## Lord takes reins

Before a 9:30 meeting on a recent morning, new Andover High principal Christopher Lord has already been to 10 classrooms. Building connections with teachers and students - "getting everyone pulling in the same direction" - is Job One.

As Lord begins his first school year, seniors are looking at their third principal during their high school years. Teachers are recovering from a bitter contract negotiation that damaged the union's reputation with some parents. Lord doesn't shy away from the elephant in the room.

"This [high school] community needs a positive series of events. They're so down," he said. "There's certainly a lack of trust in the community. It's building, it's getting better. I think the summer was a good time for people to heal."

Lord spent the summer months meeting

## Storyteller pitches idea, gets hit at business competition

Professional storyteller Nicolette Nordin Heavey of Andover was the fan favorite at a recent advertising pitch contest hosted by a group of businesses.

Her explanation of her literacy program - she performs stories for kids on the street - proved just as popular with businessmen and women as it has with parents and their children.

Heavey spent the summer pursuing her program, "Stories in the Streets," at community gathering spots in Lawrence,

including its farmers' market and a playground at North Common. Armed with a colorful rolling cart of books, she performs stories for underserved families and gives a free picture book to every child who listens.

It's long been a dream of this Smith College graduate, married mother of three and former Andona Society member, to perform stories and give away books to children.

"I just have a talent to communicate with children," she said. "Andona is about giving back and I very much believe in that."

It's certainly not a lucrative

career, but a storyteller's life has other, non-financial rewards.

"It's the hugs and smiles from kids," Heavey said. "The real life stuff, that's what is priceless."

Maureen Pasek of Greater Lawrence Community Action Council, which has awarded Heavey a children's literacy grant, said Heavey is phenomenal.

"She's so animated and engages kids so well, even with the simplest of books," Pasek said. "She's like the Pied Piper. Kids just love what she does."

Two weeks ago, Heavey pitched her "Stories in the

Streets" idea to the Merrimack Valley Sandbox group, a community-wide initiative supporting entrepreneurship, based at the University of Massachusetts Lowell. Up against start-up companies, including a company that turns old athletic shirts into bedding, she placed second and was also selected as the fan favorite. Heavey was awarded a total of \$1,250. She will compete again for a bigger financial prize next month.

Successfully pitching her idea to an audience of 100 business people was not a bit intimidating for Heavey, who

## Barbecue shows AHS ahead of curve on healthy food

Less sodium and more fruits and vegetables is now a national rallying cry for healthier school lunches. It's old news in Andover, as a healthier lunch menu at its high school has been mandated for years.

Even teens grabbing a slice of pizza in the cafeteria are not loading up on sodium. It's a whole wheat pizza being served and a fruit cup and a salad always goes with it for the \$3.10 price.

"We've been serving pizza that way for three years," said Gail Koutroubas, Food Services Director. "The new regulations are not that drastic for us. Our kids have gotten used to our healthier school menu. We've been reducing sodium and serving fruits and vegetables for years. We trained our kids well."

Guidelines approved by the USDA earlier this year set limits on calories and salt and also phase in whole

grains. Schools must now offer at least one vegetable or fruit per meal, in accordance with the new USDA rule.

Last Wednesday, Sept. 19, Koutroubas and staffers hosted a community-wide barbecue to highlight good eating habits. Andover High School's "Farm to School Week" barbecue event highlighted local fruits and vegetables on the menu. Several School Committee members and select members attended, along with Superintendent of Schools Marinel McGrath.

Koutroubas said local produce was eaten - very local, in fact, as tomatoes and lettuce from the Andover High sustainable garden were served.

Local farm produce, including corn-on-the-cob,

peaches and various vegetables, also was served with the veggie burgers and apple cider. Participating farms included Donabedian Farm of Salem, N.H. and Lookout Farm.

"It was just a great way for us to show the community what we are doing. It was awesome," Koutroubas said.

Andover School Nutrition

was recently recognized as a winner of the U.S. Healthier School Challenge at its three middle schools.

As reported in last year's Back to School guide in the Townsman, Sen. John Kerry proclaimed Andover's school nutrition as a "model for the whole nation," said Koutroubas, the past president of the School Nutrition Association.

The Boston-based television show, Chronicle, filmed the sustainable garden this week for an upcoming show, Koutroubas said. It was not announced when

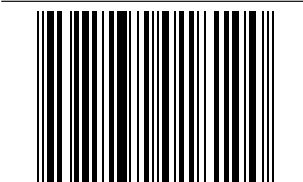

that segment will be aired. The AHS green team has also made sure the school stays healthy with recycling issues. Styrofoam trays have been replaced with biodegradable trays throughout town schools after the Green Team requested it.

"We are working hand-in-hand with the town and reminding our kids about the importance of recycling," Koutroubas

said.

Those biodegradable trays are being collected for recycling, said Sandy Gerraughty, Public Works business manager.

"Our plan is to start with the high school and then roll out a successful way to collect those trays in every school...It's costly and no one has this in their budget, so it's slow now," Gerraughty said. "But it will be slow, smart and then about the importance of recycling," Koutroubas

parents, students and teachers. Before the first day of classes he had spoken with 50 or 100 kids. He spent a morning with some of them cleaning Lovely Field, the football field, establishing ownership of the school. He had a two-hour meeting just with members of student government and their advisor, teachers union President Kerry Costello.

In his first few weeks, there have been visible changes at the school.

He mentions a few times the amount of new paint on the walls. "Covering the walls with 90 gallons of paint, that's a lot of positive feeling - it looks different," he said.

But any lingering bitterness over contact battles cannot be covered over so quickly.

"I feel as though we're during the Reconstruction Period after the Civil War. The South lost, you know. There's pros and cons about the South losing the war," he said. "I hope that in time we'll illustrate to the world that the way the Civil War ended was the right thing for the United States at the time, and I'm hoping that based on what happened here the last couple of years that this is the right thing to do for this community. I believe it is. I'll do anything I can to help support this transition and this reconstruction."

At his former school, Shea High School in Pawtucket, R.I. teachers used a 3-3 block, meaning they taught three classes each semester. This is the schedule that was at the heart of the contract disagreement between the School Committee and many union leaders

at the high school.

"I want to help the staff find the success that you can have in this kind of structure," he said. "Everybody says they want to move forward. They want to be positive, they want to be constructive...I'm trying to help them make it happen. They want to put it behind them."

### GOALS: BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS AND ESTABLISHING A PLAN

Lord has started the Warrior Word, a Friday email to build school spirit; he established a master calendar that will show everything that's going on in the school, so people can be learn about interesting events. He believes the school is more secure this year, with all doors locked during the school day, monitors in the halls, and a police officer in the school connecting with students.

Lord said he and a new assistant principal plan to attend every sport and club at least once this year.

"I don't think there's any one magic bullet. It's a series of things. It's listening to people," he said. "Part of that is their therapy

"Going forward, it's bringing an attitude to the school," said Lord. "I can't control perception. However if I'm consistent with being as candid and upfront about my desire to be there for people, to support the teachers, to support the kids, to support the parents, to make this a really special school that people can feel good about, people can be proud of, that's what I'm going to do. I'm going to be delivering that constantly over time. I'm hoping that will

build the he socio-emotional capacity that people can draw on to do great things."

He acknowledges that improving morale is a goal that is hard to measure. But he doesn't shy away from using numbers to judge his effectiveness. He believes AP and MCAS test scores and the number of kids involved in after school activities will increase as the positive feeling in the school grows.

"I got this plaque that we're in the top 50 [Mass. high schools]," he said. "That's nice, but this school can be more than that. And when [we] want to be, then we will be."

He talks about listening, but has ideas of his own, such as creating academies within the school for students interested in specific fields. In Andover, students interested in environmental science might visit scientists at Andover companies once a week to apply what they learn in class to the real world.

"If people want to get behind that, let's go," he said.

### ACCREDITATION

Lord expects Andover to take criticism as part of the reaccreditation process this year. He believes Andover High will be told it needs to move toward standards-based reporting and toward creating teacher advisories.

This will mean creating a new report card, one that still gives students As, Bs and Cs, but also provides additional information, showing people how well students are doing at reaching specific, identified skills. Lord said this may be one of the reasons he was

hired, because he has this type of augmented report card at his former high school in Rhode Island.

"An A in three different classes can mean two, three different things. This (new approach) kind of gets everyone aligned," he said.

If created, the advisories would connect each student with a teacher-advisor who will stick with them throughout their high school years. They could create an Individualized Learning Plan for each student "to make their dreams come true," he said. But first Lord must get buy-in, and find time within the school day for students to meet with teacher advisors.

"There's things associated with the teachers' contract and extra preps, but it's the best way to run high schools. Nationwide, there's all kinds of evidence about establishing advisories for high schools and personalizing the learning environment-getting kids known by an adult at a ratio of 10 to 15 kids to 1 [teacher]."

"At my former school we did performance-based diplomas, so their advisor would help them build their portfolio of work. They had to show 26 pieces by the time they graduated. To a panel of judges, they had to present their work, like defending a dissertation, or your thesis," Lord said. "I would love for Andover to jump into that...If people want to start the conversation, and they think performance-based diplomas that would complement the MCAS results for a graduation requirement would be of value, I could help set that up."

calls herself "pretty competitive." The audience voted on their favorite pitch from their seats and votes were tallied on a big screen at the event, held at Chester's at the Bell Tower in Lawrence.

Heavey will use her winnings to run a summer camp in Lawrence for students who

want to be storytellers. She expects a dozen kids to take part.

"It's an art form," she said of storytelling, and it's a passion she has pursued through performance for the past 10 years.

Heavey, who has a business and marketing background and lived in Belgium and London before attending college in the United States, is hoping to get grants so her "Stories in the Streets" program can grow. Lawrence is her pilot site. She has also performed in Lynn.

*Heavey will use her winnings to run a summer camp in Lawrence for students who want to be storytellers.*

The Greater Lawrence Community Action Council is hoping to give her more grant money from the federal grant program, Race to the Top, which is promoting literacy development across the country.

"I've been so well-received in Lawrence and I want to keep Stories in the Streets going," Heavey said. "The program meets a critical literacy need in Lawrence, where about 60 percent of third-graders are reading below grade level."

Competing for \$10,000 in the Sandbox final pitch contest next month is Heavey's next step. That money would certainly help her literacy program grow. Contestants have just one minute each to pitch their new businesses.

"I had two and a half minutes before, so I'm just editing," she said. "I'll do it."

## Gov. Dukakis to visit NECC's Haverhill campus

On Friday, Oct. 5, Governor Michael Dukakis will visit Northern Essex Community College's Haverhill Campus to share his experiences as the Democratic nominee for president in 1988 and his thoughts on the importance of voting and civic engagement.

Free and open to the public, Dukakis's presentation will be held from 10 to 11:30 a.m. in the Technology Center, Room 103 A/B, 100 Elliott St., Haverhill.

The college's Contemporary Affairs Club will host a voter registration drive in conjunction with the presentation and Northern Essex Professor and Andover resident Richard Padova will display political campaign memorabilia from his collection.

Born in Brookline, Dukakis served four terms in the Massachusetts legislature, beginning in 1962. In 1970,

he was the Massachusetts Democratic Party's nominee for Lieutenant Governor and the running mate of Boston Mayor Kevin White in the year's gubernatorial race which they lost to Republican Frank Sargent and Donald Dwight.

Dukakis won his party's nomination for Governor in 1974 and beat Sargent. He inherited a record deficit and record high unemployment and is generally credited with digging Massachusetts out of one of its worst financial and economic crises in history.

But the effort took its toll, and Dukakis was defeated in the Democratic primary in 1978 by Edward King. Dukakis came back to defeat King in 1982 and was re-elected to an unprecedented third four-year term in 1986 by one of the largest margins in history. In 1986, his colleagues in the National

Governors' Association voted him the most effective governor in the nation.

Dukakis won the Democratic nomination for the presidency of the United States in 1988 but was defeated by George Bush and soon thereafter announced that he would not be a candidate for re-election as governor. He left office in January 1991.

Dukakis is a professor of political science at Northeastern University and a visiting professor at the School of Public Policy at UCLA. His research has focused on national health care policy reform and the lessons that national policy makers can learn from state reform efforts.

Dukakis was nominated by President Clinton for a five year-term as a member of the new Board of Directors of Amtrak, the National Railroad

Passenger Corporation, on May 21, 1998, and was confirmed by the Senate on June 25, 1998. He currently holds the position of vice-chairman of the Amtrak Reform Board.

## New organ to be heard at Christ Church

On Saturday, Sept. 29, Christ Church will kick off the inaugural series of music performances featuring the new organ built by the Gloucester firm C. B. Fisk, Inc. The organ will be heard in demonstration and in recital. The church said in a release that "the experience for the listener will be like seeing how a book is made and then hearing an interpretation of great masterpieces from that book."

At 5 p.m. David Pike and Greg Bover of C.B. Fisk, will discuss and illustrate the range of sounds the new organ has been designed to produce. "Questions of how an organ works, how it is built, how it produces the range of soft woodwind flutes to triumphal reed trumpets will be answered. This will be a chance not often offered and not to be missed," according to the church.

Following a short break, at 7 p.m. Barbara Bruns, organist of Christ Church, will be heard in recital on the new organ. Bruns has performed in recital for the American Guild of Organists' conventions, can be heard on recordings, and is pianist and organist for The Boston Cecilia. Her thoughts on the literature for organ have been consulted in the design of Fisk Opus 137.

Barbara Bruns has chosen a program for the inaugural recital that displays French, German and Italian works and two masterpieces of J.S. Bach.

Doors will open at 5:15 for the organ talk and demonstration. After a brief intermission, seating for the recital will begin at 6:30.

The events are open to all. Tickets are not required. A donation is suggested of \$15 per adult, \$10 for seniors and students, to benefit the music series and organ fund at Christ Church.

## Injured cyclist still in ICU

Cyclist Roger Smith, 66, of Wildwood Road, remains in the intensive care unit at Brigham & Women's Hospital in Boston. Smith was thrown from his bike in an accident Sept. 2 (Townsman, Sept. 6) in Ipswich.

Friend and neighbor Ken Shapiro of Andover, who was cycling with Smith and witnessed the accident, saw Smith last Saturday.

"A group of us visited him. We brought music and talked to him...his eyes were shut... he doesn't talk," Shapiro said. "He is breathing on his

own. He has a very long road ahead of him."

Ipswich police reported the accident happened on Topsfield Road at 8 a.m. on Sunday, Sept. 2. Smith was medflighted from the grounds of the former Cable Hospital in Ipswich to Brigham and Women's Hospital. ## Merrimack to expand Volpe Athletic Center

"While my Merrimack career is coming to an end, it's exciting to see the hard work that countless student-athletes, coaches, staff, and alumni have put in is paying off," stated Katie Ganser of the women's basketball team. "I'm jealous I won't be able to experience the new and improved Volpe Athletic Center as a student but I can't wait to see it as an alum and to see our women's basketball team play inside Lawler Arena one day."

The expansion will result in a second full-sized ice

rink, a 5,000 square foot Center for Sports Medicine, a 3,500 square-foot athletic training facility, additional locker rooms and offices, and what is described as a new state-of-the-art varsity weight room.

"With Sports Medicine and Athletic Training among the fastest growing programs within Merrimack, students and faculty will be provided with unique opportunities to combine classroom work with internships and practicum courses for gaining clinical experience," the school said in a release. "Expansion of the Sports Medicine facilities will provide one-of-a-kind opportunities to expand public-private partnerships while also providing professional services related to improving health, wellness, and performance for athletes and non-athletes of all ages and abilities."

"This project is a rink, a training facility, a sports medicine facility, locker rooms and other athletic facilities, but more importantly it is the foundation for which we begin our ascent to Division I," said Hopey. "And more importantly still, it is the moment where our values, our resources and our energy clearly state that men's and women's athletics are equal at Merrimack College."

Merrimack will add four luxury suites in Lawler Arena, a new lobby and ticket office, a Merrimack Hall of Fame display and additional concession facilities. The new Volpe Athletic Center will become the new home for the campus bookstore.

# ARRESTS: Part of recent national investigation, crackdown

investigation. Thomas' arrest last Thursday, Sept. 20 came a week after the high profile arrest of pediatrician Richard Keller, of Cyr Circle. The only connection between the men seems to be that they allegedly ordered videos from the same company.

Thomas was expected to have a detention hearing late Wednesday morning, after Townsman deadline, to determine if he will seek and be granted bail.

An affidavit states that Thomas made 15 separate orders between August 2005 and March 2011, purchasing 18 separate titles at a cost of more than \$600.

The affidavit made specific mention of a March 25, 2011 order for "Raw Rewind Vol. 2," a two disc DVD

costing \$27.90. The video included boys under 18 naked in the shower, at an indoor pool and in a sauna, and engaged in "sexually explicit conduct."

The DVD set was found under Thomas' mattress, according to documents.

During the search of Thomas' Andover home, law enforcement officials seized approximately 200 CDs and DVDs from a bedroom, and "multiple items of computer media."

The affidavit created the day that Keller's Andover home was raided said that federal agents removed more than 500 high-glass images and at least 60 to 100 DVDs of child pornography from Keller's home.

Neighbors said that agents were at his home from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m.

"There was certainly more evidence seized during the course of the search," than the 500 images and 60 to 100 DVDs, said Christina DiIorio-Sterling, spokeswoman for the U.S. Attorney.

Keller had been working as a pediatric endocrinologist at Boston Children's Hospital, as a pediatrics instructor at Harvard Medical School, and at two overnight camps.

He had moved to Cyr Circle, near Andover High School and West Middle School, after spending 19 years on the Phillips Academy campus as medical

director of the private school's student health center. Phillips Academy did not renew his contract in 2011.

With Keller's arrest, the U.S. Attorney's Office made public a phone line for people to call if they have information related to his case. Sterling said the U.S. Attorney's Office has received calls.

"Victim information is private. I can tell you we have received calls, but I can't tell you the nature of those calls," said Sterling. "The federal government does not have a statute for sexual assaults. If there

were any alleged misconduct, [the U.S. Attorney] would work with the local district attorney's office."

Andover police Chief Brian Pattullo said no one has approached his department since Keller's arrest to allege inappropriate behavior by Keller.

"We've never been asked to look at anything criminal involving Dr. Keller to date. We've had no requests from the academy," said Pattullo this week.

Pattullo said Andover police are not aware of any previous criminal charges against either Keller or Thomas.

Last Friday, Keller waived his right to a detention hearing, for now choosing to forego bail and remain in prison.

In a detention hearing, the U.S. Attorney makes public evidence it has that the government believes would prove a defendant is a danger to society.

The U.S. Attorney's Office must indict Keller and Thomas within 30 days of their arrests.

Both Keller and Thomas were in the custody of U.S. Marshalls within a Massachusetts prison as of press time early Wednesday morning.

## BETTER THAN EVER

### Deloury's recovery a key to football success

ANDOVER — Andrew Deloury knew it was his swan song for the season.

The Andover defensive back knew, in a matter of days, he would be on an operating table undergoing major foot surgery. He knew his football season was over, and that his career on the gridiron may be done.

So he wanted to do something special.

"I really wanted to go out with a bang," he said of the game last fall. "Because I didn't know when I was going to be on the football field again."

He certainly made a splash last October — just days before his surgery — when he picked off a pair of passes and ran one back for a touchdown against Methuen.

But his career was far from over.

Nearly 11 months after his surgery, Deloury is back on the field this season, which he opened by intercepted two more passes and grabbed two touchdown passes in the Golden Warriors' season-opening win, and has been a star ever since.

"Having to miss most of last season hurt him a lot," said quarterback C.J. Scarpa. "It was rough. So to see him bounce back like that is just great. He is a great player."

At 6-foot-2 and 186 pounds — massive by high school cornerback standards — Deloury looked the picture of health last season. Deloury

had stepped into the role of shutdown corner for the Golden Warriors a season ago.

So few would have guessed he had been dealing with a major foot problem since birth.

"I was born with fused

bones in my left foot," said Deloury, a three-year starter.

"My bone was fused from my ankle to my toe. As I got bigger it hurt more and more. It hurt during my sophomore season, but I played through it. By football last year, after games I couldn't walk for two

days. It got to the point I had to have surgery."

Despite hoping to delay the surgery until football season was over, after much discussion with his family, teammates and coaches, Deloury made the decision to go under the knife in late

### Scarpa, Flaherty key huge victory

METHUEN — Maybe it's the height, listed at a generous 5-foot-9.

Maybe it's the undeniably young face, or the soft spoken demeanor.

For some reason, opposing fans — and a few players — continue to underestimate Andover quarterback C.J. Scarpa despite his gaudy numbers, as shown by one Methuen fan midway through Friday night's game.

"Wow," the fan commented after a 40-yard bomb. "That quarterback is small but he throws a great ball."

Scarpa continued to build his case as the state's top quarterback with another dynamic performance Friday night, throwing for 228 yards and three touchdowns and rushing for another score in just over two quarters of play as Andover rolled over Methuen 34-0.

"Hey, that's why we call him C.J. 'Golden Arm' Scarpa," said linebacker Mark Zavrl with a laugh. "The scoreboard shows what he has done."

Through just three games this season, Scarpa has now thrown for 801 yards and 11 touchdowns, just eight short of his 19 that led the area last season, and nearly halfway to the modern area record (23).

"There have been a few times I've looked at the stats (and said wow)," said Scarpa. "I try not to. I know people look at my size and think it's a disadvantage. But it doesn't matter to me. I just play."

The Golden Warriors' faced-paced, wide-open spread offense is one that

demands a quarterback who can handle the pressure both physically and mentally, and Scarpa fits that bill perfectly, triggering an offense that has scored 127 points through three games.

"He's not the tallest guy, but his arm strength is amazing," said receiver Cam Farnham. "He throws a great ball, but he's also the smartest quarterback around, and we need that."

Scarpa once again struck early last night. In the first quarter, he hit Jack Sylvester for a 70-yard touchdown and, in the second, connected with Will Heikkinen on a 5-yard score.

Finally, with two seconds left in the half, he scrambled for a 2-yard touchdown. He played just one series in the second half, hooking up with Farnham on a 23-yard touchdown, just three plays after an 89-yard score to Farnham was called back for a block in the back.

It was also a huge night for Scarpa's favorite weapons. Heikkinen caught eight passes for 70 yards and a score and Farnham caught five passes for 74 yards and his score.

It was also a breakout day for Sylvester. After missing Week 2 with an ankle injury, the running back caught the long touchdown, and rushed for 110 yards on just 10 carries.

On defense, it was a massive day for linebacker Jake Flaherty, who made a whopping 16 tackles.

Two interceptions, one by Chas Heseltine near the 15 and another at the 5-yard line by freshman Brandon Marti, clinched the Warriors' first shutout of the season.

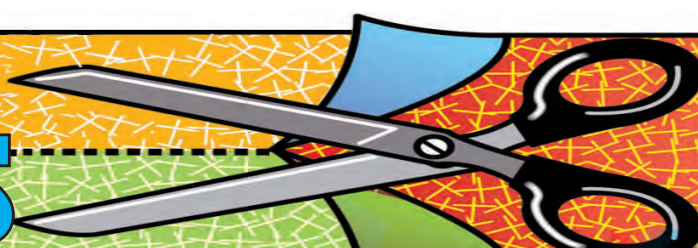

## Super-Couponing Tips

Jill Cataldo saves hundreds on groceries by making the most of the common coupon. You can too. Here's how:

### The Case of the Phantom Coupon

Dear Jill,  
I am growing frustrated with manufacturers that require shoppers to input a fair amount of personal information before we are able to print a coupon. More often than not with manufacturer websites I hand over personal info but then never receive the coupon. Either the print campaign has already ended or there were too many printouts from other users. I understand why manufacturers create limits and of course I understand why they want my valuable demographic information. But I think it is disingenuous for them to say, "Give me your personal information and we'll give you a coupon," then when I live up to my side of the bargain they do not send what they promised. Have you received other complaints? Do you think, like me, that this practice is totally unfair and increasingly common?

Dear Kara,  
Oh, the frustration of having to jump through hoops for coupons! Unfortunately, I have experienced issues similar to the ones this reader describes. Perhaps you have, too. A manufacturer's website advertises a nice, high-value coupon for a product you're interested in, but in order to print it the site requires you to fill out a form and divulge your name, address and other demographics. You sigh, fill out the form and click Submit. Instead of hearing your printer whirr to life and print the coupon you selected, you receive the message, "There are no more prints available in this campaign."  
Why does this happen? There are two likely possibilities. One, the coupon campaign was much more popular than the manufacturer anticipated. You filled out the form to print the coupon somewhere between the time the manufacturer posted it on its website and the time that the number of prints in the campaign ran out. Manufacturers set a print limit for nearly all printable coupons they make available. A manufacturer can specify, say, 10,000 prints in a campaign. When that number of prints has been reached, the campaign automatically ends. However, the manufacturer doesn't automatically take down the web page advertising the coupon.  
The second possibility is that the print campaign for a particular coupon ended long ago, but the manufacturer left the registration form page online. Perhaps the manufacturer removed the link to the coupon's registration page from its homepage, but the page still lives on its server. People using search engines to look for specific coupons can stumble across the registration form, which still efficiently collects data then sends users off to print a coupon that no longer exists. These forms give users the impression that they serve no other purpose than to collect users' names and info without offering a coupon in return.

What's a couponer to do? In her email to me, Kara included more information about her experience. After she was unable to print a coupon for toothpaste, she emailed the manufacturer to let someone know that the "phantom form" was still collecting data and not rewarding users with the promised coupon. Could the manufacturer mail the coupon instead? Here's the response she received:

"We're sorry to learn that you have been experiencing difficulty printing the coupon. Offers expire if the total number of coupons that the manufacturer made available to print has been met. This can be the case with popular items. We have notified our technical support team of the issue. Unfortunately, the coupon offer is not available to be mailed at this time. We value you as our customer and again apologize for any inconvenience you may have experienced."

What an unsatisfying end to this reader's story. Collecting marketing data under the guise of offering a coupon then not delivering does little to inspire consumers to buy the product. I'd advise you to gauge whether it's worth divulging personal information to a company online to print a coupon, and act accordingly.

## Time to replace the NFL replacements

There's no need to go to tape for this one. It's clear that National Football League replacement referees are a bigger bust than Chad Ochocinco in New England.

In just three short weeks, the nation's most popular and financially successful sport has become the subject of both ridicule and outrage. A contract dispute between the league and the referees union has led to a lockout, and replacement refs have been called in to try to keep the games going.

They are clearly not up to the job. At first their mistakes were an annoying sideshow. Now they are undermining the integrity of the sport and putting players at risk of career-ending injuries as the conduct of games spins out of control.

The latest fiasco came Monday night, when an apparent end zone interception by the Green Bay Packers was ruled a touchdown for the Seattle Seahawks. If the Packers miss the playoffs by a game, the call will go down in sports history as the reason.

TV analyst and former coach Jon Gruden called the game's conclusion both "tragic" and "comical." The same can now be said about the state of the NFL itself.

The NFL owes its loyal fans a speedy resolution to this ridiculous dispute.

The bad calls, blown calls, and poor judgments by the refs have become so common there are now websites dedicated to documenting every ugly error. Game coverage has devolved into a running commentary on how many mistakes the replacement refs are making. It's now become clear that some games have been lost because of bad refereeing.

It was probably inevitable that our beloved New England Patriots would find themselves at the center of the replacement referee scandal. In the ugly 31-30 loss to Baltimore Sunday night, fans of both teams had much to jeer about. But it was the conduct of Patriots Coach and Phillips Academy alum Bill Belichick became the top story. The usually stoic Belichick blew a fuse at the end of the game, chasing after a hapless replacement ref and grabbing his arm while trying to get his attention. Belichick says he meant no harm and just wanted to know if a questionable field goal was reviewable.

Belichick's frustrations are shared by millions of fans, as well as the players themselves. The players union sent a letter to the NFL last week, pleading with it to settle its differences with the professional refs and bring them back.

Like so much that happens in professional sports, neither side in this conflict should engender heartfelt sympathy from your typical lunchbucket fan. Referees are handsomely compensated for their work, with the most experienced reportedly earning upward of \$300,000 per year. The average salary for a referee is about \$149,000 per year (meanwhile, replacement referees are paid \$3,000 per game, a little more than a third of what the average pro ref earns). The professional referees are fighting to retain something that most working Americans lost long ago: pensions.

On the other side of the dispute are the multimillionaires and billionaires who own the teams, reaping staggering profits from a monopolized sport. Seems like there's plenty of money being made by both sides.

Which side is right? The fans and the players are right. The NFL and refs need to quickly settle their dispute for the sake of a sport that so many people love.

### Retiree: In Romney's eyes, I'm one of the irresponsible

Editor, Townsman:  
Dear Mitt Romney,

As one of the 47 percent who pay no income taxes, I've been reflecting on your remarks about those of us who are "government-dependent." And the more I think about your comments, the more offended I become.

In my case, I regularly paid income taxes (and real estate and sales taxes) every year from 1960, when I graduated from college, until 2010, eight years after I retired. Even after I started collecting social security, I owed (and paid) taxes every year because I consulted for the company from which I retired.

In 2011, for the first time, I decided as I approached the age of 74, that I no longer wanted to consult. Since then, my income includes withdrawals from an investment account for which I have already paid taxes, and some small royalties from three children's books that I have authored. (In this country, authors do not make as much money as rock stars, Hollywood performers, professional athletes, or Wall Street traders.)

So I guess I am one of those government dependents who, according to you, refuse to take responsibility for myself. Yet somehow, despite my lack of responsibility, my wife and I have managed to raise a family of six children, all now adults. Four of them are gainfully employed in responsible careers, and regularly pay taxes. Two of my children, I must admit, are "government dependents," in that their income comes directly from tax dollars. One is a high school social studies teacher, the other is a warrant officer in the Marine Corps who has served two tours in Iraq. It is thanks to them and millions like them, who live on taxpayer dollars, that this country is educated and protected.

I wonder how many of the "dependent" 47 percent are like my wife and me, retired after careers spanning more than 40 years? How many are struggling workers trying to raise a family on a minimum-wage job (or two or three, because one job simply doesn't support a family)? Are some of them the people who work in nursing homes for a pittance taking care of our sick and elderly because we don't consider that a "critical" occupation? How many are mentally ill adults wandering the streets and living under bridges because we've saved taxpayer dollars by closing mental institutions? Or unemployed family men and women desperate to find jobs after Bain Capital sent their former jobs overseas?

No, Mitt, I don't think you can convince me to vote for you. Certainly President Obama has no better than a mediocre record, and in a different election year, would not get my vote. But I'll choose him over you, not because I want or expect the government to support me,



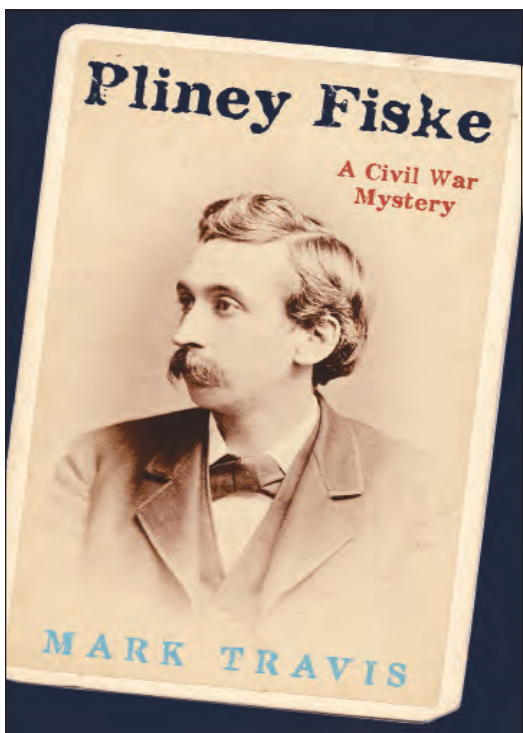

## Andover native writes Civil War mystery

When a newspaperman turns author, chances are the novel will put the reader at the scene quickly and the story will move fast.

Author Mark Travis, an Andover native who is publisher of the Valley News of West Lebanon, N.H., certainly uses that writing approach in his new book. "Pliney Fiske, A Civil War Mystery" (\$14.95) is Travis' self-published book. Travis wastes no time getting the reader hooked as Fiske, an agent helping Civil War veterans get their pensions, is introduced in the novel's opening sentence as "...scrambling out from under a rifle in his face."

True to his newspaper reporting skills, Travis keeps the story pace moving as Fiske meets all sorts of characters while doing his job. Those people and their backgrounds fill these pages and it's a slice of life showing Concord, N.H., circa July 1867.

"I was researching my other book, 'My Brave Boys,' which is nonfiction about the New Hampshire regiment in the war, and an idea came to mind," Travis said. "I was doing research at the National Archives in Washington and came across these pension documents...just fascinating stuff."

"It proved that people truly depended on pensions and there was a lot of pension bureaucracy back then," Travis said.

So, "Pliney Fiske" was born. It's not a true story. Travis said he used historical fragments and added his knowledgeable take on what was happening during the Civil War and after.

"Fiction lets you fill in the gaps," he said. "I hope to reach a different audience than a nonfiction Civil War book might."

One example is the name Pliney Fiske. It's a real name found in Travis' research travels. Fiske was a sign painter from Concord, N.H. Letters by a serving soldier report a feud between the soldier and Fiske, because Fiske did not serve in the war, owed the soldier money and the soldier felt Fiske visited the soldier's wife too often.

"That's the real fragment," Travis said. "That name, Pliney Fiske, just stuck with me."

History has been the author's passion since his kindergarten days at Central School on Bartlett Street (the building that is now Doherty Middle School). He remembers bringing a prized history book to show and tell.

"I still have that book and I still remember that day," he laughed. "I tripped going to class and ruined the corner of the book."

Travis said his love of writing took shape in Andover. He was a regular at Memorial Hall Library and the Andover Bookstore. His family lived on Summer and Elm streets. Travis graduated from Andover High School in 1975.

He wrote his Pliney Fiske manuscript several years ago after completing a Nieman Fellowship at Harvard University in 2003. He landed a New York literary agent, but the manuscript was

100 Years Ago - Sept. 27, 1912

Foundations have been laid on Essex Street for a lunch-room, to be conducted by the present proprietor of the lunch-cart there. A new and up-to-date cart has been purchased and will be built into the cement foundation.

Another old landmark has had to be removed. One of the large elms in the square which has stood guard there for over 80 years was cut down by the authorities Monday.

Mrs. Charles A. Hill is now ready for customers with lines of fall goods at her millinery parlor, 32 Chestnut St. Telephone 65-3.

Monday afternoon, Josephine, the two months' old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Jacobs, died of cholera infantum at her home on Tewksbury Street.

It is understood that Frank E. Gleason is soon to vacate his coal office on the corner of Main and Essex streets, after an occupancy of over twenty years. The new tenants will be the Cross Coal Company, which expects to move into its new quarters about the first of November.

75 Years Ago - Sept. 24, 1937

Andover will go to the polls on Tuesday to participate in the Congressional battle between Edward D. Sirois, Republican of Lawrence, and Lawrence P. Connery, Democrat of Lynn. All six polling places will be open here from noon to 6:30 p.m.

Andover is expected to go overwhelmingly Republican, gaining in strength over last November because of the antagonism here over the Supreme Court and other proposals of the president.

Actions on a suggestion to change the opening school age here to conform to that of all the surrounding towns was postponed to the spring by the School Committee on Monday night at a special session. It was pointed out at the meeting that Andover requires a child to be six years before January first of the school year. Surrounding towns offer other dates.

The story of a dog-owner who neglected to have his dog inoculated in the town's free rabies clinic this year, and who recently had to pay about \$150 for family inoculations in addition to losing the dog was told this week by Franklin H. Stacey of the Board of Health which inoculated some 300 dogs. [Note from compiled: The owner's dog died, and tested positive for rabies. The \$150 covered the daily inoculations over 14 days for the owner's family members.]

The local theater, closed since late spring for extensive alterations, may be ready for occupancy in a month or so.

50 Years Ago - Sept. 27, 1962

In a spectacular early-evening accident Sunday, two men lost their lives, and three others were seriously injured when their car slammed into a tree on Lovejoy Road. The vehicle flipped over on its roof, trapping four of the occupants inside for over a half hour. Only the arrival of a wrecker from the Shawsheen Motor Mart enabled police to get the doors pulled loose. Rene Bellanger, who operated the wrecker, was able to crawl into the car and pry loose the twisted metal that held the occupants. Killed in the crash were the operator of the car, Albert DiNardo, 39, of North Reading, and Alan Finn, 36, also of North Reading.

A capital expenditure program for seven years has been tentatively presented to town officials, which would cost nearly \$9.5 million. The consulting firm of Adams, Howard and Greeley prepared the report for Town Manager Thomas E. Duff, and will further revise the figures before presenting a final recommendation by budget time.

25 Years Ago - Sept. 24, 1987

Veheement objection by the "Ballard View Condominiums" affordable housing developers did nothing to dissuade the Andover Zoning Board of Appeals from pursuing further information on the issues of possible hazardous waste, sewage and on-site culverts. During the course of the third public hearing Tuesday

# Viewing Shawsheen history through lens of a green bottle

The beautiful green bottle pictured on page 15 was discovered in an antique store by Tara Masih, a local editor, writer and former antiques dealer. She found the bottle in a nearby antique store and asked if I could help her discover more information about its history. The bottle says, "Shawsheen Bottling Company, Shawsheen Village, Andover, Mass.," and its volume is stated as "1 pint 10 ounces."

I know Shawsheen Dairy was on Tantalion Road, a now nonexistent road that ran between Haverhill Street and Riverina Road, but the bottle doesn't look like anything a dairy used.

Since Shawsheen Village was called Frye Village until 1919, and the 1920 street directory lists

into existence after 1920. In 1926, there was a Shawsheen Spring Bottling Company in Shawsheen Village, according to the book "Andover, A Century of Change" (Eleanor Motley Richardson, Andover Historical Society, 1995), but no location is given. However, I found a document saying that, in 1932, Shawsheen Bottling Company acquired 11-13 Stevens St., Lawrence, and used that location for manufacturing, selling, and distributing carbonated waters until June 11, 1946, when the property and bottling equipment was sold to Royal Crown. Furthermore, online I found a bottle for sale that resembles our bottle, only it's not green. The seller dates it at 1933, and it has "Shawsheen Bottling Co. Lawrence Mass." on its label, not mentioning either Shawsheen Village or Andover. This would all indicate that our green bottle must have been made in Shawsheen Village between

1921 and 1932. And what was the bottle used for? The fact that the sturdy-looking, reusable bottle advertises itself rather than any contents suggests to me that some folks could have used it in a way to bypass Prohibition. The dates of the bottling company's existence in Shawsheen are within the period of Prohibition, 1920-1933, which outlawed the sale, manufacture or transportation of alcohol, but did not prohibit its private ownership or consumption. Additionally, wine could be made at home, under the legal fiction that it was fruit juice, and books about Prohibition mention that homemade wine and beer was plentiful. Of course, the bottle may have contained more innocent products as well.

This reminds me that 45 years ago I once, only once, made beer in my house; it was kind of an "in" thing to do. I bought bottles, caps, and a press that capped the

bottles and then followed a recipe that was in a popular magazine. After capping, the beer was supposed to sit for a certain time, say three weeks, and was then ready to drink.

Almost three weeks after the bottling, I heard a loud pop, like a .22 caliber rifle, and the source of the noise was one of the three dozen bottles of beer I made. It blew its lid with such violence that I was afraid to touch the other bottles. Within hours, they blew as well, leaving the closet that contained them looking like a scene that deserved a CSI visit. I tasted some of the liquid that didn't explode on the closet's contents and thought it was something only a rummy might consume. Strangely, I kind of liked it.

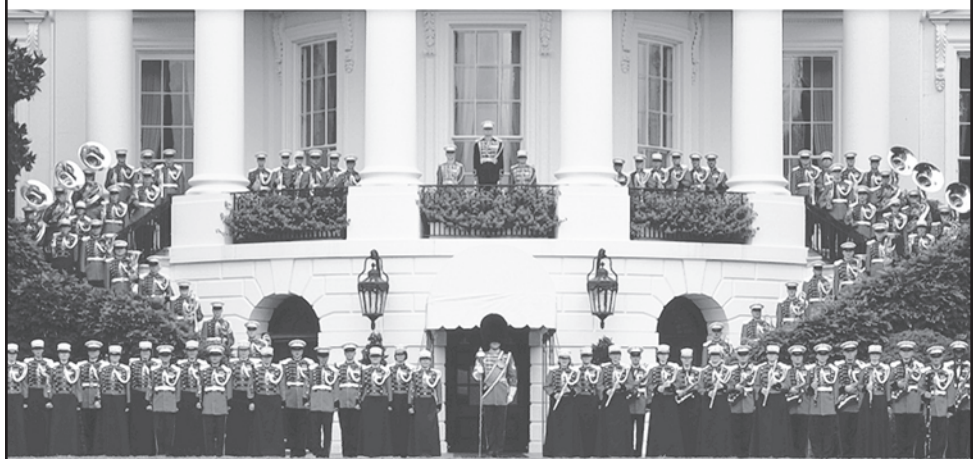

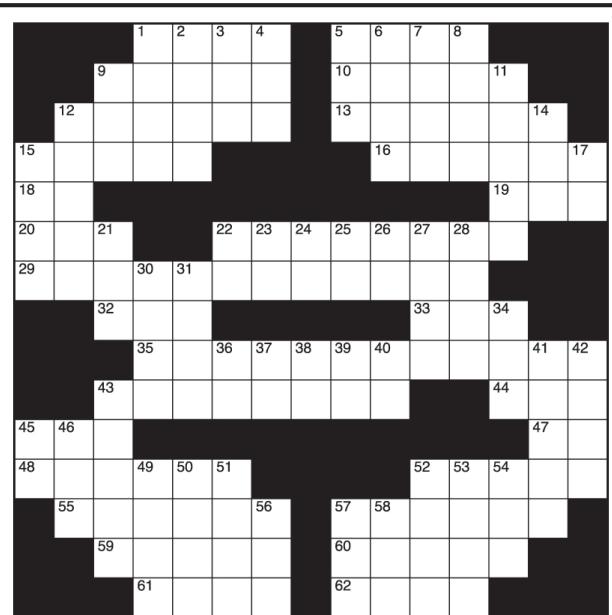
