Voters will be asked to redo **DMS** site with youth center \$2.5 million project

BY DUSTIN LUCA STAFF WRITER

The Cormier Family Youth Center will come up frequently at this year's Annual Town Meeting, with at least three separate votes impacting the project.

A Special Town Meeting within the regular Town Meeting will ask people to divide a town-maintained trust and spend half the money on youth center construction. A separate Annual Town Meeting article has been written to move the building 35 feet to the north. Finally, voters will be redesign all paved surfaces asked to spend \$2.5 million around West Elementary to replace all paved surfaces School. The youth center around Doherty Middle will be built behind Doherty School, a capital improvement request that follows






of the 20th century, including a power plant, according to Ataide. When soil samples were done on the site during the youth center's design phase, officials found fill that a youth center could not be built upon.

Because of that, "the soil has to be removed -[across] the whole footprint of the building," Ataide said.

To comply with Occupational Safety and Health Administration regulations, a sloping section 16 feet long that starts eight feet deep must also be dug out around the building's footprint, according to Ataide.

That digging would cut into the Doherty Middle School's driveways. Additional digging would also cut through the school's driveways to run power, water and sewer service from nearby streets to the youth center, Ataide said.

The plan is to dig in and build the youth center's foundation while the town also replaces the paved areas around the school, according to Chris Huntress, Andover Youth Center Building Committee chairman.

Officials are hoping the \$2.5 million warrant article is approved. They're unsure what would happen if the youth center construction went forward without a process to replace Doherty's paved surfaces set in stone.

They watched as Martinez parked the Durango next to a silver Nissan Maxima with California plates. After some small talk, the trunk of the Maxima opened. "Moments later, surveillance observed Martinez remove what appeared to be a large suitcase and a duffel bag and transfer them to the rear compartment of the Durango," McTeague wrote. Minutes later, McTeague and Troopers Steven Barnes and Stephen Gondella pulled over Martinez on Route 495 and found the large amount of cocaine in the trunk. Judge Mark Sullivan ordered Martinez be brought back to court on May 6 for a probable cause hearing.



Race, dinner send important message

As the final people finished the Run for the Troops road race on Sunday, Andover's Jay French was marveling at the number of people who turned out for the event created by fellow resident Bill Pennington. Back in 2008, French noted, French struggled to pull off a successful dinner to support Homes for Our Troops.

What I love about it is, in a town where we don't have a Homes for Our Troops project, it has dedicated itself to producing one, and supporting Homes for Our Troops," said French.

The Run for the Troops has become a great event, and a great Andover community event. But a real feel for the meaning of the race could be found at the related dinner the Friday before the race, also organized by Pennington.

During the dinner, Debbie Smith, whose husband Joe Smith of North Carolina was the face of the 2011 Run for the Troops in Andover, told the crowd just how much the effort means to injured veterans.

"Joe never had a visitor in the hospital for four years (after he was injured). He thought that nobody cared," she said.

On race day, he and everyone present know just how much people do care. The Smiths look forward to coming to the race and dinner each year.

The support in Andover was clear to Marine Sgt. Josh Bouchard, who was the honoree for the 2012 race.

"In my mind, I still don't expect turnouts like this. I felt like I was alone when I was injured," said Bouchard. "To be able to cook my own food, wash my own clothes is life-changing. I didn't know what I would have done if I hadn't had this house. I'm not just missing a leg, I'm paraplegic."

Contractor A.J. Crane who whipped together Bouchard's house and grounds in a matter of days with the help of many volunteers has also worked on one of TV's Extreme Makeover homes.

"I'd do 10 of these before I'd do another one of those," he said. "I don't know if it's selfish, but it's because Josh did something for me. I can go to the park and play softball and he went over into the desert."

To raise money for Bouchard's home last year, people were given the chance to sign or leave messages on the wood boards that were used to frame the house. The boards and the messages remain within the home. But one board was left over when the project was finished, according to builder Brad Campbell. He swears it was not done on purpose. The piece of lumber says, "From the day you were born, you have always been a hero." The message was from Bouchard's mom and dad.

The workers decided to mount the piece in Bouchard's garage, so that he would see the note whenever he pulled into his home.

A 2x4 board was sitting outside the dinner last Friday for people to sign for Kevin Dubois, who will benefit from this year's race. That little piece of Andover will be mounted in Dubois' garage, which will be built starting May 18. It's something he'll see every time he drives into the home that Andover helped build.

The messages on the lumber are tributes to the sacrifice and bravery of Dubois. And, in a small and different way, that board will be a tribute to the power that a few committed people can have in Andover and other communities, too.

I remember talking to the secret service agent originally from Andover who was blown out of her shoes when the Twin Towers collapsed, the Andover truck company owner who found toys in the rubble, many people standing with candles on the side of roads in town because they wanted to do something. Shortly after the attacks we put out large sheets of paper on which people could write messages. I took those pages to New York and tied them to the fence around Ground Zero, with so many other messages of good will from around the country.

At its core, I hope that is a reflection of what the last 20 years: a kind of community gathering spot in what sometimes feels like an increasingly impersonal world, a place to share ideas and learn about your neighbors. I hope it's also been a fun read, sometimes for its little quirks. I don't think I've been to an Andover party in 20 years when someone hasn't talked to me about the police log, which often includes some unusual incidents. My personal favorite came from a simple animal-complaint call. The dispatcher's Hemingwayesque notation read, "Bat out of house. Husband out of closet.' More than 1,700 people ran and walked the starspangled Run for the Troops through downtown Andover Sunday, helping to raise money on behalf of veteran Kevin Dubois.

Between Sunday's race and a dinner event held at the Wyndham Hotel on Old River Road Friday, April 5, the community raised around \$30,000 to help build a home for Marine Cpl. Kevin Dubois, according to co-organizer Bill Pennington. Specifically, the events raise money for Homes For Our Troops, a national non-profit organization that builds homes it gives for free to people disabled fighting in the War on Terrorism.

The groundbreaking for Dubois' home, to be built for his needs in Rhode island, is scheduled for May 18, Pennington said.

Events prior to the race honored Dubois and the beneficiaries of the last two years of Homes For Our Troops events in town: Army Sgt. Joe Smith, who received a home in 2011, and Marine Sgt. Josh Bouchard, who was the focus of the events in 2012.

"It was more than what I expected," said Dubois after the race. "Andover isn't even my town. The support is ridiculous. The course is beautiful; the town put up all the flags along the course. It's a great race."

Many from Andover and beyond said they came to the event to show their appreciation for the military.

Mark Chisholm of Foster Circle in Andover ran with his three children, Charlotte, 10; and 8-year-old twins Jake and Zack.

"We just wanted to come out and support the troops. There are over 30,000 servicepeople with injuries, including some real bad injuries," he said.

Chisholm was in the Marines Reserves during

Reflections on Patriots' Day

Joan Patrakis

Patriots' Day is a special day in New England commemorating the beginning of the American fight for independence. The Revolution against the British began in Massachusetts at Lexington and Concord on the early morning of April 19, 1775. For many years the event was celebrated in Massachusetts and Maine, a colony of Massachusetts at that time, on the traditional date. Since 1969 it has been observed on the third Monday in April.

One hundred and five Minute Men from Andover answered the Lexington

alarm, although they arrived as the British were retreating. Joined by 230 foot soldiers from this town they pursued the enemy to Cambridge. Throughout the war Andover sent 700 men to the battlefield. Many of them were recognized for their contribution.

Peter Martin and John Lovejoy were among a select number of Revolutionary soldiers chosen to serve in the elite Commanderin-Chief's Guard. The men were hand-picked by General George Washington to fill a two-year commitment. Although a good deal is recorded about their military experience, little is known of their personal lives. One of them met a tragic fate while a member of the group. The strict

requirements demanded of each regiment of the Conti-"the flower of the American nental Army present at the Army" speak highly of the Andover men's character.

The Guard, also known as Washington's Life Guard, was formed in the spring of 1776 in Cambridge. Its purpose was to protect the commander-in-chief and the official papers of the Continental Army. The unit, consisting of approximately 180 infantry and cavalry, accompanied Washington in all battles. Because it was an honor to belong to the Guard an effort was made to include soldiers from each of the 13 original colonies.

The General directed the formation of a corps of "sober, intelligent and reliable men." The Guard was initially created by selecting four qualified men from siege of Boston. From that group the necessary number of men was picked.

Washington stipulated that the qualified soldier should demonstrate "habits of sobriety, honesty and good behavior." Candidates were to be between 5' 8" and 5' 10" tall and "handsomely and well-made." The General expressed that as there was nothing more desirable in his eyes than cleanliness in a soldier, the men should be "neat and spruce."

At 16, Peter Martin was among 335 Andover men who answered the alarm of April 19, 1775. John Lovejoy was 32 when in December 1775 he joined Captain John Abbot's Company for one year.

Both men enlisted in the 11th Massachusetts Regiment for a term of three Guard. Von Steuben's trainvears in February 1777. Martin fought in the battle of Stillwater in New York. The Andover men were among four candidates from the regiment recommended to the Guard in 1778. Both residents were selected and transferred that March to General Washington's headquarters at Valley Forge. By then Congress had finally approved supplies for the troops who had suffered through the winter without adequate food and clothing. Several Andover men were among the troops. One of them died.

That spring the Army was re-vitalized by Prussian military expert Baron Friedrich von Steuben, who oversaw

the training and discipline of the men, including the ing regimen showed immediate results in battles against the British at Barren Hill and Monmouth, N.J. Martin and Lovejov participated in the confrontation at Monmouth on June 28, 1778.

Martin served the Guard until 1780. Following his commitment he enlisted with the 2nd Massachusetts and saw action at Yorktown, Va. He continued his military career to war's end in 1783.

Private Lovejoy's service with the Guard was shortlived. In October 1778, while attending an anniversary celebration of Burgoyne's Saratoga defeat, he was run over by a horse and died of his injuries.
