals this season.

"On the back of our T-shirts it says 'Road to Foxboro,'" said senior lineman Matt Crush, dripping sweat after a long practice. "Our first goal is to win the Merrimack Valley Conference (Large), but our overall goal is to make it to Foxboro and win the Super Bowl. We feel ready."

With the season-opener looming next Friday (Sept. 9) at North Andover, the Golden Warriors feel confident they have the talent and focus to make the approximately 54-mile trip from Lovely Field to Gillette Stadium, home of the MIAA Super Bowls.

"The kids are working so hard," said coach E.J. Perry. "They know the system now and we had a good scrimmage against Acton-Boxboro. I love our offensive line and out defense has some speed and some hitters. It's going to be fun."

With the talent the Warriors have on the field, it's hard to argue.

"We like the pressure," said running back Andy Coke. "We had to overcome that last year, but this year we want the pressure. We want to take that last step to Foxboro."

The offense

Just like a season ago, the Andover offense starts with record-setting back Coke.

"It's so nice to have Andy back there," said lineman T.J. Leeman. "You know, if you make a hole, he's already going and he's going to get yards."

A season ago, Coke set the Andover High single-season records for rushing yards (1,811) and rushing touchdowns (24) in a season, on the way to earning All-Scholastic honors.

Coke rushed for 200 or more yards in four different games and eight touchdowns in the epic eight-overtime win over Lowell in his dominant debut season.

"I got a lot faster and stronger in the offseason," said Coke, who is being contacted by many colleges. "I was very focused on this season. I can't wait."

But Coke is far from the only weapon the Golden Warriors field.

At quarterback, junior C.J. Scarpa has impressed throughout the preseason, and seems

to have the edge in the battle to start, with Coke seeing some QB duty in special formations.

"Scarpa has really picked up his game," said star junior Mark Zavri. "He is making good reads and has a great feel for the offense."

The quarterback will have impressive targets to throw to, led by junior wide receiver Cam Farnham (18 catches, 223 yards last season). Will Heikkinen, at 6-foot-3, also presents a huge target and Zavri will start at tight end.

"Cam is so fast and Will is big and can jump," said Coke. "We have a lot of talent, and we'll spread the ball out more. And I'll be running behind the big boys up front, who look great."

Returning starters Leeman and Crush lead a big and athletic offensive line. Joining them on the line are Andreas Christopoulos and James Kelly — who both saw time as injury replacements last season — and newcomer Ben Hartford.

"I love every bit of the o-line," said Leeman. "We are looking good, we know the offense and we will be very hard-nosed."

The defense

While offense may garner many of the headlines, the Golden Warriors also sport

plenty of playmakers on defense. "We lost some size," said Leeman. "But we are tougher than last year. We know the system now, and we have tough guys that want to make hits."

Just like on offense, Crush and Leeman anchor the defensive line along with Brendan Paquette and Greg Brown.

"The line has really picked it up with T.J. and Crush," said Zavri. "And Brown and Paquette have really stepped it up."

Zavri, after a stellar sophomore season, leads the linebackers along with Giovanni Rosano and Will Eikenberry,

who transferred to Andover from Brooks this offseason and has impressed. He has also seen time at quarterback.

Jimmy Walsh returns to pace the defensive backfield after a standout junior campaign that including the game-clinching tackle against Lowell, along with returning starter Andrew Deloury, Freddie Scribner and Coke, who will play defense after only playing offense last season.

"Deloury didn't get enough credit for what he did last season," said Coke. "Jimmy has done a lot and I love playing

defense. I love hitting people."

Special teams

There were few more memorable moments from the 2010 season than Zavri blasting field goals of 42 and 37 yards on Thanksgiving Day.

After an offseason of training, arguably the best kicker in the state is feeling even better.

"I don't feel any more pressure," said Zavri. "In fact, it's less pressure than last year. I have a year under my belt."

"The team is feeling great and working hard. We can't wait for the season to begin."

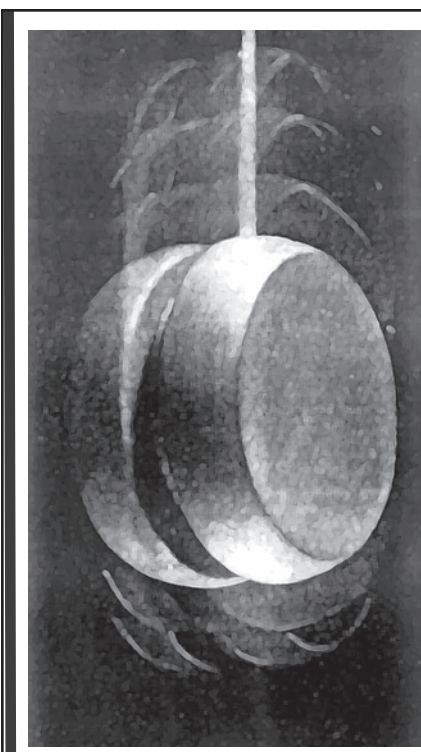

Who's the real Rosie the Riveter?

Rosie the Riveter is a famous symbol of American Labor. But which picture is really Rosie?

Rosie was created in 1942 during World War II. Many American men were called to fight in Europe and the Pacific. Women were needed to fill jobs traditionally held by men.

Redd Evans and John Jacob Loeb wrote a song titled "Rosie the Riveter" in 1942.

They were inspired by Rosalind P. Walters, who worked on the night shift building fighter planes.

That same year, artist J. Howard Miller created posters to promote the war effort at Westinghouse factories. One of his posters featured a woman with a red polka-dot scarf rolling up her sleeve and flexing her muscles. The inspiration for his poster was a photograph of Geraldine Doyle, a factory worker.

The poster was not widely distributed at the time, and Miller didn't model her after the song.

In 1943, artist Norman Rockwell painted "Rosie" for the cover of the Saturday Evening Post magazine.

Rosie pauses to eat a sandwich with her riveting tool on her lap. Crushed under her feet is a copy of Adolph Hitler's book "Mein Kampf."

Rockwell's model was Shirley Karp Dick. He based her pose on Michelangelo's portrait of Isaiah on the ceiling of Sistine Chapel.

Americans loved the magazine cover. Rosie became an immediate heroine. Everyone associated the Rockwell image with the song.

Today, however, Miller's image is the one people think of as "Rosie the Riveter."

So how did Miller's image become more popular than Rockwell's?

The publishers of the Saturday Evening Post refused requests for reprints of the Rosie cover. Westinghouse and Miller had not copyrighted their image, so it was widely reprinted as a symbol for the labor movement and the woman's rights movement.

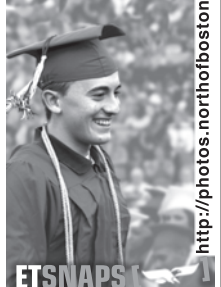
