Ice cream, cupcake shops coming to Main Street

Andover residents with a sweet tooth can rejoice. An ice cream parlor and a cupcake shop are coming to Olde Andover Village on Main Street.

Steve Reppucci of Andover said he soon will open a Mad Maggie's ice cream shop at the downtown shopping center.

The business will be located at the corner of Olde Andover Village where Fred Church Insurance has been for years. The insurance

company recently moved to a second floor location in Olde Andover Village. Mad Maggie's will occupy the vacated

Group auditions 14 pooches for Legally Blonde show

A popular summer arts program for local teens has gone to the dogs - literally.

A 2 1/2-year-old chihuahua Pomeranian mix is a star of the Summer Theatre Ensemble's production of Legally Blonde the Musical. And this dog, known as a Pomchi by some, even has performing experience.

Jalapeno was one of 14 dogs who showed up for the dog-only, bark-free auditions to play the role of Bruiser in the show.

Bruiser is lead (human) character Elle Woods' constant companion in the show. She's a blonde sorority queen (played by Lauren Wanthal of Andover) who is dumped by her Ivy-college boyfriend, Warner (played by Ian Gillis of Andover). She decides to follow him to law school to get him back. Elle learns she has more legal savvy than she ever imagined.

Bruiser is by her side for all of the drama in this show, which has a

Town sprays for known West Nile virus threat

Roads north, east of 93 and 133 treated

Heavy rains Tuesday night may have foiled workers plans to spray insecticide in an area of town where mosquitoes have been found to be carrying West Nile virus. But if the weather did not allow for spraying late Tuesday, the spraying was expected to be done Wednesday evening.

The Board of Health voted last week to spray parts of town after West Nile virus was found in one trap on the Andover-Lawrence line near Corbett and North Main streets on July 18.

The Northeast Massachusetts Mosquito &

Wetlands Management District-planned to spray all town roads north of Route 133, from the North Andover line, west to Interstate 93. An insecticide called Duet, an "ultralow fogger" that dissipates almost immediately, was sprayed from trucks, according to Tom Carbone, town health director.

Carbone asked the Board of Health to take action against the threat last week saying he was "worried about the virus amplifying."

"If we have an opportunity to knock down that adult population of mosquitoes, that will help suppress the

Selectmen mull town manager's performance

Raise tied to meeting four goals

Selectmen are in the process of determining how well Town Manager Buzz Stapeczynski performed this past year, and whether he deserves a raise.

Stapeczynski's annual raise is tied to his ability to meet four goals, mutually agreed upon by himself and the selectmen. During a regular meeting last Monday, the board discussed only two of Stapeczynski's four goals. For one, they plan to ask him for more information, while for the other they agreed that

he achieved the goal. Discussion for the other two goals are expected to be completed in upcoming meetings.

Stapeczynski will can receive a combined merit raise and bonus payment of between zero and 4 percent, depending on what percentage of his goals he attained. If he reaches less than 60 percent of his goals, he will not receive a raise. Reaching 60, 75, 85 or 100 percent of his goals earns him more money.

GOAL 1: Save \$225,000 in salary and health benefits, worth 50 percent of his

happy to hear the news. It's usually banks and nail salons coming to town," Reppucci said.

Renovations continue at the shopping center on Main Street and a management spokesman was thrilled to announce the two new tenants, Mad Maggie's and a gourmet cupcake business called Pink Tree Sweets. The cupcake business will be located where LuLu & Dots used to be.

"We're right on schedule and progress is on track," said Chris Arruda of Avison

Young, the Charlestown-based company that is managing the makeover at Olde Andover Village.

The center will be renamed Andover Village Square and the new signs are expected to go up tomorrow, Friday, Aug. 3, Arruda said. Arruda said more food-related businesses are looking at the site, but no others have signed a lease.

"I think this is great for downtown," said state Sen. Barry Finegold, an investor in the Olde Andover Village project. "I grew up here and remember how we had Rose Glen, Brigham's and Emack & Bolio's for ice cream. So,

this is great."

There has been a major renovation happening at the site for months, with many tenants changing.

General Goods, Co Co Collection, the Trauma Intervention Program (TIP) and Beaven Tutoring are among the tenants who have left.

Renovation work at Olde Andover Village started in January. The retail mall was purchased for \$7.4 million in September 2011. A business partnership of an undisclosed number of investors includes Finegold, Scott Jameson and John Fenton, all of Andover.

New assistant principal has block-schedule switch experience

Mark Seide, a teacher at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School in Cambridge, has been appointed to replace Christopher Phillips as an assistant principal at Andover High School.

Phillips left for a position at another school at the end of last school year.

Seide, an English teacher in Cambridge, brings experience with moving to a new block-schedule format, something Andover High School will face in the year ahead. That experience made him the top candidate for Andover High, where teachers will soon teach three courses each semester for the first time since the current block schedule format was implemented over 15 years ago, according to high school Principal Chris Lord.

"Six years ago, CRLS transitioned to the [three courses taught per semester] block schedule, a teaching structure we hope will make him an excellent resource to our staff as we too transition to this new format for the instructional day," wrote Lord in an announcement to the community.

When he arrives, Seide said he's hopes to "help lead the professional development we can offer for the teachers who might not be as comfortable with the sixth course."

Seide's appointment has yet to be voted on by the School Committee. If approved, he will make around \$110,000 a year, according to the town's human resources department.

In his introductory letter to the Andover school system, Seide said he "became a high school English teacher because I wanted to improve the lives of adolescents through literacy. As I have served in several

leadership capacities over the years, my desire now is to improve adolescents' lives across the school spectrum as an assistant principal."

"I applied for the school because ... the students are very engaged in learning there, and it has a great reputation," said Seide. "I love schools that have a myriad of opportunities for students, and that certainly describes AHS."

Equipped with two master's degrees, in education from Harvard University and organizational management from Endicott College, Seide said he hopes to have an open-door relationship with students and teachers.

"I, from day one, want to build relationships with students and have it so both teachers and students feel I'm there to support them," said Seide.

"In the classroom, [Seide] has paid particular attention to the views the students have of his instruction, making judgments about how he might improve his work based on their input," said Lord. "He recognizes the important role assistant principals play in a school like ours in maintaining the pathways of inspiration for all students."

MANAGER: Raise will be tied to meeting four goals set by selectmen

potential raise.

WHAT HE SAID: When developing the fiscal year 2013 budget, Stapczynski eliminated two positions from town departments: Water Treatment Plant Chief of Maintenance for \$88,043 in savings and a Spring Grove Cemetery Laborer position for \$48,295 in savings. With health insurance coverage costs included, the two positions combined for \$166,526 in savings.
Additionally, seven town employees opted out of the town’s health insurance coverage, which included six

family plans and one individual plan. Those opt-outs saved the town \$65,280. Combined with the salary savings, the changes overall saved \$231,806.

WHAT THE SELECTMEN THINK: Selectmen are interested in more information. They said they want to know if positions were added elsewhere in the affected departments to carry some or all of the duties that the eliminated positions were responsible for, which would have an impact on how much the town saved.
“The cemetery laborer, that’s the position where we need to hire an outside

company to mow the lawn at the cemetery,” said Selectman Dan Kowalski. “Isn’t there a cost we’re incurring with that?”

Regarding the health insurance opt-outs, Selectman Brian Major said the employees who dropped the plan “can still get back in. There’s nothing that we could do that would permanently keep them out.”

Selectman Alex Vispoli also questioned whether the \$65,280 saved by those opt-outs are sustainable.

GOAL TWO: Develop a debt analysis tool, worth 20 percent.

WHAT BUZZ SAID: A debt

subcommittee was formed over the course of the year. It analyzed various debt service impacts, including current debt, projects that the town has approved and planned projects that the town is considering. Out of that analysis, a debt analysis tool was created, and debt information was published on the town website at andoverma.gov/finance/debt/.

WHAT THE SELECTMEN THINK: The Selectmen, as individuals, agreed that Stapczynski fulfilled the goal.

“I feel comfortable in saying that Buzz completely nailed or delivered on that issue,” said Major.

“We’ve got the analysis tool. It’s there,” said Vispoli. “It’s there. It does everything we need it to.”

GOAL THREE: Implement the four action plans created out of the previous year’s goals, worth 5 percent for each, 20 percent total.

The plans included a Department of Public Works work order system, outsourcing the town’s payroll operations, develop printing and imaging “as a service” by integrating them and transfer all school custodians to the Plant and Facilities department.
Over the span of three pages, Stapczynski provided

evidence he believes shows he developed and executed all four plans.

This goal has not yet been discussed by the board.

GOAL FOUR: Develop the coming year’s budget without using the town’s accounts for Free Cash and the Stabilization Fund, worth 10 percent.

In his summary, Stapczynski said the budget was developed without using either money source. This goal has also not yet been discussed by the board.

SPRAYING: Chemical will target only mosquitoes, spare other insects

transmission of the virus,” said Carbone.

Duet is specifically designed to target mosquitoes, and is synthetically produced in a way that doesn’t harm other insect species, according to Jack Card, the mosquito control district director. It also works to

make the mosquitoes more active in order to increase the effectiveness of the spraying.

“Each mosquito has its own little quirks, so we try to direct some of the applications to that,” said Card.

Historically, the town doesn’t spray “for nuisances, and we wait until we start seeing an indication that

they’re a threat to the public health,” said Carbone. “That’s what we’ve got for today.”

Several other traps have been set around town and tested in recent weeks as well. Carbone said he “wouldn’t be surprised” if West Nile virus-carrying mosquitoes were caught in some of those traps in the

coming weeks.

People commenting on online updates on this issue have expressed concern about the safety of using synthetic materials like pyrethroids, the chemical family to which Duet belongs. Material Safety Data Sheets for Duet made available by its producer say contact with the insecticide can cause skin and eye irritation, and that “excessive inhalation of mists can cause nasal and respiratory irritation.”

As a result, drivers who are spraying Duet are told to shut down vehicles if they

get near pedestrians. Even then, Duet is still a safer alternative to other sprays, said Card.

“You can’t say that everything’s safe, but you try to use materials that you can apply in a safe manner that don’t have the toxicity that other materials have,” said Card. “We try to use the safest materials and apply them in the safest manner.”

The Board of Health also voted at its meeting to authorize a mosquito advisory board, which includes Board of Health Chairwoman Candace Martin and Town Manager Buzz Stapczynski, to make further decisions on whether to spray parts of Andover if additional treatments are needed, in lieu of having the Board of Health schedule, post and hold a public meeting to make the same decision. The motion passed unanimously.

Despite the threat of mosquitoes carrying West Nile virus, residents are encouraged to continue with any plans they may have outdoors, but take necessary precautions to avoid mosquitoes. A recent release from the health department said residents who are outside after dusk and “other times of high mosquito activity should continue to protect themselves from bites by wearing long pants

and long sleeved shirts, and using a mosquito repellent with DEET; always follow the label on the repellent.”

“We shouldn’t be holed up in the house,” said Carbone. “Get outside. Exercise.”

WEST NILE VIRUS


West Nile virus is a mosquito-carried virus that can cause illness ranging from a mild fever to more serious diseases like encephalitis or meningitis, according to the state’s Department of Public Health. It was first identified in the United States in 1999.

Around 80 percent of those infected with the virus don’t show symptoms. Just under 20 percent of those infected show symptoms including fever, body aches, nausea, vomiting and sometimes swollen lymph glands, as well as rashes on the chest, stomach and back, according to the state.

Less than 1 percent of those infected will develop severe illness, including encephalitis or meningitis. These symptoms can include high fever, headache, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma and tremors. People over 50 run a higher risk of developing severe illness, according to the state.

78 beds cut from college's dorm plan

Merrimack College has cut its new dorm project by 78 beds and one building.

The revised plan was announced at a neighborhood meeting on July 23 after college officials met with the Andover Planning Board. The college also was planning to meet with Andover's Conservation Commission, but that meeting has been rescheduled for later this month.

The original building plan called for adding 428 beds spread among six new buildings in the center of the campus. In addition, the college's Hamel Health Center and one resident townhouse were scheduled to be demolished.

Now, the plan is to create 350 beds in five buildings and no existing buildings will be demolished. A sixth building, that was located closest to the abutting neighborhood, will not be built.

"The college proposed the

six building development so as to provide the town and our neighbors a complete understanding of our development plans. We did so knowing that the sixth building was not going

to be built in this project cycle," Felipe R. Schwarz, assistant vice president, external affairs, wrote in an email. "We are pleased to continue through the local review process for the

proposed housing and new 350 beds."

The new dorms will be located entirely in Andover. Schwarz said the college, which is located in Andover and North Andover, owns about 135 acres in Andover. Construction will start this September and be finished in September 2013.

The newly revised dorm plan will be submitted to Andover's Planning Board and Conservation Commission a later this month for review.

When the new dorm plan

was announced last month, college officials said the small, Augustinian college needs to grow to stay competitive. About 2,300 students now attend Merrimack. The plan is to enroll 3,000 students.

Tuition is \$45,610.

Dorm space is already at a premium as 40 to 50 upperclassmen will live at Marriott's Residence Inn in west Andover this coming school year. The college will run a shuttle service to the main campus for them.

Rising, falling pond baffling conservation

A part of the Hussey Brook Watershed that feeds into the Shawsheen River teems with turtles and frogs most days of the week. But come the weekend, it loses at least 10 inches of water - and nobody seems to know why.

For some parts of Grecoe Pond, which is surrounded by Canterbury and William streets and Warwick Circle, the change in water levels seems to be on a schedule, according to some people familiar with the area. Like clockwork, the water levels plummet over the span of a few dozen hours beginning

Friday afternoon, only to come back up again by Monday morning.

Conservation Director Bob Douglas said he is investigating the pond's activity, but he has no explanation for the phenomenon that some say has been going on for the last few years.

"I've seen it before. Really, it has always been through dam manipulation," said Douglas. "We'll see in the case of where there's a beaver dam that is built up, breached and built up again. You'll get pulses of water."

"But I haven't found any beaver activity on this site," said Douglas.

The range of the

watershed rising and falling is "within a normal summer range, a fluctuation of 10 inches," said Douglas. The fact that this event has "been reported to happen always at the same time is a bit perplexing."

Steve Erikson, president of Norse Environmental Services Inc., does consulting work with the nearby Andover Country Club. He said the club's irrigation systems are not impacting the watershed.

"They have two irrigation ponds on site, all state,

federal and local permits," said Erikson. "They've been taking water out of those for 30, 40 years."

Additionally, with the falling of water levels coming at the end of the work week, "the last time you'd want to be irrigating would be on a Friday afternoon, because you have all the golfers" at

the club, said Erikson.

The rising and falling of the watershed's levels "doesn't make any sense to me," said Erikson.

For the time being, the water level changes are expected to continue, and the town is keeping a close eye on it, said Douglas.

"We've seen some amazing

results of unlawful or uncontrolled breaches before, and they do cause a very fast refill," said Douglas. "I am doing periodic observations of my own and trying to get information from overseers that overlook the area. I haven't solved the mystery yet."

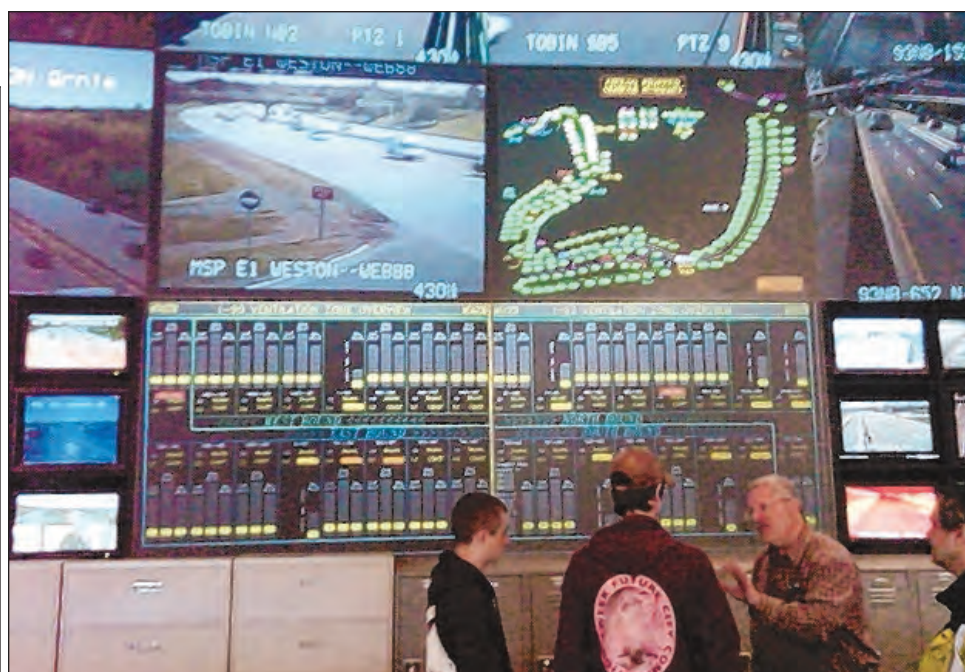

Teacher aiming for plan that's perfectly-engineered 'Explaining Engineering' seeks experts for class visits, field trips

For many science- and math-minded students at Andover High School, just a few words with a man or woman in the field can be the eye-opening experience that changes a life forever.

Minda Reidy, "Explaining Engineering" teacher at Andover High, is calling for engineers and local engineering companies to bring that level of influence into her Andover classroom. With more experts coming to school or hosting field trips, she believes she'll be able to interest students in the field and help feed a larger, global demand for engineers she believes American schools just aren't providing.

"I want people who are passionate about what they do just to come in and talk

to" her students, said Reidy. "It inspires them. It shows them really what can be done and how their knowledge from high school in math and science comes together and works.

"The image that kids have of an engineer is the nerdy engineer with a pocket protector," said Reidy. "Until you had the [television comedy show] Big Bang Theory, you didn't see any engineers on TV."

All around the world, demand for engineers is on the rise. In America, however, only about 4.5 percent of college graduates plan to pursue a career in engineering. In other countries, that number is much higher - up to 20 percent in some Asian nations, according to Reidy.

"We've done a pretty good job of introducing engineering at the elementary and middle schools, but when

they come to the high school, we haven't had a chance to expand it," said Reidy. "There's a huge demand for engineering right now. Baby boomers are retiring, and we need someone to fill it."

New Principal Chris Lord said he strongly supports the idea of having students meet people who work in the field they are studying. It is very similar to "some of the academics I want to get going at the high school," he said.

At his previous high school, Lord ran a series of academies - such as the Government Academy, where students would go to state and local health departments, and visit City Hall and Town Offices, spending a few hours to learn more about careers in government.

"What's really neat is the relationship they establish with the working world," said Lord. "There's an academic thing you can learn in the classroom, and it's nothing compared to working with someone in that profession a couple hours a week at their job site."

"The whole trick of high school is to find the key that turns the kid's lock," continued Lord. "That is just the first step. You give the kid an idea of where they want to go, and it's almost like a spiritual experience when you actually connect with a real-life person who's doing what you're describing."

Last year, Reidy's class went to a few different sites, including a state highway command center and the Andover-based Proctor and Gamble facility on Burt Road.

In the end, the class was divided between wanting to do more research, or wanting more hands-on experience. Either way, 100 percent of the students were committed to furthering their understanding of the options available through a degree in engineering.

"This is a turning point," said Reidy. "It's make or break. If they don't get excited now, it will take a while."

But showing a student engineering options is like showing a climatologist the entirety of the planet's atmosphere. In a few minutes of brainstorming engineering careers, Reidy offered 28 different options, including those in thermal, civil, audio, geomatics, aerospace, manufacturing, software and architectural engineering.

All of them look at the world differently and require a different type of person. But they're all in demand, she said.

"If you really want to save the world, find a way to solve a problem," continued Reidy. "No matter what you're interested in, there's probably an engineering degree that will allow you to get there."

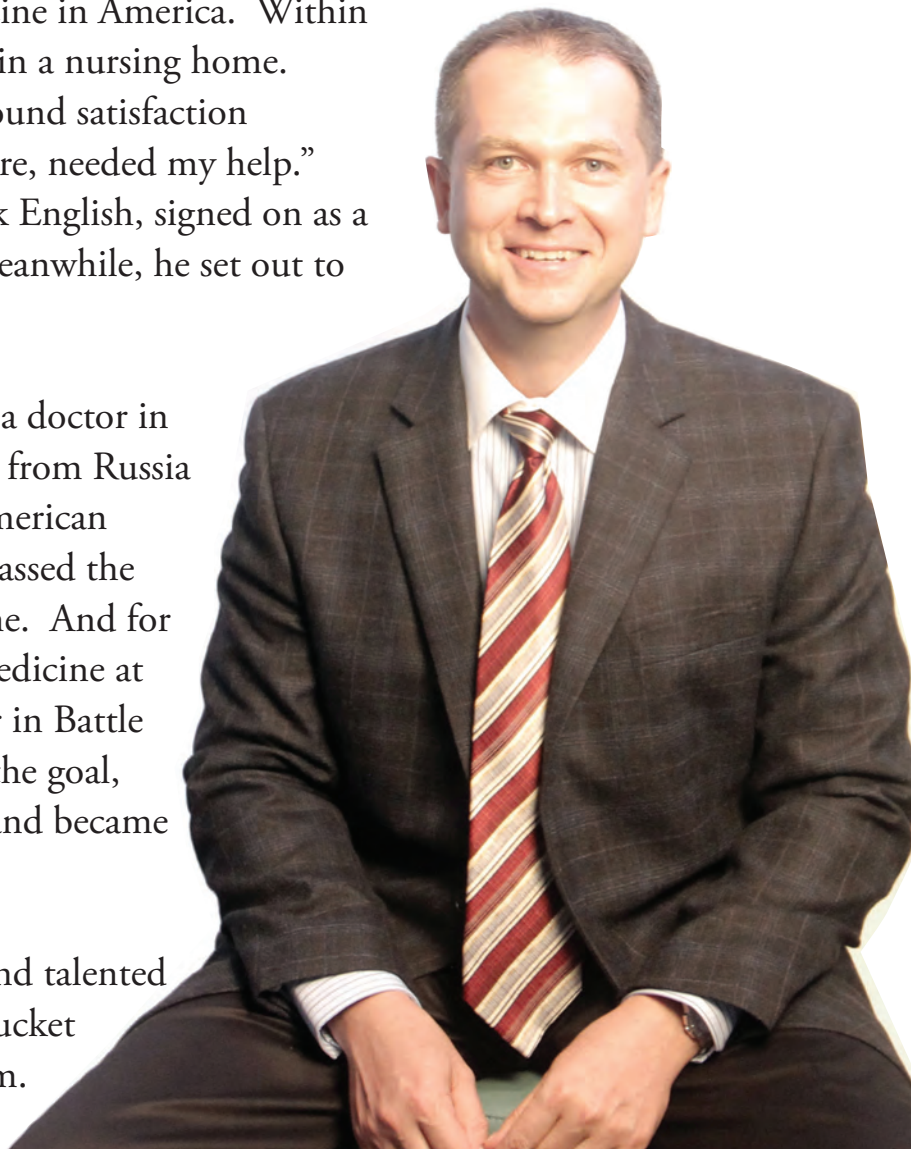

DPH urge precautions against ticks, Lyme disease

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health encourages residents to stay vigilant against tick bites when they're outdoors this summer.

If not removed promptly from the skin, ticks can transmit Lyme disease, a serious but treatable illness.

Ticks are tiny and are most commonly found in brushy, wooded or grassy areas, including backyards. There are several steps that people can take to protect themselves from tick bites, and prevent the spread of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses.

If you are going to be outside in an area likely to have ticks, use an insect repellent with DEET or Permethrin according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age, and should be used in concentrations of 30 percent

or less on older children. Permethrin products are intended for use on items such as clothing, shoes, bed nets and camping gear, and are not effective when applied to skin.

Check yourself, your children and pets for ticks after coming inside. Pay special attention to areas between the toes, back of the knees, groin, armpits, neck, along the hairline and behind the ears.

If you find a tick attached to your skin, use a pair of fine-point tweezers to grip the tick as close to the skin as possible and pull straight out with steady pressure.

Talk to your doctor if you develop a rash where you were bitten, or experience symptoms such as fever, headache, fatigue or sore and aching muscles after a tick bite.

According to the latest data, in 2010 a total of 2641 cases of Lyme disease were reported in Massachusetts.

Don't worry. The Tower of London has housed some famous prisoners through history, but it hasn't been used as a prison since World War II.

Its official name is Her Majesty's Royal Palace and Fortress. The complex of buildings has two rings of defensive walls and a moat.

It has been used as a fortress, royal palace, prison, menagerie, royal mint and armory.

Today, over 2.5 million people visit the Tower each year

On the Kid's list of things to see are the White Tower, the collection of armor and weapons, the medieval palace, the ravens and Traitor's Gate.

The Yeomen Warders, or Beefeaters, are the ceremonial guardians. They give guided tours of the Tower. The Yeomen Warders were founded by King Henry VII in 1485. The Yeomen are retired from the armed forces. They live inside the fortress.

The Crown Jewels are displayed at the Tower of London. The Cullinan I diamond (530.2 carats) and Cullinan II diamond (317.4 carats) were cut from one huge diamond mined in South Africa in 1905.



The Sovereign's Sceptre features the Cullinan I diamond, also called the Star of Africa. It is the world's largest cut white diamond. The Cullinan II diamond is set in the Imperial State Crown.

Peer mentors worth expansion talk

For four years a growing number of West Middle School students have been helping their fellow students with developmental special needs to be more thoroughly involved in the school community. Serving as peer mentors, they've helped go over lessons, break down stereotypes and create a more inclusive school experience.

Now, with 34 West Middle mentors moving to the ninth grade this fall, there's talk of bringing the mentoring program to the high school with them. New principal Chris Lord said the program, called Excel, has him interested and he is talking to the schools advisor for special education about it.

We'd like to offer praise for the students involved in this program for being good students and improving their school; praise to the middle school administrators for fostering this program, and encouragement to the high school leaders, including Lord, for considering its expansion. Often when a new person comes in, the leader talks about listening to the community. But listening only goes so far without strong action to support what's successful and squash what's not. The school year hasn't started yet, but Lord is already getting involved and considering how to make positive change. That's a good early indicator of the type of leader he may be.

As for the Excel program, it seems to be a feel good story - with feel good results - all around.

Stiff fine would hold National Grid accountable

The power outages of last October's freak snowstorm and Tropical Storm Irene are a distant memory for most, but we're glad to see they were not forgotten by Attorney General Martha Coakley's office.

Coakley recently announced that the results of her office's investigation into the electrical utilities' handling of the storms showed, "National Grid's preparation for these storms was inadequate and its response was unacceptable." National Grid acknowledged it failed to meet customer expectations but said Coakley's recommended fine of \$16 million — the largest penalty ever proposed against a utility in Massachusetts — was "extreme." The Department of Public Utilities said it would take Coakley's recommendation under advisement. The penalties, if enacted, cannot be passed on to National Grid customers.

The evidence of National Grid's lackluster preparation for the storm was evident all over the state, including here in Andover, where many were without power for days during and after the October snowstorm, and places such South Church and Memorial Hall Library had to open their doors so people would have a place to shower, eat or remain connected and safe.

British-owned National Grid has been roundly criticized for failing to spend enough on maintenance of its lines, apparently being more interested in earning a comfortable dividend for its investors instead of keeping its customers across the pond satisfied, safe and secure.

Coakley's office found that National Grid officials violated four separate storm response obligations under the company's emergency response plan. They were:

- Failing to communicate effectively with customers and municipalities throughout the two major storms.
- Failing to provide timely damage assessments.
- Failing to properly staff for the two emergency events.
- Failing to respond to public safety calls about downed wires.

"Combined, these two storms left nearly a million National Grid customers without power, some for more than a week," Coakley said.

Meanwhile, it's been noted that National Grid treats itself to rate-payer funded excesses. Some time ago Coakley's office forced the company to take off ratepayers' backs \$1.5 million in outrageous expenses such as the cost of shipping an executive's wine cellar to the U.S. It is time to hold the company responsible.

Longing for restoration of historic facade

Editor, Townsman:

The building on Park Street now owned by the Christ Church since 1972 was once known as the Howell Block ("Thrifty changes: Downtown store gets green facelift," Townsman Business section, July 26).

The late 19th century building was owned by S.E. Walker and sold to Rhoda A. Howell in 1895. When

first constructed the building had three separate storefronts at street level. The windows were large four divided panes of glass to admit as much light as possible and show off the tenant's merchandise. Buchan & Francis furniture company occupied the upper floors for their showroom, warehouse and upholstering business.

When the Barnard Block on Main Street opened in 1911 Buchan & Francis moved their business to No. 12 and remained there until 1930. The Howell Block has held a number of businesses over the years including, John P. West bakery 1926, Franklin Belcourt Barbershop, Ruth Hammond Resort Wear (1948), Andover School of Ballet in the 1960s, realtors and the Andover Gift Shop. The building was sold in 1947 to Vincent Treanor who opened the gift house.

Treanor sold his business to the Anderson family in the early 1960s and that is when the pseudo colonial facade was added. It was a popular trend along Main Street as owners and merchants abandoned original architectural features in an effort to upgrade the look of a tired downtown. Fortunately the trend now is to restore buildings back to their original look. The revival of the Haverhill downtown is an excellent example of what can be done with buildings of the same period as the Howell Block.

I'm afraid I don't share the enthusiasm for the recent Thrift Shop renovations. The new windows will continue to conceal rather than reveal their merchandise. I think a golden opportunity was missed to restore the building facade, most likely for less money, and increase foot traffic into the store. It may look fresh and clean but it is a miss for me.

Abolitionism in Andover

Last week's story focused on New England slavery and the free black community in Andover. This week we'll focus on the anti-slavery movement.

Although slavery had been abolished in Massachusetts in 1783, the practice continued on in the Southern states for decades, creating tension between the states that would last through the Civil War.

The Fugitive Slave Law was passed in 1793, stating that "No Person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due."

Cotton became a major cash crop following the invention of the cotton gin in 1793. The practice of slavery grew to support the industry and by 1830 there were an estimated 2 million slaves in America.

Between 1830 and 1860, slavery was the most

significant national issue, due in part to western expansion and controversy over which states would be free and which slave states. Free states fought against the admission of new slave states into the union, while slave states held to their position.

Tensions increased after the Compromise of 1850 that brought California into the union as a free state.

In return for California's free state status, Congress strengthened the Fugitive Slave Act of 1793. By this Act, the federal government was now empowered to prosecute any black or white person who assisted runaways. The stiff penalty of six months in prison and a \$1,000 fine enforced the law. Any white person had the right to challenge a black person not in the company of a white man. Federal agents had permission to pursue slaves into free states and apprehend suspected fugitives, even though they had been living free for years. Even ex-slaves who purchased their freedom were at risk.

Like so many stories from history, the story of anti-slavery, Abolitionism and the Underground Railroad is messy. Some abolitionists advocated for equal rights for African Americans, while others contended that freedom was desired as long as people of color "kept their place." Some actively supported the Underground Railroad movement, while others supported the movement

financially. Given that participation in the Underground Railroad was an act of civil disobedience that required a significant risk of prosecution, it's not surprising that many mainstream sympathizers found other ways to help the movement.

Andover was home to abolitionists and Underground Railroad activists. Many supported the movement without being active in the Underground Railroad by bringing anti-slavery speakers to town. In 1835, the fiery abolitionist George Thompson was invited to speak in Andover, but was refused podiums at the Seminary and South Church. He eventually delivered his two hour speech at the Methodist Church where an angry mob rushed the pulpit. Students formed a flank around Thompson and maintained a watch throughout the night to protect him.

Others joined anti-slavery societies and groups. West Parish Anti-Slavery Society was founded in 1837. As an auxiliary of the Massachusetts Anti-slavery Society, its objective was the immediate and entire emancipation of the oppressed. The Society collected money to support abolitionist writers and lecturers, sent delegates to conferences, and raised fund for clothing and resettlement needs for fugitives in Canada.

Andoverites also participated in the New England Emigrant Aid Society, formed to send settlers to the territory of Kansas in

Supplemental Chapter 70 aid: what is there to mull over?

Editor, Townsman:

When I read last week's Townsman story about the supplemental Chapter 70 school aid coming to Andover, I asked myself, "What is there to mull over?"

After five or more years of significant budget hits to our schools, it's time to recover and restore. The state senate has made good on its commitment to restore school aid to communities like Andover that have weathered a disproportionate reduction in school aid during the recent economic downturn.

By using the Chapter 70 authority, it is clear to me that the senate intention was to restore our public schools, not to spread the wealth around. Reviewing school budget proposals from prior years, I found the list of school department deficiencies to be as long as my arm. Just looking back one year, there were very real losses in special education, guidance, foreign languages, mathematics, and AP course offerings at the high school.

I do not understand why the School Committee does not have a priority list of critical funding needs ready to go before the public for discussion and debate. I do not understand why, after so many years of substantial cuts to our public schools, the Board of Selectman and the Finance Committee are considering taking no action on appropriating local aid that is clearly intended for the public schools. For what reason? To improve the town's bottom line by a whisker?

How many more years of painful budget cuts can our schools absorb before the high quality reputation we all cherish so highly becomes more veneer than substance? We simply cannot wait for the results of the ongoing Andover school re-accreditation study to be made public before we begin the process of recovery and restoration.

The action needed here is a no-brainer: discuss and debate the needed funding priorities for our schools as soon as possible, call a Special Town Meeting, and appropriate the supplemental Chapter 70 funds. The vote to approve the additional funds will not cost the Andover taxpayer an extra penny.

It's time to stop mulling over and high time to take action now for our children and our schools.

Bancroft: Dragon's Lair gone, new entrance road paved

The town has completed

paving work for an extension of West Knoll Road that will serve as the new entrance to

Bancroft Elementary School this year. The extension, which was

a point of contention for the Bancroft Elementary School construction project for several years, will serve as the only means of accessing the school starting Aug. 20, according to Maria Maggio, Plant & Facilities. As of this week, all that remains for the road construction is installing sidewalks and curbing.

In front of the school, pavement once used for parking and play have been reduced to piles of moved earth. The school's beloved Dragon's Lair playground has been demolished, and space for three soccer fields is now occupied with mountains of dirt and construction trailers.

As it stands, the front access to the school is restricted to construction equipment, though residents have still been using the school's front driveway in recent weeks.

"The only people who should be going on that site are the principal, the administrators and the custodians for the school," said Maggio. "We're trying to stop people from going in there, but a lot of people are just driving in."

West Middle \$1.1 million construction progressing

Parents dropping their kids off at two Andover schools this fall will find things have changed quite a bit.

A \$1.1 million project to replace all paved areas at West Middle School is moving forward while, two miles away, preparation work is chugging along for a new Bancroft Elementary School (see related story).

The project at West Middle School includes a new access road that wraps around the building, according to Maria Maggio, acting director of Plant and Facilities. The road will provide a means for emergency vehicles to get to any portion of the building, she said. The project will require a reconfiguration of traffic patterns to the school, the details for which will be released in the coming weeks.

The West Middle work, approved by Town Meeting voters earlier this

year, replaces the school's existing parking areas and driveway with new surfaces and upgraded drainage systems.

"The whole front [of the school] is just being redone. New sidewalks, new plantings," said Maggio. "It will be done, probably, sometime in the last week in August."

Next on the list of school parking lots to be overhauled is Doherty Middle School, a project could come before Town Meeting in April. Plans to replace the school's front, side and rear paved areas are estimated to come in at around \$2 million and include parking for a planned Cormier Youth Center behind the school, Maggio said.

Then, in the following year, the town will seek to replace Andover High School's parking areas, according to Maggio.

Native wins national photo-art contest

Malis' work displayed at Florida art center

An Andover native is making a name for himself with his photography.

The Naples Art Association awarded \$5,000 to Washington D.C. photographer Jon Malis, 27, naming him the winner of the second annual Camera USA: National Photography Exhibition and Award 2012. His artwork, Specimen 66, along with 47 additional photographs by artists from across the country is on view through Aug. 10, 2012 at The von Liebig Art Center in Naples, Fla.

The association reported that Juror Bradly Treadaway selected the winner of this exhibition by going with his instinct, praising Malis as a photographer, "who,

instead of filling in the margins of our history books, is choosing to turn the page and help write a new chapter in photography."

Originally from Andover, and a former photography intern at the Andover Townsman, Malis has been living in Washington D.C. since 2003, excluding a year in Columbus, Ohio.

"I first got into photography when I was 6 years old in Andover. I won a camera in the local camera store's summer raffle. It was a little red block of plastic (the kind where you load the film, press a button, wind it up and you have no control over anything else in the equation), but it was enough to get me started. This was right around the time my

father started heavy travel for his job, so in the summers, we'd travel through Europe, and I'd be snapping away," he said. "But I think the seed was planted long before that. My mom, in the early '80s, was the PR/communications director for the Massachusetts Art Council, and before that, the Boston Ballet, so art's something I always grew up with and was exposed to from before I was born.

"I didn't take my first actual photography class until high school, and then I kind of fell in to art classes my freshman year in college - undergrad at The George Washington University - through

a lucky draw of my inability to register for classes in my originally-intended major (international relations and political science), and then by the first semester of my sophomore year I'd declared as a studio art/photography major," according to Malis.

Malis is a member of the adjunct faculty at the American University's school of communication/film and media arts. His prize-winning artwork is part of a larger body of work, reMind, which

was inspired during research for documentary he and a team of American University filmmakers and anthropologists are producing. It is based on scientific specimens of brain tissue produced during the 1900s by Saint Elizabeth's Hospital, a psychiatric hospital operated by the District of Columbia Department of Mental Health. It was the first large-scale, federally run psychiatric hospital in the United States. Malis found glass-plate slides of brain tissue among the stored artifacts at the hospital and felt

the vibrations of a new artistic idea.

"At the time, most of my personal work had to deal with personal investigations into my own memories, and I saw these as a perfect way to start examining the processes of memory and abstract interpretation outside my own personal experiences," Malis said in a release.

Calling himself a "recovering newspaper photojournalist," Malis reports that he works as an artist, filmmaker, cinematographer, sometimes

professor, and commercial/editorial photographer. He owns a digital printing studio, TUBE Studio.

The Naples Art Association, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, was founded in 1954. It says its goal is to educate and promote visual arts in Southwest Florida through classes and exhibitions for adults and children.

Today, the organization includes more than 1,000 members and operates The von Liebig Art Center, located at 585 Park St. in downtown Naples.

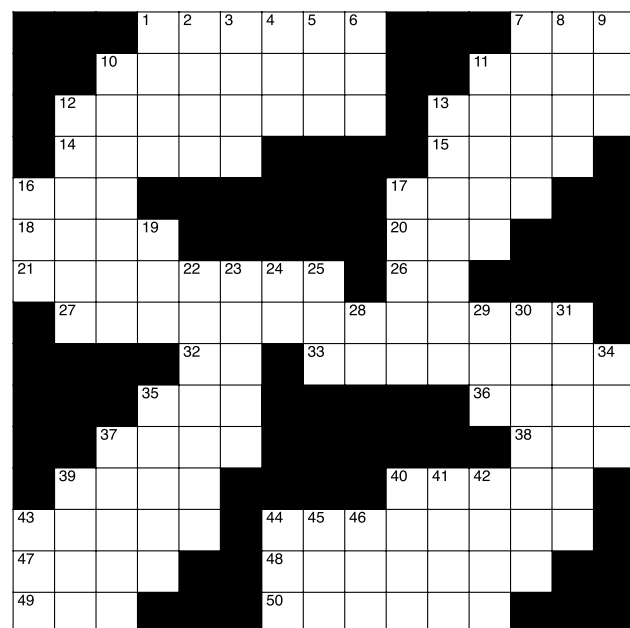

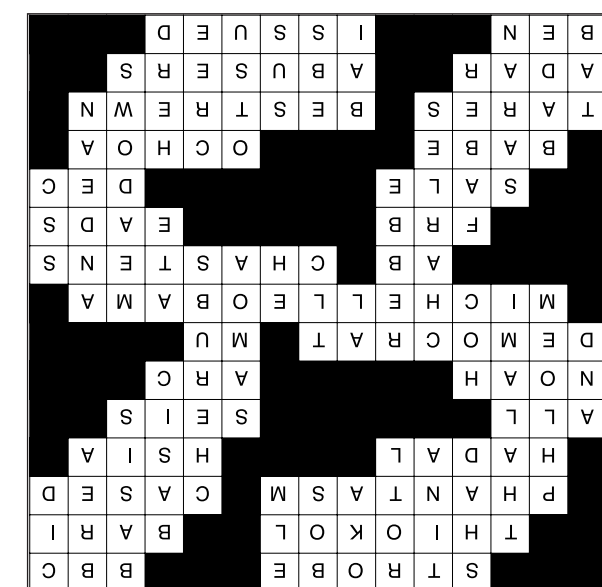

New AD brings student-leadership plan

Takes over one year after hazing incident

After a controversial year marred by a hazing incident involving several members of the boys basketball program, a new athletic director is coming to Andover with a plan to remind team leaders about the important role they hold.

Don Doucette, the athletic director at Hamilton-Wenham Regional High School for the past seven years, has been appointed to replace Athletic Director Chris Bergeron, who announced last month that he was stepping down.

Doucette is known in local sports circles for coaching the University of Massachusetts Lowell basketball team to victory in the NCAA Division II National Championship in 1988. That year, he was also named "National Coach of the Year" by the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

Doucette, 60, said he believes the school has one of the top five Division I athletic programs in the state and is looking forward to starting his new job.

"I am anxious to get started and meet people, student athletes and coaches," he said. "And get everything up and running with the program."

"We are delighted that Don has chosen to take our school to the next level through the athletic lens," said new Andover High Principal Christopher-Lord. "He has a great experience in collegiate and secondary athletics that he brings to Andover. He has terrific social skills and has implemented a student leadership program at Hamilton-Wenham that Andover Warriors can now enjoy."

Lord wrote in a letter announcing the news that one of Doucette's primary

initiatives in the fall will be a student leadership program that has been proven to help team captains understand the important role they play on their teams and for the school. The program will reach out to all of the school's after-school programs, he said.

Doucette will officially start on Aug. 21 with a revised athletic policy approved by the School Committee at the end of June. Some changes include stricter hazing consequences, requirements for teams to perform a community service project and raising the minimum academic standards to a 2.0 grade point average for students to participate in sports.

The School Committee tabled a controversial proposal to ban freshmen from playing on a varsity team except in cases where a

sport has only a varsity team. Sports at Andover High with only varsity teams include golf, skiing and gymnastics.

Doucette agreed that the athletic director position at Andover High can be pressure-packed, but said he is an energetic person ready to take on the challenge. Andover High's athletic program is about three times larger than the one at Hamilton-Wenham, he said.

"It comes with the territory," Doucette said. "I think any time you are on the higher level it just intensifies the drive that people have for the program."

He said he is aware of Andover's hazing incident and is looking to bring new ideas to school to prevent future incidents. One traditional Doucette said he will continue from his seven

years at Hamilton-Wenham is meeting with all the coaches at the start of every season. He plans a larger presentation for all student athletes and their parents to ensure a clear understanding of the MIAA and its role in guiding sports programs across the state.

"It is being proactive," Doucette said. "It provides them with as much information as possible and the consequences of things. It has been very helpful."

Before his time at UMass Lowell, Doucette was the assistant basketball coach at Merrimack College between 1983 and 1985. Doucette has been a head coach and/or athletic director at the University of North Carolina-Asheville, Chaminade University in Hawaii, Central Missouri State University and Newbury-College,

according to a prepared statement from Lord.

Bergeron had been at Andover High for four years and in Salem, N.H., for eight years. He has said he and his wife, Tia, will be moving to South Carolina to be closer to family members, including his parents.

Bergeron, 40, was part of 13 state championships over his four years and had to deal with last summer's hazing incident when two new members of the basketball team were forced to play a humiliating sex game at a summer training camp at Stonehill College in Easton.

"That was a tough time," Bergeron previously said, referring to months of anxiety once he became aware of the hazing incident. "But what occurred is not indicative of the program. We really have so many outstanding student-athletes and coaches. As time goes, you will see more positives coming."

Students as teachers help some Excel

A team of mentors helped seven students with developmental needs succeed--at West Middle School last year. The mentors? They weren't businesspeople or teachers, they were fellow West Middle School students.

Now, a large portion of the students involved in the school's Excel mentoring program are moving on to the high school, and high school administrators are eager to develop an Andover High program tailored to foster a similar mentoring community.

At an "Excel-e-bration" Monday night, some of those involved came together to honor the 73 students who acted as mentors to the seven special needs students in the West Middle program. For as many as the last three years, they've worked together going over lessons, projects and homework, developing a bond that really can only exist in a peer-to-peer relationship, according to Becky Franks, West Middle assistant principal.

"How to be a middle school student is so much more powerfully taught by middle school students than by teachers," said Franks, special education administrator at the school until this year. "It has been incredible. It has impacted our school community in ways bigger than any of us envisioned when we started this program."

In the program, general education students are given additional, brief lessons outside of class time to effectively "train" on upcoming subjects and lessons. Then, during a daily enrichment period - much like a study hall with more of a purpose, Franks said - the students meet with those in the Excel program to help fill in any blanks that exist by way of individualized mentoring.

When the Excel program was started four years ago, around 10 students signed up, according to Franks. This year, 92 students filled out applications. Close to two dozen were turned down due to over-enrollment, Franks said.

Amanda Pascoe, 14, is one of the program's mentors. Now entering the high school, Amanda said the Excel program "has helped Excel kids grow out and branch out, and make so many more friends

than they would if they were alone."

Her younger brother Alec wants to be a mentor as he starts sixth grade this year. Her father, Russ Pascoe, said that the program "helps break down stereotypes that might exist" for students with special needs.

"Back 30 years ago, there wasn't any program like that. These kids got made fun of," said Russ Pascoe. "This program helps both sides understand each other and start working with each other, and find out that everyone has something to contribute."

During Monday's "Excel-e-bration," John Norton - the high school's program advisor for special education - said working through the school's guidance office via community service could open the door for high school students both new and old to become mentors for students on individualized education programs. If anywhere, that's where Excel will continue for those students leaving West Middle this year, he said.

"The students in the Excel program, just for who they are, make the school a better place," said Norton. "We are pursuing it."

Chris Lord, new Andover High principal, also expressed support for the program, saying Excel "will definitely be a part of mine and John's conversations."

For Brendan Fournier, being involved in the program and working with mentors has not only greatly improved his math skills, it has exposed him to a number of new allies in Andover's education system.

"I know pretty much everybody in the whole school," said Brendan, 14. "I've made new friends because of my Excel friends."

"I enjoyed doing it," he added, "every week."

Andover native Finegold remembered for fighting for peace

Joni A. Finegold, 42, a former U.S. Foreign Service officer and an academic studying for a doctorate at George Mason University in Fairfax, Va., died July 26 of non-smoking related lung cancer.



Joni Finegold of Alexandria, Va., lost her battle with cancer on July 26, 2012.

She lived with her husband, Daniel Sachs, and their two daughters, Lillian, 11, and Miriam, 6, in Alexandria, Va. She is the sister of state Sen. Barry Finegold, D-Andover, and of Diana Finegold; and the daughter of Sondra and Michael Finegold of Andover.

At the age of 23 she was accepted to serve in the

United States Department of State in the Foreign Service Division.

She was assigned to a hardship post as a political and economic officer in Bogota, Colombia, during the height of the drug cartels' power in 1995 to 1996, where she traveled to work each day in an armored car. She also served as a consular and political officer in London and Belfast, Northern Ireland from 1992 to 1994 during the violence leading up to the first ceasefire.

"We honor those who fight for the peace but we often forget those whose job it is to keep the peace. Joni was truly honored to serve the United States in this capacity," Sen. Finegold said in a statement.

Most recently, Joni Finegold was an adjunct instructor at the Institute for Conflict Analysis and Resolution at George Mason University, where she was also working toward a doctorate in political and international affairs.

She had attended North Street School in Tewksbury, and South Elementary School and Doherty Junior High School in Andover.

She graduated from Phillips Academy in 1987 and went on to attend Barnard College and then graduated from the London School of Economics, majoring in international relations, in 1991. She received her master's degree in conflict analysis and resolution from George Mason University in 2004. A funeral service will be

held in Virginia. The family will be sitting Shiva on Aug. 1 and 2 from 5 to 8 p.m., one hour earlier than first planned, at the home of Michael and Sondra Finegold, 11 Lavender Hill Lane, Andover.

Memories of a self-made man, Ben Sayles

Ben Sayles, a lifelong Andover resident, died in 2003 at age 81. A self-employed landscaper, he was a

lifelong member of the Merrimack Valley branch of the NAACP, serving on its membership committee. In his later years Ben -- or "Benny" as he was known by many residents -- was often seen downtown collecting cans for recycling and saying hello to people. He is remembered in a letter to him by his friend Bill Dalton.

Dear Ben,

I miss you, not because you were a fixture in town from the 1940s until you died in 2004, but because you were Ben Sayles, a unique, interesting man.

You were one of the first people I remember in my early memories. I was 4 and you were a young man with a landscaping business, and you worked in my parents' yard.

I looked out the window and you were the first black person I ever saw. On that hot summer day with the windows open, I yelled as loud as I could to my mother who was in another room: "Mommy, why does that man have black hands and face." I still laugh about how much my mother was embarrassed by me. She said that everyone in the neighborhood heard me yell, including Mr. Sayles. I'm sure you heard me, but there was nothing about you, in all the 55 years I knew you, that caused me to believe that you were upset or embarrassed by a child's question.

Over the next three or four years, I went outside and watched you work in the yard, and you talked to me and let me help you push the lawnmower. You were easy to like. You worked very hard, and sweat glistened on your face and ran into your clothes. My Dad liked you and was grateful that you could help him. I called you "Mr. Sayles," and even when you asked to be called "Ben" I couldn't do it for you were a man for a child to admire.

The neighborhood kids and I knew when you were coming. Loudly you arrived and departed on a most magnificent, shiny motorcycle, a 1944 Harley, and when you arrived the sound of that machine was powerful, deep, and beautiful, and the sound preceded you by half a mile, oftentimes with dogs chasing you after you. When you left, you'd sit on that bike and stomp on the pedal to start it. Sometimes it took three or four stomps, but when it growled into action it made a sound felt in my deepest insides. You looked good riding that machine: a handsome, proud, strong, young man who ran your own business and was captain of your life.

As years passed, your motorcycle was exchanged for a red pickup that you owned for decades. You had a lot of business and that pickup was seen all over town from early morning into the evening, and it was out there every day of the week. I asked you if you ever took time off and you looked at me like I was from another planet, mumbling something about how good it was to work.

One day in the mid-1980s, I was on Essex Street in Lawrence and saw you ahead of me on the sidewalk. What I saw remained with me forever as one of the most gentle moments I ever observed. You were leading your father down the sidewalk; he was obviously blind, and you had him by the hand and were softly talking to him telling him not to be afraid. There was something so sweet and loving about your voice and the way you were holding his hand that made the moment beautiful.

You and my Dad had great respect for each other. For years, you spent summer evenings in front of his pharmacy and often dropped in to talk with him. You realized, just as we in his family did, that when he was busy filling prescriptions he had no interest in idle talk. But in the evenings things quieted down and you two would talk and you never missed

an opportunity to ask him to join and support the NAACP. He often laughed to his family about how persistent you were, but it was you, Ben, who told me how easy it was to get Dad to join and you laughed about that.

You must have told me a hundred times, "Bill, your father was a great man." You knew how good it made me feel to hear you say that.

People who knew you only as the kindhearted man seen downtown might not have known what kind of man you truly were. The price most of us pay for old age is to retreat or retire from activities, generally becoming more irrelevant to all but close family; but that wasn't your style. When you became too old for your landscaping business you became a picturesque part of downtown. Usually not too far from

where my father's store used to be on the corner of Main and Park Streets, you spent your time talking with people and collecting cans to retrieve the deposit money. I never knew anyone who didn't like you, but those of us who knew you since you were a young man also had deep respect for you. I can close my eyes and see you: the proud, strong man stomping life into that Harley and roaring off up

the street. Ben, you were a real man, totally your own man, unafraid of the world. You were a great man, and I still miss you.

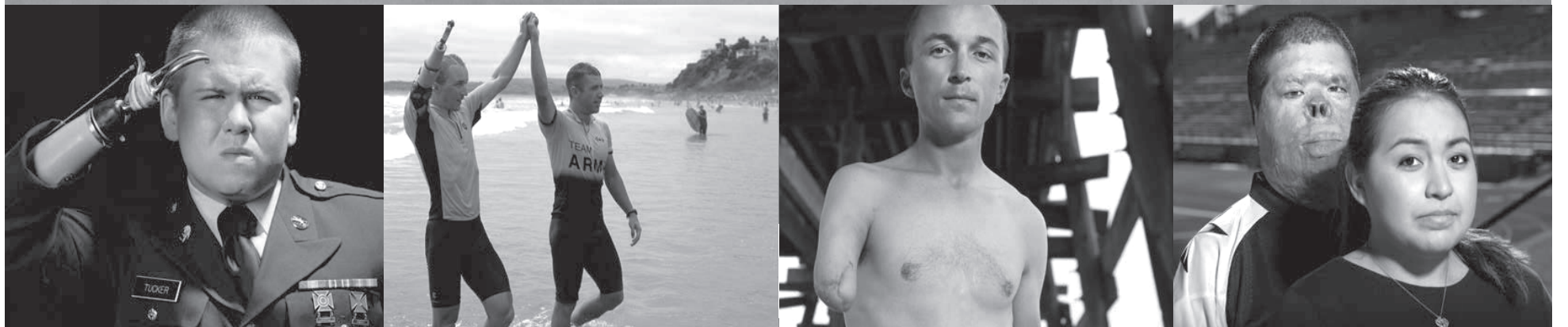

'More than a surprise'

Murphy goes from cut to starring on mound and at plate

Even with all the stats, even after all of the hits and outstanding innings on the mound, Ben Murphy still struggles to grasp this summer.

"Going back to where I was a few years ago," said Murphy. "Going back to getting cut, I really can't picture myself where I am now. It has been one amazing summer."

Cut from the JV baseball team just two years ago, a JV player as a junior and strictly a pitcher for Andover High this season, Murphy has emerged as the top hitter and a go-to pitcher for the Andover Legion team this season.

"He's been more than a surprise," said Post 8 coach Joe Iarrobino. "He wasn't on the club this season, but this year he has done so much. He is willing to do anything asked from him and he wants the baseball."

Heading into the week, Murphy was hitting a team-high .396, while striking out 31 with a 0.35 ERA in 19 2/3 innings on the hill.

"I had a great time during the high school season," said Murphy. "But once I got to the Legion team everything kind of just came together. It has really been great."

Murphy could never have anticipated this emergence in the spring of 2010, when he was cut from the JV team and was encouraged to move on from baseball.

"It was really tough to get cut," he said. "My parents really wanted me to do something else, like join the volleyball team. But I

couldn't see myself going away from baseball."

Instead, he became the manager for the JV team, and continued to work on his skills. A year later, he earned a spot on the JV team, and began to find some success.

But Murphy felt like far from a lock to make the varsity team this spring.

"It was pretty nerve-racking," he said. "I didn't know if I was going to make it coming into the season. But then I had a few good pitching appearances in the preseason and I started to get confident."

"Coach (Dan) Grams called me in for a meeting and told me I had made the team as a pitcher. I was so happy I made it that I didn't care what my role was."

Murphy earned the closer role for the Golden Warriors, appearing in 10 games and notching a pair of saves, including one against rival Central Catholic. He then showed his versatility late in the season, taking over at catcher for the final three games of the season after an injury to regular backstop Brian Ganci.

"I go to a lot of the high school's games and loved how versatile he was," said Iarrobino. "He isn't

overpowering, but he had a good slider and changeup and was willing to play catcher, third base, outfield. He did anything asked of him."

But it was when Legion season arrived that Murphy truly flourished, both as a pitcher and a hitter.

"I was pretty confident I was going to pitch," he said. "But it wasn't until the start that I knew I was going to be able to hit. I was nervous, but soon I got into the swing of things. But I didn't expect this kind of success."

Warriors take 7 on 7 football title

While the journey to Gillette Stadium they are dreaming of takes place a little closer to Christmas, winning a title at the home of the New England Patriots wasn't a bad way to close out the offseason for the Andover football team.

"They had tied it up, then our defense made a great stop," said Scarpa. "We had 10 seconds left, and I called

for a play where Cam and Will are together and just take off. Cam used his speed to get open and I just let it go. I knew Cam would go get it."

Andover then finished off the title with a 19-6 win over Reading, helping build confidence with preseason camp just weeks away.

"We've been looking forward to this since the tough Thanksgiving Day (loss)," said Scarpa. "I feel like I know the offense much better this season, and I have better chemistry with guys like Cam and Will. Plus, our defense really looks good. We feel like we are clicking."

Now, with the preseason ending at Gillette, the Golden Warriors have their eyes on another run to Foxboro in the real season.

"I feel like this reignited the flame that burns in everyone's hearts for football," said Ladd. "It was quite a feat to accomplish. Trailing by a run heading into the seventh, Tom Palleschi and Dustin Hunt led a three-run, seventh-inning rally to give Andover a 5-3 victory over Methuen and a postseason berth on the final day of the regular season last Thursday.

Through Sunday he led Post 8 with a .396 average (21 for 53) and had struck out the fewest of any hitter in the order, batting first lower in the order before moving to the No. 2 spot and playing outfield, DH and serving as backup catcher.

On the mound, he had allowed just five hits and walked only five in 19 2/3 innings, while striking out a whopping 31. He had not pitched for the last two weeks because of a hip pointer.

"I know I'm not an overpowering pitcher," said the 5-foot-11, 150-pounder. "I throw a fastball in the low

80's, a slider and a curve. I throw a lot of strike, and I release the ball from behind my head so it is hard for batters to pick up."

But his most memorable outing was his 9 2/3 inning relief outing in which he retired 28 of the 30 batters he faced and struck out 16.

"We definitely were not

expecting this from him," said Iarrobino. "But he has been unbelievable. He is a great team player, a great contact hitter and wants to be out there. If he gets stronger, he can be a very good college player."

Murphy will next refine his skills in a postgrad year at the Pomfret School, and
